### Jack Smith surprised with freedom of Sedgefield

**Paralympic gold medal winner Jack Smith received a big surprise when he returned to his old school in Sedgefield last month.** Jack was invited into Sedgefield Primary School to talk to pupils about his life and career as a wheelchair rugby player. What he hadn't been told was that after presenting to the school assembly, a delegation from Sedgefield Town Council was on hand to award Jack the freedom of Sedgefield, in recognition of his achievements. Jack's family was also on hand to witness the presentation. Afterwards, Jack was taken outside to unveil a plaque that commemorates the gold medal that he won with his Team GB teammates at the Tokyo Paralympics in 2021.



Jack Smith comments: "This was a very surreal and unexpected experience. I play rugby because I enjoy it and don't really expect that all of these other things will come off the back of that. It's hard to believe that there's now a plaque up in my honour at Sedgefield Primary School, where I was a pupil.

"In the national squad, we've already moved on from Tokyo and had other tournaments. Occasions like this are a definite reminder of what we achieved, but looking forward, I hope that more people can be encouraged to try wheelchair rugby.

The North East Bulls train at the Community College here in Sedgefield and are always keen to welcome anyone who wants to give the sport a try.

"It was brilliant to meet and talk to the children at the school, and I feel very honoured to have been awarded the freedom of Sedgefield. Thank you to Sedgefield Town Council, the school and everyone else who was involved in this."

Cllr Mel Carr, chair of Sedgefield Town Council, comments: "The award of Honorary Freeman is the highest accolade Sedgefield Town Council can bestow. This award is only given to people who have given a significant to contribution to public life in our local area. The town council has granted this award to Jack in recognition of his fantastic sporting achievements and his steely determination to overcome adversity in order to succeed at the very highest level. We are not only proud of Jack's sporting achievements, but also the way in which he represents Sedgefield by being an inspiring role model to young people. Jack Smith MBE joins a very small group of people who have been given the title of Honorary Freeman of Sedgefield".



### STEVE'S NATURE DIARY DECEMBER 2022


As winter develops and dark nights are upon us, there is less time to get a fix of nature connection, or vitamin N, as some people call it. You sometimes have to find different ways to experience nature, so last week we went to a new exhibition at The Baltic, which did have an environmental theme and was particularly good. The exhibition also had a North East flavour and as the blurb

says "Hinterlands is a group exhibition that invites us to consider our relationship with the land and its ecosystems. The artists showcase and explore complex histories, mythologies, legacies and potential futures for its custodianship. New commissions and existing works by artists connected with the area reflect on ideas of rootedness and belonging, human and more-than-human relationships, boundaries, land and time in the era of the climate emergency." The



exhibition is multi-sensory with various innovative artistic processes and approaches with installations related to ancient woodland, the sound of electric pylons and a collection of material fragments from Industrial Teesside. Stand out experiences included: Foundations Press and its risograph prints entitled "Field Club" which celebrates one of the oldest naturalist groups in the North East of England, The Cleveland Naturalist Club formed in 1881; and Laura Harrington's "Fieldworking" - 6 artists, an ecologist, and 2 film makers who spent five days in an off-grind location surrounded by moorland and blanket bog - the result is fascinating sounds and pictures of a unique environment recorded in a unique way.

Talking about moorland, Durham Wildlife Trust has marked its half-century by unveiling its 50th nature reserve. The Trust launched its '50@50' campaign two years ago – aiming to grow its number of nature reserves from 42 to 50 by the end of its 50th anniversary year. And its latest acquisition, which will be known as Cuthbert's Moor, a 300-acre site in Teesdale, means that the Trust can celebrate the success of its campaign. The 50@50 initiative is part of The Wildlife Trusts' wider objective to protect 30 per cent of land and sea for wildlife by 2030. The Trusts consider this essential to combat the decline of wildlife in the UK, considered one of the most nature-depleted countries on Earth. Cuthbert's Moor, designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest, is home to a variety of species, including curlew, snipe, meadow pipits, skylark, common lizard and stoat. This upland moorland is also the first nature reserve of its kind that Durham Wildlife Trust has acquired. The Trust will spend the next year surveying the site and its wildlife to inform its long-term nature recovery plans. I am looking forward to visiting the reserve and learning how the Trust will try to improve biodiversity on the site. Many people now value wildlife more than ever, and there's a growing understanding of just how important the natural world is to modern society. Nature will form part of any solution to the climate crisis; if we don't take action to restore wildlife, we won't stop climate change.

