Sedgefield In Bloom Update

Judges from Northumbria in Bloom visited Sedgefield on July 20 and the national judges will be here on August 12 from 9.30 am.

Their walking tour of the village centre takes in Ceddesfeld gardens as well as the village green and surrounding area, then they drive through the village, stopping off to see the vintage seed drill, restored by students from the Community College (pictured with teacher Chris Young). The judges are sure to admire the beautiful tubs, troughs and hanging baskets provided by village residents and commercial premises, as well as our hard working team of gardeners and volunteers. The judges will drive out towards the industrial estate, noting the newly planted roundabouts and mangers beneath the village signs. Then onto the Winterton estate and NetPark, before visiting Hardwick Park and the racecourse. Hardwick Hall Hotel has generously agreed to provide complimentary accommodation for the Britain in Bloom judges, which will give them an opportunity to spend more time in the park than their schedule usually allows. The hotel also kindly donated plants from its nursery. The community involvement has been tremendous this year and Sedgefield in Bloom is very grateful to all those who have provided support, sponsorship, inspiration and muscle to make the village look so beautiful. As well as touring the village, the judges will also see a presentation, display and DVD showing Sedgefield in action throughout the year. The portfolio

the judges receive before their visit also explains the extent of our community involvement, horticultural achievements, environmental awareness and future plans. These include working with the residents of Willowdene Care Home to develop their garden, encouraging use of the community plot at the new Winterton allotments and improving the recycling of garden material at the new composter site in the cemetery. Working together, we can all play our part in bringing gold to Sedgefield in Bloom.

Northumbria in Bloom judges Eddie Wardrobe and Valerie Giles met students from Sedgefield Community College on their recent visit to the town. With teacher Chris Young, the students had undertaken an ambitious project to renovate a vintage seed drill donated by a local farmer. Restored to its former glory and beautifully

planted by members of the Sedgefield in Bloom team, the vintage machine takes pride of place at one of the entrances to the town. Chairman Ian Sutherland said, "The judges were very impressed by our team's efforts, the level of community involvement and the standard of horticultural achievement in and around Sedgefield."

As well as beautiful flowerbeds, tubs and hanging baskets in the centre of the town, roundabouts have been planted with trees, shrubs and grasses. Begonias tumble from troughs beneath brand new blue and gold Sedgefield signs and topiary horses prance around the racecourse. Shops, cafes, pubs and restaurants are a blaze of colour and local residents take great pride in showing off Sedgefield in Bloom. The judges also visited Ceddesfeld Gardens, Hardwick Park, NetPark and the new community garden and allotments at Winterton. Community Development Officer Angela Simpson said, "We are very grateful to everyone who has contributed to the success of this first judgment day and we now look forward to August 12, when the Britain in Bloom judging takes place." Sedgefield has won 14 awards in Northumbria in Bloom, taking a gold medal in 2009. In the national competition, their category of Best Small Town includes Keswick, Garstang in Lancashire and Aghohill in Northern Ireland. The competition is organised by the Royal Horticultural Society and results are announced in September.

Snapshots of Sedgfield



August's Snapshot shows Rectory Row School in 1924. On the middle of the front row, the blond boy with the striped tie is the late Gordon Swinbank and, on the row behind, the second girl from the right is Dulcie Claxton. Now 93, Dulcie (nee Bell) of Thurlow Grange, has a phenomenal memory about Sedgfield and its shops. She vividly remembers Johnny Mowbray's shop and warehouse, featured in July's Snapshots of Sedgfield, although she has no idea why it is described as Italian. He sold everything for a penny, from pins and needles to sweets, biscuits, treacle, paraffin, Brooke Bond tea and a penny twist of salt. The warehouse was in Cross Street, opposite the present day pottery. The shop was round the corner, next to Johnny's house, which was connected by a tunnel to the fish shop, also his. There was a second fish shop in Sedgfield, Bill Smith's, where, in exchange for some newspapers, you got a free bag of chips. Not at Johnny Mowbray's though. He only used clean white paper for wrapping.

Bob Waller, resident in Fishburn since 1956, but Sedgfield born and bred, remembers Johnny Mowbray's shop for lamp oil and deliveries by horse and cart. Joy Armstrong's grandfather used to drive the delivery cart and worked, with his wife, in Johnny's fish shop. Lesley Tate, a friend of the Jacobs', who provided Mowbray's carrier bag in the first place, has looked at census records and discovered that John H. Mowbray was born about 1876. His father William Mowbray, a blacksmith, lived with his family at 100 Front Street in 1871 before moving to the Tenements as a lodger and blacksmith by 1881. The rest of the family lived in Eastwell Street, also with a lodger, William Bedford, an agricultural labourer, aged 60. By 1891, Ann, apparently widowed by now, was a grocer in East End with 15 year old John. By 1901, Johnny Mowbray was 25 and a grocer's assistant to his mother Ann, now described as a grocer in her own account, with a shop on Front Street.

