Green Shoots of Recovery at Bradbury

For some time past the Methodist Chapel at Bradbury has been at risk of closure due to the combination of a falling congregation and the need to carry out various repairs to the building. There are also the implications of the Disability Discrimination Act in respect, mainly, to access. Over recent weeks various meetings have been



held and a positive decision taken to move forward and to do all possible to keep the chapel open for the benefit of not only the c u r r e n t congregation but also for future generations.

The priority was to encourage new members to attend

and to renew the interest of those who had attended previously.

To this end a mail shot was undertaken to all the homes in the adjacent village of Mordon and to those in Bradbury where interest might be forthcoming, additionally the surrounding farms were contacted. The mail shot suggested that anyone interested in supporting the chapel should attend the normal service at 10.30 on a particular Sunday.

The day dawned after possibly the heaviest snowstorm in years, with the news that the heating in the chapel was not working and that there was a leak in the water supply. The communion service, however, went ahead as planned but in one of the member's houses, very much perhaps as in the days before the chapel was built in 1895, a cosy coal fire and a nice cup of tea or coffee giving a welcome opportunity to meet our new friends.

Successful applications have now been made to the local Methodist Circuit and the Sedgefield Relief in Need Charity resulting in £4000 of funding assistance being obtained towards the building work, with further applications in the pipeline.

Whilst there is still a long way to go, the green shoots appear to have taken hold and the future looks much brighter. Services take place every Sunday at 10.3O, all are welcome. *John Burrows - Steward*

With an album 'They Reckon' under their belts and another planned for early next year, things are looking up for the lads.


Catch them live at the Cricket Club on 15th May at 7.30pm with special guests 'This is' - also Sedgefield based - in support.

Rail bridge safety on the Bradbury to Mordon road

Following the accident at Selby when a Land Rover left the road and ended up on the main line, Durham County Council have initiated a scheme to prevent errant vehicles leaving the road and getting onto the main East Coast link.

The bridge between Bradbury and Mordon is extremely vulnerable and work has started there, erecting barriers to prevent a repeat occurrence.

The road was closed on Saturday night 17th April to enable scaffolding to be erected adjacent to the line (there are no trains overnight during this period).

By midday Sunday the single line access over the bridge was in place and is being

controlled with temporary traffic lights for the next 12 weeks.

The work includes the diversion of the 6 inch water main in the pavement over the bridge to allow civil work to be completed. Overnight closure will also be required on the 22nd May and the10th July for relocation and removal of the scaffold.

Local residents are very pleased that the County have taken this action, as it was always considered to be an accident waiting to happen.

Sedgefield NHW & Crimewatch Panel

Minutes of Meeting held on 13th April 2004

Minutes of Previous Meeting (10/02/04) were approved. Matters Arising: Clarification sought of the term, "legitimate vehicle" - this was provided.

Treasurer informed members of balances of the Panel's Current and Premier accounts.

Secretary Details were given of correspondence issued and received as follows:

Received: Cavos – various; Mayor – thanks for Panel's support for chosen charities; Town Council – Rent account, Grant award of £50 towards panel rent & Mayor's intention to fund Balance of Panel Rent; Co Durham Foundation – CO monitor funding; Community Empowerment Network – various, elections for Community Forum Groups (any member interested to contact Secretary after meeting); Sarah Norman – Insurance, now appears to be resolved

Issued: Mayor – charities, & thanks for funding award; Town Council – thanks for Grant award; Co. Durham Foundation – response re CO monitors application; Help the Aged – Handy Van Scheme; Police – Inspector Neill re use of Police Stn for Exec. Meetings (which he has actively supported); Sarah Norman – re Insurance (via e-mail); Alan Smart C/man SARCA – thanks to Ceddesfield Committee for their provision of an office to house Community Force Officer when on beat in Sedgefield & to facilitate direct contact with village residents.

Representative Reports:

Village Constable: Unable to attend; crime figures to be sought after meeting.

Crime Prevention Officer: Neil gave an overview of details regarding Dwelling Burglary in the Ward and our Area for the year. The majority of "work" is in the west of the Ward; Sedgefield continues to be a safe area. At the C/man's request he described how communications are now working in the reorganised divisions; pointing out that for Sedgefield, all calls go to the South Centre at Bishop Auckland. He described in detail the impressive new technology now in use and the huge potential it offers. Neil confirmed that Operators are now able to directly access cameras in Sedgefield.

Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator: Sarah raised the issue of Garden Crime, urging members & the public to be vigilant and act to prevent this seasonal crime. She advised that it is well worth taking the time to Post Code mark (or other form) property using UV pens and also take Photos of property - simple but most effective measures.

A member asked about "smart water" for marking & Neil responded in great detail describing the product, process, licensing (via Home Office), & cost (approx £20 per household if a whole street is involved - Pen @ 50pence each). Community Force: C/man tendered Officer's apologies due to urgent personal commitments. C/man sought Panel's approval to seek a dedicated telephone for use by Officer (for benefit of residents) when in Ceddesfield; this was unanimously approved.

Alan Sowerby Good Citizenship Award: David Hillerby (Vice C/man) reported on the introduction of this award to the Community College (completing the schools in the village) with the handover of the Shield to Lynne Ackland Head

Teacher, and her support for the scheme. The school intends to award the trophy to their successful pupil at either the Hardwick Hall or the Riverside Stadium later in the year; Sarah will present the award on behalf of our Panel and it is understood that there will be an opportunity for a small number of Panel members to be present also.

Communication Policy: deferred to a later meeting. **AOB:** A member raised the subject of a discreet telephone number that could be used by all members of the public to contact Police when it was a non-urgent matter. After debate Neill offered to look into this & report back at a future meeting.

A member queried who you report vehicle license problems to; his personal experience (reporting to the Police) had not resulted in vehicle removal. Another member quoted his recent experience (via the Police) that was very successful, resulting in vehicle removal within some 5days.

Another member recommended the use of the national number (DVLA) 08000325202

Neill reported on the very successful operation that is ongoing in the Borough where the Police with the DVLA spend a day each month targeting such vehicles with immediate action taken when owners either can't be located or do not pay on the spot.

Several members expressed great concern at the lack of presence of the Traffic Warden and the bad/dangerous parking in the village now.

Members were advised that Traffic Warden no longer exists; they have been replaced by Community Support Officers who not only carry out the Warden's duties but also have wider powers & are therefore more flexible. A dedicated Sergeant manages these officers. Members requested that the Panel Secretary write to the Sergeant requesting urgent action in the village to improve the situation, and also to contact the Town Council & Road Safety Committee of this action.

Raffle raised £17.00.

Next Meeting Tuesday 8th June, 7pm, Parish Hall.

Clerk to the Town Council responds to War Memorial letter

The Town Council recently commissioned a full conservation study on the War Memorial and implemented all of their recommendations in consultation with English Heritage.

The overall cost of £3750 was met by a 50% grant from English Heritage War Memorials with the remaining 50% being paid by the Town Council.

No 40 mph limit at Hardwick Park

The idea of a permanent 40 mph speed limit on the A177 outside Hardwick Park has now been abandoned as the police will not agree to it.

This means when the roundabout is completed, the speed limit will revert to 60 mph. However the dangers arising from crossing the road to the Park entrance will be mitigated by the use of the underpass which should be available for use quite soon. Also, the roundabout should slow the traffic down, making it easier to cross.

Work continues apace in and around the Park. Most obvious is the preparatory work for the new roundabout.

A temporary hold-up occurred due to the discovery of a previously unknown water main very near to the surface. Northumbrian Water has belatedly agreed it belongs to them and a suitable scheme has been evolved to deal with it.

At the end of the Serpentine River construction of a cascade and limestone bridge has required the closure of the paths to that end of the Serpentine, for health and safety reasons. Access will be restored later in the year.

The clearance of trees and scrub around the Temple building opens up the view to the west where the A1M motorway is clearly in view. When the Temple restoration is finished it will present a magnificent vista to the motorists on the motorway, almost rivalling the Angel of the North!

Work on the Lake bed will start this month, weather permitting, and reinstatement of the Lake edging will be ongoing during the summer. There will be a lot of activity to see and progress should be rapid.

It was also decided that Roy Smeaton write to Durham County Council, Jeff Stephenson to thank him for his letter which indicated that a traffic flow investigation will be carried out by them after the Easter break. Various other aspects of road safety were noted and passed to the sub committee to follow up.

Disabilty Access

It was agreed that a village wide audit be carried as soon as possible.

He will be responsible for developing the website for Sedgefield Development Partnership who are providing the facility. Tim comes with a wealth of experience and



expertise. He was a science teacher at Haughton Comprehensive School for 28 years, and has also worked for as tutor information technology specialist with TRAC.

