Music - a healing force

The North East branch of national charity Nordoff-Robbins Music Therapy is offering an exciting new educational opportunity for people who are interested in learning about music therapy. The course will include case-studies covering a wide range of groups who could benefit from music therapy, as well as musical improvisation workshops.

Janet Graham, now living in Bishop Middleham, is Nordoff-Robbins' North East Regional Head Music Therapist. Born and brought up in the Consett area, she studied at the Royal Academy of Music and stayed in the South East working as a composer and piano teacher before training as a music therapist. Her husband, Philip Deane, is a professional organist, currently working at Ferryhill.

Janet is often contacted by people who want to learn more about music therapy and how it can help people with illness, disability or communication problems. Being able to provide this course offers "a unique opportunity, not only for musicians who may be thinking of undertaking post-graduate music therapy training at some point, but also for people working in health, education or social care who would like to know how to use music more beneficially in their everyday work."

No previous musical training is needed to attend the course. It aims to help anyone who is interested in music's healing potential; not only those who may take it up as a career, but also those caring for people with an illness or disability. Evidence shows that music therapy can be an effective form of treatment for many people, including those to whom the use of words may be difficult, emotionally painful, or simply not possible. Therapists work with children and adults with illnesses, difficulties and disabilities ranging from infant autism to advanced dementia, using joint music-making to develop a therapeutic relationship, allowing the therapist to find out what specific needs a client may have, then choosing ways to help.

Nordoff-Robbins Music Therapy (RCN 280960) provides 55 music therapy services nationwide and has recently established projects at care centres in Peterlee and Billingham. Testament to the value of the service comes from people involved in both centres: at The Hawthorns in Peterlee, "The sound of music throughout the corridors is comforting ... harp or guitar, cymbals and drums. Residents look forward to sessions with Janet where they can relax, have some fun and enjoy the experience together."

Stephen Scollard, Manager at The Billingham Grange Independent Hospital agrees "Janet manages to captivate our patients and provide a most pleasurable experience. Our patients do benefit from this and are keen to attend the next sessions."

Extraordinary funding bid takes orchestra to Edinburgh Festival



The Darlington and the Dales Youth Orchestra had resigned themselves to missing out on a third consecutive Edinburgh appearance, until cellist Tim Jasper took the initiative. The problem was that hoped-for Arts Council funding had not materialised. Tim contacted Co. Durham's Youth Opportunity Fund and filled in an online application, explaining why it was important to the young players to take part in Festival of British Youth Orchestras. Last month he heard that the YOF had agreed to fund the whole cost of the trip - £3,800. Now the DYO Committee are gathering their players together to rehearse their challenging Festival programme. Tim's sister Ciaran, a flautist in the orchestra, will be making her first appearance at the Edinburgh event this year; a particularly good reason for Tim's efforts to succeed.

Sedgefield Music Festival 5th - 7th September

This is the third annual festival and it promises to be an exciting weekend. Various activities are taking place in the village and everyone is welcome. There will be three concerts and three singarounds. Children are invited to a workshop in Ceddesfeld Hall on Saturday 6th September at 10:30am, featuring the world spoons champion, Bertie Draycott, who will teach the children to master the art of spoon playing. There will be a competition in Ceddesfeld Hall on the afternoon for children and adults, with cash prizes.

Friday night in the Parish Hall features Nancy Kerr & James Fagan, John Wrightson Band, Rob Guest and ex Lindisfarne front man Billy Mitchell.

Saturday night in St Edmund's Church features Marske Fishermen's Choir, Northumbrian Pipers and Fishburn Silver Band.

Saturday night in the Parish Hall involves Prelude, House Sisters and the one and only Vin Garbutt.

Singarounds will take place during the weekend in Ceddesfeld Hall with the final one on Sunday 7th September from 11am.

Home Security - a Brief Reminder

During the summer period with changeable weather it is all too easy to forget about the open window and the unlocked door, your chance of forgetfulness is the chance the thief or burglar is waiting for.

Garden Security, mark your valuables with your post code using a simple UV pen (available at most stationers) & don't leave tools etc out unattended, lock them away preferably out of site.

Door Callers, Trading Standards, the Police & N/H/Watch urge everyone **not to buy at the door**.

It is usually a costly exercise and gives the dishonest their opportunity to con honest folk out of their cash at best or actually steal from them at worst.

Walk in Theft, this happens to those least expecting it, & often to someone who is usually careful. **Police Crime Prevention** continually stress the need to keep doors locked or secure even when you are in the house and *especially* during the fine weather when you might be in & out of the garden; opportunist thieves do operate in our area, in fact some have even travelled in to steal from our local stores!

Residents' Forum July meeting

Much work has gone into the preparation for the Holiday Park appeal: thanks are extended to the village residents who have so willingly helped. Focus on food: Fennel

A tight creamy-green bulb with bright green stalks and feathery fronds, fennel is not really a bulb at all but the swollen part of the plant's stalk. Also known as Florence fennel, it has a mild liquorice flavour that mellows on cooking. It aids digestion and is high in vitamins and minerals. Florence fennel and sweet fennel are alternate names for the farmed fennel bulb. The fresh fennel herb is the same plant, allowed to grow taller and harvested differently. Wild fennel has slim stalks rather than a "bulb" but has similar feathery fronds and flavour. Fennel seeds, used as a spice, have a much more powerful liquorice taste.