Johnny worked a six day week, only taking Sunday off, when he got dressed up in his suit to go to church. On New Year's day, kids would queue outside his shop until he threw pennies out. First in line got a shilling ! The kids used to play outside Johnny's shop with its big window and paraffin lamp. They played a game called First and Last Letters, a bit like I Spy. For instance, Liquorice Allsorts would be LS. First to guess correctly got chased to the kerbside and kicked!

Dulcie remembers being sent with a pint pot to buy two pennorth of black treacle from a big can like the ones petrol came in. A quarter of custard creams cost tuppence for five biscuits. Johnny also sold pills, which may explain the patent "Lily" advertised on the carrier bag. Dulcie never bought corsets from him, but she and her mates would buy a tuppenny box of Pond's face powder and daub it on with a hanky. Sweet cachous came in different colours, but they preferred the red ones, because they could use them for lipstick.

Johnny never married, but had various housekeepers, including a Miss Sheldon, who was with him a long time.

When he gave up the shop, it was taken over by a man called Croft. Dulcie has many other memories of Sedgfield shops and characters, which I hope to include in a later edition. I am very grateful to her for sharing her fascinating memories and for lending the school photo showing herself aged seven. The Headteacher is Mr. Shaw and the lady teacher is either Miss Nichol or Miss Fairless. Can anyone name the other children or recall memories of school days ? Community SAFETY



Home Security a Brief Reminder

During the summer period with changeable weather it is all too easy to forget about the open window the unlocked door, your chance forgetfulness is the chance the thief or burglar is waiting for.

Garden Security, mark your valuables with your post code using a simple UV pen (available at most stationers) and don't leave tools etc out unattended, lock them away preferably out of site. Install one of the many low-cost security alarms available and readily useable in a shed location.

Door Callers, Trading Standards, the Police & N/H/Watch urge everyone to not buy at the door.

It is usually a costly exercise and gives the dishonest their opportunity to con honest folk out of their cash at best or actually steal from them at worst. Why not display a No Cold Calling Home sticker and ignore any uninvited callers - especially those who ignore your notice.

Stickers are still available free from the Town Council Offices (next to the Doctor's Surgery).

Walk in Theft, this happens to the least expecting & often to someone who is usually careful.

Police *Crime Prevention* continually stress the need to keep doors locked or secure even when you are in the house and *especially* during the fine weather when you might be in & out of the garden; opportunist thieves do operate in our area.

N/H/Watch advice is for householders to: -

- Keep the door chain or door bar on at all times, especially when answering the door.
- If in doubt keep them out, a locked door prevents unwanted visitors.

Door bars are still available, now from our Community Warden, Tim Spearey. Remember just having a clearly visible deterrent in place really does help to deter the casual thief, who will try elsewhere. There are many alarms available today from simple vibration detectors (easily attached to windows, frames etc.), movement detectors, security lights etc. talk to our Crime Prevention Officer, Keith Lownds if you have any doubts or simply want to be better informed. Keith is always available at our N/Hood Watch meetings, if you want a casual contact - rather than phone him.

Alarms

Sedgefield's Crime Prevention Officer has previously demonstrated (at the Neighbourhood Watch meeting) very useful alarms including a wireless PIR/ alarm unit and a unique "alarmed" pad-lock both available at reasonable cost; and of course there are numerous similar devices readily available from normal retail sources. Just having a clearly visible deterrent in place really does help to deter the casual thief, who will try elsewhere.

No Cold Calling House Notice / Stickers

These are still available from the Town Council Offices - free.

For the majority of "Cold Callers" the notices seem to act as a good deterrent but of course there are still several individuals who will choose to ignore them and be a nuisance to you *in their own interests - not yours!*

From experience it seems clear that if complaints are made to companies by individual householders (ask for a response in writing) most organisations will confirm that they don't want their reps annoying the general public and consequently running the risk of damaging their reputation, and they will take steps to reprimand the offender. So if you are sufficiently irritated by a rep ignoring your notice let the company know - give them a flea in their ear. If you display a No Cold Calling Home sticker and still get door knocked, options to consider: -

- Do not answer the door (waste their time not yours).
- If you do answer the door, ask them for their name/I.D., their company telephone details, then ask why they ignored the notice & finally ask them to leave. Then take the time & trouble to report them to their organisation & seek an apology etc in writing. Pass details on to either the N/Hood Watch or our Police Liaison Officer Neil Langthorne (see below).
- If any you receive any abuse try & obtain their personal details, make a note of their description & contact the Police immediately.
- If the caller is suspicious in any way, try & obtain their personal details, make a note of their description & contact the Police immediately.

