## Sedgefield through the years

With lots of interest in historic photographs and events in our area, Martin Peagam, The Time Traveller (right) from Sedgefield's Local History Society has agreed to provide snippets of history on a regular basis. Here are two tasters.

### May 1919: 100 years ago

Sedgefield Cricket Club visited Hart Cricket Club; it was the first match for Hart club after a lapse of four years (the extended tea-interval being due to a small matter of the First World War). Sedgefield won the match. Cricket won the day. Celebratory drinks were scarce, though. Colonel Burdon MP enquired in Parliament when the wartime restrictions on the sale of beer and spirits would be lifted. The ravages of the Spanish Flu, which infected 500million people worldwide, of whom 50-100 million died between January 1918 and December 1920, had missed the

Sedgefield Asylum: it was reported that none of the 1,435 patients showed signs of the flu.

### May 1819: 200 years ago

Lord and Lady Stewart left Wynyard Hall for a weekend tour of Durham, visiting Sedgefield, Durham City and Sunderland. At Sedgefield toll-bar, the horses were removed from their carriage and the village folk pulled the carriage into the village to great cheers. Lord Stewart left £15 at the Black Lion Inn for the locals to have a drink.

However, the visit was marred by an accident. One local, called Piles, slipped and fell under the wheel of



the carriage, receiving a broken leg. On their return from Sunderland on Sunday evening, Lord and Lady Stewart called in to assure themselves that the unfortunate man was being cared for.

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### **Greener Sedgefield**

A new Facebook group has been started, with the aim of helping people to reduce, reuse and recycle - and to share ideas on how to replace everyday items with sustainable ones. If that sounds like you, please come and join us.

Plastics are unavoidable and in some surprising places.

Teabags, chewing gum and most clothes contain plastic fibres. Plastic is cheap, quick to produce yet it takes centuries to decompose and a disappointing percentage is recycled.

There's a handy A - Z on the council's website of what they can take kerbside, but that **doesn't** mean everything else should be committed to landfill.

Carrier and bread bags are taken by Sainsbury's. Asda and Tesco also take other soft plastics in their carpark recycling bins. Some stores, like Lush, will take plastic lids, and charities including Ellie's Fund, a brain tumour charity, raise money by collecting various plastics.

Shortly after The Hardwick Arms closed for refurbishment I met with Andy Popple, the managing director of EMA Group Holdings, the building's current owner, to hear details of the proposed changes. There was a busy feel in the ground floor area which had been taken back to the basics; walls to the brickwork, flooring to the boards etc. Andy is a proud north easterner who feels that heritage and aesthetics are very important in a place. He considers that Sedgefield is strong on both these points and that it is a growing community on the cusp of development. He is also impressed with how many local groups are involved in creating what he terms "a good social infrastructure". The new development aims to retain "the very busy front bar" that locals have used since EMA acquired the property but also to create a new 'Herd and Herb' Restaurant and Lounge in the main body of the building to the right of the archway. The new bar area will be situated in the rooms to the left of the archway. On the same side, more towards the rear of the space will be a

### Important news from Skerne Medical Group

Due to a reduction in the number of GPs working in our practice, we are currently experiencing great pressure on appointment availability. To help us ensure we use our time effectively, we need to ask patients to PLEASE:

INDICATE to our trained Receptionists the reason you are requesting an appointment, so we can book you a face to face or perhaps a telephone appointment with the most appropriate person in the shortest possible time.

ATTEND YOUR BOOKED APPOINTMENT OR CANCEL IT and give us as much notice as you can so we can offer the appointment to someone else. **In** February this year, a total of 362 patients failed to attend a booked appointment, which equates to over 200 hrs of wasted clinical time.

**YOUR MOBILE NUMBER.** We have a **text messaging service**, which enables us to send messages and appointment reminders to patients, so if you have a mobile phone, please provide us with the number.

REPEAT PRESCRIPTIONS. Like many other surgeries we need two working days to process repeat prescription requests, so we can perform checks and maintain safety. We are receiving increasing numbers of requests for repeat medication to be issued urgently. This delays other patients' prescriptions and increases the risk of errors. If you do not currently order medication online please speak to our Receptionists about this convenient method.

