Shortlisted for world's best school

Sedgefield Hardwick has been announced as one of the world's top 10 most innovative schools!

This month, Sedgefield Hardwick was a hive of excitement following some incredible news. At the inaugural Innovation Festival, which is an event to be held annually by the schools within the Laidlaw Schools Trust, Sedgefield Hardwick was named the UK's top school for Innovation by the World's Best School Prizes and is currently on a shortlist of the top ten schools worldwide. Headteacher Paul Taylor said, "As part of Laidlaw Schools Trust (LST), innovation is at the heart of everything we do. An innovative approach to education nurtures a culture of curiosity, exploration, and problem-solving, equipping children with essential skills for their personal, academic, and professional growth." Sally Newton, Director of Education for LST, commented, "Winning this award would mean a huge amount, not least in providing a platform to influence schools worldwide in a much-needed change to pedagogical approaches."



During the festival, children, from all primary schools within the Trust as well as pupils from Sedgefield Primary, participated in seven challenges in different innovation stations. The seven different innovation stations were uniquely linked to the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals. This gave the pupils a fantastic opportunity to learn about critical global challenges, such as climate change and poverty, while exploring innovative solutions to tackle them.

One of the stations asked the children to create a water filtration system while another station involved building solar powered robots to find ways to reduce carbon emissions from vehicles. The children were assisted by current Year 9 pupils from Sedgefield Community College, who were all Sedgefield Hardwick Alumni. Many came to help the school and the Trust celebrate. The Mayor of Sedgefield and his consort were on hand to enjoy the day along with members of local community groups. The children were also visited by Britain's Got Talent's very own Titan the Robot, who proved to be a very popular guest and helped to create an unforgettable experience for all in attendance. "The stations were brilliant as it opened our minds to worldwide problems," commented Jessie, a Year 5 pupil. "We are immensely proud of our school and what we have achieved. We hope to now achieve to be named number one in the world", stated Cameron and Eliza.

Centenary Shield ESFA U18's

17 year old George Wilkinson from Sedgefield was part of England's successful U18 team in the recent English Schools' Football Association Centenary Shield campaign, contested in matches between the home nations and the Republic of Ireland.

The first match saw George and the team fly out to Athlone Town FC in Ireland for a few days, where England got off to a good start, winning 3-1. For the next game, England travelled to Broadwood Stadium, Cumbernauld, Scotland, and again beat the home team 3-1. The team followed this up with a tight 1-0 victory over Northern Ireland at Billericay Town FC. The final match against Wales at Hednesford Town FC was a nailbiting decider. The two opponents went into the game completely level in the tournament and the 1-1 result meant that the shield was shared between England and Wales. For the last game, the England team had the privilege of staying at the national sports complex in Lilleshall, Newport, which provides world class sporting facilities to some of the country's leading sportsmen and women.

The whole experience was amazing for George and his team mates, from receiving an England cap, singing his heart out to the national anthem at the start of the match, signing autographs for school children, staying in hotels, and travelling to various parts of the country. It was a special time that George won't forget.

Something wicked this way comes

Shortly before half-term, we were delighted to welcome the Coram Shakespeare Theatre Company to the school in order to work with a group of our Year 7 students on a performance of Macbeth. The unique nature of the performance saw the students being introduced to the play, devising their own interpretation of key scenes, before delivering a performance to an actual audience – all within the space of one day!



It was fantastic to see how our students blossomed through the day, visibly growing in confidence and enjoying the range of experiences the workshop offered. The day culminated in the performance to parents and school staff, where initial nervous faces shone with pride as they graced the stage with confidence and enthusiasm in abundance.

Our audience of parents and staff members were "wowed" with our students' incredible knowledge and dramatic interpretation of Shakespeare's play, honed in just a few hours. Shakespeare was certainly made accessible and enjoyable to our students through this amazing experience, and the practical approach to the specific scenes demystified the language of the Bard, and students were quoting key lines with ease. This really was an excellent experience and one our students will remember for years to come. Later this term, we look forward to inviting a different theatre group into

school to work with other students on their own Shakespearean performance!

