1. Minutes of Previous Meeting, 9/12/2008: were accepted and approved as a true record.

2. Matters Arising: There were none

3a) Treas. Report: Details were given by the Treasurer, there were no matters arising.

3b) Sec. Report: The Secretary gave details of correspondence issued & received, specifically detailing - Insurance cover (via Police umbrella), Town Council (Parish Hall damage issues & Sedgefield Together), Durham (new) Area Action Partnership, & Cavos (Community engagement).

4. Representative Reports: a) Community Force: Tim was

a) Community Force: Tim was unable to provide his usual report due to teething problems from the changeover to Durham Unitary Authority. Nonetheless Tim gave a brief update of current activity. b) Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator: Mel thanked members for their work in our successful N/ H/watch and announced that she had recently taken up a new post in Durham and so was no longer our Liaison Officer. Mel thanked members for making her so welcome during her stay in the

"Borough". Then Mel advised of her recent work (on our behalf) in regard to No Cold Calling; she has passed on the Red Cross arrangements to Durham Trading Standards who are to use these as a "template" for other companies if & where necessary. Also that in respect of Toasty Homes their Managing Director has said that they will not be canvassing in Sedgefield again, due to our complaints. C/man Ken Saiger thanked Mel on behalf of the Panel for all her assistance and work which will

benefit other communities and not

just our village; he also congratulated Mel on her deserved promotion and wished her every success in the future.

c) Village Constable: Keith circulated copies of his report for the (six week) period 1/03 - 14/04/09 this showed that there were 14 reported crimes consisting of 1 Burglary, 7 Thefts (3 car related) & 6 of Damage (2 car related) within the village. There were a number of questions from members including events that did not appear on the crime list, some of which Keith was not aware of.

d) Crime Prevention Officer: Neil Langthorne gave a brief report on crime in the Borough and warned members to "Be on their Guard & take that Extra step to be secure & prevent domestic crime" as there is a trend that burglaries may be on the rise in our wider area. Members were also informed about "Operation Hawkeye". Neil also took the opportunity to publicly thank Mel for her work in the Borough and wished her every success in her new post. Neil then introduced members to several useful security devices that he had brought along which included a Shed type padlock (alarmed, cost £10); portable wire free alarm/intruder detector that can even be used as a car alarm (cost £10); a very neat & simple anti tamper (again portable & alarmed) motion detector that can be hung on a door handle (cost £3) also a Digital Security Camera/ Flood Light this records high quality pictures onto a digital card for subsequent download onto a computer if needed (cheapest price currently £98.00). Neil demonstrated each device and gave advice/guidance on each of the items. Neil suggested orders /

7.1 Alcohol Consumption in Public areas: Julia Bowles reported that this had been raised at the Residents Forum & they are to ask the Town Council again (as have N/H/Watch in the past) to trial this in our village. For despite the Town Council having been advised by **Durham Police** (in the recent past) that they do not / will not support such arrangements there are now **several** locations where such a ban is now in force **in**

County Durham!

All members present support this approach for our village & our community.

Jottings

from the meeting of Sedgefield Village Residents Forum, April 2009 Another varied and lively meeting.

Issues discussed included the transfer of green open spaces in the village to a private landlord as a result of Sedgefield Borough (SBC) housing stock transfer, the new build at the Community College, the creation of a partnership group in the village, the new Town Plan which the Town Council (TC) are working on, how the £47000 of unexpected money received by the TC will be spent, policing issues, health provision issues and of course the ongoing saga of the Caravan Park and Local Government reorganisation.

Residents have sent many excellent letters to our MP still expressing their objection to the Caravan Park (4 in favour) and the process by which planning permission was granted. There is still great anger and feelings of injustice from our community regarding this application and there is a firm commitment to continue to seek a review of the decision.

A big thank you must go to the residents who have offered financial support toward seeking a review but we could not possibly raise sufficient funds to go for Judicial Review and our MP is extremely critical of our efforts to access the 'public purse' for legal aid by asking someone on benefit to come forward. So we are still awaiting a response from the Secretary of State who can call for a review of the decision. We will then look at how we can proceed.

As from April 1st (April Fools Day – most appropriate) we have a new Unitary Authority, Durham County Council and no longer have a Sedgefield Borough Council (SBC); there is still a great deal of confusion as to how things will work, Area Action Partnerships etc. But we have already experienced a problem. The new authority will not inform Community Groups and Town Councils of large/controversial planning applications by letter as SBC have done in the past. Instead we will be expected to 'trawl' through, what could be extensive email lists to identify issues in our area. We believe this to be too onerous for volunteers and that the responsibility to inform effectively should remain with the Authority. We will be asking to retain our original service.

It will be interesting to see the results of the first Area Action Partnership information event for our area – it is on April 29^{th} and we will have a report at the next Residents Forum meeting.

We have asked the Town Council to object on our behalf to the car parking charge which is to be introduced at Hardwick Country Park. It is fine that visitors to the area should pay but local residents have had free access to the park for decades and many of our elderly residents who enjoy a walk in the park need to drive there as the walk over to the park is 'just too much'. So we are requesting that 'locals' be issued with a free pass.

The next meeting of the Forum is on May 4th at 7pm in the Fletcher Room. Although it is a bank holiday members still want to hold the meeting. Everyone is welcome so do come along and have your say on village issues. Minutes are available in the Town Council offices and the Library at least one week before the meeting. We hope to see you.

