Sedgefield young people's drop-in

February was all go for the 13 - 19 year olds who use the drop-in space at 58 Front Street, with two 'residentials' and a local band and singer supporting a fundraiser in Newbottle.

The residential weekends were to Edinburgh (the girls group) and Manchester (boys). Whilst in Edinburgh the girls had an opportunity to visit a number of local attractions, including Mary Kings Close, the Zoo and the Dungeons. On Saturday evening they saw The Sound of Music, and for the majority of the group this was the first time they had visited a theatre. The boys group took part in snow activities such as Snowboarding and Skiing at the Chillfactor in Manchester and alongside this they experienced a simulated sky dive at AirKix. The ideas were developed by the young people and they actively applied for money from the Youth Opportunities Fund. Local band 'Anywhere But Here' and Kieron Clarke(solo singer) took part in the fundraising event in Newbottle, for a young man who suffered 90% burns last year. The young people were supported by their friendship group and helped to raise a large sum of money on the evening.

These are just examples of the activities we do and support. During most holidays we have a number of activities like go-karting, rock climbing, kayaking and the adrenaline assault course. During the week-day sessions we look at issues that can affect young people, such as sexual health, alcohol and self esteem problems. Throughout every session we also offer a safe environment for young people to access free condoms and the Chlamydia Screening Programme.

Community SAFET



Follow up from February Neighbourhood Watch Meeting.

In last month's Sedgefield News we gave an account of the above meeting. The regular reader may have noticed that there was no report from PC Todd and no crime figures. This was not an error, as PC Todd now reports under his PACT heading direct to the paper and normally we would include the crime figures for the two month period, covered by our meetings. However at the February meeting Keith announced that crime was so low and as there had been no burglaries at all in the last two months in the village a formal report was not needed. This was welcomed by N/H/Watch members as good news indeed.

Unfortunately the good news has ended in March with a spate of thefts from cars overnight, which started 3/4th & 4/5th of March in the village itself and there have been more since! The really bad news is that these were all avoidable. The most recent incidents occurred overnight on Tuesday 16th in Cragside and Hadleigh Close. None of the vehicles were forcibly entered; they had been left insecure. If you value your property and don't want the hassle of dealing with the aftermath of theft / burglary, please take the simple precaution of keeping it locked and secure. Also worthwhile is the use of lights on in the home and the benefit of "good neighbours". Local Police have already delivered 500 fliers to various homes in an attempt to get residents to take basic security precautions. They also ask that the public report any suspicious persons / vehicles, no matter how trivial to the Police - see below.

lottings from Sedgefield Residents' Forum March meeting

As the Residents' Forum meetings scheduled for April and May both fall on Bank Holidays it has been decided to cancel those meetings. Instead we will hold a Special Meeting on Wednesday April 21st at 7pm in the Fletcher Room. The meeting will report back on answers which have finally been gathered from Durham County Council and the Planning Inspectorate to questions residents posed about the process of the Caravan Park being granted planning permission. Since planning permission was granted the 'working group' of the Forum have been persistent in seeking the answers to residents' questions. Although it has taken some considerable time this Special Meeting will be an opportunity for all those residents who asked questions and those who are still curious to hear the views and comments of DCC and the Inspectorate and in turn give feedback on the answers provided. The meeting is open to everyone so please come along to hear and comment on the questions our community submitted.

The March Forum meeting heard an update on current issues and an update from PC Todd on Policing issues in the village. There was discussion on the planning application to establish a rugby pitch at the cricket field. Whilst there were welcoming comments to this proposal recognising the benefits and success of the rugby club there was concern that open park land was being used when there are already rugby pitches at the sports college. There was no further information about the long requested bowling green

which is again a possibility on land near the cricket club.

The Forum is still seeking answers from Durham County Council on what has happened to the circa £47K section 106 monies allocated as a result of Cunningham Court development. You wouldn't believe (or maybe you would) the number of letters, some recorded delivery, telephone calls and emails sent to DCC regarding this issue - all resulting in no reply to date. (8th March – we first wrote in Oct 09)

The March minutes will, as usual be available in the Town Council office and Library and will be circulated on the Residents email list. Remember no meetings the first Mondays of April & May, but put the Special meeting in your diary: April 21st 7pm in the Fletcher Room.

PC Todd reports

Last month I highlighted 2 crimes both the theft of property from vehicles left unsecured overnight. As you will have read on the front page, the number of such crimes has increased rapidly (13 at the time of writing).