Sedgefield Local History Society to the rescue

During a recent extensive tour of the UK, Canadian visitors Frank and Michelle Arrowsmith were delighted to visit the former Sedgefield home of a 19th century ancestor. Just off the A689, at the end of the old cemetery road, Donnewell is now home to Joyce and Peter Littlefair, who in recent years diversified from farming into running a caravan site and dog exercise area. Generations of Littlefairs farmed at Donnewell for almost 100 years. They gave a warm welcome to Frank and Michelle and

were able to fill in further details about the life and times of their forebears. Born in 1803, married in Sedgefield in 1832, the 1841 census shows John Arrowsmith living at Donnewell with his wife Elizabeth, five children and several servants. They appear to have been relatively wealthy, providing jumps in their extensive grounds where neighbours of similar social standing could bring their horses to exercise.

At some point, John, now Captain Arrowsmith joined the Durham militia. He died in 1847 and is buried with a very impressive headstone in St Oswald's churchyard in Durham. Presumably, the Arrowsmiths left Donnewell sometime between 1841 and 1861, as the 1861 census shows widow Elizabeth and her family living at 510ld Elvet in the parish of St Oswald. Having done extensive family history research, their Canadian descendants were pleased to be able to visit both the Durham house and John Arrowsmith's grave.

They were very grateful to the Littlefairs and to Norma and Haydn Neal of Sedgefield Local History Society, who enjoyed a full day in their company.

Heritage trail

This term we welcomed local author and member of Sedgefield History Society, Norma Neal into school. The Year 4 children were very keen to learn about the history of Sedgefield. Guided by Norma, they followed Sedgefield Heritage Trail, visited St. Edmund's Church and investigated our school building to search for clues about it's past. Many interesting artefacts were uncovered, which the children thoroughly enjoyed exploring.



During English lessons, Norma shared chapters of her book The Magic Mobile with Year 4 and passed on her knowledge of the local area. She was so impressed by the children's interest, enthusiasm and writing skills that she gifted them each a signed copy of her novel, which was gratefully received. With huge thanks to Norma Neal, Brian Mutch and Sedgefield Local History Society for the considerable time and effort that has gone into making such a memorable summer term for Year 4 at Sedgefield Primary School.

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY JULY 2023

As I write this, at last we have some hot and sunny weather. Last week the northeast was covered in a blanket of cloud and whilst the rest of the country was sweltering, it was a chilly 12 degrees with a cool breeze. As a result of this cooler weather, I hadn't seen many butterflies, but that all changed this week when I visited two of our local nature reserves: Thrislington and Bishop Middleham and saw a few. Meanwhile in the garden they are still few and far between.

Every year, Butterfly Conservation organise a Big Butterfly Count, which is a UK-wide survey aimed at helping them to assess the health of our environment simply by counting the amount and type of butterflies (and some day-flying moths) people see. The results from last year have been released. Results were mixed but overall, the trend for butterflies across the UK remains a declining one, with the results of the Big Butterfly Count 2022 showing an average of just under 9 butterflies seen per count, which is once again an all-time low in the thirteen years since the citizen science project began. Species that saw a worrying decline from last year include some well-known favourites, such as Red Admiral, Small White and Meadow Brown. Almost 100,000 Butterfly Counts were carried out during the event, with participants spending a combined total of over two and a half years counting butterflies in their gardens, local parks and in the countryside.

For some species numbers were up including Gatekeeper, Common Blue, Holy Blue and Comma. Some of this can be explained by an increase in range for these butterflies— a result of climate change— accounting for many of the sightings of these species in the north of the UK.

The vast majority of Big Butterfly Counts are done in gardens, which makes this data especially valuable because this type of habitat is under-represented in many other counts. It is possible for people to help - you can create habitats for butterflies such as the holly blue and comma in gardens, by cultivating holly and flowering ivy for the former and growing hops, elms and nettles for the latter. Gardens that are wildlife friendly can provide vital habitats for these insects, allowing them space to feed, breed and shelter.



