After the 2011 Great North Run

Brummie Ryan is our Olympic torchbearer!

26 year old Ryan Davey has been chosen as one of the runners to carry the Olympic flame through Sedgefield on Sunday 17th June.

Ryan was born and raised in Birmingham, but his father originates from Stockton-on-Tees and moved back to the area in 2005.

Ryan moved here in March 2006 when, during a visit to his parents, he realised he really loved the village. He cancelled his train back to Birmingham and stayed! Ever since then he's been known to the people of Sedgefield as 'Brummie Ryan'.

Ryan has Psoriatic Arthritis which affects his ankles, knees, wrists and fingers. He is on regular medication to help the condition, but he has done his best to not let the condition affect him. He keeps as active as possible and does as much as he can to raise money for various charities.

Before Ryan moved here he did a lone 210 mile cycle ride from St Andrews (home of Birmingham City FC) to the Riverside Stadium (Middlesbrough FC), inspired by meeting a child who suffered from Cystic Fibrosis. He managed to raise over £2,500 for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust. As a result of the ride Ryan had to have 3 operations and suffered a great deal of discomfort which prevented him from cycling for a number of years. But last year Ryan ran the Great North Run and raised more than £900 for the Make-A-Wish Foundation. He intends to take part again this year, raising money for Scope.

Since moving to the village Ryan has become part of the Netpark Football Club, though after seeing him play for a grand total of 29 minutes, the club thought his best position would be as Club Treasurer! He now also runs competitions to raise money for the club in his spare time. Ryan says -

"I can't wait to carry the torch through Sedgefield - a place that made me feel so welcome when I first came here - and still does."

We love our library

For those members who don't routinely pass the Police Station, Neighbourhood Watch have now been allowed to put their Notice Board on the Police Station wall. Many thanks to Sgt Brian O'Connor for his enthusiastic support and his rapid response to our request to make this happen. The board is up; it will (& does) contain the unapproved minutes of the last Panel meeting for all to see before the next meeting takes place. It will also contain PACT details, and any current / relevant information we (NHW) think may benefit members and residents of Sedgefield.

SCAMS - another reminder: DO NOT TRUST UNSOLICITED CALLS, LETTERS or EMAILS. If you get a phone call whilst on your computer from someone purporting to be from Windows / Microsoft / your provider – **be on your guard**, don't trust them. DO NOT let them onto your pc, DO NOT give them ANY information whatsoever; it will be a scam, it will cost you money in one form or another! NHW advice is, ask for their telephone number, company details & name of person. Say you will ring them back then ring the Police and report a suspected crime, providing details. *See letter page*

Jottings notes from the March Residents' Forum meeting

There was lively discussion on issues affecting our community. It was noted that we have had no further information on what is happening to the S106 monies owed to the village. Durham County Council (DCC) have bought the woodland at Neville Drive with some of the money but their further intentions are not clear. DCC have promised consultation on the issue so we have requested an update.

Once again DCC plan to charge for parking at Hardwick Country Park. The Forum has again suggested some concession for local residents as some find the walk to Hardwick to enjoy the Park facilities just a bit too demanding; it seems somewhat unfair to have to pay to park after decades of free access. Unfortunately, response so far from DCC does not indicate any chance.

The hearing for the Spring/Foxton Lane wind turbines took place on 28th & 29th February. Residents from Spring/Foxton Lane had conducted an excellent campaign against the proposal and residents from across the village showed their objection by attending. There was, however, a problem with the venue which resulted in some residents not being able to attend as it was moved at the start of the meeting from the Cricket Club to the Racecourse. The organisation of the hearing and venue booking was the responsibility of DCC so if anyone has a complaint they should direct it to the planning department at DCC. We now await the Inspector's decision on the proposal, which should be known within 6 to 8 weeks.

The Forum had a disappointing result in our enquiry for information from our AAP on how our village had benefited from AAP activity; we have asked for our concerns to be passed to the AAP Board and now hope the new Public representative will keep the village informed.

The proposals for further housing in the village are still ongoing with DCC consulting on where residents think 300 new homes should be built. We need a Neighbourhood plan for our village and the Town Council and Sedgefield Together are addressing this but there is a great need for everyone in the village to give their views. The last consultation meeting where views could be put forward was not well attended. It is no good complaining if new build happens in your area and you don't want it to, if you haven't given your views. Concerns and objections were expressed to the proposed reduction in opening hours of our Library. This is an important provision for our community and is used by all age groups. It should not have to be reliant on volunteers to offer this service. A petition will be available in various venues around the village for all to sign. Please take a few minutes to sign the petition to retain appropriate opening hours for our excellent library.

