On Thursday 18th, Sarah p resented the Rectory Row shield to Erine Evans, who according to headmaster Mr Irvine, had been the outstanding choice after a vote amongst the pupils. As well as the shield, each winner received a certificate and a book as a permanent record of their success. The shield will be engraved with the winners name and hung in the School Hall, for future pupils to emulate and (hopefully) have their names engraved on it in years to come. # New £8 million Sedgefield Community Hospital opens

The new Sedgefield Community Hospital has received its first patients! Staff and patients from the old Community Hospital started to move into the new state-of-the-art hospital on Saturday 20th July and by Wednesday 24th all services will have made the move.

The new £8 million 42 bedded hospital, which has been built on the outskirts of the village, replaces the 50 year old dilapidated huts.

The new hospital will provide up to date facilities including:

- 26 elderly care beds
- 16 elderly mental health beds
- · two day care units
- a range of outpatient clinics
- other services including physiotherapy, occupational therapy and foot health
- and have innovative lan

scape gardens and secluded courtyards that patients can enjoy.

The modern facility will also have an extended x-ray department with a new ultrasound service.

Councillor Alan Gray, Chairman of Sedgefield Primary Care Trust, who will take over responsibility for managing the new hospital, said: "This is a memorable occasion for the people of Sedgefield and the surrounding villages. Local people have waited a long time for a new hospital, and finally it is here.

"We are very pleased to welcome our first patients to the new Sedgefield Community Hospital.

The PCT would like to thank South Durham Health Care

NHS Trust and Clugstons for all their hard work in helping to build this fantastic new hospital."

Sandy Taylor, Chief Executive of County Durham Darlington Priority Services NHS Trust, said: "This is a key development for mental health services in the Sedgefield area and we have been looking forward to moving into our new, modern facilities for a This impressive long time. new hospital gives us the opportunity to provide a very high level of care to older people with mental health problems and staff are looking forward to settling in."

On Saturday, 13th July, 12 intrepid girls flew off from Britain to Malawi, perhaps in the footsteps of David Livingstone, for a month!

Among the girls, from Polam Hall School, Darlington and Teesside Prep School, is Caroline Shields, of Queens Drive, Sedgefield.

This is no ordinary trip. No air conditioning or luxury tours. The Team will sleep in tents, cope with the threat of malaria and poor sanitation; climb the highest mountain in eastern Africa; and help some of the poorest, but friendliest people in the world.

They expect to return changed-more mature, with a greater understanding of their own capabilities, teamwork, and of the world in which we live.

Each girl had to raise a minimum of £3000 to take part, and to buy the necessary clothing and equipment.

Weekends have been spent practicing camp craft and navigation. In February they lived in icy conditions in Derbyshire- not far removed from the climate at the top of the peak they intend to climb!

Their Objectives, to assist in interpretation and trail development in

Lengwe National Park.

- Climb Sapitwa Peak, Mulanje, at 3002m the highest peak in East Africa.
- Work with two primary schools and a wild life club.
- Leave Malawi via Liwonde National

This experience to be challenging, enlightening, and of help to those less fortunate.

## So this is what you think!

Those who attended the Development Partnership's open meeting in Ceddesfeld Hall last month heard Chris Cox, the consultant leading the Community Appraisal, give an initial report on the findings of the recent questionnaire survey.

Amongst the key points to emerge were:

We like living here. 96% are very satisfied with the area; we value the location, the friendly community and the amenities. We like the picturesque quality of Sedgefield and we take pride in preserving its identity and environment. However most residents also feel there are issues and concerns that need to be addressed. In particular:-

- · Litter and dog fouling
- · Traffic and parking
- Disruptive youths (although young people's input to the appraisal is not yet at hand!)
- · Lack of leisure facilities

These four issues are felt to be intrusive by residents and contribute to the feeling that Sedgefield is staying the same or is declining.

Residents are keen to see control of speeding traffic, and improved parking, control litter and dog fouling legislation, better environmental maintenance, solutions to the issue of disruptive youths. This is seen more seen as a need for facilities to divert young people rather than for punitive measures against them. Amongst the facilities we most want is a swimming pool; (indeed wasn't that the conclusion five years ago as well?!)

Other findings are:

- That most households have not recently experienced crime and people feel safe in both inside and outside their homes.
- There is general satisfaction with local services.
- 90% believe the local environment to be attractive

What happens next? Well the questionnaire is only one input to the appraisal. There are two elements yet to be done. One specifically will address young people's issues and the other will look at what people see as important priorities for the future. This will be tackled through a number of discussions in focus groups that will take place over the next month and will involve many people who volunteered to take part when they responded to the questionnaire.

The appraisal will be concluded over the summer and will be a public document. It will be vital for the community, and for all groups and organisations as a record of the community's concerns and issues as well as providing a basis for justifying money for needs and priorities.

#### P.C. Todd's Column.

In this issue I would like to focus on the role of the Police, as they quietly go about their duties throughout the night.

