24/7 Pet Hospital

Did you know? Wear Referrals, located beside the Bradbury roundabout, is a specialist care unit which treats animals with complex needs and conditions. By night it transforms into an A&E unit, responding to emergency cases from across the area.





You can see inside the unit in the new BBC TV series, 24/7 Pet Hospital. The 10 part series was launched on BBC One in February, but if you missed it, you can catch up on iPlayer.

The programme has behind the scenes access to operating theatres, prep rooms and wards, where access for pet owners isn't normally possible. Viewers get to know the team and see them deal with anything from performing hip replacement surgery on tiny Shih Tzus and extracting corn on the cob from Boxer dogs, to treating suspected kidney tumours on much-loved Labradors, wild owls injured by cars - and everything in between.

The series also follows the devoted pet owners who travel from far and wide with their beloved animals for specialist treatment and expert care.



Celebrate!

February was a month of celebrating landmark days at Sedgefield Hardwick. At the beginning of the month, we recognised Children's Mental Health week and followed this year's theme - 'Let's Connect'. We explored the importance of children having somebody to talk to and discuss any worries or doubts. We discussed who those people would be for ourselves, ranging from parents and carers to teachers and friends. We also thought about why it is important for children to communicate in less formal, more spontaneous ways, like taking part in after school clubs or weekend activities.

Following on from Children's Mental Health Week, and in a very similar vein, we hosted our annual online safety day, with Safer Internet Day. This year, the theme was 'Want To Talk?' So we focussed our thoughts from Children's Mental Health week into thinking about how these issues may present themselves online. We discussed about what we should do if something online worries us, and who we should speak to about it.



Finally, we also celebrated International Women and Girls in Science. We considered the importance of having equality in representation of both men and women in the world of science, and learnt some more about the fantastic achievements of women and girls in the scientific world, from Marie Curie's work into polonium and radium, the development of x-rays and subsequent progress in cancer treatment, to the present day brilliance of scientists like Sarah Gilbert, who was instrumental in creating the vaccine in the recent Covid pandemic.

We have thoroughly enjoyed celebrating our landmark days in school and look forward to many more throughout the course of the year!

Bees at Hardwick - Can you help us?



Our bee-keeping group is looking for a new site for our apiary.

Nearly ninety per cent of wild flowering plants need pollinators, like bees, to transfer pollen for successful fruiting and reproduction, and yet humans have altered the natural landscape and changed land use, reducing the natural habitat of pollinating species?

In order for our bee-keeping group to flourish and thrive our hives need a new home: just a small strip of land. A suitable spot would be a private area away from the general public, but close enough for us to walk to, sometimes with heavy gear, ideally level land with some shade.



We are a docile bunch who love our bees and honey and enjoy beekeeping as a hobby. During the summer we need to keep an eye on the bees at least once a week, but during the winter, maybe once a month. We are fairly low-key and are no trouble at all. We aim to breed calm bees and are more than happy to talk to you about our amazing hobby and how rewarding it could be to have bees if you have some spare land. If you have flowers, crops or trees even better, as both the bees and your plants will massively benefit from the pollination.

Beginning with bees

Aycliffe Beekeepers'
Association is running a beekeeping course for beginners.

To be held at Neville Parade Community Centre in Newton Aycliffe on the weekend of 22-23 April 2023 between 10am and 4pm. It covers the history of beekeeping, how a hive is put together, the beekeeping year, how to spot and control pests and diseases, what to do when bees swarm, how to stop them swarming, and how to access further education and literature.

New Eco-Trail

A new trail for children and their families has been launched at Hardwick Park.

The new Eco-Trail is made up of brass rubbing posts depicting 6 items essential to a balanced eco system – animals, oceans, the sun, fresh water, plants, and air.

Children can pick up a booklet and use a crayon to make rubbings on their walk around the park, before answering questions to learn more about nature and the environment, the effects of climate change, and measures they can take to make a difference.

The route of the trail also takes in a brand-new storytelling chair in the park which has been designed and hand carved by artists Jill and Lee

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY MARCH 2023

There are so many signs of spring it is difficult to know which one to mention, but on a recent walk I heard a familiar bird sound, which is not a call or a song. Any guesses? It was a sound that can travel quite a distance and consist of bursts of rapid, resonant tapping echoing through the trees.

