Community Safety & Health

PC Todd reports

Some of the reported crimes in Sedgefield between 16th June – 13th July have included: paint stripper on car and nails in tyre on Oueen's Drive, parcels taken from one insecure van on Spring Lane and a juke box and other items stolen from another van delivering to an address in Front Street. A works van was broken into and tools stolen in Mitford Court. Windows were broken in Rectory Row, High Street and South View. Thieves struck in The Meadows, The Square, Wallington Drive, Beacon Avenue and Chestnut Road. A Drugs Dog Operation in the High Street resulted in one person being arrested. Once again the number of crimes

reported in the village over the past few weeks remains low, but I would like to highlight two unusual crimes which could have been avoided if only more care had been taken. Both crimes of theft occurred when delivery drivers left their vehicles insecure while they were delivering goods nearby. On one occasion a Juke Box was stolen from the back of the van, and in the other crime about 9 parcels were taken. The ducks living around the ponds behind Ceddesfeld Hall have been subjected to attacks by gangs of youths lately, which have resulted in about 6 ducks receiving treatment. Sadly, some ducks have died from their injuries. Kicking or throwing things at our feathered friends will not be tolerated. I will prosecute anyone doing so.

Two guest speakers attended the last meeting and spoke about taking action against under-age drinking in pus and initiatives to improve local pub watch schemes. In an emergency situation ambulance and hospital staff will then be able quickly to identify your next of kin and contact them. It's so simple that anyone can do it.

Mobile Podiatry Service suspended due to mechanical problems

A Mobile Podiatry Service that has operated in the Durham Dales and Sedgefield areas has been suspended due to mechanical and electrical problems. The decision to suspend the service follows a recent inspection of the Podiatry Mobile Unit by the manufacturers on 24th June, following reported mechanical and electrical failures. Patients are being offered alternatives by the Podiatry Service temporarily. Jeff Hobkirk, Head of the Podiatry Service said: "We regret that we have to suspend this long running service, but it was felt necessary in order to protect the safety of both staff and the public. Durham Dales and Sedgefield PCTs are looking into the options around for the future of the mobile service."

All patients are being contacted directly by the Podiatry Service and are being offered alternative appointments with a choice of venue and appointment time using existing facilities.

Jeff added: "The Podiatry Service extends its apologies to all users of the Mobile Service for the sudden change to service and any inconvenience it may cause. One of our readers was re-united with her lost necklace due to spotting in last month's PC Todd's Report that a necklace had been handed in to the police

VJ Day- August 15th 1945

60 years ago some of the final acts of the 2nd World War were enacted with the formal surrender of the Japanese Empire (isolated fighting continued in some areas, after this date, due to communication difficulties).

At the time of the surrender there were 11 Sedgefield men serving in the South East Asia Command of the British Forces.

RAF: J L Hammond, N Walker, J Gill, S S Wilkinson, E Orwin-Kent Army: J Bell, N Watt, H Ellis, R W Southwood, W Ramsay, and Les Butler.

In addition Gunner T H Harris Heavy Anti-aircraft Regiment RA had died on the 11th January 1944 as a Prisoner of War of the Japanese. He was captured in Malaya in 1941 and died later in Thailand.

These men served with the 14th (or Forgotten) Army and most of them did not return to UK until 1946. Gunner Harris, God rest his soul, did not return.

We must always remember that it was not only in Europe where atrocities of WW2 were carried out and we must ensure that they do not happen again!

The above information is from records just unearthed. If they are not accurate nor complete, would you let me know please.

Further investigation into the Roman site

In the last few weeks there has been a lot of archaeological activity in the East Park. A partnership between Durham County Council's County Archaeology Section and Archaeological Services University Durham (ASUD) has been running an excavation on part of the Romano-British site in the East Park. The Time Team first excavated parts of the site in 2002 but they only scratched the surface. Subsequent investigation has revealed that it is one of the largest Romano-British sites in the north-east, with the exception of Hadrian's Wall. So far nothing military has been discovered and the description of it as a Roman industrial estate still seems to be accurate.

The dig encompasses an area where the geophysics has highlighted a large target area at the joining of two ditches. This has proved to be a pit about six metres wide, of indeterminate use. Several sections through the ditches have been



excavated revealing some artefacts including pottery and animal bone, the bone being a rare discovery on such sites. On another part of the dig the remains of a small building have been found, with slots for the timbers laid on the ground. There is evidence that it was rebuilt at a later date, with vertical posts set into the ground. Other discoveries are two Roman ovens, probably used for drying grain or malting barley for brewing and several burnt areas of industrial origin. Late 4th century pottery has been found, Crambeck ware from the Castle Howard area, which is common on military sites, as well as a few coins and pins.