Most people understand the need to have routine patrols to help catch and frustrate the criminal element, from conducting their nocturnal activities. Sometimes these patrols prove very successful, as was the case a couple of weeks ago.

But firstly I would like to point out that there have been three successful night time vehicle chases through the Village in recent weeks. One, sadly, resulting in the injury of a local Officer (I won't mention his name to save him from any embarrassment). These chases each came to conclusion in the Cleveland area.

The incident I would like to focus on

started in the early hours, when two youths were spotted by the Police driving around the streets. They failed to notice the blue light flashing behind them, or the sound of the siren. I must apologise at this point to the people living in Station Road, West End and Rectory Row, as they may have heard the siren as the chase developed. It is necessary at times to use the siren to warn other road users of possible dangers. The chase ended near the Golden Lion PH when their vehicle hit the kerb, spun out of control and came to a halt in the middle of the road. Both youths abandoned the vehicle and ran off. One was caught in the car park of the Golden Lion but the other was able to avoid detention until the Police aircraft was able to locate him in the gardens around The Orchard area. Both youths are now being dealt with

for various traffic/driving offences, including unfit to drive through drugs, and dangerous driving. I have mentioned this incident in some detail in the hope that readers will have some understanding, when you are woken in the middle of the night. We did receive a couple of complaints regarding the noise made by the sirens and police activities, on this occasion.

Generally, Sedgefield has remained a quiet, crime free area, with only isolated incidents of theft from gardens, of tubs and plants. Plus a couple of vehicles having property removed!

# Sedgefield Crime figures 9th April to 11th June 2002.

In this latest report there are 28 crimes listed, (a big drop from the last one) but only 13 actually took place in the Village!

Of these, 3 were thefts from gardens; plants & ornaments

5 were damage to vehicles, only 1 of which involved theft (audio cassettes)

1 theft of wallet from unsecured car.

#### **MORDON**

The Parish of MORDON stretches from the stands on Sedgefield Racecourse to Preston-Le-Skerne, on the boundary of which is a dismantled railway line. This used to run from Port Clarence on Teesside, to Simpasture (now the town of Newton Aycliffe), where it joined the Stockton and Darlington Railway. Its main use was to transport coal from the West Durham coalfields to Teesside, and in 1914/15 the line was electrified which lasted until the 1930s, when steam trains were re-introduced. By the old railway at High Grindon is the site of a mediaeval village no longer visible. In the winter of 1946/7 floodwater from the River Skerne covered the Carrs (as the low lying land is called), and a local farmer remarked that "You could have rowed a boat to

Mordon", since when the drainage of the carrs has been much improved. An old adage states that "When Roseberry Topping wears a hat; Mordon-Carrs will suffer for that." The village of Mordon is on higher ground and is "an oasis of green raised above the marshy levels." Its name has been suggested to be derived from More-dun or the Moorish Hill (as described by Surtees in 1823.) The size of the Parish is too small for a Parish Council, so we hold a Parish Meeting with an elected Chairman and Clerk to carry out the political business. We consider this to be the most democratic of all meetings, as all parishioners on the electoral roll are allowed to attend, have their say, and vote.

## **Sedgefield First Responders**



First Responders work in partnership with the North East Ambulance Service, providing a rapid response to 999 calls where the casualty is unconscious or suffering chest pain, stroke, diabetic coma, etc. within the area of Sedgefield, Fishburn, Bishop Middleham, Bradbury and Mordon. They do not in any way take the place of the ambulance crew, but provide first-on-scene cover whenever possible.

The responders are all volunteers, most of whom had no experience. They are trained in the use of the Heart Defibrillator and in Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation, and the each now has a full first aid certificate. There are two active trainers, Mrs Mary Osel-Cassidy and Mr Mark Stewart, who provide training on a fortnightly basis. All volunteers must re-qualify every 90 days to ensure a high level of competency.

The First Responders team was

launched in October 2001 and is now looking for more volunteers so that they can meet their aim of providing 24 hour cover by the end of this year. If you would like to serve your community in this worthwhile way and can spare a little of your time, they would love to hear from you.

As a volunteer you will be expected to attend regular (friendly) training sessions and will receive a certificate from NEAS after assessment at the end of the required training. After that you can put in as much or as little time as you are able; the more volunteers, the less time on call for everyone in the group. You will never be expected to attend a call

alone, as the group always works in teams of two.

#### WAS IT RICHARD WOODS OR JOSEPH SPENCE?

At the last meeting of the Friends of Hardwick in the Hardwick Hall Hotel, Nick Owen who is a Historical Landscape Architect came up with the theory that the Pleasure Gardens in Hardwick Park may have been designed by either Richard Woods or Joseph Spence. Many of the features of the Park bear remarkable similarities to those in other gardens. Woods was responsible for laying out the gardens at Harewood House and Spence was responsible for the park at Auckland Castle. The decision from Heritage Lottery on the bid for a £4.4m grant is expected before the end of July. Forestry work should be started this autumn and major landscape restoration next spring.
