There was a very festive atmosphere with lots of ukulele themed entertainment including the fantastic Ukulele Orchestra of Great Britain.

At 3pm the world record attempt took place. We all had to leave the square and be counted back in so that the people from the Guinness book of records were able to verify the numbers. We started with a warm up that included a Mexican wave of ukuleles and then played through the song that we'd all practised, Sloop John B, made famous by the Beach Boys. We knew that the previous record was 400 people so you can imagine the cheer that went up when it was announced that we had more than doubled that with 851 ukulele players. So we are now officially ukulele world record holders. Mystery photo update

I'm very pleased to let readers know that, since the July issue, I have heard from the man himself. Barry Hutchinson and his wife Hazel moved to Holy Island in 2000, when he was appointed Director of the St. Cuthbert's Centre, a Christian retreat, owned and managed by the United Reformed Church. Open to people of all religions and none, the centre was developed during the 1990s to offer island residents and visitors a modern, well-equipped building in which to meet for worship, fellowship, prayer and sacrament. Inspired by the life of Cuthbert, the centre aims to provide ministry under the five themes of hospitality, teaching, solitude, reconciliation and worship.

Surrounded by quiet paths and pleasant borders under gothic arches, with attractive garden sculptures, a bench in the centre's garden marks the beginning and end of St Cuthbert's Way, a popular walk from the border town of Melrose to Holy Island. The centre and its gardens are accessible to wheelchair users and are open to the public from morning prayer until dusk, Tuesday to Sunday, when not booked by groups. Used by a wide range of groups and churches for quiet days, retreats and away days, the centre is close to the centre of Holy Island village, within easy reach of island facilities and attractions. It sounds delightful and Barry will be very sorry to leave when he retires from the island in 2011. Village Primary Schools

So why is it that each year there are several, mindless (but very expensive to our community) acts of vandalism & damage to the property & premises at our schools? If anyone sees such acts please follow the recent public spirited example of a member of the public who witnessed a youngster damaging play equipment at Sedgefield Primary school; report it. On this occasion photographs allowed the culprit to be identified and the School/Police can now prosecute.

Home Security - a Brief Reminder

During the summer period, with changeable weather, it is all too easy to forget about the open window, the unlocked door. Your chance forgetfulness is the chance the thief or burglar is waiting for.

Garden Security

Mark your valuables with your post code using a simple UV pen (available at most stationers) & don't leave tools etc out unattended, lock them away, preferably out of sight.

Door Callers

Trading Standards, the Police & N/H/Watch urge everyone **not** to **buy at** the door. It is usually a costly exercise and gives the dishonest their opportunity to con honest folk out of their cash at best or actually steal from them at worst. Why not display a No Cold Calling Home sticker and ignore any uninvited callers - especially those who ignore your notice. Stickers are still available free from the Town Council Offices (next to the Doctor's Surgery).

Walk in Theft

This happens to the least expecting & often to someone who is usually careful.

Police Crime Prevention continually stress the need to keep doors locked or secure even when you are in the house and especially during the fine weather when you might be in & out of the garden; opportunist thieves do operate in our area. Neighbourhood Watch advice for householders is:

- **KEEP THE DOOR CHAIN OR DOOR BAR ON AT ALL TIMES**
- **ESPECIALLY WHEN ANSWERING THE DOOR**
- IF IN DOUBT, KEEP THEM OUT!
- A LOCKED DOOR PREVENTS UNWANTED VISITORS

Sedgefield Primary School on Rectory Row has become the target again of a minority of youths intent on causing mindless damage and disruption. A burglary, damage to windows and to newly installed play equipment, have occurred over the past 4 or 5 weekends. More concerning is the fact that a pupil cut her hand on the broken glass bottles carelessly discarded and smashed. Groups of youths have been found hanging around various areas of the school and have been informed that the school is out of bounds. Action will be taken against anyone found on the school grounds without permission. Another area of concern, which has previously been highlighted but continues to cause problems, is the church grounds, especially behind the wall to the right of the main gate. Youths gather in this corner causing damage and leaving litter including beer cans and bottles. Recently, a piece of broken headstone was used to damage the inside of the boundary wall. The wall is very old and has stood the test of time. We do not appreciate those few who wish to destroy it. Other crimes reported recently include a burglary at Ceddesfeld Hall. The youths caught on CCTV wearing the stolen theatrical costumes may well be getting a knock on their door. The Beat team, with the help of the drugs dog, attended many of the pubs in the village on a Friday night recently, not only to reassure customers and staff that positive action is being taken to deter drug misuse but also to catch and prosecute offenders. The dog showed an interest in 6 customers,

