Keep on rolling

The evenings are drawing in again, and whilst it's not quite like enjoying a ride in glorious sunshine there's no reason to stop riding into autumn and beyond! Indeed, a ride around our lovely countryside on a cool sunny morning, enjoying the changing colours of the trees and the fresh autumn air can be a great way to get some exercise at your own pace and even get some jobs done as you go. There are a few things you can do to make the changing conditions a bit more comfortable though:

- Fit mudguards. You will be amazed at the difference they make to staying warm and dry. There are lots of different types available and there will be one to suit your bike, from full length fixed ones to clip on guards for bikes without fittings for full guards. Drop us a line at BAT for advice.

- Get lights. Even if you don't intend to ride as it gets dark, having a red light at the back and a white one in front can help you be seen when the sun is low. I always have them fitted on my bike so I can turn them on as conditions require. Remember to keep them charged or carry some extra batteries.

- Carry spares. A spare inner tube and the tools to change it can save you a long walk. I try to keep a bit of cash with me too in case I need a taxi! You might also want to carry a lightweight waterproof jacket in case you get caught in a shower.

- Get a luggage rack and panniers. If you want to carry some shopping home it is so much easier to carry the weight on the bike than in a backpack or carrier bag. I have twin panniers and a saddlebag that can carry lots of shopping or my things for work. Put a couple of bin bags in them that you can roll things up in if you need to keep them dry.

- Change your clothes. You can get cycle specific waterproofs and thermal cycle clothing if you want, but otherwise wearing several layers can let you regulate your temperature easily. I always carry gloves because my fingers get cold easily!

With a bit of planning and preparation, cycling into autumn and winter can be comfortable and fun, so don't be in a hurry to pack your bike away just yet! 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Black History Month

The first event in our diversity calendar is Black History Month, which is recognised nationally every October. Every year group received an assembly about Black History and why there is a need for Black History Month. We also welcomed Marsha Garrett (who is a researcher, public speaker and historian on the creation of race and racism) back into school to run workshops for our Year 8s about Black History, the creation of race and racism. Marsha shared her expertise with warmth and humour and we look forward to continuing our work with her in the future.

Sports galore!

What a week of sporting achievement it has been at Sedgefield Hardwick! Pupils have taken part in both a cross country event and a football league. This year's sport began with the school football teams competing against other schools in the area. The teams were made up from a mix of boys and girls across Years 4, 5 and 6 and both teams participated with great ambition and determination to finish as high as they could. After four weeks of intense competition, our A team achieved a silver medal while not losing or conceding a goal-what an incredible effort! Our B team were hot on their heels and finished with a bronze medal.



In the cross country, pupils showed great resilience and perseverance to achieve some fantastic results. A gold and bronze medal were secured in the Year 5 and 6 boys race. This was followed up by Year 5 and 6 girls achieving a bronze medal as well as finishing fourth. In the younger age group of Year 3 and 4, the boys won a silver medal. These fantastic finishes mean both our Year 5 and 6 teams as well as our Year 3 and 4 boys have qualified for the county finals later in the academic year.

Creative drama workshops took place for Year 4 & 5 pupils to launch the school year. This gave them excellent teamwork building skills opportunities, through music and acting skills. Pupils developed science skills by learning about the water cycle through the Ripple Effect Workshops sponsored by Northumbrian Water.



The environment and water conservation were also a key feature to the creative day, supporting our PHSCE (Personal, Health, Social and Citizenship Education) curriculum.



All pupils thoroughly enjoyed his creative way of learning and took lifelong learning water conservation messages home to parents.


At our October meeting we were visited by Dr Pete Edwards, a physicist and astronomer from Durham University. He gave us an update on the newest developments in space exploration. We were all fascinated by his presentation on the new James Webb Telescope. We also learnt that one of the businesses at NETPark has played an important part in the design and manufacture of a critical part of the technical, infra-red cameras. Our next Speaker, on 4th November, is a Professor of Archaeology at Durham University; he will be bringing us up to date on what has now been discovered from the artefacts and relics uncovered at the recent excavations in our East Park. It seems that, almost 2000 years ago, Sedgefield may have been an important industrial and support station to troops moving to and from Scotland.