**CERVICAL SCREENING**, also known as the "smear test", is a routine health check that identifies potentially harmful cells and changes on the cervix. It can reduce your risk of developing cervical cancer, which kills 2 women every day. It is important to make an appointment for screening when invited. We have arranged a WALK IN SCREENING CLINIC at Harbinson House, Sedgefield on Saturday 11 May between 9am and 11:30am. Please come along if you know you are due a screening test or if you would like to ask any questions. No appointment is necessary.

### **Humble Boy**

The Players most recent production of Charlotte Jones' 'Humble Boy', performed in March has been hailed by audiences as being a huge success.

The play, which is loosely based on Hamlet, tells the story of Theoretical Astrophysicist Felix Humble (Tom Guest) who, plagued with self-confidence and social anxieties, returns to his family home to attend the funeral of his father. His difficult relationship with his mother Flora (Viv Jacobs) is pushed to the limit when it's revealed she has been having an affair with George Pye (Geoff Clifford-Brown), father of Felix's ex-lover, and unbeknownst to him the mother of his

child, Rosie (Sarah Legender). Flora's neighbour Mercy Lott (Jean Hewling) and a ghostly apparition of Felix's father James (Terry West) serve to lead the plot along and allow Felix to come to terms with his grief, his lack of understanding of 'how the world works' and allow himself in some form to just 'be'.

A poignant and at times funny play was brought to life by Sarah Atkinson on a sumptuous garden set, designed by Walter Howell. Adam White developed a beautiful and moving soundscape that allowed the action of the play to unfold, leading to the final moments when Felix was finally able to scatter his father's ashes, and move on. Thanks must go to all the helpers working front of house, on prompt and backstage with this production, as well as to our fantastic audiences.

In April the Players performed two plays 'War Brides' by Marion Craig Wentworth and 'Beata Beatrix' by Gillian Plowman at the **Richmond One Act Drama Festival**, part of the All England Theatre Festival. Jacqui O'Meara and Terry West were nominated for Best Actress and Actor for their roles in 'Beatrix', whilst Walter Howell took home the award for Best Set as well as being nominated for Best Director. 'War Brides' won awards for Best Actress, shared by Sarah Legender and Viv Jacobs and Best Supporting Actress for Lucy Atkinson as well as winning overall, which means it will be moving on to the next round at the Washington Arts Centre in May. 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## Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood Watch

### Why Neighbourhood Watch?

It's easy to shrug it off and assume that Anti-social Behaviour or other crime won't happen to you or that nothing can be done about it. In fact, a great deal can be done to prevent it.

It has always been true that the Police cannot prevent or solve every crime alone but it is especially appropriate to remember that, in these times of more limited resources, each of us has a vital role to play by being a little more diligent and observant.

Residents of a community possess a special knowledge of their neighbourhood that the Police find hard to acquire. For example, a Police officer may not recognise someone in your garden as a stranger, but your neighbour might. It is this kind of awareness and willingness to help that is the basis of Neighbourhood Watch.

Residents need to work together with the Police to make Sedgefield safe and crime free, even if we have to look inwardly sometimes in order to address the problem head on. If you spot suspicious behaviour, contact the Police quickly with accurate information. This provides the best chance of successfully apprehending criminals.

Crimestoppers is an independent charity: full anonymity is respected. There will be no names, no police statements, no courts. Contact by phone or online.

Remember, crime isn't as common as you think... but don't be a victim. Please lock up, stay safe and sleep well.

All members of the public can come along for a chat with the NHW Team and ask Rona about her ideas and security measures. Remember the more difficult it can be made for criminals, the more likely it is that crime can be reduced.

### NHW Coffee Morning 31<sup>st</sup> May at 10 am in the Parish Hall

Again, Rona Stocks will be attending together with NHW members and our Police Beat Team. There will be a raffle and tombola with some cracking prizes offered by local Sedgefield Businesses not to mention tasty homemade produce to accompany your coffee. It's an opportunity to meet friends and find out what Neighbourhood Watch is all about.

#### **Cyber Security**

Our presentation in April was delivered by Katie Cain, Police Cyber Crime Prevention Officer and was well received. Amongst the good advice given were simple techniques to make passwords more secure whilst keeping them easy to remember. Leaflets provided by Katie will be available at our other events.

#### **Sedgefield Show**

Our Beat Officer, PC Lamb has invited NHW to join the Police Team at Sedgefield Show in August and so we are planning a joint effort which could involve police dogs and motorbikes

### **Anti-social Behaviour**

This is our No 1 priority as of now and it is highly appropriate to offer our congratulations to PC John Lamb and Amy Jorgeson for their hard work and dedication in tackling this problem.

