They said it made them feel part of something, as they viewed their spectacular art installation. Sedgefield Primary has won many awards for their participation in the arts throughout the years and they are so proud that they will now become part of living history in the magnificent Durham Cathedral.



Community impact

Over the last few weeks at Sedgefield Hardwick, we have been working very hard on our Community Impact Offer. The global pandemic meant that many community links were reduced or halted, and we are very keen to once again engage fully with opportunities in our local area, but also broaden this to a national and even international stage.

In Year 1, our pupils have been working closely with the local charity 'Feeding Families'. They have undertaken a drive to encourage people to donate food packages to families in need in our local area, and will assist the charity to deliver these packages in the coming weeks. In Year 2, we are excited to reestablish our links with Willowdene Care Home, and our pupils have met with staff and residents of the Care Home to discuss different ways in



which they can entertain the residents, for example by taking part in reading activities, board games or performances. Our Year 2 children are very excited to take part in these sessions next term!

Year 3 have also had an impact locally by working alongside the Days In, Days Out (DIDO) group to assist members in our local community in the use of technology. The pupils designed and delivered a workshop where they demonstrated the use of different aspects of iPads and apps that can be useful in our day to day lives.

Years 4 and 5 have some exciting projects lined up for the summer term regarding local traffic and environmental issues, whilst in Year 6, pupils are preparing to take part in a truly international project.



Just before the Easter holidays, Year 6 were visited by Peter and Linda Machin, from Silksworth Independent Methodist Church in Sunderland, who have helped us to forge a link with Bright Star Christian School in Ghana. Together, we are going to work to build beneficial links for all of our pupils, as well as sampling school life in a different culture and continent! As part of our project, our Year 6 pupils will be spearheading a drive encouraging donations of technology devices which could be shipped to Bright Star Christian School, as Computer Science is an area that has been marked for development in their school. Watch this space for more exciting developments over the coming weeks and months!

Careers in medicine

During their time at Sedgefield Community College, we work very hard to ensure students understand the wide range of careers that are available to them – encouraging them to consider professions that they may not be familiar with. Two events in the spring term took place in school to help our students gain a greater understanding of careers in the medical field.



We were delighted to host a drama performance for our Year 8 students that focused on some careers within the NHS such as art therapist and radiographer that many would be less familiar with. At the end of term, we were also delighted to welcome the 'Medical Mavericks' back to SCC for a second year to work with our Year 9 students. The children took part in a workshop and had a chance to test a range of medical equipment and this included using an ECG machine, taking their blood pressure, taking blood from a simulated arm. searching for the growth plates in their wrists using an ultrasound machine, performing keyhole surgery and looking at the eye in huge detail using a retina scanner!





Students had a great time during both events and got a feel for 'real-life' medical careers. For any of our students or their families, a reminder that lots more information about careers is available via the 'Careers @ SCC' site on our school's online learning platform.

You may recall our October front page featured a fundraising campaign for Durham Wildlife Trust seeking to restore Durham Carrs. The Trust has just announced that the campaign has been a massive success.



"Our vision for a Great North Fen, a restored landscape where nature can recover and wetland habitats will sequester and store carbon, is one step closer to being realised."

Thanks to the generosity of the Trust's members and supporters, the £20,000 fundraising target has been met and the money raised has been used as match funding for a grant application. As a result, Durham Wildlife Trust has been able to negotiate a deal to purchase additional land at Ricknall Carrs. The acquisition of the land should be completed in late spring.

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY MAY 2023

On one of the many wet days that we have had recently, I decided to have a go at The Wildlife Trusts' new Great Big Nature Survey. They say it is all about people and nature and they want to hear your opinions on some of the biggest questions surrounding nature and our role in caring for it. I thought it would be quite interesting to have go and it would be relatively easy to do. The Wildlife Trusts are running this survey to find out what people in the UK really think about nature and how we, as a society, should protect it. Results will also help The Wildlife Trusts hold the government to account over its environmental policies and priorities.

The first question was easy: it was all about what I did to help the wider environment from recycling, feeding the birds, to having a wildlife friendly garden. It then got a bit more difficult "In your opinion, how effective are the following at protecting nature? Individuals, communities, council, government etc." Quite thought-provoking especially because it included water and energy providers! It then goes on to ask questions about "Is nature important to you? If so, how important? And what, if any, roles should people, business, and government have in managing nature?" So if you have got 15 minutes to spare, on a rainy afternoon or evening why not have a go at the Great Big Nature Survey it can be found at wildlifetrusts.org/great-big-nature-survey.

When the weather does improve it is the time of the year when people start to think about cutting their lawn again. We haven't done ours yet and a few dandelions have started to appear which is great for the early bumble bees looking for nectar. One of the campaigns that The Wildlife Trusts do every year along with the Royal Horticultural Society is "Wild About Gardens" which celebrates wildlife gardening and aims to encourage people to use their gardens to take action to help support nature.

This year it's all about going wild about lawns. Our lawns are so much more than just a patch of grass. With a bit of care and attention – or even inattention – a lawn can provide a sanctuary for our natural neighbours. Take some time to get to know the plants and animals in your lawn, and you might be surprised at what you find!

The difference between weeds and wildflowers is just a matter of perspective – embrace the daisies, dandelions, clovers and other naturally flowering plants and you won't see a weed in sight. A lawn full of wildflowers provides vital food for bees and butterflies, amongst many other benefits. So, ditch the weedkiller, mow less often, and let the flowers flourish!



