Hot stuff: Investigations with a thermal camera

I have been on the Octopus Energy waiting list to borrow a thermal camera for a long time but, last month, it finally arrived. I thought you might be interested to know what I learned:

To detect where heat is escaping and where cold is entering the house, it is best to use the camera when it is very cold outside and the heating has been on. I was lucky to get the camera when we had snow. It attached to my phone and I could take photos and videos to record my findings. I found that I got more insightful readings using the camera inside my home and soon found some problem areas:



- Window sills and the corners of windows are letting cold in
- Some rooms have drafts from the skirting boards
- There is an area in the loft without insulation and this could clearly be seen on the ceiling beneath that space.
- The most startling revelation was the French doors which leaked cold at their closing point as seen on the image below.



As a result of my adventures with the camera, I have a number of actions identified:

- Invest in some sealing strips for the French doors
- To seal around the skirting in the room with hard flooring
- My blinds look nice but adding curtains will block those window drafts.

I had to return the camera after 3 days but I would be interested to repeat my survey to see what impact the changes have made. Sedgefield Development Trust want to gauge interest in having a camera for use by the local community. STEVE'S NATURE DIARY APRIL 2023

We recently went over to the Lake District and on the way back we made our obligatory stop at one of our favourite nature reserves- Leighton Moss. The weather wasn't wonderful, but we managed to see one of the reserves specialities, hear another but missed out on another. The RSPB reserve is the largest reedbed in the north-west of England and home to a number of reedbed specialists and it was one of those that we saw just after we arrived, quartering over the reed beds looking for food - the Marsh Harrier. It is the largest of the harriers and can be recognised by its long tail and wings held in a shallow 'V'. It is distinguishable from other harriers by its larger size, heavier build, broader wings and absence of white on the rump. Females are larger

than males and have obvious creamy heads. Its future in the UK is now more secure than at any time during the last century, breeding at various sites including Leighton Moss. You are almost guaranteed to see these magnificent birds here (famous last words) especially if you visit in spring and summer.



Whilst sitting in one of the hides watching a good selection of ducks including Mallard, Teal, Tufted Duck, Wigeon and Pintail and keeping an eye out for otters (which you also find on the reserve), we heard the sound that we were hoping for. Difficult to describe really but it sounds like the noise you make when you blow over the top of a milk bottle also known as a boom. It was a Bittern booming. This rare and shy heron, spends almost all of its time hidden away in large reedbeds, where it feeds on eels and other fish. Having wonderfully camouflaged plumage, this helps it blend into the reeds. It can also stand motionless for long periods to avoid detection. So, it can be difficult to see but you can occasionally spot them in the reeds or sometimes as they fly. During the breeding season, to attract a mate, the male bittern 'booms', making a deep, foghorn-like sound which can be heard up to two miles away, mostly at night. It's an unusual sound and is difficult to pin down where the sound is coming from; one minute its over there; the next time somewhere else! The final reedbed specialist we were looking for was the most elusive - the Bearded Reedling, and although we spent some time watching the grit trays that are put out to aid their digestion, we didn't see any. Still there was still a lot to see and we enjoyed being out on a cold March day. Closer to home you can occasionally see reedbed specialists on some of our local nature reserves including Coatham Marsh and Saltholme.

SEDGEFIELD NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Reclassification of Offences

At our March Neighbourhood Watch meeting, Police Sergeant Daniel Lake gave the group an overview of policing in our area and

answered many questions put to him on issues of concern. One important and topical matter raised by Sgt Lake, was the reclassification of some offences of Antisocial Behaviour, Public Order or Threatening Behaviour, which are now to be classed as "Crimes". Previously, persons found to have taken part in such incidents could expect to have been "Reported" or "Cautioned" by the police. Now any person so involved may find themselves arrested and charged with a crime, resulting if convicted, in a criminal record. This is especially important to young persons as it could prohibit them from a whole host of future training/employment opportunities. What the individual concerned may regard as a minor incident of damage or disturbance, could now result in a criminal record affecting their future.

Cybercrime

Many people are now more concerned about Cybercrime than physical crime. National Neighbourhood Watch has teamed up with the Cybersecurity firm 'Avast' to help people keep their digital lives safe, by providing easy to understand practical advice, such as:

Your local Neighbourhood Watch team, together with Town Clerk Jane Ayre and County Councillor Chris Lines, continue to press Durham County Council for answers to questions posed some weeks ago, regarding the efficiency, monitoring and upgrading of the town CCTV cameras.

Reported incidents of damage and antisocial behaviour have decreased in the past couple of weeks. This may be partly due to the end of half term but I like to think that the efforts of numerous local organisations, together with good work by our local police have also played their part.

Action has been taken against persons responsible for cruelty to birds in our area. Although pigeons are officially classed as vermin, the police teamed up with RSPB and other agencies to resolve the matter which was highlighted on our Facebook page recently.

We still await results of the Active Travel Survey carried out by DCC regarding road safety and access in Sedgefield but these plans will be circulated once received.

Incident Reporting

Policing like any other service, is provided on a data driven basis and while Sedgefield may be a relatively low crime area, it remains vital that every and all incidents are reported to the police, whether by telephone, email or in person.

