
Grease is the word!

It was tears and laughter in equal measure at an outstanding production of 'Flamingoland' by Deborah MacAndrew.

Defiantly facing up to death from cancer, Mari (Norma Neal) is determined to leave everything in order, bagging, boxing and shredding the accumulated clutter of a lifetime. Long suffering daughter Kathleen (Jacqui O'Meara) does her best to help, but careful preparations are shattered when a long hidden family secret is revealed. Mari's snobbish sister Bridie (Jean Hewling), so puritanical that her own daughter Sadie (Viv Jacobs) feels obliged to keep her musical talent under wraps, brought tension and a complete lack of understanding to her sister's situation. Thomas Guest as Dave, the environmental health officer trying to deal with squirrels in the loft, became an unlikely ally, sharing hopes, fears and dreams with Mari and Kathleen. On a spartan set, almost totally devoid of furniture by the final scene, the five perfectly cast actors took the audience on an emotional journey, gales of laughter in the early scenes giving way to moments in the second half when you could have heard a pin drop. Director Walter Howell, his dedicated team of backstage and technical crew and the actors worked hard to bring Sedgefield a production which will live long in the memory.

Well done to our local Police

Sedgefield Neighbourhood Watch Chairman Ken Saiger is extremely pleased to be able to publicly thank local officers PCSO Gavin Rutter, PC Keith Todd & Sgt. Due to their co-ordinated and persistent efforts to catch the thieves they made 3 arrests during the small hours of Saturday morning on the 26th of February. Crime prevention in Sedgefield

A timely reminder of a message from Durham Police - Crime Prevention; they are keen to impress upon residents the need to keep their homes secure at all times and to ensure car and house keys are not visible from windows and doors. It is important to be aware that homes are given the appearance of being occupied. Light timer switches can be used to activate interior lighting and dusk to dawn sensors can do the same, to automatically switch on exterior lights. An approved intruder alarm is also something to consider. It represents a significant deterrent and is a most effective burglary prevention measure. For anyone thinking of upgrading their external doors or windows, new doors should meet the enhanced security standard PAS 24 and the window enhanced security standard is BS 7950.

Past research has indicated that over half of the burglaries in Sedgefield Borough area did not involve forced entry. This would suggest the crime was either a sneak-in crime, distraction or the property was insecure. We are all complacent at times, but by giving a little consideration to your home security will help prevent you becoming a victim of crime.

Cold callers

Why not display a No Cold Calling Home sticker and ignore any uninvited callers - especially those who ignore your notice. Stickers are still available free from the Town Council Offices (next to the Doctor's Surgery).

Flask in the fridge

Please remember to update your data sheet inside the flask, following any change to either your medication or to your health. It is vital that if the Emergency Services are called and refer to the information that it is accurate & up to date, it is for your benefit only. A simple method is to put your most recent medication script in the flask (as long as it has all your current medication on it). Flasks are still available free from the Library and the Town Council

Jottings from Sedgefield

Residents' Forum March meeting. As usual the meeting covered updates on issues from the previous meeting, and new issues raised by residents. It was welcomed that there had been some foot path repairs but concern was expressed at the standard of repair and the worry that 'skimming' repairs will not last very long. The Local Government Ombudsman has decided that since we have not been able to make any progress in getting answers from Durham County Council (DCC) to the Section 106 monies issue that she will instigate a further complaint and investigation against DCC. We will report any result when we receive information. We have had no feedback from DCC since the Forum made comment on DCC proposals for further land allocation for building homes in the village. Information indicates that DCC propose further consultation on the issue in March. The Forum felt that the Town Council should seek the views of our community on any further building developments in the village so that they can give a clear view on what our community requires.

We still await a date for the planning meeting to consider the application for wind turbines in Spring Lane. Other turbines have recently been given permission in the surrounding area and there is the possibility of a huge application in the none too distant future which would result in

our village being completely surrounded by turbines. We welcome our MP's comments that the cumulative effect of such applications must be considered.

Concern was expressed at the potential closure of the Hardwyke Ward at the Community Hospital. Although there was some publicity on the issue many people in the village are not aware of the potential loss of the service of that ward locally. It was a long fought battle, many years ago, to retain our Community Hospital and we must make sure that the excellent services it provides locally are maintained.

