Restoring the Durham Carrs

The Durham Carrs were a relic from the last ice age - a complex of wetlands fed by the River Skerne as it descended from the limestone escarpment in the east of County Durham, and flowed south. The term 'carr' means an area of bog or fen in which scrub, especially willow, has become established, so in recent centuries the landscape of the Durham Carrs was not open water, but a mosaic of habitats that would have been home to a wide range of species.

Some believe the Romans used rafts on the wetlands to carry heavy goods and supplies to service camps and forts. It stretched north from just near Aycliffe up to Bishop Middleham and included Ricknall Carrs, Mordon Carrs, Bradbury Carrs, Nunstainton Carrs, the carrs just beside the west of Hardwick Country Park and others.

Durham Wildlife Trust has a vision for a Great North Fen. Restored landscapes where nature can recover and wetland habitats will sequester and store carbon. The Discover Bright Water Landscape Partnership

began the first phase of the restoration of the Carrs, securing land at Bishop's Fen to the south of Bishop Middleham. Additional land has recently been acquired at

Those habitats, and the species they supported, are now almost entirely gone. They were drained for agriculture and the East Coast Mainline and later the A1(M) were driven across them. Many bird, mammal, plant, insect, and other species were displaced from what was a very diverse ecosystem. We now know that it was also a major sink for atmospheric carbon. Today, the landscape has become difficult for modern agriculture due to frequent flooding and rising groundwater levels following the end of coal mining.

Ricknall Carrs, near Newton Aycliffe. Durham Wildlife Trust are now seeking your support to complete the initial restoration of the Durham Carrs. They have been given the opportunity to purchase an additional area of land. To be able to submit a grant application for £200,000 to buy additional land, the Trust first needs to raise £20,000 and need your support to do that.

Church Tower trips resume in Sedgefield

For the first time in more than five years, visitors to Sedgefield will soon be able to enjoy outstanding views of the Durham countryside from the lofty tower roof of St Edmund's ancient church.

Trips to the roof of the church tower, the second highest in County Durham, had to be cancelled for health and safety reasons but safety bars have now been installed in the castellations so that rooftop tours can be resumed.

The Friends of St Edmund's, who have funded the work, admit they have been frustrated by the delay in sourcing the approved metal for the bronze bars.

"We know that many people have been disappointed at being unable to enjoy the panoramic views from the top of the tower. On a good day, you can see for miles", said Brian Mutch, membership secretary of the Friends and emeritus warden.

Initially, rooftop trips will be restricted to pre-arranged private parties. All donations will be given to St Edmund's Church.

Best Ever GCSE Results

Students, families, and staff at Sedgefield Community College celebrated its best ever set of GCSE results in end of V11 exams t

celebrated its best ever set of GCSE results in end of Y11 exams this summer. There were exceptional performances from many students with lots achieving the highest grades across all subjects. As well as this, there were many instances of students overcoming enormous obstacles to achieve grades that they can be very proud of. 80.5% of students achieved 5 standard passes (grade 4+) including English and Maths - a 4.3% improvement from 2019. As well as this, 63.2% of students achieved 5 strong passes (grade 5+) including English and Maths - a huge improvement of more than 10% from 2019.



Paul Fleming, Headteacher, commented: "After all of the challenges that our Year 11 students have faced, we're delighted that they have achieved such impressive results. They have shown terrific resilience and they deserve all of their success. Of course, these tremendous exam results have only been possible due to the commitment and expertise of our fantastic staff and the unwavering support of parents, carers and our governing body. Congratulations to our students and we wish them all every success in the future."

The achievement of the Y11 students follows on from the school's Ofsted inspection in May 2022 where the report confirmed that Sedgefield continues to be an 'outstanding' school.

Wildflowers at Winterton

Durham County Council is in the process of changing the management of selected areas of its green spaces to encourage biodiversity, improve health and wellbeing of residents, and reduce carbon emissions.

One of the areas chosen for ecological enhancement this year is Winterton Avenue in Sedgefield, where part of a large grassed area is to be seeded with perennial wildflowers.

In order to facilitate the wildflower seeding, the initial ground preparation requires the existing grass to be sprayed off to kill any invasive weeds before cultivation and then seeding with a perennial seed mix. The sward will then be managed by late summer mowing, with the cuttings collected and placed in a suitable area on the site to compost.

This management will ensure that the area provides attractive wildflowers over the spring and summer, and looks neat over the winter as the dead stems are removed. It will then grow and flower again the following spring. The wildflowers will be located on the upper section of the green (the area surrounded by the yellow line in the image below) and a large area in front of the houses is retained as amenity grassland and will be managed as it is currently. People are free to walk among the wild flowers and enjoy them and the insects that they attract. The wildflower seeding simply changes the sward composition to enhance biodiversity and the council is undertaking works like this on many sites around the county. This project to enhance biodiversity contributes to actions that are addressing the ecological emergency that the council declared earlier this year, and will reduce the organisation's carbon footprint.