We welcome visitors to all our meetings and look forward to meeting some more of you soon.



STEVE'S NATURE DIARY NOVEMBER 2022

I write this the day after going to a very entertaining talk entitled "Where the Wildflowers Grow - My Botanical Journey through Britain and Ireland" by Leif Bersweden. Over the course of a year, Leif goes on a journey around the UK and Ireland, highlighting the unique plants that grow there, their history and the threats that face them. His journey takes him from the Cornish coast to the pine forests of Scotland - even to the streets of London, proving that nature can be found in the most unexpected places. After the talk there were lots of questions from the audience and one of them was about what people can do to help the plight of plants and Leif replied with "tell other people how wonderful they are". So here I am telling you a little bit about what wonderful plants you might find in November.



This time of year is a good time to concentrate on a group of plants called the bryophytes. They are a group of plants that include mosses, liverworts and hornworts. Currently there are 1098 species of bryophyte in Britain and Ireland. Like the 'higher' plants (flowering plants and ferns) the majority of bryophytes make their own food via photosynthesis and because they contain chlorophyll, the majority are green. However, bryophytes are different to higher plants because they lack proper roots and proper leaves, so are generally quite small. They can be found in several habitats but particularly like mild and damp conditions. Often in lawns, on walls, in woodlands or other damp habitats. They have interesting names like Springy turf-moss, Wall Screw-moss, Mouse-tail moss and Forked veilwort. They can be difficult to identify but have a look at <u>britishbryologicalsociety.org.uk/learning/some-common-bryophytes/</u> to help you.

Another question that was asked was about the threats that flora (and fauna) are facing at the moment and Leif explained about how during his travels he heard how some plants had disappeared from sites for a number of reasons including habitat destruction and climate change. The Wildlife Trust is particularly concerned at the moment because the UK Government has announced that they will be: "Removing important laws that protect nature, help to provide clean water and reduce pollution (through the Retained EU Law); Introducing a new planning and infrastructure bill, as well as investment zones as part of the growth plan, which will weaken protections for wildlife; Considering scrapping plans to reward farmers for managing land in a nature and climate friendly way; Lifting the ban on fracking in England, despite there being no evidence that proves fracking is safe." They have started a campaign #DefendNature – you can find more details at wildlifetrusts.org.

AUTUMN AND WINTER CRIME PREVENTION

As last month's Crime stats for Sedgefield indicated, a dwelling house burglary in the village is a rare event. That doesn't mean we can be complacent regarding security measures in and around the home as darker nights loom. Always keep doors and windows locked, even when you're at home. Remove keys from locks and keep them out of view or reach. Install a PIR LED light to ensure your garden and entrances are well lit. Come to one of our meetings and pick up a Neighbourhood Watch window sticker, which has been proven to deter would be criminals.

ENERGY REBATE AND PARCEL DELIVERY SCAMS

We are still receiving reports from residents who are finding messages on their devices claiming to offer energy rebates. Energy rebates will be paid to your bank or your supplier direct. You do not need to apply for them. Another popular scam at the moment is a message from a parcel delivery company, which you may have previously used, claiming that they have tried to deliver a parcel and follow the links to arrange another delivery date. As usual, the advice is to take five minutes to think before doing anything. If you know it's a scam, report it.

I recently accompanied PCSO Amy Jorgeson on a walkabout in the village and we identified an area which was being targeted by youth harassment. Although several homes had been affected, only a couple of residents had reported it was taking place. Amy quickly investigated the issue, the culprit was identified and police action taken. A good reminder that if the police, Local Council, Housing Authority or Neighbourhood Watch are informed about incidents, action will be taken.

A quick reminder that our Sedgefield Neighbourhood Watch meetings are on the second Wednesday of each month at 7.30 pm in Ceddesfeld Hall and we still have a vacant position on our committee. Everyone is welcome, and it's free!

Remember to keep those reports going in to the Police on 101 or 999 in an emergency. Whether it's harassment, anti social behaviour, dangerous or inconsiderate driving or parking, or any issue which may be causing you distress. If it happens every day, report it every day. You can always report a crime issue to Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555111.

