

Another successful Christmas Tree Festival

St Edmund's Church looked spectacular, adorned with 35 Christmas trees for the 2023 festival. Thank you to all the organisations and individuals who came up with brilliant ideas for the decoration of each of the trees on the theme: Christmas Around the World.

The judges, Pam Royle and Jack Smith, had a difficult job selecting the winners in each of the categories as the standard was so high. During the 10 days of the festival over 2,200 people came through the doors and £4,310 was raised, after costs. This has been shared between Feeding Families North East (a food poverty charity based in Sedgefield which provides emergency food boxes for individuals and families in need) and St Edmund's Church.

Community College update

We're in the early days of the spring term here at SCC and able to look back on some fantastic events that took place at the end of the autumn term as we approached the festive season. Amongst these events, a particular highlight was our annual carol concert that was a fantastic opportunity to celebrate the many talented musicians that we have here at the school.

A wide range of different performances took place, ranging from those delivered by the whole school band to individual solo performances. All of the students should feel incredibly proud of their efforts. Whilst there were many highlights to the concert, the performance of 'Fairytale of New York' by Jamie, Libby and Mr Posmyk was one that will live long in the memory! As well as this, Mr Posmyk introduced a greater level of audience participation than in the past, with a number of carols where everyone was 'encouraged' to join in! As is always the case, our families were wonderfully supportive of the students and it was brilliant to see so many in school to share in the celebration of the musical talents of our children. The next musical showcase for our students will take place at the end of the spring term and families can look forward to this taking place in March.



Computer Science

Since returning to school at Sedgefield Hardwick after the Christmas holiday period, we have been working hard in Year 5 on our Computer Science curriculum. We have been using our iPads to create written code which we have then used to execute commands and algorithms. We have used an Apple-developed app called Swift Playgrounds in our lessons. This cutting-edge application allows us to write, execute and debug our code in an environment that looks like a 3D platform-based game. The written code which we use is called Camel-case, and builds on the block-based code we have previously used.

We have utilised our technical computing abilities such as using for loops (repeating commands a set number of times), creating functions (a new set of commands put together in order to complete a task) and initialising types (giving a character a set role, a bit like a blueprint!) to create an exciting, immersive platform game level, which we are then going to present to our

classmates!

Through building our understanding of written code through these lessons, we'll be ready to code more complex physical devices in the summer, like drones and Micro:Bits!! Keep an eye out on our social media for more pictures and videos of our creations!



Beads of Courage

One of our pupils has demonstrated amazing courage and resilience throughout her life. Rosa was diagnosed with child leukaemia aged two. Following diagnosis, she has undergone a wide range of treatments in her recovery programme, collecting a bead to represent each stage of this treatment programme.

The Beads of Courage programme was first introduced in the UK in 2011 and it is designed to support children through their treatment. It allows their story to be told using beads. The beads are meaningful symbols of courage that commemorate different milestones, such as chemotherapy, blood transfusions, hospital stays and radiotherapy.

The beads allowed Rosa to explain her journey to the class.



On 30 January, Rosa will commemorate her sixth year in remission. Sedgefield Primary was delighted to ring the bell for Rosa whilst she was a pupil in our Early Years Foundation Stage. The whole school took part in a fund raising event, a wig walk around Hardwick Park to raise money for this worthy cause. We are so proud of the resilience Rosa (now age 10) shows every day.

Amazing attendance

Amazing attendance is something we, at Sedgefield Primary, are very proud of. Class 5 were delighted to receive the best school attendance award in December. They thoroughly enjoyed being awarded additional playtime on the first day back at school in January and were thrilled to be able to spend time with their class mates, many of whom they had missed seeing over the Christmas holidays. Community walk of the Sedgefield Heritage 100

Sedgefield News has already reported on the launch of a Heritage 100 walk in Sedgefield by a charity called the Walk and Talk Trust. The three-mile figure-of-eight route starts and finishes on the village green outside St Edmund's Church, and showcases Sedgefield's unique historical landmarks and the natural beauty of the nearby countryside. Work will start soon on writing the story of the walk, which will be used to promote the route. Meanwhile, the Walk and Talk Trust will host a community walk around the route, on the afternoon of Sunday 4 February. The group walk will start at 1pm on the Village Green and will be led by the trust's operations manager, Keiron Young. Given the time of year, the route might be muddy in places, and suitable outdoor clothing and footwear is recommended. However, it's not an arduous walk and is mainly on clear, well defined tracks in and around Hardwick Park. Everyone will be welcome (along with well behaved four legged friends!).

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY FEBRUARY 2024

On my last walk in January, I came across some very early catkins which are always nice to find. They were on a Hazel tree. Hazel is a small, shrubby tree that can be found in a variety of habitats, such as woodlands, gardens and grasslands. It is famous for its long, yellow, male catkins (known as 'lamb'stails') that appear in spring, and its green, ripening to brown, fruits (familiar to us as 'hazelnuts') that appear in late summer. These nuts are a favourite food of grey squirrels, dormice and wood mice, and some small mammals will cache their finds, storing them in burrows or old birds' nests. When I looked closely at the catkins I noticed further along the branch interesting red flowers. Hazel is monoecious, meaning that both male and female flowers are found on the same tree, although hazel flowers must be pollinated by pollen from other hazel trees. The yellow male catkins appear before the leaves and hang in clusters from mid-February. Female flowers are tiny and bud-like with red styles and it is these that I found.

