# **Bold New Look for Your Website!**

April 2<sup>nd</sup> saw the re-launch of our community website

sedgefieldweb.co.uk. Hopefully you have had a chance to view the new "look and feel" and found the many pages of information easy to access and useful. With the huge relaunch effort completed, it seemed like a good time to provide more information on the redevelopment of the site, its objectives, its funding, and most importantly, the ways in which the community can contribute to, and receive benefits from, the site.

In co-operation with Sedgefield Borough Council, and the Local Strategic Partnership, the SDT Trustees decided to take the opportunity to utilise a grant from the Community Engagement Fund in order to redevelop the site. The objective was to build on the extensive work of Tim Randall in creating and updating the site, to take further advantage of its potential both for community involvement and self-sustaining advertising.

A tender document was produced, and a number of website developers were consulted. Interestingly, the large size of the existing site put off many potential developers, who would much rather start with a clean sheet! Finally, an excellent proposal was received from Stephen Edgoose Computer Services and work started on the key tasks of creating the new site structure, installing the new format and transferring the many pages of data and links that were in place on the original site.

Many hours of work were required to complete these tasks but everything was in place for the planned launch date of April 2<sup>nd</sup>, and we could all breathe a sigh of relief, particularly Ste Edgoose who had worked so hard and effectively on the project. I hope that you agree that the finished result was well worth the effort.

Having used the initial funding to re

-launch the site, it is important that we can continue to update the site to keep the content current and fully reflect the developments in our community. We plan to achieve this in two ways. Firstly, the new site has been designed to be readily updated by suitably trained volunteers, with limited computer expertise being required. Secondly,

by making the site even more popular and attractive, we can encourage advertisers to place paid advertisements on the site, with the objective of meeting the running costs of the site and therefore making it self-funding. We are currently seeking additional funding to "jump start" these activities. So, how can you benefit from the site and what could you contribute? The site supports the community by presenting a wide range of useful and interesting information about the local area, including details of local events, businesses, crime issues, maps, and photographs, both current and historic. We are also seeking to attract input from the local schools. The site is a valuable local information resource, all available via a simple menu system, which will also reflect changes and new developments in the area. Everyone can contribute to this in three key ways:-

# Walking the Wall

My name is Bethan Jones, I live in Sedgefield and attend Sedgefield Community College and I have just turned 16. In February 2005 I was diagnosed with ALL – Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia. The chemotherapy treatment that I am currently undergoing lasts approximately two and half years and will finish in May this year. I have had to attend the R.V.I (Royal Victoria Infirmary) in Newcastle nearly every week and have regular hospital stays. Roughly 1 in 700 children will contract cancer before their 15<sup>th</sup> birthday. I know two other children in Sedgefield that have recently had cancer.

In June I intend to walk Hadrian's Wall, which stretches for 84 miles, with my dog Toffee, a golden Labrador. Our aim is to raise money for the NECCR.

The North of England Children's cancer research charity (NECCR) is constantly searching for alternative methods and improvements to current cancer treatments. They endeavour to increase the number of children that are cured of cancer, to understand the causes and to make the treatment less distressing.



Being diagnosed with cancer is a life changing experience and definitely alters your priorities. I would like to raise money for this charity, so that perhaps in the future, other children who are diagnosed can benefit by receiving a shorter, more effective protocol of treatment and improve the relapse and survival rate.

My family will be fundraising in the village, so please support me. Your generosity will help benefit the lives of children from across the world.

There will also be a full range of competitions and displays including agricultural classes for cattle, sheep, horses, ponies, vintage tractors, small livestock and a dog show. This year we will also see the return of the heavy horse category.

# COMMUNITY SAFETY Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood Watch



#### Update from Neighbourhood Watch meeting held 10th April 2007:

Prior to the meeting being opened Councillor Maxine Robinson gave an update about the installed CCTV in response to members' request from the Feb. Panel meeting.