2 of whom were arrested for possession of drugs and prosecuted. Drugs will not be tolerated in Sedgefield and, as the Terminator says, 'He will be back'! Everyone should know it is an offence to purchase alcohol and hand it to persons under 18 years. A female was handed an £80 fine recently for doing just that. More fines are to be carried out in the coming weeks. Don't do it! Until next time, Keith

At meeting held recently in the Social Club, members were informed of the P.A.C.T. priorities and were asked to take a more responsible view of the use of glass outside their premises and any form of drug misuse within. No incidents were reported requiring further action from members.

Jottings

from the Sedgefield Village Residents' Forum meeting, 6th July

The meeting was well supported and residents attending for the first time were welcomed.

There was concern expressed about the extension to the Racecourse licence and possible noise intrusion to neighbouring areas as well as the helicopter rides which are currently taking place. Loud music from pubs in the centre of the village was also raised and, again, there was much discussion about the anti-social behaviour, noise and drinking in the village at varying times. Police and Local Authority continually emphasise that nothing can be done without 'evidence' of complaints. So it is no good any of us complaining about things if they are not properly reported. It is acknowledged that it is not always easy to report incidents but residents should direct their complaints about noise nuisance to the DCC environment officer and also to the Sedgefield Town Council, and any other issues please report to police.

To help gather 'evidence' of issues the Forum will put a 'post box' in both the Library and the Town Council office. While we emphasise this is not a replacement for reporting things properly to the authorities it will help us measure what is being reported. So please, whether you report things to the authorities or just want to report it to the Forum, pop a note in one of the post boxes, anonymously, if you wish. The note should record the time, date and nature of any disturbance and whether or not it was reported to the Authorities. PLEASE REPORT ANY DISTURBANCES AND ISSUES it will really help in getting problems dealt with.

It was also agreed that the Town Council be requested to take urgent action regarding the anti-social behaviour, noise, intimidation and drinking in the village centre at varying times but in particularly at weekends.

The Forum is still seeking to get answers to the many questions raised by residents regarding the granting of planning permission for the Caravan Park. Getting answers is proving to be rather difficult but we will continue to take action. The correspondence file the Caravan Park questions will be kept up to date and is in the Library and Town Council Office for anyone to read.

Information from the Forum meeting held on 6th July 2009 can be found in the minutes which will be in the Library and Town Council offices at least one week before the next meeting. Since it has been agreed that there will be no meeting in August, minutes will be out by the end of July and any update notices will be circulated and shown on the village notice board.

The Forum has written to the residents of Wootton Bassett expressing admiration and thanks for their continuing show of respect and recognition to our troops killed in Afghanistan and their bodies being returned through Wootton Bassett.

Please note that there will be NO AUGUST meeting. The next meeting is on Monday 7th September at 7pm in the Fletcher Room, Parish hall. Everyone is welcome.

Mother urges parents on MMR vaccine

A mother has urged parents to have their children vaccinated after she claims she nearly lost her teenage son and daughter to measles. Gary Bridges and Billy-Jean Nicholson developed serious complications after both contracted the highly contagious illness, which has seen a major resurgence in the North-East. Neither were immunised as babies because at the time there were unfounded scare stories about the MMR vaccine.

Both children ran dangerously high temperatures. Gary, 16, also had

Both children ran dangerously high temperatures. Gary, 16, also had chronic vomiting, an angry rash from head to toe, delirium and sight loss. His sister's condition was so severe it triggered her asthma and she had to be given oxygen by paramedics as they rushed her to hospital by ambulance. Both lost a stone in weight in a week.

Director of public health for County Durham and Darlington Dr Tricia Cresswell said the region was experiencing the worst outbreak of measles in 20 years. "It is a real concern and we know it's happened as a result of the drop in uptake of immunisation following the unfounded concerns about the MMR vaccine," she said. "Measles has become thought of as a mild and unimportant disease but it is in fact a serious killer and every year more than one million children in the developing world die from measles.

It's never too late for a child to have the MMR. The vaccination is free, and available from your GP.