Hazel is quite often managed by coppicing - this gives a source of wood and can provide an improved habitat for wildlife. Coppicing is the practice of cutting the stems of a tree down to the base every few years, allowing new shoots to grow and providing a crop of wood. Hazel has been coppiced for 4,000 years and the poles have been used for wattle (canes woven into a lattice pattern) to make fencing, hurdles and the foundation of wattle-and-daub walls for houses. Hazel is still used today for making crafts, screens and even bean poles.

Bees will occasionally collect pollen from catkins and speaking of bees, for the fourth year in a row, British Sugar have asked Defra to allow the 'emergency' use of a banned pesticide. Farmers were promised support to move towards nature-friendly farming and should not have to choose between pesticides or pollinators. The Farming Minister, Mark Spencer, will decide whether or not to allow this banned chemical on

the crops AGAIN. Say 'yes' to healthy bees. Say 'yes' to healthy rivers. Help to urge the Farming Minister to say 'No to Neonics' by visiting action.wildlifetrusts.org/page/139962/action/1.

Veterans need you

Sedgefield Village Veterans
Association was formed in
2006 by a small number of
ex-service personnel who were
residents of Sedgefield. The original
aim was to provide a social circle
and mutual support for like-minded
people. Social meetings (meals out,
visits to pubs & cafes) and cultural
events (visits to military museums,
etc.) soon followed.

Over time, the membership numbers expanded by including military veterans from surrounding villages. This enabled the team to commence charitable support and raising funds, also becoming a member of Sedgefield Community Association. The monthly coffee morning held on the last Friday of each month in the Parish Hall is the main source of income. The popularity has risen—it now attracts up to 100 visitors each month.



We are well known in the village from laying wreaths on Remembrance Day in Sedgefield, at Middlesbrough Football Club and for our service every Armistice Day (11 November) at the cenotaph outside St Luke's Church, Winterton. As listed in last month's edition, the Association has made numerous donations to a wide range of causes. The majority of the founder members are sadly no longer with us and, after a recent accident, our active member numbers have dwindled. This meant the January coffee morning was unfortunately cancelled. Luckily, we've received offers of assistance from the good people of Sedgefield to enable February and March coffee mornings to go ahead.

In 2023, our constitution was amended to include any ex- or serving civilian uniformed people (Fire Brigade, Merchant Navy, NHS, Police, etc.) and their partners to become members. The current situation is unsustainable and, without new blood, the group is likely to fold. SPORTS UPDATE

By the time you read this, Sedgefield will have hosted the English Northern Cross Country Championships in East Park, welcoming runners representing clubs from the North East, Cumbria, Yorkshire, Humberside, Lancashire, Merseyside, Greater Manchester, Cheshire, Derbyshire, Lincolnshire and the Isle of Man. Among them will have been many of the country's best club athletes, some of whom have represented their nation at international events. The championships are organised by Northern Athletics, but can only go ahead with support from an army of volunteers, host club Sedgefield Harriers, landowners such as Durham County Council, and local organisations and businesses such as Sedgefield Racecourse, Sedgefield Cricket Club and Number Four (marshals need their packed lunches!). Hopefully, everything went to plan and there was also a good turn out of spectators on hand to enjoy the action!

Football

Sedgefield St Edmund's FC enjoyed an excellent start to the season, and at the time of typing this had gone unbeaten in all 16 games played (over 90 minutes), losing just one cup tie 13-12 on penalties. The weather has played havoc with the fixtures, so the team has only completed two fixtures in seven weeks up to 20 January.

There is loads to play for in the second half of the season, with the club still in three cups (facing two quarter finals and the last 16 of the Durham County Cup). St Edmund's have only played seven league games, so if they continue to progress in other competitions, they could be playing three games every week towards the end of the season, which will bring its own challenges.

Athletics

Sedgefield Harriers hosted the club's winter handicap race for the Gerry Kearsley Trophy on Sunday 14 January. There was a record number of runners for the free to enter event, with 141 tackling the multi-terrain two-lap route of around six miles, starting and finishing at Bishop Middleham Village Hall. In the handicap format, athletes set off at intervals based on their declared best time over 10km during the previous 12 months, with the slowest starting first. As a result, most of those who took part finished within a few minutes of each other, making for an exciting race and a challenging job for the volunteers who were recording the results.



First across the line and winner of the Gerry Kearsley Trophy was Andrew Lilley of Runfit Hartlepool in a race time of 51 minutes and 38 seconds. First female Harrier over the line was Samantha Foreman in 57:06 and first male Harrier was Chris Lines in 40:17. The fastest runner overall was Ryan Watson of Sedgefield Harriers in 36:49 and the fastest female runner was another Harrier, Sadie Abel, in 45:04. Refreshments sold before and after the race raised around £300 for the food poverty charity Feeding Families. The club is grateful to Bishop Middleham Village Hall for allowing the event to be hosted there, and to all of the volunteers who helped out on the day.

Cricket

At Sedgefield Cricket Club, the first main pre-season event is on Sunday 4 February when the annual 'Kit Day' is held at the clubhouse. Kit suppliers Icon Sports will be in attendance from 10am-2pm to help players size themselves up for the club's branded clothing and equipment. 