Flask in the Fridge

Please remember to update your data sheet inside the flask, following any change to either your medication or to your health.

If the Emergency Services are called to help you, it is vital that the information which is your information, is accurate & up to date.

PC Todd reports

Crime remains low in and around the village with only 5 reported crimes. However, there has been a small increase in anti-social behaviour over the same period. The focus of this negative behaviour centres around the cemetery and allotment site. Youths are gathering and using timbers to make shelters and dens. They leave behind rubbish and beer cans. This behaviour is upsetting for the many visitors to the cemetery, not forgetting the members of staff who have to clean up. Please, if you are a parent or if you are one of the persons responsible, remember that we should show some respect for the families who find comfort in visiting the cemetery. Crimes reported include damage to windows in Ceddesfeld Hall, damage to a vehicle in Stockton Road, attempted theft of lead in Hardwick Park, theft of a fork lift (recovered nearby in NetPark) and theft of a van in Racecourse Road.

A meeting was held recently in the Golden Lion. No reports were made that required further action from members.

P.A.C.T. meeting

At a meeting held after the Pub Watch meeting it was decided that the priority this month would be persons who park within the Zebra Crossing area. The zig zag lines are there for a reason. Anyone found parking in this area will receive a £60 fine and 3 points on their licence.

Jottings for July from Residents Forum

There was no Forum meeting in July, we cancelled it as it fell on the same night as the Area Action Partnership Forum meeting for our area and we felt it important not to conflict with an important meeting which residents might want to attend. The Area Action Partnership (AAP) was established by Durham County Council (DCC) in the reorganisation to a single local authority. To remind you of what the AAP was set up to do:-

The purpose of the AAP is to be a mechanism through which the Council works with local communities and partner organisations to make sure those local services meet local needs and that the voice of the community is heard within the service development process. It enables councillors, residents and partners to come together to influence priorities and take decisions in the light of local needs and circumstances. It focuses on local actions to help the Council and its partners to tackle inequalities and narrow the gap between different areas and it also delivers locally agreed improvements that are important to communities within its area.

AAPs will focus on the following key overarching principles:

- Engage and involve local people, service providers such as Police, Fire Service and local Councillors so they can work together to tackle local issues.
- Allow local people to get involved in influencing decisions that affect their area and guide the spending of the AAP budget.
- Take action on local issues.
- Monitor the effectiveness of local services.

The AAP started work in July 09 and has not received a great deal of attendance from local residents. DCC do view the AAP as the major way in which it will consult and involve local communities; so if we don't engage in it, it will be seen that we have chosen not to give a view.

It would be really helpful for us at the Residents Forum to hear any views you may have on the AAP process and maybe how we could get more residents taking an interest. If you have any comments or suggestions could you pop a note into the Town Council office for the attention of the Residents Forum or email your comments to sedgefieldnews@hotmail.com marked AAP comments.

The next Residents Forum meeting is at 7pm on August 2nd in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall we will hopefully; by then have some feedback from the issues sent to the Local Government Ombudsman and the two questions from residents which we have asked DCC under the Freedom of information Act. Everyone is welcome so come along and hear what is going on and give your views.

I was privileged to attend a very special event in July, down in London village. On 16th July 1985, North East athlete Steve Cram set the first of three world records in just 19 days. In a remarkable sequence of races, Steve took the 1,500m, mile and 2,000m records, beating the times previously set by Said Aouita, Seb Coe and John Walker. This achievement is still regarded as one of the most impressive in athletics history and to celebrate its 25th anniversary, a 'posh do' was held a few weeks ago. The guest of honour was of course Steve Cram, but Aouita, Coe and Walker were all there (together for the first time since the 1980s), along with other sporting stars such as Michael Johnson, Paula Radcliffe, Kelly Holmes, Sally Gunnell, Barry McGuigan and Daley Thompson. Even Des Lynam put in a typically smooth appearance and a Back to the Future specification DeLorean car added some Hollywood glamour to the evening (the film was released 25 years ago). The Jarrow Arrow (or more correctly Jarra Arra) was pretty much unbeatable back in 1985 and although Steve never claimed an Olympic gold during his career, he is quite rightly regarded as one of the greats of middle distance running, from an era dominated by Brits. Like almost every great athlete, his ascent to the top of his sport began at his local club,

There has been a healthy growth in membership of Sedgefield Harriers in recent months – and most of the new recruits seem to be women. It is noticeable that there seems to be an increase around the country of women taking to running to improve their lifestyle and fitness.

