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Fr. John Caden was a charismatic, lively, warm hearted and great spirited priest and public servant. In 1966 he was appointed as parish priest of St. John Fisher's Sedgefield, where he has worked tirelessly as hospitals' chaplain, Town and County Councillor and as Chairman of Sunderland Community Health Council and Vice-chair of South West Durham Health Authority. He was a founding member of Sedgefield Community Association and a supporter of our twinning with Hamminkeln, welcoming the German friends to the village and his parish.

He was attentive, engaged and compassionate; a shepherd always vigilant for his village community and his flock and a most remarkable and faithful Christian minister. Although officially retired he continued to serve his people, celebrating the Eucharist and visiting the sick, both Catholic and non-Catholic, until shortly before he died. He wanted to make a difference, to help all people regardless of their faith, promoting the work of all the churches in the interest of the common good.

Education was a subject very close to his heart and he spent many years on the governing bodies of the Sedgefield Community College, St William's Primary School, Trimdon and Carmel College, Darlington. While a committee member for social services, education, youth and community services he worked to provide amenities at Sedgefield Community College including a sports hall, fitness room and floodlit outdoor playing area and as chair of

Governors of Carmel College steered the college from threat of closure in the 1980's to the position of high performing college which it now holds.

In 1989 he was honoured with the title Honorary Alderman of Co. Durham and in 1998 was made an Honorary Burgess of Sedgefield. Finally in 1998 he was honoured by the Queen with the M.B.E. for his services to the community. Fr. John Caden has been an inspirational man in all aspects of his ministry. He touched the hearts of many generations by his constant care for the sick, his anguish for the poor and his defence of the weak in society. People across the North East will remember him with gratitude and deep affection and many could say with Maura Regan, Principal of Carmel College and lifelong member of St John Fisher, "He has been my friend, my mentor, my inspiration and my confidant. I will be ever grateful that I had the privilege of knowing such a giant among men."

His funeral Mass in St Edmund's Parish Church, attended by hundreds of people, was a testimony to the uniqueness and generosity of the priest who had given everything in service to his community. May he rest in peace.

Awards from store developer's community fund

The £150,000 given by Terrace Hill, developers of the new Sainsbury's Store, as a gesture of goodwill towards the community, has now been allocated by Sedgefield Town Council, following presentations, public meetings and much discussion. The funding is expected once the store opens in May and these will be the main beneficiaries:

The Town Council retained the first £20,000 to divide equally between funding towards the new neighbourhood plan for Sedgefield and a small pot for grants up to £2,000, which will be administered by Sedgefield Together Community Partnership. A further £20,000 will be given to Fishburn Parish Council; it was felt that as the new store is close to Fishburn, their community should also receive some benefit. Continued on page 2

The Town Council were impressed with the presentations and agreed that all were very worthwhile projects. They discussed the merits of all projects and felt the money should be given to sustainable capital schemes with a real chance of success and of improving the existing activity. Unfortunately, applications from the Cricket Club and Youth Development did not make it into the final shortlist, but the overall recommendations of the working party were unanimous. Hopefully the successful groups can now move forward to obtain the necessary matched funding and other general permissions such as planning etc. The monies will be retained by the Town Council and handed over once everything is in place. If a project is unable to move forwards within two years, then the group can apply for an extension. Otherwise the money will be re-allocated.

Athletics track public consultation

Sedgefield Harriers will hold a public consultation event in early April to share the club's proposals to install an athletics training track at the community college. The event will give people the opportunity to find out more details of the plans and provide feedback to the Harriers about the project. The consultation will be held over three days; April 4th (5pm-7.30pm), 5th (10am-4.00pm) and 6th (9am-12noon) on the ground floor of the Manor House on West End (next to Barclays Bank). All are welcome to go along, meet the team behind the track project and have a look at some of the details behind it. During the event, there will be an exhibition of entries submitted by primary school children towards the end of last year, for a competition that looked back at the highlights of the Sedgefield Village Games, and the London 2012 Olympics and

Paralympics. Over 200 young people entered the competition and there were some very imaginative creations, many of which will be on display in the Manor House for the duration of the public consultation.

Residents' Forum Jottings from March Resident Forum

There was the usual update on previous & ongoing issues. Again, no representation from Councillors although there was a verbal promise that written updates would be sent. Verbal information was given following a query regarding progress on the caravan park. The caravan park is 3 years into the 5 year conditional period before caravans could be sited.

Survey work has been seen in areas of proposed housing development; we will have to wait for the final draft of the County Durham plan for final information. Following the Forum's objections to the perceptions of Durham Diocese as to housing need in the village (remember they own a large area of the land identified for building) they were to have further discussions on the issue and have promised to keep us informed of their views.

Of course it is an ongoing worry that County Durham is one of several councils who have not yet approved a plan in the time required by Government and as recent national press reports indicate this leaves areas very vulnerable to any development as the presumption in favour of development takes priority. Please attend any consultation meetings to protect our village character – your voice is important.

There were reports on the Police and Crime Commissioner, community policing, noise issues in and around the village and great concern was expressed at the use of a ward at the Community hospital as administration offices when, as residents identified, there is a need for more beds for elderly patients. Update was given on the ongoing section 106 monies, Durham County Council have forward a budget showing the total spend of the circ £46K on the woodland work, (obviously future maintenance will have to come from Council Tax revenues !) They have not included any of the disputed interest on the monies but our investigations continue.

As outlined last month, local elections will be held on May 2nd; this is the only chance to elect our representatives for the next 4 years. It will be very interesting to see who stands for election. The Forum has agreed to hold an open meeting in April to allow prospective Town/County councillors to give information to and answer question from our community. We held such an event prior to the last elections and it proved very popular so do come along and meet the people who want your vote. We hope to hold the meeting at 7pm on April 23rd but watch the village notice board or the email circulation, if you are on that list, to see if the event is going ahead.

The next Forum meeting was scheduled for May 6th but since that is a Bank Holiday we have changed it to **Monday May 13th at 7pm in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall**. By then we will know our new Council members. But remember from March 18th to 22nd May there is a period of 'Purdah' - the pre-election period; specifically the time between an announced election and the final election results. It prevents local and principal councils (e.g. Durham County Council - DCC) from promoting or actively supporting any particular political party or candidate. It also prevents them from making announcements about any new or controversial initiatives which could be seen to be to the advantage to any candidates or parties in the forthcoming election.

Crime has remained low in Sedgefield over the last four weeks with only a report of theft on 23rd February of both front and rear number plates taken from a Renault Megan being reported. The recent publicity regarding counterfeit notes circulating in the village have also had the desired effect as we have had no further reports. Nearby villages have also seen a reduction in persons using them.

She said that she had been drinking in a Sedgefield pub before driving her vehicle. She is now waiting for a court case and automatic ban.

P.A.C.T. Due to another meeting being held at the same time it was decided at the last meeting that the police would not attend this meeting of the Residents' forum. Also, that the Pact priority would remain the same for another month. This would be for the Neighbourhood Police Team to continue to focus on the complaint received regarding the of manner of driving/speed of vehicles coming through the chicanes and along Durham road. A number of drivers have received warning letters. You have been warned.