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY OCTOBER 2022

As I write this, whilst listening to the weather on the radio, "evenings getting cooler and possibility of ground frost", autumn is well under way. I look round the garden and there aren't many flowers left, a few purple spikes of Buddleia, pink and red Sedum flowers and fading blooms of Geraniums. These flowers will provide a nectar source for a number of late butterflies and bees, but there is one plant that is only just revealing its flowers, opening up for business long after the others have closed their doors.

Ivy is unusual among our native plants in that it flowers in autumn and produces its black berries in spring. When ivy comes into bloom you see it flowering with bobbly explosions of pale green. For our insects, it offers welcome nourishment for those that like staying out late in the year. You will see a mix of characters queuing up for one last meal before they head off to sleep for the winter. Beautiful butterflies dine alongside wasps; Queen Bumblebees jostle with lowly Hoverflies and our ivy bushes literally buzz with life, it acts as an entomological service station in autumn. Many of the visitors will be shining chocolate-orange hoverflies know as droneflies. They spend the early part of their life in wet manure heaps or stagnant mud as rat-tailed maggots, named because of their long siphons which they poke up to the surface to breathe. They spend the winter as adult flies and ivy nectar will help to see them through the winter.



The importance of ivy to the wildlife of our towns cannot be understated. Aside from this vital late season nectar supply the evergreen leaves also feed caterpillars - including those of the Holly Blue butterfly and the elegant Swallow -tailed moth. These leathery leaves also provide a hibernating site for Brimstone and Comma butterflies. On cold winter evenings you can hear chirps and the chatter of an invisible starling and sparrow choir roosting in its waterproof warmth. Its black berries keep visiting winter thrushes fuelled and, in the spring, it is a nesting site for robins and wrens. Ivy covers a blank brick wall with a piece of living graffiti. It's a nature reserve that has spread itself across our villages, towns and cities.

But despite all the life it supports, ivy has a bad reputation in some circles, its roots sucking the life from the trees it surrounds. This isn't true; ivy manufactures its own nourishment just like any other honest plant. And we can't forget an important service that ivy provides for us humans. For centuries ivy has protected us from house goblins. Bringing ivy into your home as a decoration at Christmas (the time when goblins are apparently at their most pesky) will ensure that your festive season passes without a burnt turkey or a blown fairy light!

With energy prices set to rise again in October, the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has received more than 1,500 reports of scam emails, bearing the Ofgem logo, claiming that the recipient is due an energy rebate payment as part of a Government scheme and providing links to follow to apply for the rebate. These links lead to malicious websites designed to steal personal and financial information. Check the email carefully. If you have any doubts, take 5 minutes to think before giving out any information, or contact your energy provider direct using their official website. If you are not sure about any email,



As always, a big contingent of runners from Sedgefield made the journey to Tyneside for the Great North Run. This year, the world's biggest half marathon was able to return to its traditional route, after the cancellation in 2020 and last year's 'out-and-back'. Inevitably, the occasion was somewhat more subdued than usual, and the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was marked appropriately and elegantly (in my humble opinion) at the start of the event.

Once the race began, the running was as good as ever, with some notable performances by participants from Sedgefield. Of the 23 Sedgefield Harriers who ran, David Bentley was first over the line in an extremely impressive time of 74 minutes and 15 seconds, which secured him 99th position overall! The first female Harrier over the line was Georgina Letts in 2:07:23 – a great performance on her Great North Run debut. Other Harriers who took part included John Tomlinson, who I believe has completed every single Great North Run, and Ean Parsons, who has completed all but the very first. Of course, there were a lot of others from Sedgefield who also took part in the Great North Run, including many who raised money for good causes. Bravo to all of you!

The week after the Great North Run, Sedgefield Harriers hosted its popular Sedgefield Serpentine race, a trail race of around 10km that started and finished in East Park next to the cricket club, and took runners on an undulating route on paths between Hardwick Park and Bishop Middleham. There were 125 runners on the day. The overall race winner was Steve Rankin of Sunderland Harriers in 37:16, followed by Lee Thompson of Crook AC in 38:45, and James Oldfield of Sedgefield Harriers in 39:01. The first lady was Monikar Molnar of Blackhill Bounders in 47:48, with Jocelyn Wilkinson of Run Peterlee second in 48:40 (Run Peterlee), and Lisa Darby of Sedgefield Harriers third in 51:02.

The club is grateful to Lost Robot for sponsoring the free gift to every runner, to Up and Running for providing the prizes, and to the many volunteers on the day who went above and beyond to make sure that the event went smoothly. Many participants and chief event organisers Steve and Tracy Foreman stayed to enjoy some rehydration at the cricket club's beer festival after the race.