Next meeting

Our next NHW meeting is on Thursday 13 April at 7:30pm in Ceddesfeld Hall. We hope to have another good attendance, including police and local councillors. We would love to hear your concerns, questions or ideas on keeping Sedgefield and its residents safe.

Please keep reporting incidents of ASB, criminal damage, etc. to the police on 101, or 999 in an emergency, and don't forget, you can report suspicions of criminal activity anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555111.

Horse racing

Last month, our Sports Page included news that well known local businessman and racehorse trainer Ray Craggs had been named Flat Trainer of the Month for December 2022.

This significant accolade was awarded to Ray by the Jockey Club, the largest horse racing organisation in the country, which owns courses such as Aintree, Cheltenham and Epsom Downs. Congratulations to Ray, who is pictured with his award, alongside daughter-in-law Janet and two of the horses that he trains.





Duck ponds

Residents in the area around the duck ponds near the Eden Drive play equipment have raised concerns about an



increase in vermin activity there. Durham County Council's pest control staff have inspected the area and have been unable to find any clear evidence of an infestation. In the event that vermin are identified in the future, the pest control team will take appropriate action that does not endanger other wildlife and residents. Meanwhile, we encourage residents to minimise the chance of vermin being attracted to the area. The best way to do this is to avoid providing any food that could attract vermin, which could either be food put out for other animals or human food related litter. In the event that you feel you have to provide food for the other wild animals in the area, you should only use food suited to those animals and it should be thrown directly into the pond and not onto the surrounding banks/green spaces.

Sedgefield also has a successful junior parkrun on Sunday mornings, a 2k event for children aged 4 to 14. None of this would have been possible without the volunteers who have made it possible – over the years, that's added up to 857 individuals at the Saturday event and 581 on Sundays. Many of them are serial volunteers, including Val Newton and Keith Charlton who have helped out 992 times between them!

Squash

sedgefield Durham and Cleveland recently held its County Squash Masters Championships at Yarm Squash Club, with age groups ranging from over 35s to over 70s. Sedgefield's Ian Williams reached the final of the over 60s competition, finishing runner up in a hard fought final against former British champion Neil Harrison.

Sedgefield Squash Club held its annual individual handicap competition recently. This year, handicaps were adjusted for every round, resulting in some incredibly close matches. The format was 'best of five' with each game to 11 points. Both finalists fought some extremely close matches on their respective journeys to compete for the silverware. Simon Groom and Matteo Rutherford (U17) played a tremendous final in front of a lively balcony, with Matteo winning the title 3-1. This tournament is proving a great platform for the club's juniors, with three out of the last four winners being up and coming youngsters.

Sedgefield Squash Club is grateful to all the ladies and girls who came along to the Rally Together event. The concept was in conjunction with International Women's Day and a nationwide campaign run by England Squash to get more females involved in sport.

The county leagues are all but complete, with a few re-arranged matches still to be played. Sedgefield's 1st team, who play in the Premier League, have finished the season strongly with three out of four wins. The 2nd team finished second in Division 2 and are promoted to Division 1. The 3rd team can still be crowned champions but still have two matches left in Division 3. The 4th and 5th teams both played in Division 4 this season. Sedgefield 4th team finished third, just missing out on promotion. The 5th team, which is made up of many up-and-coming players, had a really successful season, and were only narrowly defeated in their last match against champions Bedale 2. Sedgefield's ladies' team currently sit second in their division with two matches left. Fingers are crossed they will be lifting that trophy by the end of the season.

Swimmina

The annual Northumberland and Durham Championships took place over two weekends in February with five swimmers from Sedgefield 75 having qualified. The venue was the Sunderland Aquatic Centre's 50-metre pool in the shadow of the Stadium of Light and all spectator tickets sold out. Alex Boyer kicked things off for Sedgefield with a 1500m freestyle swim and went on to 200m and 400m freestyle where he set a personal best.

Aviana Wilson competed in four events and gualified for finals in three of them, 50 and 100m backstroke and 100m freestyle. She set a new PB in 50m freestyle and saved the best for last with nearly three seconds off her best 100m free time in the heat, then a further second in the final to break the 1:10 barrier for the first time.

Filip Wilczynski finalled in all seven of his events, clocking up 14 swims in which he bettered his PB's 10 times and broke club records in 50m freestyle, 50m backstroke, 50m butterfly (all twice) and 200m backstroke in the heat. He took the titles in all three backstroke events and won bronze in 50m freestyle and 100m butterfly. In his two other events, 50m butterfly and 100m freestyle, he placed fourth.

Jessica Bell clocked up 16 swims, seven of them finals. She beat PB in 100m backstroke, 100m breaststroke, 50m butterfly (twice) and 200m individual medley. In her two 50m butterfly swims, Jessica beat her own club record twice.

Charlie McEwan swam in 50m freestyle and 50m butterfly and beat PB in both, going sub-29 seconds in the butterfly for the first time.

Coach John Moore was delighted with the swimming, remarking on Filip's backstroke clean sweep as something he hadn't witnessed before. The club finished in 12th place out of 26 in the medal table.
