### SEDGEFIELD BLUES CLUB

Sedgefield Rock and Blues Club has been described by the artists that travel from all over the UK as "an absolute gem and a superb place to play music" to a room full of music loving fans.

From humble beginnings in 2010, the Club has since hosted 83 gigs attracting the industry's finest headline bands with their own material and top-quality support acts from around the region.

### **Summer Cycling**

This time of year is usually the nicest time for getting out on your bike. The warmer weather makes it much more pleasant to be out in the sun! There are a few things to think about that will make your ride more comfortable:

Clothing: You don't have to wear Lycra if you don't want to! Normal clothes are perfectly OK for riding short distances and make it easier to pop to the shops or the café without feeling self-conscious! If you want to wear longer trousers, roll up the right leg to keep it away from the chain and avoid it getting caught or covered in oil. For longer rides, proper cycling clothing can make it more comfortable by wicking sweat away from your skin and, being close-fitting, avoids chafing on longer rides.

Water: You will need a drink! Water bottles and cages make it easy to carry water on the bike, but do practise carefully getting the bottle out if you want to drink whilst moving. Top up often or stop at a café or pub. Freezing a part-full bottle the night before a longer ride will keep the water colder for longer. Sun-cream and hat: You will catch the sun and the wind over your skin makes it harder to notice getting sunburn! Use suncream and remember to re-apply. A buff or cycling cap worn under your bike helmet is also a good idea.



Try to plan a longer ride to allow for regular rest and refreshment; it's a great excuse to use local businesses! Remember to have a drink before you feel thirsty. You should also carry a snack in case you run low on energy, which can happen suddenly if you become dehydrated.

### **Active Travel Paradise**

I have just returned from a short break in Copenhagen, which is a paradise for walking and cycling! In the city centre, most people walk or cycle, and cars are quite rare and found mostly on the major routes through the city. Side roads are often narrow and parking is hard to find, which encourages people to use active travel options.

There are many public transport options in the city too, with a reliable and convenient bus, tram and underground system that makes it easier for less mobile people to get around. Drivers also have to drive cautiously because of the amount of active travel, so motor vehicle speeds are usually low which makes it safer for everyone to get around. Many large cities on the continent are taking a more active approach to transport; Amsterdam is famous for it but, more recently, Paris has taken steps to increase active travel across a large part of the city. If these places can make a change, surely we can make a few improvements in the Sedgefield area?

### **Growing the change we need**



Last September, I saw a Facebook post about Seeds2Trees, a project launched by Living Woods to enable people to grow UK native trees from seeds to be used in tree planting schemes across the North East. As a keen gardener, I asked if I could get involved and in November I collected my growing kit - plastic seed trays and netting, all of which will be reused by the next growers - plus my bags of seeds - 75 English Oak acorns, 30 Common Hazelnuts and enough small seeds to grow 15 Silver Birch and 15 Common Alder. Following the instructions, my seeds are now germinating and growing

Once they reach 15cm/6" tall they need to be potted on into Tetrapaks, the cardboard drinks containers. As I need well over 100, I wondered where I could find a ready supply.

I approached Marie Cato and her team at Zen Den Wellbeing Coffee Lounge on The Square and asked if



they could save some for me. They readily agreed and as they offer lots of different milk options (oat, soya, almond, coconut) so they get through a lot each week. As there are three other Seeds2Trees growers in Sedgefield, I am sharing them around. As Marie says, "It is great to see the cartons being re-used for this lovely project".



I will be sad to see my trees leave but hopefully I will find out where they get planted and I will be able to visit a copse or forest of native trees. ### STEVE'S NATURE DIARY AUGUST 2023

Whilst trying to decide what to write about this month a new book arrived, part of a series that I collect and therefore I don't have to follow the house rule - a new book in means an old book has to go to a charity shop!

The book is all about a particular group of insects which can be found in a variety of habitats including your garden - Shieldbugs. They belong to a diverse order of insects called Hemiptera (True Bugs) a huge group of around 100,000 species which includes aphids, whiteflies, scale insects, leafhoppers, froghoppers, spittlebugs, cicadas, lanternflies, capsids, bedbugs, water scorpions, water boatman, backswimmers and water-skaters. Phew!



I have seen several species in my garden and, when on bug hunts with groups, we use a technique whereby you hold a white tray (or white material) underneath a bush and tap it gently collecting anything that falls off into the tray. It's always a bonus when you find a Shieldbug. They are chunky, glossy, often large and strongly coloured and many have a distinctly shield shape - great to see. They have a clockwork way of moving and will often spend a few minutes on the hand to let you get a closer look. When disturbed some Shieldbugs will give off a mild, oily almond scent, hence the name they are given by some people "stinkbug". They don't bite and generally are not a pest in the garden. There have been around 80 species recorded in the British Isles and they are not too difficult to identify.



The Hawthorn Shieldbug is the Shieldbug species that you are most likely to encounter. This handsome invertebrate can be found wherever suitable shrubby foodplants are available - from garden to woodland. Eggs are laid in spring and, over the summer, the nymphs feed on ripening red berries, particularly hawthorn, but also rowan, whitebeam and cotoneaster. The adults appear from late August and will often wander quite far from their foodplant, occasionally being attracted to lights at

night, when they may turn up in moth traps. The adults go into hibernation in the late autumn, emerging again in the spring to breed. There are five similar green-and-red Shieldbugs. The Gorse Shieldbug is more rounded than the Hawthorn Shieldbug, while the Hairy Shieldbug is covered in short hairs and has a black-and-white-chequered pattern around the edge of the body. The Birch and Juniper Shieldbugs are both similar in shape to the Hawthorn Shieldbug, but are much smaller and have a different pattern. So why not spend some time this summer and see if you can find a Shieldbug in your garden and admire it.