He then taught at Dagfa House School for three years, and has also worked freelance as a hardware engineer and software trainer.

His other interests include photography, (very useful for making an attractive website), astronomy, seaangling, wildlife and winemaking. Some of you may know Tim already. He has just finished running the twice weekly drop-in computer support sessions in Sedgefield Library and Ceddesfeld Hall, which those attending have found very helpful.

Cook's Corner

Crispy Nut Roast Ingredients for 2 (approx)

1 1/2 tablespoons cooking oil 2 cloves of garlic 1/2 teaspoon each of curry powder, cumin & fennel seeds

Chop the following group of ingredients finely together

1 onion, 1 small carrot
1 stick celery, 4 mushrooms
1/4 of green or red pepper
2 tblsps unsalted peanuts
1 tblsp each of chick peas,
(pre-soaked & cooked) &
tinned red kidney beans
Salt to taste

Topping:

Two slices of brown bread Two tablespoons cornflakes 1/4 teaspoon of curry powder

Method:

In a frying pan, warm oil on low heat. Add spices & garlic. Stir gently for 3 minutes (don't allow oil to burn) Add vegetables and pulses to

pan and continue to cook on low heat for further 10 mins.

Put contents of frying pan into an oven dish. Add topping (precrumbled in blender).

Spoon one tablesp cooking oil over topping and firm down.
Cook in oven for approx. 20 minutes on medium heat until topping is crisp.

A safer route to school -

Hardwick Primary School wins support

Hardwick Primary School has been included in the Safer Routes to School Programme, an initiative that forms an important part of Durham County Council's Local Transport Plan. The aim is to encourage more children to walk, cycle or take public transport to school.

The main benefits will be to improve safety, reduce traffic pollution and improve children's health. It should also encourage their independence at the same time as benefiting the environment and the local community.

Each school draws up its own School Travel Plan to suit circumstances. Such schemes have already been successful in other parts of the County, where footpaths, street lighting and public transport have been improved.

Ideas to draw on include cycle routes, cycling proficiency and secure cycle parking;

walking buses and walk to school weeks; car sharing, traffic calming, road safety and personal safety as well as reviewing speed limits.

Ms Gillian Coulson, Head Teacher at Hardwick, says that their travel plan will be put into action from this term, starting with the 'walking school bus'.

Anyone for Tennis?

Sedgefield Tennis Club is based at Sedgefield Community College, where we have 3 floodlit acrylic courts and a Clubhouse with changing facilities, which we share with the College.

The College has the use of the courts during term times, but they are free for our use in the evenings, at the weekend and during school holidays.

The courts are kept locked and access is via a key for the door padlock. Keys are issued to members upon payment of appropriate Membership Fees (see below)

We try to run Turn-up-and-Play social periods, principally on Thursday evenings, Sunday afternoons and Sunday evenings, although these are dictated by the weather.

For the more competitive, we currently run three Men's teams, a Ladies' team and a Boys' 13-and-under team, all in the Cleveland League. For the less energetic, we hold social events such as barbecues, quiz nights, etc.

The Membership year runs from April.

Fees for 2004 are: Family £55, Adult £33, Age 14-18 £22, Age Under 14 £11, Social (non-playing) £11.

This represents superb value compared to other clubs in the area. Look out for one of our Open Days, advertised in the village, where members and non-members alike are welcome.

War Memorial plea

I keep reading about the Town Council praising themselves for the "completed" work on the War Memorial in the village. Six years ago I first wrote to the council requesting that the names on the memorial were re-painted as they were fading badly. The reply I got was that they would try to get the repainting done in time for that vear's Remembrance Sunday. As anyone can see, whilst some remedial work has been carried out. the names are now almost unreadable and in desperate need of painting. From the little research I have undertaken into some of the names, men from Sedgefield fell in some of the worst battles of the First World War such as the Somme. where Sedgefield men are remembered on the Thiepval Memorial along with the names of 73.000 men who have no known grave; and on the Menin Gate at Ypres alongside 53,000 men with no known grave, as well as countless other cemeteries.

In the Second World War Large numbers of men died serving in the RAF Bomber squadrons, as well as ground forces in many well known battles.

These men should be remembered and I think it is a disgrace that the council after six years have not done anything to help remember men from the village who gave the ultimate sacrifice. Please get in touch with the council and persuade them to do some work that has real meaning.