There were many and varied topics discussed and updates will be available at the next Forum meeting which will be on May 7th at 7pm in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall. Sedgefield in Bloom

Northumbria in Bloom judge, Liz Lazenby visits Sedgefield at 2pm on Thursday 12th April for preliminary spring judging. Members of the Sedgefield in Bloom team will show her around the centre of the village, pointing out areas of interest and explaining future plans which will come to fruition before her summer visit in July.

Britain in Bloom judges will follow shortly after, and as well as horticultural achievement, they will be looking for community involvement and environmental awareness. In this very special year, the cornerstones of planning for Sedgefield in Bloom 2012 have been heritage, celebration and community. A great deal of work has already been done, with several more exciting projects in the pipe line. The recent spell of unexpectedly mild and sunny weather highlighted beautiful displays of spring bulbs and plants in tubs and beds around the village. The bed in preparation on the church bank, thanks to the efforts of Bloomers and members of Round Table, will soon become a colourful display celebrating Sedgefield 700. A vintage plough expertly restored by students at the Community College will be placed alongside the seed drill at Beacon Avenue. The students' next Sedgefield in Bloom project will see the original gates from Hardwick Park, beautifully restored, placed on Durham Road, near to their original site, suitably planted and set within a framework built from vintage bricks. Primary school children have planted wild flower seeds at the Community Garden, to be used in the creation of meadowland within the village. More young trees have been planted in Ceddesfeld Gardens. The Community Gardens at Winterton now have a smart new shed, to be

used as a resource, storage and teaching area. Extra hedging has also been added and major work done to improve the layout and productivity of the gardens. To celebrate the Olympics, the Bloom Beacon, placed centrally in one of the beds on the village green, will be filled with plants in vibrant reds and oranges. In 2012, Sedgefield has a great deal to celebrate and, of course, in this exciting Olympic year, we must go for gold.

You can also support Sedgefield in Bloom by helping with the constant battle against litter. Items regularly picked up by people who didn't throw them down include cans, crisp

packets, sweet wrappers, cigarette boxes and takeaway packaging; also bottles, plastic & glass, empty or half full. Cigarette ends are a major problem. Other very small items, difficult to pick up and bin, include wooden or plastic forks, empty ketchup packs and little blue pens from the betting shop. Smart new bins have been provided, at some expense, at various points around the village. Many of our shopkeepers and other commercial premises make sure their frontages are kept tidy and clear of litter, but they can't be held responsible for every bit of litter. Let's all do our bit to keep Sedgefield tidy & blooming beautiful.

Sedgefield parkrun

The first Sedgefield parkrun was held on 17th March in Hardwick Park. On a bright morning, 181 people from near and far took part, in an event made possible by run director Jane Spink and a big team of enthusiastic volunteers. Runners showed up from Durham, Darlington, Newton Aycliffe, North Tyneside, Middlesbrough and even Nottingham. And of course, plenty of Sedgefield residents lined up to support the event. From now on, the Sedgefield parkrun will take place every Saturday morning at 9.00am, starting outside the visitor centre. Just register on www.parkrun.com and then turn up – it's all free. All that parkrun asks is that runners volunteer to help manage the run

three times each year. A Northern Echo journalist came along to sample the atmosphere of the first parkrun and write an article about it. He enjoyed it so much that he returned the following week to run again, and then the week after as a volunteer. Give it a go – it's a great way to stay fit or get active and there's a really friendly atmosphere at the parkrun that encourages every participant – young, old, fast, slow, experienced or beginner.

Sedgefield Harriers

Anyone with sharp eyesight watching Sky Sports on Saturday 10th March may have seen Sedgefield Harrier Abie Hearmon competing. Abie was selected to represent County Durham Schools at an inter-counties cross-country championships in Birmingham which was featured on TV. Abie has made big advances this year under the charge of coach Scott Hydon and is attracting attention from regional selectors. She finished in 136th position in a field of over 260 in this national competition, despite having the disadvantage of starting from the back of the funnels and thus having more ground to make up. On Saturday 17th March Abie, along with Jonna Baines from the Harriers, also competed in Somerset in the National Schools Cross Country.

There was a lot of satisfaction for coach Marie Walker on 21st February when many of her younger juniors competed at the Sedgefield District Primary Schools Cross Country competition at Maiden Castle. Around 20 schools took part and there were children from several schools who had benefited from Marie's coaching. Unsurprisingly, Marie kept a special eye on Sedgefield pupils and there were some noticeable successes: boys year 3/4, David Budd, Henry Jones, William Dredge; boys year 5/6, Liam Welsh, Tom Burkill, James Raw, Marcus Storey, Joe Thomas, Jack Richards; girls year 3/4 (1st place team overall), Carla Abel (1st place), Kate Abel (2nd), Abbie Walker, Jenny Walker, Sophie Earl, Annie Pickard; girls year 5/6 (1st place team overall), Aimee Barlow (1st place), Charlotte Raw (3rd), Megan Boyle, Sophie Hawthorne.