Sandra Morris 1941 - 2009



We are saddened to report the death on 2nd July of Sandra Morris, a much loved and respected teacher here in Sedgefield. Sandra's teaching career spanned 34 years, 21 of which she spent in Sedgefield. First appointed to the staff of Sedgefield Primary School in Rectory Row in September 1966, she then became Deputy Head Teacher at the newly opened Hardwick Primary School in October 1971. It was clear that her talents and practical common sense gave direction to so many young people and ensured that they had a valuable and enriched education. A further promotion followed to a headship at Shildon Jubilee Primary School, another new school with all the challenges which Sandra seemed to enjoy. Finally, she returned to Sedgefield Hardwick School as Head Teacher in September 1984 -a school which she had always loved and to which she gave so much in patience, understanding, kindness and generosity. She remained there until her retirement in July 1995. Sandra maintained an active interest in education, continuing to teach at Bishop Middleham Church of England Primary School.

Caring, thoughtful and with a lovely sense of humour, she led a full life in the community. Always keen on sport since her College days and throughout her school career, Sandra had a passionate interest in golf and was an active playing member of Bishop Auckland Golf Club. In 2006 she proved to be a successful Lady Captain, who particularly enjoyed her year. We will miss her wonderfully warm smile and her great and loyal friendship. She was truly a very special person.

Squash

Seven teams from three primary schools battled it out in a mini-squash competition hosted by Sedgefield Squash Club at the end of June. With so many teams this year, a qualifying tournament preceded the knockout competition. Many players in the qualifying tournament were competing in their first ever matches, and the games were all closely fought and full of skill.

Sedgefield Hardwick 'B' team won both their matches to qualify; who would join them rested on the last match between Trimdon Junior 'A' and Sedgefield Primary 'B'. Trimdon were desperately unlucky: they won 3 -2, but their points total was inferior to Sedgefield Primary (36-44) and the Sedgefield team went through. In the knockout stages, both 'B' teams played their hearts out but were no match for some very experienced 'A' team players. In the final, year five representative, Daniel Skilbeck, got Sedgefield Primary 'A' off to a winning start before two wins for Zoe Dobson in the girls' match, and Francesca McMillen, in the third string match, gave Hardwick 'A' a commanding 28-18 (2-1) lead. 2nd string Josh Hetherington sealed it for Hardwick with an 11-5 win. Although the game was effectively over, this fact was kept secret from the number ones, and the spectators were rewarded with Jake Lennox's best ever game against County under

13 player - and referee for the qualifying tournament - ten year-old George Peden. Jake was very pleased with his four points!
Hardwick 'A' won the final 43-34 (3-

2) and were presented with the cup by Dr James Larcombe, who organised the competition, with help from Emily Sarsfield, a world class skier, but new to squash, from the Sedgefield Schools Sport Partnership. The final results were: winners -Sedgefield Hardwick 'A'; runners up -Sedgefield Primary 'A'; third place -Sedgefield Hardwick 'B'.

The competition began in 2006 after the Sedgefield club's first tentative school visits. With the support of a 'Koolkash' grant from Sedgefield Borough Council, they introduced 700 children in South Durham to squash in 2007, and this year were chosen as a pilot site for school visits by England Squash area development coach, Colin Wheatley. He visited four schools in Trimdon and Sedgefield. Now that many children have been introduced to the sport the club hopes to work with players who want to improve their skills, as well as beginners. Sedgefield Squash Club, which practises on Saturday mornings, already has three teams in the County Junior Leagues, but has the capacity for more young players who want to take up the sport.

Sedgefield Harriers

The 14 miles Northumberland Coastal Run may have been voted Britain's best race, but it can be very tough, as well as scenic, especially if there is a wind blowing from the south on a warm day. That's what the situation was on Sunday 12th July when this year's race was held and eight Sedgefield Harriers took part. They set out from Beadnell Bay under blue skies, headed down onto Low Newton beach and then south to the half way mark beyond Craster, finishing the run in Alnmouth.

Shining for Sedgefield were Gary Hetherington (1:25:59), Rosie Sims (1:46:36), Marie Walker (1:54:19) and Jo James (1:59:39).