In summary the issue of costs does not arise, we have useable and effective cameras in place now, they are regularly used to assist in securing convictions and to detect crime, a trial of a wireless system is ongoing (no date for trial results is available), the Town Council are totally committed to the continued use of this valuable tool. C/man Ken Saiger thanked Maxine for her thoroughness and efforts with the Borough to obtain "the facts" and for taking the time to give her report in person.

The meeting was well attended by members and also full representation from our Police, N/H/Watch & Community Force regulars that helped make for a lively and interesting meeting.

**Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator Sarah Norman** commented on misleading press reports regarding the "cut out" Policemen; they have proven to be very effective in the communities where they are used. Sarah asked members to take steps to guard against "garden" crime - keep equipment secure and locked away and out of sight, also have it marked (UV pen or similar); and to pass the message on to friends & neighbours in the village.

**Community Force Officer** Tim Spearey agreed with members that dog fouling is on the increase again, however he is actively pursuing those dog walkers in our village that disregard others. One member thanked Tim for the very real improvements he has achieved in her area of the village (in respect of dog fouling). Members informed Tim that the damage in Elm Avenue (recorded in Tim's report) is still happening when the schools are open. Tim will try to improve the children's behaviour in this area in term time.

Tim pointed out to members that it only takes a few minutes to install a shed alarm and make the shed secure; and that **all agencies** (including Community Force, Carelink, Handy Van) will assist in this respect if those in need of assistance request them.

**Village Constable** Keith Todd circulated copies of the Reported Crime in Sedgefield Village for the period **between 6**<sup>th</sup> **Feb & 10**<sup>th</sup> **April** this indicated there were **11 crimes** recorded, consisting of: - **1- Attempted Burglary**; **7-Damage & 3-Thefts.** In addition there were probably 2 more (shed) burglaries that Keith would be investigating but had not made it on to the reporting system yet.

Keith gave details of a telephone call to the Police reporting a *possible* burglary in progress (from a village resident). As a result of this person's action a passing local CID officer apprehended a youth leaving the premises and a prosecution is pending; the youth's accomplice will also be prosecuted.

The message for **everyone** is **if in doubt ring the Police** – you might just help your neighbour from being a victim of crime.

A spate of (very) recent reported bin fires was also discussed.

Keith also reported of an ongoing prosecution arising from use of the CCTV –involving a drunken youth.

Members said it was very rewarding to learn of these positive results and thanked Keith for informing them; although there was concern that they had not all appeared in the crime report and that the wider public may not be aware of the good work being achieved by our local Police. Keith explained why some of these had not made it into his Crime report.

**Crime Prevention Officer** Neil Langthorne added to Sarah's request regarding garden crime reminding members that this is a real headache for our Borough; this type of crime really increases each year and has a major impact on recorded crime.

Possible changes within Durham Police Force were discussed.

The Secretary then read out the questions put to Superintendent Summerbell at the Feb. PCC meeting and his public responses. These were already summarised in the April issue of Sedgefield News. From Supt. Summerbell's responses at the Feb. meeting the Secretary believes that the Panel should not see any detrimental change and that Neil, Sarah, Keith (& Dean) will be able to continue their service to our village.

Neil then demonstrated to members a very useful small alarm consisting of a wireless PIR and alarm unit, originally developed as a car alarm but useful in the home and certainly for garden sheds. The price of the unit is £27.00 anyone interested should contact Neil / Sarah for purchase.

No Cold Calling: C/man Ken Saiger reported that the result of the ballot had appeared in the April issue of Sedgefield News, and confirmed there had been a resounding 100% YES vote; and not one vote against; this was an extremely good basis for implementation. In respect of implementation he would meet Trading Standards responsible officer later in the month to discuss details of notices, stickers all of which are needed to enable implementation.

Members present reinforced the desire to have the words NO COLD CALLING on street signs to ensure the views of residents are clearly visible.

Implementation details will be announced in future issue(s) of Sedgefield News.