How to serve it

Fennel can be served raw in wedges as a crudité, or sliced paper-thin on a mandolin and dressed with oil, salt, pepper, and lemon juice. In Italy fennel is traditionally served at the end of a meal as dessert with fruit and cheese. Try it in place of onion or leeks in soups, cheesy bakes such as potato dauphinoise, and pasta sauces. Fennel can be grilled, roasted, deep-fried in batter or braised in chicken stock. Good flavour matches include lemon, garlic, tomatoes, aubergines, olives, orange - in fact, almost anything Mediterranean. Use the stalks in stuffings for fish, seafood and chicken, or dry them and add to barbecue coals to give an aromatic smoke. The decorative fronds can be employed as a garnish or flavouring, anywhere you would use dill.

Preparation

Fennel turns brown quickly after cutting so prepare it just before using/serving, or else place it in water with a squeeze of lemon, to prevent discolouration. Slice the bulb vertically into wedges, or cut like an onion. The tops of the fennel are a guide to freshness - if the stalks are a bit flabby, soak in iced water to make them crisp up.

SPORTS UPDATE

By the time you read this, the start of the Beijing Olympics will only be days away. It's going to be fascinating. The build up has been controversial, with the torch relay being dogged by human rights protests and fears being regularly expressed that poor air quality will affect endurance events. What is not in doubt is that China will make sure that the Games are spectacular. The Great British team is hoping to bring home about 35 medals – expect to start being temporarily riveted by sailing, rowing, diving, equestrian events and all sorts of other sports that you might only watch once every four years (as well as plenty that you do regularly follow!). And for Sedgefield, there is even more interest than usual in the 29th Olympiad as one of our own, Bradley Saunders, will be representing the country in the light-welterweight division of the boxing tournament. More on boxing later.

Youth Football

I know, it's summer and football shouldn't be on the agenda. But the new season is almost upon us and the various Sunday league teams are in pre-season training. Sedgefield Youth FC has been celebrating its successful first season, with a presentation evening in the Parish Hall. They were joined by a trio of mayors, John Robinson, Dudley Waters and Tim Jeans, a band called Remember When and Adam Postgate as DJ for the night.

The main award of the night was the Aurthur Stelling Sports Person of the Year and this was won by Connor Herron who plays in defence. Martin Worthington won an award for being named man of the match most times, the manager's player of the year award went to Jamie Herd and most improved player was won by Jacob Ho. The club was also presented with a shield for finishing second in a tournament in Ferryhill.

The Golden Lion provided the bar for the evening (soft drinks only for the players!). Luke Towler had been selling balloons and, thanks to money from that and a donation made by Mrs Scott from a quiz she had run, he was able to present the team with two new match balls. The evening was a great success and the club is really looking forward to the new season, by which time its new website will be fully up and running at www.sedgefieldyouthfc.org.uk.

Boxing

South Durham Amateur Boxing Club recently held its annual presentation at the Beehive in Fishburn, rounding off a fantastic season of many highlights:

In October, travelled to a tournament in Denmark, Jeff Saunders and Matthew Toothill picked up silver medals, while Lee Milburn won gold. Not a bad start to the season. In December, Matthew Toothill, Paul Warnett and Gary Fox competed in Rotterdam; in January, Matthew Toothill, Karl Thompson, Paul Warnett and James Archer boxed in Guernsey; April, travelled to Scotland for a tournament where Toothill, Saunders and Fox achieved a clean sweep of victories with the latter being named best boxer of the tournament.

In May, London multi nations tournament Toothill won silver and Thompson bronze. Also in May, Jeff Saunders won at the ABA finals in Liverpool. In June, Jeff Saunders represented England in a three nations event, winning a gold medal. Other highlights of the season have included: Jeff Saunders Senior receiving an award from the ABA of England for producing exceptional talent out of South Durham ABC; a special award from South Durham being presented to Lee Milburn; Jack Turner winning a national title in the minors section; Jeff Saunders being crowned Northern Counties Champion and winning the British title.

The South Durham ABC award winners were: most dedicated - Kieran Gash; best attendance - Adam Athy; best junior prospect - Joe Lewis Fanelli; best senior prospect - Gary Fox; best junior - David Swailly; best senior - Matthew Toothill; best overall boxer - Jeff Saunders. During the season, the club was involved in 114 bouts, winning 77 throughout the UK and internationally. And then there's the small matter of Bradley Saunders winning a bronze in the World Championships and qualifying for the Beijing Olympics. He has already been to China once, where he won a gold medal in a tournament, stopping the current Olympic champion in the third round. Yes, that's one successful boxing club – in fact one of the best in the country – and it aims to build on that, which means competing at more high profile events.