Yes that's right, the staccato sound is the work of a woodpecker on a mission. Each rattle sends a message to all the other woodpeckers that can hear it – this part of the woodland belongs to me. Whilst some birds sing to attract a mate and intimidate their neighbours, woodpeckers take a different approach. They hammer their beak against a tree trunk at incredibly high speeds – up to 40 strikes per second for the Great Spotted Woodpecker. There's no denying that's impressive!



There are three species of woodpecker that nest in Britain, but the only one that you're likely to hear drumming in our area is the Great Spotted Woodpecker. It's our most common species, found in many woodlands and parks and an occasional visitor to a bird table. They are glossy black and white birds with a splash of red beneath their tail – males also have a red patch on their nape. Their drumming is a short, explosive burst of strikes so fast that they blur together. Each drumroll usually lasts less than a second. The strikes speed up towards the end of the roll, but get fainter at the same time so that they seem to tail off.

There's been some debate about how woodpeckers can cope with the strain of repeatedly banging their head against a hard surface. For a long time it was thought that woodpeckers had spongy skulls, that absorb some of the impact and protect the brain – people have even copied this idea to create safety helmets. But a study published last year disputed this common belief, showing that there is no cushioning effect. The woodpeckers use their head as a stiff hammer, not a shock absorber. Instead, it's their small size that protects their brain. Woodpeckers just shrug off blows that would give us a serious concussion.

The much rarer Lesser Spotted Woodpecker used to found in the area and, as the name implies, is smaller. But their name now takes on a more tragic meaning, as they're also far less likely to be spotted — or heard. They've declined so dramatically that they've been lost from most of Britain. The drumming of a Lesser Spotted Woodpecker is slightly slower than that of a great spotted, with the individual strikes more clearly heard. It also typically lasts for longer, well over a second, at a steady pace without the acceleration towards the end. Our final woodpecker is also our largest. The Green Woodpecker, who is a chunky bird with a moss green back and a bright red cap. They often forage on the floor, probing for ants with their long, sticky tongue. They rarely drum and when they do it's hard to hear — a soft series of rapid taps. They prefer to display with their loud, laughing calls.

So the next time you are out for a walk have a listen and see if you can hear the dawn chorus's percussion section! Discover our best sites for hearing drumming woodpeckers for yourself at wildlifetrusts.org/woodpeckers.

SEDGEFIELD NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Neighbourhood Watch meeting 9 February

A packed NHW meeting was attended by our Area Neighbourhood Police Inspector Sarah Honeyman, members of County and Town Councils, representatives of numerous Sedgefield community groups and a large number of very concerned residents.

Strong views were expressed and we heard first hand accounts of incidents of criminal damage, antisocial behaviour (ASB), public disorder and abusive behaviour, which had occurred recently, in and around Sedgefield. Inspector Honeyman gave a comprehensive report of current police availability and recent action taken, which resulted in youths being apprehended and dealt with for various related offences. Officers had been on evening patrol last week and the Inspector said she would endeavour to increase these patrols, subject to staffing requirements.

During the meeting, calls were made for improvements to CCTV, more evening police cover, possible future intervention in local schools, parental responsibility and provision of safe spaces for young people to congregate. Some residents said they were pleased with the police response they had received but others less so.

Mention was also made of the current numerous sporting, cultural and other activities provided locally for children and young persons and it was noted that the present ASB incidents are instigated by the few and not the majority of youngsters in and around Sedgefield.

All the views expressed during the meeting were taken on board by the relevant organisations represented, in particular, Insp. Honeyman, who asked residents to continue to report all such incidents. Police responses are "data driven" so the more incidents recorded, the more evidence there will be to justify an increase in police cover for our area.

Vaping

Another issue is the amount of vaping paraphernalia littered around our area and the sale and use of vapes locally. Although the sale to under 18 year olds is illegal in England, it is estimated that there are now 3.6 million users in the U.K. That figure equates to half the number of cigarette smokers.

The British Medical Association is calling for further restrictions to the sale and advertising of vaping material, pointing out the possible harm caused to the nose, throat and lungs of the user. Any person, under the age of 16, found in possession of vaping material, is liable to have it confiscated by the police, who will then investigate its origin. Again, we would ask any person with relevant information about the misuse of vaping material, to contact the local police.