Whilst not totally eradicated by any means, the incidence of ASB has been notably reduced. However, work will continue in the same vein to ensure we can further reduce the problem as far as possible.

Please note that this includes the Zero Tolerance approach stated in the Police Notice outlined here last month which will involve Social Services and lead to a criminal record where appropriate.

This is where your support is essential as parents, guardians and neighbours in the true sense of Neighbourhood Watch.

Do you know where your teenagers are on an evening and who they are fraternising with?

Two important facts should be borne in mind:

- 1) The majority are good kids who can be led astray by one or two influential but misguided ringleaders;
- 2) The majority of incidents are committed by young Sedgefield residents, not people from other areas.

Therefore, the bitter pill to swallow is that the perpetrators are from this Community; they are your neighbours, and the solution lies within your Community.

## Steve's Nature Diary for May

I made an early spring visit to one of my favourite local sites, Durham Wildlife Trust's Bishop Middleham Quarry Nature Reserve - primarily looking for butterflies and although the sun was shining it was a little on the cool side and I didn't see any. The reserve at this time of year can look very bare which makes it easier to spot the multitude of deposits left by dogs or should I say left by inconsiderate owners who think because it's a nature reserve they don't need to pick it up! What I did see however, was a number of spring migrants which had recently returned from the Sahel area of Africa. There were around a dozen Sand Martins flying over the quarry looking for insects to feed on and then prospecting new nest sites above the existing quarry on the other side of the road. It is good to see them back after making such an arduous journey. When you read this, many of the migrants will be back from their travels and you will have the opportunity to hear the dawn chorus again with birds such as Blackcap, Willow Warbler and Chiff Chaff in full voice.

Going back to butterflies (if you visit the reserve in May you should see more than I did), the newest findings from the annual UK Butterfly Monitoring Scheme led by Butterfly Conservation reveal that last year's heatwave may have given several species a boost but 2018 wasn't a good year for all butterflies. More than two-thirds of UK butterfly species (39 of 57) were seen in higher numbers than in 2017, with two of the UK's rarest, the Large Blue and Black Hairstreak, recording their best years since records began.

But despite the upturn, 2018 was still only an average year for the UK's butterflies. Around two thirds of species (36 of 57) show an apparent decline since records began 43 years ago with 21 of these showing significant long-term declines. It was also a surprisingly poor year for some garden favourites. The Small Tortoiseshell slumped by 38% compared to the previous year and the Peacock was down 25%, whilst the migratory Red Admiral crashed by 75% after a good year in 2017.

This long term decline is mirrored in a range of other species from water voles (now missing from 94% of the places they once lived) to toads (numbers have dropped by 68% in the last 30 years alone). With this in mind, The Wildlife Trusts have produced an updated animated trailer of The Wind in the Willows. This has revisited the riverbank 100 years later to discover how the world has changed. And it's not a pretty sight. Rivers are choked with pollution and litter, trees are torn down to make space for development and grass gives way to concrete. But sadly, this picture is far from a fantasy. The release of the Wind in the Willows trailer launches a new campaign for a Wilder Future. The campaign is calling for Nature Recovery Networks to protect existing wildlife sites and map out where wildlife ought to be. This will join-up important places for wildlife and also allow more people to live closer to nature. ### **Ball Game correction**

After reading your article on the 2019 Ball Game I want to correct you on one point. The ball is "alleyed" when it is kicked in, and recovered from, the Spring Lane beck, not when it is thrown up to start the game. I have played and followed the Ball Game since about 1947. In those days there were two alleys, the Spring Lane one, and a now filled-in pond at the bottom of North End near the garage. Also, in those days there were unwritten rules; the game was between the farmers and the tradesmen with the farmers kicking one way and the tradesmen the other.

The ball was supplied by the church, and the then Church Warden, a Mrs Ward, took the ball to every house in the village before Shrove Tuesday to solicit donations.

The Church Warden always started the game, and if the ball was not alleyed before 6.00pm it went back to the church. In later years, both my father and an uncle started the game as the oldest known resident. *Vic. J. Wright* 

### How times change!

I recall my father and another gardener down the street having a gentleman's agreement that when the Co-op milk horse left a deposit either side of an imaginary line in the road, that dictated which of them could collect it for their gardens.