The Big Butterfly Count is the largest citizen-science project of its kind and relies on volunteers spending 15 minutes outside each summer, counting the number and type of butterflies they see. Taking part each year helps scientists to gather important data on how butterflies and moths are coping with changing climate, changing weather, and habitat loss. This year's Big Butterfly Count will take place from Friday 14 July – Sunday 6 August 2023. For more details visit bigbutterflycount.butterfly-conservation.org.

Cuts to Arriva bus services in Sedgefield and Fishburn

You may have heard that Arriva plans to cut more bus services in County Durham. Specifically, from 9 July, the X21 will no longer run between Sedgefield, Newton Aycliffe and Darlington, meaning that there will be no direct service between the three communities.

Our local councillor, Chris Lines, reports that he has written to officers in the Integrated Passenger Transport team and to Cllr Elizabeth Scott, who is the relevant portfolio holder in the DCC Cabinet. He has highlighted that:

- This development is disastrous for people of all ages and backgrounds in the ward.
- There has been a lot of rhetoric from the national Government in recent times about commitments to bus service improvements. This news is a signal that the opposite is happening.
- There is a lot of good work underway on 'Active Travel' initiatives in Sedgefield and the wider county to improve footpaths and cycle routes and encourage people to walk and ride. These projects will be undermined by reductions in bus services that push more residents towards using private care

DCC's Integrated Passenger Team is exploring options for at least continuing/resuming a service between Sedgefield and Newton Aycliffe (from which there are several services to Darlington). Both Carmel School and Queen Elizabeth Sixth Form College run bus services for students, but for everyone else, the loss of the X21 is a big blow.

Farmers Market stall

Despite the cool temperature, it was a fruitful morning and we had quite a bit of interest in our safety and security equipment available for sale and to order. Advice was given on a range of topics and it was good to meet so many enquiring residents.

ASB diary

ourwatch.org.uk is the website of the National Neighbourhood Watch. In partnership with local authorities, they have launched an Antisocial Behaviour Diary. If you are suffering from what you consider to be ASB, you will be able to visit the site, gain advice and guidance and if necessary, print off an antisocial behaviour diary. This is a 12 day record of the incidents which you simply complete on a daily basis and submit to the local authority, giving details of location, type and frequency of the disturbance and how it affects you personally. As with reporting to the police, the more the disturbance is reported, the greater the likelihood of future action being taken to remedy the situation.

NHW Meeting 8 June

Many thanks to all attendees of our last meeting. PCSO Amy Jorgeson joined in the discussions on a number of topics raised by concerned residents, which included;

- Two new Special Constable's being allocated to Sedgefield. More uniform patrols on our streets is good news and they will be very welcome.
- Continuing action against illegal sale and use of vapes. A recent walk down the footpath between Sedgefield Post Office and the Co-op car park revealed a host of empty packaging and discarded vape canisters, not only litter but also a health hazard.
- Proposed use of lamppost cameras. Wireless cameras which can be located and moved wherever there is a need to identify ASB and other crime issues. This type of equipment has been used in other areas and further enquiries and discussions will follow. The use of drones was also considered but the prohibitive cost of the equipment together with training, licensing and restrictions on their use are all topics for future consideration. It was noted however, that drones are currently used by all the emergency services and have been proven to be a useful surveillance tool.

Crime and community survey

This recent survey provided evidence to suggest that residents who are members of their local NHW feel more assured of their safety, better informed, less isolated, more trusting of their fellow residents and generally happier in their community. So "Join us" - see <u>ourwatch.org.uk</u> for details.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 13 July in Ceddesfeld Hall at 7:30 pm. We have been promised a police presence again and our ever increasing stock of safety/security equipment, including our Holiday Boxes, will be displayed. We will not hold a meeting in August due to holiday commitments.