**A.O.B. No Alcohol in Street:** Julia Bowles reported that the Residents' Forum was still trying to achieve this for our village; this is an initiative that N/H/Watch have tried unsuccessfully to achieve over a number of years. The present position is that the Police have still not replied to the Forum's last correspondence.

**Crime Prevention in Sedgefield:** A member recorded that the minutes must reflect the excellent work being done by the Police, Crime Prevention and Community Force and how our village is benefiting from their presence (recently much more visible) with more effective detection and prosecution. All members present endorsed these views, slightly tempered in the knowledge that there are many (regular / repeat) problems and issues still unresolved.

# **PC Todd reports**

I have noticed recently that many residents have devoted their time and spent their money on colourful plants and garden ornaments. Thieves too have noticed, and consider them easy pickings. Recently this low life attempted to take a couple of expensive pots, only to discover that they had been anchored to the ground with wire. This simple but effective method thwarted their efforts.

Another good idea is to paint your postcode inside and on the bottom of the pot. This not only makes the sale of them difficult but may also result in their return and possible prosecution of the offender.

Anyone living in the Queens Drive area must have noticed the work being carried out in the street to lay a pipeline. The mini mechanical excavator used to dig up the footpath had not gone unnoticed by thieves. Last week this vehicle was taken away during daylight by a group of confident criminals. However, unknown to them a tracker device was fitted and later the same day the vehicle was located in and recovered from the Cleveland area. One male was arrested.

Other crimes reported to the police recently include:

in The Lane, number plates taken from a vehicle; Eden Drive, vehicle paintwork scratched; Salters Lane, underground BT cable cut; Rectory Row, school window smashed; Mill Close Walk, plants pulled from pots; Wellgarth Mews, alloy wheels stolen.

# Jottings from Sedgefield Residents' Forum

The Forum had invited residents from Bishop Middleham to give information on the proposed extension to the Lafarge Quarry. The impact on this proposed 225 acre extension would be massive e.g. increased traffic, increased explosions, increased pollution from burning of waste, loss of agricultural land, loss of sites of special scientific interest, reduction in property values etc. etc. and it brings it all closer to Sedgefield. As neighbouring communities we need to be supporting each other so please register your objections at the planning department at Durham County Council.

The meeting reported that some members would be visiting Care Principles (they are proposing to build a secure unit to hold individuals held under the Mental Health Act on the grounds of the old community hospital) to see one of their establishments in Norfolk – it will be interesting to hear their report, it is a very different concept to what we were used to as Winterton Hospital.

It seems that our communities are being forced to have ongoing campaigns in an attempt to retain the way of life we have established and value. Of course there are those in favour and against all the issues but just think, we have agreed and proposed huge wind turbines, a secure unit, a huge guarry extensions and we have just been made aware that Bolams are appealing against the refusal of their proposed animal waste incinerator – this can have a real impact on the whole village so please do express your views (information is being circulated) don't rely on others to do it for you. The next Forum meeting (April 23<sup>rd</sup>) is our meeting to give everyone opportunity to meet and hear from those standing as Town and Borough Councillors it should be a very interesting and thought provoking session leading up to the May elections after which we will have a new Town Council.

The next ordinary Forum meeting will be on **May 28**<sup>th</sup>.

#### **Sedgefield Harriers**

Spring and summer are very busy times for road races and Sedgefield Harriers will be well represented in a lot of events between now and September.

The Summer Grand Prix Series kicked off on Sunday 1st April with the Hartlepool Marina 5 miles. Gary Hetherington was 7<sup>th</sup> overall and first for Sedgefield in a time of 27:31 with Andrea Gough the first woman in 39:46. On Sunday 8th April the club had its biggest turn out to date with 14 runners competing in the scenic North Tyneside 10k race between North Shields and St. Mary's Lighthouse, Whitley Bay. Graeme Addison achieved his target for the year by running a sub-40 minute 10k, a significant target for a lot of runners. Graeme's watch showed 39:58 even though the official time cruelly gave him as 40:00! Graeme has promised to make sure the achievement is beyond doubt when he runs his next 10k. The first woman home for Sedgefield was Gail Bell in 46:25.