South Durham ABC has been invited to take part in two tournaments in Johannesburg in October by Anton Gilmore, president of the ABA. The first planned event will see South Durham take on opponents from Brazil and South Africa; in the second, South Durham will take on a Johannesburg select team. Both tournaments will be

televised in South Africa and have been made possible by the efforts of Chris Reed, Sedgefield born and bred but has lived in Johannesburg for 20 years. South Durham ABC hopes to take a full squad to South Africa on 14th October and this is a fantastic opportunity for the lads to represent Sedgefield Borough and England. To make this possible, the club needs support from the local community. If anyone is willing to sponsor a boxer, they should contact Tracey Saunders on 07861 226986/7 – without help, the trip won't be possible.

The Long Walk

By the time you read this, a stand up comedian called Mark Oliver will be about to start performing his show at the Edinburgh Festival. His preparation has been a little unusual, as he decided to walk 410 miles to Edinburgh from his home in Bristol, using his experiences on the way as material for the show, which is called Ramble On. Mark is not a 'hardened' walker and confesses to being lazy and unfit. He explains why he took on the challenge: "I wanted to get out of my comfort zone. People in general don't do enough to leave their comfort zone, because we've got everything we need at home. I'm a lazy comic who spends so much time sitting in cars, buying sandwiches from petrol stations. This has been my way of seeing Britain and meeting real people, which you don't get to do when you're on the road. The prospect was petrifying, but it's been a fantastic and illuminating experience!"

Mark passed through Sedgefield during his walk, joined a few locals in the Dun Cow for a drink and stayed in the village – and he looked a bit leaner than his Facebook photo. He has become clear proof that walking is a great way to get fit. Mark has raised thousands of pounds for hospice care during his walk and you can still donate to the cause at www.justgiving.com/markoliver.

Finally, I am assured (by a contact who will remain nameless, for the moment) that I will soon receive an update on Sedgefield Cricket Club's season so far. Charity toddle in Hardwick Park

Date - Sunday 10th August

Start Time - from 11am at the play area / visitor centre, round the new lake footpath and back to the visitor centre.

James was born in May of 2006 and, like any other newborn, was so precious. However, it became apparent within days that he was having difficulty breathing. Two weeks later, James was diagnosed with 4 holes between the chambers of his heart that would need open heart surgery to correct the problems. At just 6 weeks old he had the operation, which was a success, and we owe the life of our child to the skill and dedication of the staff at The Children's Heart Unit at The Freeman Hospital. The Children's Heart Unit Fund is a registered charity founded in 1979. Its aim is to raise money to buy equipment for the children's heart unit at The Freeman Hospital. Sometimes small pieces of equipment to help nurses on the wards, sometimes larger items to help doctors with diagnosis or surgeons with complex operations and after care. In some instances it is used to pay salaries of medical support staff essential to the efficient running of the unit. Heart defects comprise one of the most common groups of congenital abnormalities in newborn babies. Many of them are tiny premature infants, who up to a few years ago would not have survived. Out of 33,000 babies born in the northern region each year around 350 will require treatment in the children's heart unit at Freeman. Around 200 small babies and children are operated on each year by the two children's heart surgeons at Freeman Hospital.

The procedures are highly technical, complex and carry a very significant risk because of the severity of the heart problem. In addition to the more routine forms of cardiac surgery, Freeman Hospital undertakes children's heart transplant operations for the northern half of Britain. Many extremely sick children come to the unit at Freeman Hospital for assessment, for transplantation, and some require to be supported by special heart pumps within the Intensive Care Unit while waiting for transplantation. Sedgefield doctors' practice and its other branches are proud to have been recognised for their efforts in making services 'young people friendly' with an award of membership to Investors in Children for the coming year.

Investing in Children, a Durham County Council initiative, works to ensure that children and young people have a voice, and are able to influence the services they use. Co-ordinator, Helen Mulhearn, in presenting the award, commented that the practice has demonstrated, to the satisfaction of the young people who use the service that they have been involved in meaningful dialogue and that change in the service they are offered has come about as a result.

Elizabeth (Liz) Green runs the Sedgefield Teenage Health Clinic, along with, currently, Cheryl Dunn, the School Nurse. The clinic has been established for almost 7 years and welcomes young people from all over the patch seeking advice on all health-related issues. Young people have been involved from the outset, helping 'get it right' - fitting exactly the criteria looked for in this initiative, which looks for services designed with young people in mind, and involves the local young people in planning and developing a project. This involvement has also helped the rest of the staff in the practice to develop a better understanding of young people's specific needs in general.

Nationally, the Department of Health have been trying to encourage easier access to health care for young people, and it was this which enabled the practice to bid locally for funding for the clinic. Succeeding in the bid allowed them to take the youth service into Sedgefield Community College during Monday lunchtimes.

"We are always looking at ways to improve our service, and we welcome comments and suggestions to help us" said Liz Green.

Her message to young people is simple. "You are all welcome at our clinic. There's no need to book an appointment. Just 'drop in' either at school on Monday lunchtimes or in the surgery on Monday afternoons between 3.30pm and 5pm, during term times. You can get advice on your general health, friendships, emotional health, contraception and sexual health – or a mixture of them all."