Our next NHW Meeting is on Thursday 8 March at 7:30pm. at Ceddesfeld Hall, Sedgefield. We hope to have Sedgefield's Police Sergeant Legg present, to hear your concerns and update us all on current developments. We will also have our display of security equipment and we'll be happy to chat to you about personal or property security matters. Ceddesfeld Hall bar will also be open. Please keep reporting incidents of ASB, criminal damage, etc. to the Police on 101, or 999 in an emergency, and don't forget, you can report suspicions of criminal activity anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555111.





Your LETTERSFly tipping on private land

On Sunday 4 February this rubbish was found on our land which borders several properties in Kerr Crescent, Sedgefield.



We are aware that a footpath which serves the back of some of these properties runs adjacent to our field where our horse is kept. This footpath is only used by residents of the properties which back on to our land, and it accommodates their bins.

We have lived in this house of over thirty years, and always kept horses on our land, however, we have never had a problem with fly-tipping in this particular area. You can see the items included planks of wood, some with metal attached to it, and electrical cords and plugs which could easily cause injury to a horse. We have already had problems with 'lampers' who almost caused the death of our horse last year and another of our horses got her foot in a trap laid by poachers, and had to be put down by a vet.

What adds more insult to injury is the fact that as the rubbish was found on our land, and we have been told that we will need to take on the responsibility of taking it away!!

How can this be fair when we as council tax payers are paying our

council tax payers are paying our local taxes to have fly-tipping regularly cleaned up in for example NETPark, and the Old Stockton Road, where visitors, including travellers, dump or leave their rubbish to be collected and paid for by us? What is so different about this situation? This is not our rubbish and more importantly was not left by us!

Busy Spring for Players







SPORTS UPDATE

While winter may not have finished with us yet, warmer days (hopefully) and lighter evenings aren't too far away, which means that the English cricket season will soon be upon us. For Sedgefield Cricket Club, indoor training is underway and it won't be long before the junior and senior players are back outside. Next month's update will include a preview of the season ahead. For now, as always, there's plenty of other sports news to report.

Athletics

Sedgefield Harriers held the club's winter handicap race in January, on a two lap multi-terrain route of about 6 miles that started and finished at Bishop Middleham Village Hall. Participants ran with a handicap based on their best 10k time within the previous 12 months, meaning that the fastest runners set off last, and everyone finished within a few minutes, which made for some exciting racing.

The first person to cross the line, and winner of the Gerry Kearsley Memorial Trophy, was Chris Ward, in a time of 49:53. The first female to finish, who was also the fastest, and first Sedgefield Harrier, was Sadie Abel (43:02). The first male Harrier was Jonathan Wallace (48:55) and the fastest male runner on the day was Elliot Bareham (39:34). The club is grateful to the volunteers who made the event possible, and to Bishop Middleham Village Hall for allowing the event to be hosted there.

The winter cross country season is nearly over and is set to be a successful one for Sedgefield Harriers in the North East Harrier League. Along with some very encouraging performances by the club's junior runners, the senior men's and women's teams have done well in their respective leagues.

The men were promoted to division two last year and this time around, they have been racing against some of the biggest clubs in the North East, including South Shields Harriers, Crook AC, Low Fell RC and Durham City Harriers. Each club's first six runners over the line count in the results at the six fixtures and Sedgefield have established some great strength in depth, with at least 11 runners taking part in every race, and two full teams in all but one (though only the first team of six features in the league table). The latest fixture was also the most local, at Thornley Hall Farm, and in uncharacteristically benign conditions for the venue, the Harriers team was sixth on the day, consolidating a mid-table position of seventh in the division. With just one fixture to go (on 4 March in Alnwick), Sedgefield's men are in prime position to retain division two status.

Meanwhile, Sedgefield's senior women have also made good progress this year. Competing in division three, their results have improved from fixture to fixture, and at Thornley they finished in a very impressive second place, pushing them up to ninth in the division. Had it not been for the fact that some of the women were unavailable for a few of the earlier fixtures, it's clear that Sedgefield would have been making a serious push for promotion – hopefully, that's something that will be on the agenda next season!

At the end of January, he competed in the 2023 British Cycling National Track Championships in Newport, tackling the scratch race, one kilometre time trial and individual pursuit disciplines.