The London Marathon is fast approaching and the Harriers have their biggest contingent yet going down to compete, including Jo James, Matthew Jones, Gail Bell, Scott Hydon and Diane Baines. Meanwhile, Rebecca Mott and Hannah Featherstone have been chosen to represent the North East in the U13 girls' race in the mini-London Marathon, based on their performance at the North East and Northern Cross Country Championships. The mini-marathon takes place on the same day as the Marathon – Sunday 22nd April. Watch out for a mention of Sedgefield Harriers on TV!

Sedgefield Harrier Steve Foreman (who is from South Shields and works on NETPark) will be the first Sedgefield Harrier to cross the line in the Olympic Stadium! Steve has been selected to run in the National Lottery's Olympic Park Run on 31st March. He's promised us a photo of him in his Sedgefield vest in the stadium.

And finally, Sedgefield Harriers will be staging their very popular Neptune Relays in Hardwick Park on Wednesday 25th April. This is a fantastic event which attracts teams from across the North East. There's an award for non-club teams from other sports clubs and corporate teams and although there is great competition 'at the sharp end', the event is open to runners of all abilities. The Relays are also an excellent spectator event as they follow a figure of eight course based on Temple Hill, from where people can watch the action unfold. NETPark's bright new buildings

You may have noticed two new buildings sprouting out of NETPark's parkland. They are designed as "Grow On Spaces" for companies graduating from the NETPark Incubator, much as Kromek graduated a year or so ago into its own building. This type of space is essential to NETPark's success: Kromek started life a few years ago as a spin out company from Durham University and moved into a lab in the NETPark Incubator with 2 employees. Now they occupy their own building and employ over 50 in a range of careers, including scientists, technicians, sales & marketing, and administration. They bought an American company last year and so can truly claim to be NETPark's first multinational company. Now these new buildings can house similar success stories.

The two new buildings have been christened Discovery Centres in honour of the County's tradition of innovation and invention and also in honour of the space shuttle orbiter of the same name, reflecting NETPark's increasing links with space industry (those who watched Stargazing Live a few months ago will remember that the South African Large Telescope played a starring role. Some elements of that telescope were made on site right here at the NETPark Durham University Research Institute).

Built on a 2.5 hectare site which formerly housed the Gables building, each unit provides 1,870 sq m of floor space, including office areas and spaces which tenants can fit out as laboratories, clean-rooms and prototyping space. As the buildings have been constructed speculatively, great care was taken with the design to ensure they would be as flexible as possible. So each is a "T-shape" with offices on the "downstroke" and space for labs etc on the crossbar of the T. The layout being exactly the same on both floors means that it is very flexible for letting purposes: a company can take a whole building, one entire floor or even half of the building vertically if that suits them better. Architect, David Wallace of Devereux has designed nearly all of the buildings at NETPark. Internal and external design took into account the need for eventual tenants to mould the buildings around their individual needs and also the need for the buildings to belong to the overall NETPark style. Little touches such as choosing the render to match the colour of the render on the Research Institute and using the same solar shading as the Incubator mean that the buildings look part of the NETPark family while having their own identity.

Around £200,000 has been invested in renewable energy features, including the installation of photovoltaic panels on the roofs to generate electricity for direct use by the occupiers as well as the addition of charging points for electric cars and bicycles. All three units have been partly funded by the European Regional Development Fund, Single Programme and Durham County Council.

Your Letters

Be on your guard

We are being targeted by a computer scam. Last week I received a phone call from the "Windows Security Team" informing me they were receiving reports from my computer that it was operating slowly and was infected by malicious programs planted by hackers. I was suspicious as my computer had been working well, so asked the caller to prove that he was genuine. He was very persuasive – he knew my name and postcode and said he could tell me my confidential computer ID number. He talked me through operations on the computer that revealed a CSLID (identity number), and read it out to me. How could he know that number if he was not genuine, I thought? He insisted that my computer was at great risk and the Windows Security Team could protect it – no payment was necessary, I was told. He displayed a list of my "infected files" on the screen and I was then asked to give the Technical Department remote control of my computer, and I agreed as I was very worried by the apparent infected files. At that point, they took remote control of my computer and I watched helplessly as the cursor zoomed around my computer screen, altering programs and settings. Then came the sting – I was told to go to a website "AMMY.com" and they would install new security software for a one-off payment of £89! I hung up immediately, switched off my computer and called the PC Doctor for help. He told me it's a scam and several local people have been caught. Google "AMMY scam" for more details. The great worry is that the scammers may have planted malware on the computer that can compromise security, including email access and internet banking security. So beware. Major companies like Windows NEVER contact customers directly, and if ANYONE asks for remote access to your computer, don't allow it unless you know and trust them.