At the North of England Half Marathon Championships, this year held in conjunction with the Redcar Half Marathon, Gary finished an excellent 8th overall in a time of 74:19 and Scott was 38th in 81:13. Harriers also competed at the South Shields Sand Dancer 10k, the Hartlepool Marina 5 miles, where Gary Hetherington was 10th overall in 27:49 and in the Guisborough Moors Race over 12 miles+ and 2,500ft+ of climbing where Gail Bell was first Harrier in 1hr 54mins, 4 mins ahead of Matthew Jones. Harriers will hopefully have completed the London Marathon in our blue and white vest and ten, including the four from London will be only a few weeks from the Edinburgh Marathon on May 31st. Team spirit was fantastic and the young people were well supported by their parents and families. Our young competitors did not disappoint and there were displays of fantastic promise as well as some gold medal performances. George Pilkington showed the way early on by qualifying as winner of his U11 boys 60m sprint heat. George was accompanied in the final by Stephen Greaves and Tom Flatters to give Sedgefield three from eight finalists along with runners from Birtley, Aycliffe, Middlesbrough and North Shields. George took gold in the final equalling his heat time of 9.20secs. with a superb and strong run. Further glory wasn't far behind for the Harriers when exciting runner Scott Kippen finished second in his U15 Boys 100m heat and took silver in the final with a time of 12.90secs. Ellie Gaines wasn't going to be out of the medals in the U11 Girls 600m and showed a lot of guts to outsprint a Gateshead runner for Bronze medal in a field of 20 runners which included Zoe Carr from the Harriers. There was greater glory to come for Scott Kippen who justified his confidence over 200m by taking the gold medal ahead of runners from Sunderland Harriers and Middlesbrough Mandale in a time of 25.70 secs in the U15 boys event. Not to be outdone, George Pilkington took a second

medal, a bronze in the U11 boys 150m in a time of 23.10 secs. All of the competing Junior Harriers put in excellent performances and showed tremendous promise for the future. These included Stephen Greaves, Joseph Devine, Kelly Dobson, Gemma Hill, Zoe Carr, JT Fanneli, Zoe Dobson, Adam Flatters, Elliot Bourdais, Lee Armes, Tom Flatters Rory Varley, Gemma Varley and Matthew Walker. Parking at Hardwick Country Park

We were dismayed to see that one of the first effects of the new Unitary Authority will be to implement parking charges of £3 per car to Hardwick Park (£40 for a season ticket).

This is our local country park (we live in Fishburn), we have young children and visit several times a month (sometimes twice per week in good weather) as it is our local park. We have visited for years, long before the redevelopment started and enjoyed it just as much in its "wild" state. We cannot walk there from Fishburn, it is too far with children.

- Other local councils do not charge for access to green space, e.g. Middlesbrough, Stockton and Hartlepool do not charge for parking at their country parks.

- It discourages Healthy Lifestyles. Free swimming IS being introduced for under 18s & over 60s in all pools across County Durham. We can take the kids swimming for free or if you an oldie you can get a free swim but you have to pay for a walk round your Country Park! How does this fit with the Council's Health & Well-Being strategy?

- Specifically discriminating against those with impaired mobility and low incomes. Hardwick Park is heavily used by those with impaired mobility such as disabled people, older people and those with young children because it is flat, accessible and easy to get round. - Improved Facilities? Hardwick will now have improved facilities (including the much needed new toilets) and more than other similar resources in County Durham but certainly NOT more than those in Stewart Park (Middlesbrough), Summerhill (Hartlepool) or many of the excellent country parks run by Stockton Council - NONE of which charge for parking.

- Local people are already paying through their Council Tax, in the Durham County Council Budget 07/08 £0.3m was allocated "to run Hardwick Park Visitor Centre". It is fundamentally not right to charge people for access to their local green space and sets a very worrying precedent.

And, in brief, more points about the parking charge... Although I agree with the need to provide improved facilities at Hardwick, particularly toilets, I understand that £0.3 million of council tax money is already allocated to the running of the new centre. I therefore ask, what are local residents, who have already paid this proportion of their council tax for the last two years (and not yet received a visitors' centre) going to receive for the £3 parking charge?

My family uses Hardwick Park regularly; we walk there when we are able, but it is not always possible to do so. When you have young children even a half hour trip out to catch some fresh air can involve loading the car with drinks, towels, wellies, fishing nets, buckets, balls, kites, waterproofs and a host of other much needed items. We have tried cycling, but as there is a cycling ban at the park, which we have always adhered to, it leads to problems of what to do with our bikes when we get there. Then of course have you ever tried cycling from the centre of Sedgefield to Hardwick Park, with voung children, with fishing nets, buckets etc? Of course not. It is extremely difficult, and at times dangerous.

A significant proportion of elderly and less able residents enjoy a trip out to the Park. Are they too expected to pay this parking fee simply to enjoy a facility they already have?

What are the people who live a little further out expected to do? It is their local green space too. Families at Mordon, Bradbury, Fishburn and Bishop Middleham all regularly use this fantastic facility. It is too far to expect them to travel to Hardwick Park on foot, yet what will they receive for their £3 parking charge? I ask readers to raise their concerns over this issue with their local Councillors. Local parent, Dawn Bellis