The DERIC Youth bus started its work in the village on Saturday nights; it will be interesting to hear what all parties think about the service, though it only seems to be there for a couple of hours from 5pm.

On a final note, please sign the petition to save Coxhoe (and other) Leisure Centres from closure. You can get involved in efforts to save the Centre, which many people from our village use (information in the Town

Following closely behind were Linda Cummings and Marie Priest in 4th & 5th positions respectively. Congratulations to all concerned for some outstanding performances and especially to captain Sue Smith, who has developed ladies squash at the club over the last few years to a position where the club now fields both a strong, competitive squad and

I now have an update from St. Edmund's FC on progress since the turn of the year. The first game of 2011 was at the end of January and saw the end of cup interest for the season, with a 1-0 loss at home to Chester Osborne in the League Cup. This was followed by a 3-1 away defeat at Langley Park in the league; clearly not the start to the year that St. Edmund's had planned. The club has representatives in all junior age groups from under 20s to under 11s but there is one particular group that is showing exciting signs of success to come – the under 13 girls. This is a strong area for the club and includes athletes who have performed well at the North Eastern, Northern and National championships.

The fledgling stars are Hannah Featherstone, Rebecca Mott, Elise Brown, Emily Robertshaw, (pictured), Sadie Able, Megan Hetherington, Ellie Gaines, Heather Denholm, Charlotte Scurr & Kate Carmichael.



Together, they finished 4th in the North Eastern championships, 15th in the Northerns (top North East club) & 35th in the National Championships (first North East club).

Most of the girls were running at bottom age which means that they have another year at U13 level and should improve their placings next year. Head coach Scott Hydon commented: "It is an exciting prospect to consider this group coming through to late teens and senior level having run and trained together from an early age. There is some real individual talent in the group and they will certainly go on to win things for Sedgefield as a team and as individuals."

Junior athletes in disciplines other than endurance running, i.e. sprints, throws and jumps have an opportunity to showcase their talents as the track and field season opens soon and the Harriers will be taking strong teams to the Cyril Elliot track and field meeting in Middlesbrough on 3rd April and the Anne Marie Redshaw meeting in Shildon on 17th April. The club have had medal winners at Shildon before and with the North East championships coming along in the late spring, hope to have more.

The senior Harriers had a strong group of runners out at the Dentdale 14 (miles) on Saturday 12th March for their 3rd Grand Prix race of the season. Finishers for the Harriers were Greame Addison, Rosie Warnett, Scott Hydon, Marie Walker, Jonathan Wallace, Jo James, Christine Hearmon and David Walker. The next Grand Prix race is the North Tyneside 10k in April.

The Harriers are staging their popular Neptune Relays in Hardwick Park on Wednesday 20th April at 6.45pm. Last year the event attracted 32 teams from around the region with some very strong competition. The event is open to teams of four, including non-club runners. 

Give blood & save lives

Giving blood gives the donor a real sense of satisfaction and a unique feel good factor. Blood donors can help ensure that sufficient blood is available for patients.

Each donation is broken into its component parts, but two have short self lives. Platelets, which promote blood clotting and are used to treat leukaemia and cancer patients, last just five days. Red cells last a little bit longer - 35 days - and are often transfused to patients suffering from severe anaemia or severe blood loss, so it is vital that new supplies come in regularly. Many patients rely on this generous and kind act. First time donors should be aged between 17- & 65, weigh at least 50 kg (7 stone 12lbs) and be in general good health. There is no upper age limit for donors who have donated in the last two years. To book an appointment visit www.blood.co.uk or call 0300 123 23 23.

Leisure centre closure

Coxhoe District Leisure Centre has been identified as one of 6 to be closed as part of Durham County Council's cuts. It could be demolished by October unless immediate action is taken. A 3 month consultation period has been set up to seek the views of the community.

65,000 visits to the Leisure Centre are recorded each year and closure would affect the health, fitness, quality of life and sociability which come with regular exercise. It is the only purpose built indoor facility in the East Durham Rural Community AAP area, which has much deprivation – poor health particularly respiratory problems, heart and stroke, musco-skeletal, as well as significant issues with childhood obesity.

An Action Group has been formed to oppose the closure and a petition has been set up, which is also collecting statistics. These are showing that the Centre is widely used by many participants from Sedgefield. We are determined to keep this important facility open for all. Please complete the Consultation Questionnaire.