### **Police Operations**

Two joint North East police force operations are currently up and running covering our area:

- Operation Walrus (the names are chosen from a random list!) is targeting Rural Crime, which has increased by over 40% in the last year. Favourite items for thieves include GPS systems, used on tractors and other large farm machinery. Sanctions imposed on Russia have made these items difficult to purchase there so they are highly sought after on the black market.

-Operation Galio involves five police forces and is targeting rural poaching, again on the increase.

Extensive police resources are being deployed in both these operations. Please continue to be vigilant regarding these issues and report any suspicious vehicles or persons to the police. I know that the <u>Farm Watcher</u> Facebook site is a valuable tool in the sharing of relevant information.

### Phone and online scams

Phone and online scams now account for more than 40% of UK recorded crime. In the last year, over 340,000 such scams have resulted in the loss of more than £3.7 billion. 70% of scams originate from outside the UK. If you receive such a suspicious call, text or email, remember:

- 1. Take five. Take five minutes to think about it. If you don't know the number, don't answer it, If it's important they'll leave a message. If you do answer a call and it seems suspicious, just hang up and block that number on your phone.
- 2. Never open a link online which you are unsure about. Ask a friend or relative what they think.
- 3. Never divulge banking details or passwords on the phone or online. Banks will never request such details in such a way.
- 4. Report any such suspicious activity to Action Fraud on 0300 1232040 or through the online reporting tool at actionfraud.police.uk.

### **Facebook**

Sedgefield Neighbourhood Watch Facebook page currently has over 620 users. It is a great way to pass on information on suspicious activity, keep up to date with local relevant information, ask questions on security and safety equipment, or neighbourhood issues important to you. A recent post regarding broken glass in a particular area of the village and it's effect on mobility users, prompted me to have a look at the area and report it to the Town Council. A good example of keeping in touch at a local level.

Talking of keeping in touch; as always, please continue to report any incidents of ASB, criminal damage etc. or any suspicious activity to the police on 101 or 999 in an emergency alternatively you can report anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555111.

We will not be holding a Neighbourhood Watch meeting in August, due to holiday commitments but we will be back at Ceddesfeld Hall on Thursday 14 September at 7:30 pm and would love to see you there for a chat and an update on keeping Sedgefield safe.

### Section 106 monies

In general terms, Section 106 monies are funds paid to local authorities by developers, on completion of a housing or other development, and are intended to be used to assist in capital infrastructure projects in that area.

Durham County Council are currently holding a consultation regarding the Sedgefield Ward (Sedgefield, Fishburn, Mordon, Bradbury, Thorpe Larches and the surrounding area) and projects under consideration are:

- 1. Butterwick Road cemetery expansion.
- 2. Eden Drive and Winterton play areas.
- 3. The Active Travel Initiative (cycling/walking/highway safety).

### **Defibrillator at The Dun Cow**

After being diagnosed with a terminal illness, Lesley Anne Baker from Washington dedicated her time to raising funds for community defibrillators. Lesley, who had worked for the North East Ambulance Service, sadly passed away last year but an ex-colleague set up Lesley's Defib Team which continues her work with ongoing support from the Rotary North East One Life Initiative group. When the Sedgefield Village Veterans heard her story, the association raised £400 for the cause. This, along with an additional donation from the team, was allocated to the One Life Initiative for a defibrillator and cabinet for the village. A grant of £300 from the East Durham Rural Corridor AAP then enabled the purchase of the equipment which has been installed outside The Dun Cow Inn.



Phil Hopps from the Rotary NE One Life Initiative said: "Lesley spent the last year of her life helping to raise funds for this potentially life-saving equipment. Through her job with the ambulance service, she was only too aware of the importance of CPR and the availability of a defibrillator in the event of someone experiencing a cardiac arrest. She was a determined person who focused on ensuring more defibrillators were accessible, not only in her home town but also in other parts of the region".

Phil thanked everyone who has been involved to see the unit sited at The Dun Cow and following the installation of the cabinet by local electrician Mark Foster, the defibrillator was registered on The Circuit (thecircuit.uk) and is now available to the local community.

Remember - in the event of a medical emergency always phone 999 or 112 and seek help. If a defibrillator is required and there is one available nearby, the ambulance service will give the information on where it is and how to access it.





### X21 bus update

It is not looking likely that the direct link to Darlington will be restored in the near future, but there is some hope that the link as far as Newton Aycliffe might be reinstated, from where there are other services to link to Darlington. However, that's by no means certain. The decision was taken by Arriva and the county council can't directly reinstate every service that's been cut. Unfortunately, the fact that the X21 was so underused between Trimdon and Aycliffe adds to the challenge of reinstating it, as the annual cost of running it is about £150,000. However, although the numbers are

small in the greater scheme of things, the impact on each person is big. On a practical level, the low numbers just add to the challenges of first finding a company that will run the service, and then sustaining funding for it.

It's a really disappointing and frustrating situation, and not one that any of us wants, but it's the stark reality being faced here and all over the county.

I wish that I had more positive news. There isn't any at this stage, but I will continue to push for action, politically and through officers. I've done more lobbying in the last week and have also asked our MP to keep pushing on this where he can. As soon as there is any more news to share, I will do so. Councillor Chris Lines