#### **CHRISTMAS**

A time for giving.....but sadly a time for taking too !

Durham Police are working hard over Christmas to keep you and your family safe, but here are a few simple steps we can all take to help. When you are out shopping:

□ Keep valuables in inside pockets of clothing or bags.

- □ Only carry the cash and cards that you need.
- Avoid returning to the car to leave your shopping half way through your trip.

□ If you have to leave presents in the car, make sure they are locked out of sight in the boot and keep the receipts with you, not with the presents. At home:

Don't leave presents under the Christmas tree or valuables lying around, especially if they are visible from windows or doors.

□ Keep doors and windows locked at all times and keys out of sight.

□ If you go out at night, make sure your property looks occupied by using a light timer or TV simulator (available at NHW meetings) ,or leave a radio on. □ Mark your possessions with your postcode. You can register your property for free on the National Property Marking Database immobilise.com. □ Don't open the door to anybody you don't recognise.

#### **VILLAGE SAFETY ISSUES**

Durham County Council will shortly be launching a public consultation regarding our village safety. Questions will be asked on a number of issues, including pedestrian safety and the proposed construction and location of further zebra crossings in the village; traffic calming measures and the possible introduction of selective 20 mph areas; and increased accessibility for pedal cycles and mobility scooters and their safe parking. These are just some of the areas up for your discussion so make sure you look out for the publication of details, join in and have your say.

#### VILLAGE GREEN DAMAGE

I'm sure we were all saddened and disappointed to hear of the recent damage caused to the numerous flower tubs on the village green, particularly those in front of our War Memorial the week before Remembrance Sunday. Numerous reports have been received of school children removing plants and throwing them at each other or passing vehicles. Other than an Offence of Criminal Damage, the destruction of these plants has a cost issue for our Council, who don't have extra funding to keep replacing flowers and plants. 

Care in our community

A few weeks ago there was an accident outside our house. An elderly lady in a malfunctioning wheelchair had come down the steep slope outside the Social Club and been tipped face down into the road, hurting her face and her neck. An ambulance was called and we were told it would take 2 hours. It was a very cold day; so, with some other neighbours (including a retired doctor) we covered the lady with blankets and gave her four hot water bottles. We were really worried about her getting hypothermia. The local police arrived and stayed a while, providing a heat-reflecting cover and some cones on the road to protect her. They tried to put pressure on the ambulance to come more quickly, but were told it would now be 3 hours! In the meantime many of the people walking or driving past came to offer help. I joked with the lady, saying if she had £5 for every offer of help, she would be rich. We managed to call the lady's sister in Darlington and they were able to exchange a few words (not easy when you are lying on your face). We also contacted her carers who came straight over and waited with her, in spite of the cold. After 2<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> hrs an ambulance arrived, but it was not in answer to our call. Some schoolboys had walked past our little group on their way through the village. As they walked past the fire station, they had seen an ambulance and its crew having a rest. The boys went up to the ambulance and reported our casualty. Bless the crew, they gave up their break and came straight over. Our patient was soon put onto a stretcher. As she looked up at some birds circling overhead our patient cracked a joke in a weak voice. 'Tell those birds I am not ready to go yet!' You will be pleased to know the lady concerned is now back home and travelling about the village again. This letter is not aimed at the difficulties being faced by

ambulance crews. We all know only too well about them. It is meant to celebrate the kindness and care offered by the community in Sedgefield. Long may it continue! Alison Manning


### **Sleeping Beauty**




