2019 Ball Game - match report

Shortly after the start of this year's Ball Game, the passengers on X12 to Durham found themselves becalmed at Sedgefield zebra crossing amid a sea of swirling, unpredictable humanity. To the uninitiated passengers, it appeared to be mayhem unfolding on the roads; to the locals it was just the latest enactment of our annual Shrove Tuesday Ball Game.

The game is ancient in its origins, a contest between local farmers and tradesmen. The game resembles a lawless free for all characterised by behaviour that might kindly be described as robust but in fact it's governed by rules, traditions and conventions which determine how the game is won. The game begins at 1pm on the village green just behind the bus shelter opposite The Corner House. Players and spectators alike gather tightly to 'Alley' the specially made leather ball. This involves the ball being passed three times through a metal ring set into the ground, before being released for the assembled throng to chase. This action is traditionally carried out by a chosen elder resident, the honour falling this year to Mr David Mortimer.

The 'Alleying' done and the ball thrown out of the huddle the game was on. Eager to catch or kick the ball, players surged through the centre of the village, weaving their way through and past the braver spectators whose chosen method of viewing was to get as close to the action as possible. Others, arguably of a more sensible disposition watched from the margins of the ruck or, better still, from the warmth and safety of the local pubs and cafés. By 1.30 the ball had disappeared into a local pub to reappear sporadically throughout the rest of the afternoon.

By 4.30pm the ball had been dipped in the beck and returned to the village green by the victor. This year's winner was Mike Adcock. Mike becomes the third member of his family to win the game following his father, John, in 1974 and his brother, Tom, in 2017. Tony Magee

Bank Service Point proposal

As previously reported, Sedgefield Development Trust has been trying, since the closure of the Barclays Bank branch in Sedgefield, to encourage the introduction of alternative banking facilities. We are pleased to confirm that we are now in detailed discussions with NEFirst Credit Union with the objective of establishing a Service Point in Sedgefield.

The main purpose of the Credit Union is to provide savings and loan facilities on a "not for profit" basis, and it is owned and run by its members. It has established a large number of Service Points in North East England.

We expect that the Sedgefield Service Point will be open once a week in an easily accessible community location. The principal activities will be to register members, to deposit cash in savings accounts, and support the completion of loan documentation. There will be no facility to withdraw cash. Loans and withdrawals from funds will be issued to members by bank transfer. The location will be staffed by volunteers under the supervision of the Credit Union. 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National Photonics Healthcare Centre

The official opening of The Centre for Process Innovation's (CPI) National Healthcare Photonics



Centre (NHPC) took place at Netpark last month. Stakeholders and prospective development partners attended a detailed presentation on the centre's ambitions in the field of healthcare innovation. The centre's resources, will be available to client companies, allowing both firms to work alongside each other in the development process. The NHPC will have the means to manufacture small numbers of devices for testing purposes. The centre's overarching goal is to help companies bring their photonic enabled products from the laboratory bench to market as quickly and safely as possible.

CPI aims to help companies become successful in Britain and feels it has a particularly important role to play in helping the North East become a global hub both for photonics related technology and, in the long term, for

healthcare in general. As well as speeding up the development cycle for new products and ensuring they satisfy the high level of regulatory requirements, the NHPC will offer partner companies strategic advice in overcoming the challenges of competing with large and well established firms to get a foothold in this difficult to enter but ever expanding market.

Science and Art do mix!

AMBITIOUS plans to create hundreds of new jobs at NETPark have taken a major step forward with the opening of a new 1km road. And a new piece of artwork features at the new entrance.

Dignitaries gathered at the North East Technology Park (NETPark) during National Science Week to mark the opening of the road, named Rosalind Franklin Way after the pioneering scientist who contributed towards the discovery of DNA.

The works will allow a further 26 acres of land to be developed and create additional space for research and development companies which need room to prototype and scale up to manufacture on site.

The launch of the new road was held next to the bold Synergy sculpture, (pictured), which consists of four 300kg spheres and one larger, 700kg central sphere. All five spheres are made of stainless steel, with a blue mirror

The sculpture was created by Newcastle's Full Blown by inflating and stretching stainless steel. Full Blown's director Kate McDonnell said: "Each sphere is positioned at a different height to provide a dynamic eye line view, so as you enter the site you get different views as you move round the sculpture.

Amazingly, the sculpture can be seen from space and as a satellite image it emulates the NETPark logo.



Book Review by Tamzin Lafford The Hundred-Year-Old Man Who Climbed Out the Window and Disappeared, by Jonas Jonasson

This book may have been written by a Swedish journalist turned novelist, but the humour resonates well with the British sense of the ridiculous. It's zany and madcap!