Spring does finally seem to have arrived, but despite that the Sunday league football programme has continued to suffer disruption during the last month. Frozen pitches were for a while replaced by waterlogged pitches and even though games are now being played regularly again, there's a degree of fixture chaos at the moment that will endure for some time yet. When the clocks go forward, for 'Sunday league' we will be able to read 'Sunday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, Sunday league'. Challenges ahead aplenty for the players, management, support teams and whoever washes the kit. Away from the latter stages of the domestic football season (both in and around Sedgefield, and in the Premier League, Championship and the rest), cricket will be coming to the fore again soon.

Internationally, it's another Ashes year, so the England team will be working up to their trip to Australia and hoping to win down under for the first time in almost 25 years. Here in England, Durham CCC will start the season as County Champions...again. The squad still looks very strong and with the likelihood that Steve Harmison won't be called away for England duty this summer, they have a bowling attack that every other county will fear. A third successive title is by no means out of the question. Sedgefield Cricket Club is also preparing for the new season more on that in future months. Given that the summer sports are about to take the main stage, it's slightly strange that this sports update is dominated by a decidedly indoor pursuit, but there are good reasons for that.

Sport Relief Squashathon

On Saturday 20th March, Sedgefield Squash Club hosted a Sport Relief 'Squashathon', (pictured opposite) organised by club member Simon Hill. In the morning, 16 junior members with partners (either friends or parents) took part in a knock out competition at the squash club. In the afternoon, sports clubs and social groups of Sedgefield were invited to enter teams of four into a competition - the Ladies Circle, Sedgefield Harriers, table tennis, badminton and tennis clubs took part. Meanwhile, children were invited to take part in a mini Olympics type event in Ceddesfeld Hall, consisting of a range of

challenges that involved using racket and ball.

The same evening, a quiz night was held in the Nag's Head, with many local business kindly donating prizes for a charity auction.

Overall, the day's activities raised £750 for Sport Relief – a fantastic effort all round. The club would like to thank everybody who supported and participated in such a successful event.

Youth Squash

Sedgefield Squash Club hosted the fifth annual mini-squash competition for local primary schools in February. The competition and pre-competition coaching attracted three schools this year: Sedgefield Primary, St.William's (Trimdon) and Trimdon Juniors. Despite being hampered by ice and snow, Stephen Rowsby, now at college in Cumbria, and Ian Woodhead, a professional from Harrogate, delivered two half-day sessions of coaching to each school. In the end, St William's were unable to attend the competition itself, which included four teams of five players: three teams from Sedgefield and one from Trimdon. The event was organised by Dr James Larcombe, with help from teachers at both schools, Sarah Hepples (sports co-ordinator for Sedgefield Community College) and the two Daniels (Skilbeck and Toas), Year 6 pupils at Sedgefield, who refereed all of the matches between them!

As teams have to include a mixture of players (in terms of level of experience), almost half of the children were competing for the second or third time. The teams unanimously decided to shed their official titles and played under four chosen pseudonyms (see below). Each had two matches in a roundrobin format. While there was a clear winner, the race for second and third place was very close. The day was a resounding success, with many excellent performances from children new to the game, alongside the more experienced players. Final results: 1st Bulls (Sedgefield) 109 pts; 2nd Lions (Sedgefield) 77pts; 3rd Vampires (Trimdon) 67 pts; 4th Dragons (Sedgefield) 62 pts.

Sedgefield Harriers had a busy winter. A number of teams and competitors went to Leeds in February to compete in the National Cross Country Championships. A number of juniors competed at

School County Championship Level and Jonathan Baines and Ben Hetherington represented County Durham Schools at County Level. In addition, Jonathan Baines; U17's and Gemma Varley; U20's represented Co Durham at an Inter-Counties match at Birmingham on Saturday 13th March. Very well done to **Jonathan**

Baines, who featured as February's Ron Hill Athlete of the Month in Athletics Weekly. He also represented County Durham Schools at the National Schools Cross Country Championships in Manchester on 20th March. On 18th April the junior Harriers will take a large contingent to represent the club at the Anne Marie Redshaw Open Track and Field in Shildon where last year they won two gold, one silver and two bronze medals. For the senior club a number of runners have been taking part in the North York Moors Winter Fell Race series of 11 races from October to April. After 9 races Gail Bell is leading the senior ladies category and Ean Parsons the men's over-50 category. The last race is the Gisborough Moors Race