To make the most of your lovely lawn, mix up the mowing routine. Keep some areas short as pathways or sunbathing spots – and of course hunting grounds for worm-eating birds. Then let the grass grow a little longer in a small area, offering shelter to caterpillars, grasshoppers and other insects. In turn, this multitude of minibeasts will create a buffet for birds and bats. Vehicle Crime

A recent crime survey stated that in the UK a car is stolen on average every ten minutes!

Three Range Rover type vehicles have been stolen from addresses in Sedgefield in the last few weeks. These cars have been targeted because of their high value but also because thieves have been able to access their keyless entry systems from outside the owners' properties, by means of a signal transmitted from the key fob.

If you have a car with keyless entry and it's parked outside your property, you can protect it from this method of theft by keeping your key fob inside a "Faraday" bag. A small key pouch with a lining that blocks the signal to your car, or anyone else. These bags can be purchased online or at our NHW meetings, at a cost of under £10.

Let's make life more difficult for the car thief by following these simple rules:

- 1. Always lock your car. 44% of cars broken into are unlocked.
- 2. 80% of car crime occurs during the evening or at night. Ensure your car is left in a well lit position, under a street lamp or protected by a PIR Light.
- 3. Leave your car empty. Don't store vehicle documents or personal belongings in the car overnight.
- 4. Use a "soldsecure.com" security device on your car. It may be old school but a visual deterrent will make thieves think twice before targeting your vehicle.
- 5. Secretly mark your car with a UV pen, also available from NHW, by writing your postcode somewhere so if it's recovered, under false plates say, it will prove your ownership. You can even do this on your Catalytic Converter, another target for theft, or install a Tilt alarm inside the car to detect this type of theft.

WhatsApp Verification scam

Action Fraud has issued a warning about a new type of scam relating to WhatsApp.



First, you'll receive an unexpected but genuine message from WhatsApp containing a verification code.

Next, one of your WhatsApp contacts will message you via the app, usually with a story to try to persuade you to send them the code you've just received. They may say they sent it to you in error.

Because the message seems to be from a relative or friend, a lot of people have been tricked into passing on the verification code, which then allows the fraudsters to take over their account. They then have access to personal information about you and your contacts which could be used to access other accounts or target you with more scams.

Keep your WhatsApp account safe:

- 1.Don't share your login details or verification code with anyone. Not even family or friends.
- 2.Set up "Two-step verification" to secure your account.
- 3.Report spam messages or block a sender within WhatsApp. Press and hold on the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions.
- 4. Report any fraud or cybercrime to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.

Anti-social behaviour update

Sedgefield residents are still suffering incidents of anti-social behaviour with further damage and mindless acts of vandalism. Recently, the Town Council offices were targeted with damage caused to the roof. We still await news of an impending upgrade to our Town CCTV but we can all play our part in identifying the culprits. Local police and NHW advice is to resist the impulse to intervene or approach the perpetrators, however, if mobile phone, CCTV footage or photographs can be obtained, this will greatly assist in the identification and possible subsequent prosecution of the culprits.

Your LETTERS Dead pigeons!

Last summer, we had a number of dead pigeons in our garden (14-16). Since January 2023 we have now had up to 7, including one today on the drive way!

Is anyone else having this problem? We are getting fed up of disposing of these birds, so we have reported this problem to Defra (Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs) with concerns about Avian flu. The birds do not appear to have been attacked by other animals. We have also written to Local County Councillors Chris Lines and David Brown as DCC don't seem to deal with this issue.

We have spoken to our neighbours who are also experiencing this problem and we are interested to find out if this is just occurring in our area or elsewhere in the Sedgefield vicinity.

Athletics

The road racing season is underway, including some of the big spring marathons. Two of the major events on the calendar took place recently - Manchester Marathon and London Marathon, returning to its traditional April date. Sedgefield Harriers had representatives in both races, who produced some excellent performances. At Manchester, Mark Raine was the club's first runner to finish, in a rapid personal best time of 2:58:06. John Haycock was next in 3:45:49 and Beth Raine also recorded a big PB, crossing the line in 4:32:56. Incidentally, Kieran Walker, who was a Sedgefield Harrier in his formative years, claimed second place in the race in 2:17:30. A week later, three Harriers headed south for the London Marathon. In the men's race, David Bentley improved on his 2022 PB with a fantastic time of 2:33:38, while in the women's event Lisa Darby also recorded her fastest ever time of 3:13:58, breaking her own club record in the process. Completing a trio of PBs was Matt Cooke, shaving a brilliant 15 minutes off his previous best with 3:48:01. Congratulations to all of the Sedgefield runners.

Thus began the representation of Sedgefield at 134 events during the year including 13 Carol Services, even more Coffee Mornings and a wide range of fundraising events throughout the North East.



New friendships have been forged and no doubt you will have seen many Mayors and Consorts visiting Sedgefield at the dozen or so events I have organised here in the village, all raising funds for Cancer Research UK and local community groups at £12,000+ and still counting!

We were all saddened to learn of the passing of our beloved Queen Elizabeth II. I had the great privilege of reading out the official Proclamation and Statement, a tremendous honour indeed. I will also be involved with the Coronation Service. My final event is a Murder Mystery Night on 10 May starring Sedgefield Players, who have given me fantastic backing all year. I hope to see some of you there and I thank you for your great support and generosity during my year as your Mayor".