If you feel like a walk, the dig is in the East Park just to the left of the path from the Showfield to Hardwick Hall entrance. Once there, continue on into the West Park where rapid progress is being made with the restoration. The Temple of Minerva now has its dome in place and is well on towards completion. The walls of the Gothic Seat are rising above the platform and work is progressing on the tower of the Gothic Ruin. Some minor work is being completed on the Lake edges and soon (hopefully) the Lake will be allowed to fill. With the nice summer weather now with us, why not go and have a look!

Boost for NetPark

In a further boost for the NetPark, it has been announced that a multi-million pound centre to help build a plastic electronics manufacturing infrastructure in the North East has been given the go ahead. Plastics electronics developer Plastic Logic has been granted permission to site an open access facility for the entire European plastics electronics community at the NetPark at a cost of more than £20m. The development is being co-ordinated by Cenamps, a centre of excellence set up by One NorthEast to bridge a gap between universities and business. Partners in the enterprise will include leading research universities such as Cambridge, Durham and Newcastle.

Stylish and comfortable underwear for mums-to-be

NetPark will soon be the location of a new company which intends to provide expectant mothers with comfortable and sexy lingerie. "Amoralia" is the brainchild of psychology graduate Jules Fossett.

Jules' idea of providing women with stylish and practical underwear, beat off the other competitors to win this prestigious business planning award from Durham University. Her prize for winning the Durham Blueprint competition (sponsored by County Durham Development Company plus others) is £2,000 and six months rent free in the incubator unit at the NetPark, plus free consultancy from business specialists.

The competition is in its second year and aims to celebrate enterprise and give the winners with the necessary support to make their business ideas successful.

Comet Dust

Comet Swift-Tuttle is not as famous as Halley's Comet (rhymes with either 'alley' or 'hall-ee' but not Bill Hayley and the Comets). Its orbital period of about 135 years makes revisits rare events – the next in 2126 will probably be a bit late for most of us! Swift-Tuttle does, however, leave a legacy which can be seen every year; comet dust. Comets have been described as dirty snowballs or as snowy dirtballs. As comets orbit the Sun, they leave behind a trail of dust. Each year, during late July and August, the Earth passes through the stream of dust left by Swift-Tuttle. This dust creates one of the year's most famous meteor showers; the Perseids. As the dust particles strike the Earth's upper atmosphere at up to 40 miles per second (over 100, 000 mph) they become white hot and burn away. Theses meteors are called Perseids because they appear to come from an area of the sky near the constellation of Perseus.

Two nights are likely to be good for observing the Perseids in 2005; 11th/12th and 12th/13th August.

Activity will begin to rise on the first of these nights and will probably be best on the second. Since 12th/13th is Friday night into Saturday morning, it is probably a good night for many to try a meteor watch. Binoculars and telescopes are not needed for meteor watching – a clear, dark sky and a comfortable, reclining seat.

Perseid meteors are expected to be seen at a rate of about 1 per minute by midnight and by then the Moon will have set. Choose a location with a good view of the north-eastern sky – sit back and relax whilst looking up at about 45° in that direction. Perseids are renowned for being fast and bright, and often leave persistent trails. *Tim Randall*

The Refurbishment of Sedgefield War Memorial



The Co-operative Funeral Service was approached by Sedgefield Town Council regarding the refurbishment of the War Memorial prior to the 60th Anniversary celebration of V.E. Day. They asked their monumental masons, North East Granite, to look at the possibility of re-furbishing the existing plaque which held the names of the war veterans from both Great Wars. Unfortunately, the

news was not good, the plaque was beyond repair and its removal would destroy part of the War Memorial. However, there was a compromise. A new plaque could be made, holding all the existing veterans names and allowing the addition of a soldier's name from the 1st World War that had been omitted from the original plaque. The new plaque, made from Lakeland Green Slate to complement the original materials, could be placed over the original so as not to destroy any part of the War Memorial for historical and sentimental reasons. This skilled workmanship came at a cost. Funds were sought and found from Sedgefield Town Council, PC Todd's Fire Walk and the Co-operative Funeral Service. It was agreed that the Co-operative Funeral Service would ask their monumental masons to carry out the work to supply and fit the new plaque.

As the photograph shows, the War Memorial has now been brought back to its former glory. It was rededicated on 5th June as part of the 60th Anniversary of V.E. Day's Thanksgiving Service.

What is happening at Harbinson House?

The building work currently being carried out at Sedgefield Surgery will last for approximately 12 weeks, and will result in a two storey extension at the front of the building. This will create two new consulting rooms on the ground floor and further office space on the upper floor. The waiting area will be extended and the front entrance will be re-sited and equipped with electronic doors, with provision for secure pushchair parking within the building. The reception desk will be modified slightly to accommodate the changes to the waiting area. The surgery is currently accessible

via the back entrance. Disabled parking spaces are situated in the bays previously allocated for medical staff, and are available for use for the duration of the building project.