Finding it tough were Ean Parsons (1:50:40 – hamstring and post holiday blues), Nick Burchall and Helen Parsons (2:07:12 and 2:11:29 - both struggling for training time) and Graeme Addison (2:11.05 – recovering from injury). NETPark is intended to be North East England's premier science, engineering and technology park for the commercialisation of cutting edge Research and Development. Companies can lead the way in developing world-class technologies that create new products and new

And it has been spectacularly successful! The first company, Kromek which produces semiconductor crystals by a novel process, to move onto the site in 2004 has grown from an initial 2 employees to the current 40. This was in the Incubator Building which rapidly filled and has recently been extended to house even more companies. The facilities are very flexible, sizes varying from a small room to many connected rooms, the walls are moveable so that spaces can be tailored to businesses requirements. When they outgrow the Incubator Building space can be made available on the site for purpose built buildings. Several university groups are in residence in addition to other expanding companies like: ANT - biohazard monitoring systems. de Burka - E-learning Kromek – optoelectronic crystals Ithaka Life Sciences - Biotech consultancy ROAR Particles - forensic nanotechnology Petec – UK national prototyping

The Royal Observer Corps, Sedgefield

William Bayston contacted us with these detailed and personal memories, after reading your letters about the Royal Observer Corps.

Royal Observer Corps Group No 30 was based in Durham City (CO Group Commander F. N Charlton) and there were 3 posts in this sector - F1 Horden, F2 Sheraton Ridge 9 (probably part of the A19 now) and F3 - Sedgefield.

Sedgefield post: Principal Officer Mr W.H. Haggie, at that time Clerk to Sedgefield Council; Leading Observer Frank Alsop; A. Iceton, known as 'Anty' Blacksmith, from The Forge, Cross Street; Harold Wright, who became Group Secretary, S.W.Durham Health Authority and on retirement served with The World Health Organisation (he now lives in Leicestershire); the Roper Brothers and father (as Mrs Cant mentioned); Bill Bayston, E. Bayston (father), R.E.Bayston (brother Reg); W; J. Welch; Mr Hunter, late of Station Road. There must have been many others.

I attended an educational visit to the Durham centre, where I met a Miss G. Reed, who has been my wife for many years. From the list above, only Harold, my wife and I survive.

Location: Sedgefield post was approached from the cart track to the left of the cemetery building, past the North of the cemetery about 200 yds, post was on the right side of the track (see sketch).

Purpose: to observe, identify, track aircraft (hostile & friendly). To report location to Group.

Composition: the post included a wooden cabin, door facing South, with heating from a solid fuel stove, tables chairs, model black bakelite planes hanging from the roof. To the South of the cabin was a raised platform, with an air raid shelter, probably Anderson to the West, running parallel to the cart track. This area was protected to above waist height by sand bags. A Tripod was fitted in the centre of the platform and to this was fitted a Micklethwaite projector, this together with headphones including microphone, field glasses, completed to equipment.

Operation: the Micklethwaite, had an adjustable telescopic sight, which was used to track aircraft and rotated on a circular base, which displayed an Ordinance Survey map of the surrounding area. The map contained a grid, each square identified. A traverse pointer on the rotating instrument indicated the position of the viewed object. The telescopic sight was attached to a vertical height bar, graduated in feet. The machine worked on the principle of triangulation.

We worked mainly with F2 post Horden, as most hostile action was to the East and they were located roughly at Right angles to our North. They could identify the East to West square of the grid and report. We could report the exact North to South square. The intersecting square pinpointed the aircraft position. With the traverse pointer moved to the appropriate square, the object was then viewed by adjusting the position on the height scale. Position and height would then be reported to Group. At the same time the second crew member would attempt identification with the field glasses, this information completed the report. The most active Airport was Goose Pool (now South Durham & Cleveland) and during the war operated Squadrons of Halifax and Lancaster Bombers. These would be plotted, reported both out going and on return.


Training took place at meetings held at Manor House. Black silhouette aircraft images were projected to screen via an epidiascope, made from a bulk 56lb Wood Butter box with a lens from an ancient Bayston slide projector fixed in the longer side. Illuminated by 2x 100w bulb holders fitted to the base, with shades suitably cut out to direct a beam towards the lens. The shades were made from A1 size vegetable cans and the inside of the box was painted white. The image to be viewed was placed on a cut out in the lid and a mirror suitably fitted directed the image to the lens. You couldn't nip down to a store and buy a projector! Proficiency certificates were issued for tests successfully taken.

Uniform: in addition to the 2 piece RAF top & trousers we had service type gas mask and steel helmet.

Known Incidents: One morning during the early hours a German aircraft being harassed by fighters, jettisoned a string of bombs in the field between what is now Pineridge and the F3 Post. These exploded and much of the shrapnel went into a haystack between the point of explosion and the Post, so the haystack saved the Post and the Crew from damage and possible injury. Aircraft returning from raids would often have irregular sound beats indicating trouble, engine failure. These were plotted back to Goosepool, we hope to a successful landing. Bill Bayston