How many books do you know that combine a self-effacing 100-year-old explosives expert, an elephant, a suitcase inadvertently stolen, two murders but no dead bodies, Albert Einstein's dim, melancholic brother Herbert, a Russian gulag, cocktails on a beach in Bali and most of the major events in world politics in the twentieth century? To which said centenarian is purported to have



contributed, thanks to an aversion to taking sides and a good-natured, uncalculating, trustful willingness to help anyone who asks him.

The old man escapes from his retirement home to avoid the birthday party imposed on him. The inept handling of the subsequent enquiry reminded me of Inspector Clouseau, as the senior citizen and a growing band of confederates swept up in the ingenuous conspiracy traverse Sweden, with the aforementioned elephant, largely unaware of the scale of their notoriety. I enjoyed the style of writing and some of the devices used, for example, the repetition of the description of the young man whose suitcase it is, and the phlegmatic reporting of sensational events. The book has pace all the way through, leaving the 100-year-old placid opportunist on the brink of another key role in world history. It might require a particular sense of humour to enjoy this book, but perhaps such a sense of humour is not so rare.

Anti Social Behaviour

NHW and Police are continuing to address this, your major concern from the survey feedback. Recently NHW produced hard copies of a Police Notice on this subject and posted them on notice boards around the village. The Statement, by PCSO Lisa Hall, can also be read on the 'In The Know' website. In short ,the statement reiterates the measures the police are determined to take to tackle this issue. Measures will include the use of Dispersal Orders, Community Protection Orders to debar specified individuals from the centre of Sedgefield at stated times and parents issued with warnings. Also, children found with alcohol will be removed to a safe place to be collected by parents following an interview with the Police Sergeant or Inspector. Parents need to understand that a referral to social services will *always* be made where children are found in possession of alcohol. The Police are especially keen to emphasise parents' responsibility for

Are Our Kids Safe Online?

If you feel you need some help to understand how to help keep your children safe online you could do worse that attend the above mentioned Cyber Security Presentation on April 10th. We all know that the internet is a fantastic resource for learning, communication and entertainment. However, it is largely unregulated and unfortunately the media of choice for people with bad intentions who don't care who they are harming. Adults are generally more aware of potential online issues where our children's natural urge to reach out and trust makes them less prepared to handle some of the negative and potentially damaging situations they may meet on the internet.

'Switched on' parents are better equipped to protect their children online, not only by learning how to how use parental control features on devices and specialist software but also by engaging with them from an early age about these issues and maintaining that conversation as they grow up in their digital world. Letter from PC Lamb

Hello Everybody.

The newly appointed officials of Sedgefield NHW have made some sterling progress and are keen to enlist the public to provide as many pairs of eyes as possible.

Despite the work done last summer on the anti-social behaviour problem there is still a minority of youths who appear intent on causing damage to property and distress to residents. Parents can play a big part in moderating the behaviour of some of these youths by pointing out a few home truths such as: The landlord of a pub has every right to demand that a person leaves their premises. If you are underage and trying to get served in a pub, you must leave when you are asked to go. Refusal to leave can legally be met with removal by force, if required. Anyone photographing a young person in the act of threatening behaviour, criminal damage etc is doing nothing wrong. A young person who shouts and swears in response, however, is committing a criminal offence. Last year we took action against a number of youths whose life choices have been affected as a result. Ring leaders who instigate this sort of behaviour want to impress their friends and to seem brave on the streets but once in custody are mostly tearful and ask, "Will this affect me in the future?" The answer of course is, "Yes, it will!"

Steve's Nature Diary for April

As I write this, it is absolutely pouring down, not good for getting out and about but ideal conditions for amphibians! People often ask me what is the best thing you can do for wildlife in your garden and the answer is a pond, whether it is small or large it provides so much to your garden for wildlife.

For this year's **Wild About Gardens** challenge, The Wildlife Trusts and the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) are calling on people to put in a pond. From mini

container ponds to larger sunken ponds, it's *THE* garden feature that can make the biggest difference to wildlife.

With much of the UK's native flora and fauna under threat, often down to habitat loss, Wild About Gardens sees the two charities join forces to raise awareness of the importance of gardens in supporting wildlife and offer advice on how to make them more wildlife-friendly.



The UK has lost ponds, rivers and streams at a rapid rate and only a small amount of our natural ponds and wetlands remain. Many of these are in poor condition and 13% of UK freshwater and wetland species are threatened with extinction. The loss of these important places – to development, drainage and intensive farming – is linked to a huge decline in wildlife, including frogs and toads, water voles and insects. Adding a pond is one of the best ways you can help wildlife and enjoy the benefits of seeing water plants, birds and bees close to home. Digging a pond is great for hedgehogs to have somewhere to drink and for frogs, newts and other amphibians to feed and breed. All ponds, large, small, dug or container, are good news for bats, damselflies, dragonflies, and other insects. I only have a small garden, so my pond is a sunken washing up bowl. It is well used by frogs and has been visited by dragonflies.