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
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SPORTS UPDATE

This month's update includes some of the regular news from clubs and individuals in and around Sedgefield. In addition, I was pleased to receive some details of the latest activities at Sedgefield 75, the well-established and successful swimming club that is based at Newton Aycliffe Leisure Centre. I was also delighted to read that John Moore remains at the heart of the club's success. John is a prime example of those passionate volunteers who keep grass roots sport going, providing the opportunities to participate and compete to generation after generation.

Swimmina

The 2022/23 swimming season kicked off for Sedgefield 75 swimming club with a trip to Billingham Swimming Club for an annual autumn gala. The young swimmers involved had resumed training in the second half of August, so were ready to test their progress since their last local competition in early July. The eight Sedgefield swimmers amassed 29 personal bests from 39 swims collectively, and everyone had something to shout about.



Aviana Wilson (who is from Sedgefield) set three PBs out of three and placed very highly in 50m and 100m freestyle, and 50m backstroke races. Ellis Dickinson took nearly six seconds off his 100m freestyle best and hit another new best in the 50m backstroke. Charlotte Lee was on top form and achieved four PBs, including an excellent five second improvement in 200m breaststroke, where she placed fourth. Charlie McEwan swam four races close to his best times, and earned a bronze medal in the 50m

freestyle with a time of 27:06 seconds.

Emma Price returned home unbeaten with six gold medals out of six, with PBs in all of them, which included very good backstroke times over all three distances. Emma also picked up three more club records in the 50m breaststroke, butterfly and backstroke.

Ruby Hancock also went 100% on PBs, swimming all freestyle with a mighty ten seconds improvement over 200m and close to four seconds off her 100m best time. Evie Weston took on eight events and hit seven PBs, with top ten finishes in all her races

Jessica Bell also had a busy weekend with six scheduled events, beating her PB in four of them and winning bronze in the 100m butterfly and 100m breaststroke. She also finished fifth in the 200m individual medley, gaining her a place in the skins competition for 12 years and under, despite being just 11. Skins competitions are guickfire knockout events of 50m races, with the stroke being drawn at random. Jessica progressed through the first backstroke round and picked up a cash prize for her efforts.

Chief Coach John Moore was delighted with the quality of swimming from everyone, and also the team spirit on show as every swimmer was totally invested in everyone else's swims as well as their own.

Athletics

Three members of Sedgefield Harriers (of which I know) travelled south at the start of October to tackle the London Marathon. They all put in great performances. Steve Foreman finished in 3:40:45 and Andy Featherstone completed the race in 4:06:56. Tracy Foreman was Sedgefield's sole lady at the event and crossed the line in 5:02:59.

However, the standout marathon performance of the day by aSedgefield Harrier was further north in Chester, where David Bentley set a new club record in a fantastic time of 2:36:19 (finishing 11th overall in the Chester Marathon). David shaved five minutes off the previous club best, which was set by Gary Hetherington. As many in Sedgefield will know, Gary was one of the best club runners in the North East for many years, before Sedgefield Harriers existed. After the club was founded and Gary became a member, he set the club record at the age of 50, but his personal marathon PB is 2:27. Back to the present and David has been making brilliant progress in recent years. He had been targeting 2:40, so to get down to 2:36 was hugely impressive. I look forward to reporting on him lowering the club record even more in the future.

Also running in Chester was Harrier Lisa Darby. Lisa had qualified to wear an England Athletics age group vest, which was a very significant achievement. Her race in Chester didn't go quite as she hoped, but her time of 3:31:39 was nevertheless very impressive.

Cycling

Sedgefield has a new national champion! Ben Hetherington rounded off his first year back in competition after his serious injury three years ago, by claiming the Paracyclist National Championship title at the RTTC National Closed Circuit Championship. In a time trial race at Thruxton Circuit in Hampshire, Ben covered the 11.7 miles in 27 minutes and 20 seconds to secure his win. Congratulations to Ben and I look forward to reporting on more success in the future.