A number of runners including Gail

and Graeme have shown steady and significant improvement over the last year, encouraged by the club. Also making great progress are Matthew Jones, Marie Walker and Andrea Gough. Michelle Addison took up running with the club at Christmas and competed in the Hartlepool 5, the North Tyneside 10k a week later and looks forward to more races this Entering races provides a great focus for improving and keeping fit with the added bonuses that many are in nice places to visit and there is the encouragement of other runners from the club.

A lot of races have competitors with a wide range of abilities – no one from Sedgefield has come last yet! On Sunday the 15<sup>th</sup> April the club held an awards evening at the Nag's Head for the Winter Grand Prix Series and Winter Time Trial Series. Graeme Addison and Gail Bell were winners in the Grand Prix Series and Gary Hetherington and Rosie Sims were Time Trial winners.

The club will be staging its own race on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> August to coincide with Sedgefield Show. The race is called the Sedgefield Serpentine and will be over approximately 7 miles on a route starting and finishing on the show field. It is an open race and competitors need not be a member of a club. Entry forms will be available soon and there will be more details in Sedgefield News in the coming months.

#### Sedgefield District RUFC

Plans for the return of rugby union in the village are really starting to take shape. Around 20 adults are regularly turning up for training and a further 20 or so 'non players' are interested in getting involved in the club. The club has already played its first training game, on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> April. A team from the well established Stockton RUFC put the Sedgefield lads through their paces. The game was split into three separate 20 minutes sessions, allowing everyone who turned up from Sedgefield to get both a game...and a rest (for many of the Sedgefield team, this was their first game of rugby, so fitness levels are not yet up to the standard of regular players like those from Stockton who are into

the final stages of a full season). After some positional changes and substitutions, by the end of the game the Sedgefield pack was not only holding its own but getting turnover ball in the scrums. There were great moves from Neil Hetherington, Richie Wanless and especially Gordon Hirst, displaying real commitment and showing everyone else how to tackle.

A second game is being planned for the near future, against a team from Durham. This will be followed by training through the closed season, as the quest to get rugby in Sedgefield back on the map steps up a pace. The club is still keen to attract more players and supporters. #### A Remarkable NHS Experience

During the past year I have been with three generations of my family in need of fairly urgent attention at four hospitals and two GP surgeries, and I want to acknowledge the quality of care we have experienced. As an example, I'll single out the Cardiology Unit at James Cook University Hospital.

After my husband's bypass surgery, as I sat beside him with my daughter in the CIT Unit, fear and anxiety were replaced of course by relief that he'd come through it, but also, unexpectedly, by stunned amazement at the bright, calm atmosphere. In this huge ward full of technology and efficiency and numerous nurses caring for people going through possibly the most traumatic event of their lives, there was a friendly insistence that our presence was welcome, not an intrusion. Roger's dedicated (both senses of the word) nurse patiently answered our every question and explained everything that was being done for him; the surgeon took time to reassure us, before going on to perform his next (apologies to religious readers) miracle; there was humour too, and genuine interest in our wellbeing as well as the patient's. I think I will remember their faces for a very long time.

This quality of care continued throughout his stay, which as a result, was quite short. Recovery is still a hard road, but if any of our friends or family had this to face, we wouldn't fear for their safety in the care of JCUH.

I read and hear a lot of glib, ill-informed criticism of the NHS; some even insist that the government is ruining it. Our experience says a different thing and here I go back to my opening comment. It's not just cardiology. Everywhere I've been with my family recently - clinics, local surgeries, hospitals - it's the same story. We are very, very fortunate. Sandy Clubley

I have found the location of Swan Carr Farm on both an old ordinance survey map and more recently on Google Earth. My gran was born in 1866. Would it be possible to find out the name of the farm owner at that time. I hope you don't mind me asking you all these questions, but I really would like to try and find out more.