Recent initiatives at Sedgefield Harriers, including two sessions run in partnership rather than directly by the club, have helped fitness runners bridge the gap and be a part of group runs without initially having to make a commitment to join a formal club. Of course, once the first step is taken, it soon becomes apparent that clubs are not solely for serious competitors. Many of the sessions led at Sedgefield Harriers have a big social element and women particularly find comfort and support in running as a part of a group.

The Wednesday evening 7.45pm session is a good example, the group covering four to five miles at a comfortable pace. Monday at 7.30pm is also a good place to start. Once in a club, new members usually find out that they have nothing to worry about and they match other runners with no problem – it seems that

everyone has the same doubts and fears when they first start out. Another benefit of club membership is access to experienced coaches who can give tips and advice about progression and goals to go with the advice on routes, clothing, distance, footwear and so on that all runners appreciate. And if you're aiming for a charity run or the Great North Run there will always be someone else who is doing the same.

But just because the Harriers seem to be attracting a lot of women these days doesn't mean to say that men aren't welcome! Whatever your ability, the club will be pleased to see you. Sedgefield Harriers Juniors have also been attracting new members recently, some by finding the club online and a lot as a result of the relationships coach Marie Walker has built up with local schools. The club has a first class coaching structure, providing the opportunity for young people to try out in a full range of disciplines from shot put to sprints before finding where their talent lies and going on to compete if they want to.

This winter there will be a particular emphasis on developing the endurance teams at the club with the clear aim of winning in some age groups at the North East Championships. Young athletes often surprise themselves when they go along to a club session. There is a major pool of talent at the club that is fully coach supported. If you want to be a part of a winning team now is a good time to join.

Well done to Harrier Katherine Crosby who, along with her cousins, staged a charity 10k run in Brinsworth near Rotherham on Sunday 4th July in memory of her uncle Kevin Robinson. An incredible 268 runners took part including Jonathan Wallace, Kerryanne Everett, Rob Morrison and Diane Baines as well as Katherine and John Crosby from Sedgefield Harriers. All proceeds went to cancer charity.

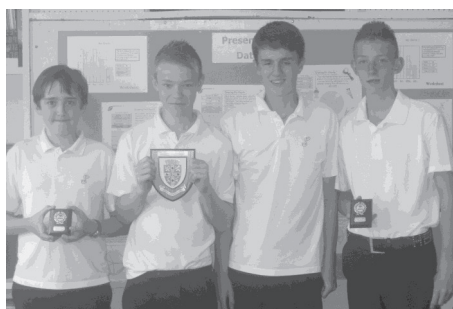
Sedgefield Village Veterans Jottings

Butterwick Moor Wind farm

At a meeting held at Ceddesfeld Hall on 19th July a Community Liaison Group was established to provide a link between E-on, the company developing this wind farm, and local communities. E-on have now commenced construction of the Butterwick Moor wind farm. Access for construction has been established just North of the A689 at Waterloo Corner. The development will consist of 10 wind turbines each assembled from 8 large prefabricated components such as blades, hub, tower sections, etc. These will be brought to the site as large loads travelling on the A689 starting about the 7th September. Everything will be done to minimise traffic disruptions but 80 large loads arriving over a month does require careful planning. More details of these unusual loads will be published next month in the Sedgefield News. In the meantime you can keep up to date with information about the development by going to www.eon-uk.com, go to the 'generation' tab and 'planning for the future' tab.

Car Boot Sale

I received a copy of 'Sedgefield News' from my mother today, along with a copy of 'Sedgefield Extra' as my Uncle, Allan Blakemore has recently been elected as Mayor of Sedgefield and was featured on the front cover. (Congratulations Uncle Allan!)

I myself have never been a Sedgefield resident, having been brought up in Fishburn, though I note that 'Sedgefield News' is in fact produced 'for the people of Sedgefield, Bradbury, Mordon and Fishburn.' I did however attend Sedgefield Comprehensive School, (as it was then) and my Mother and stepfather, Rose Mary and Bob Gott live in Sedgefield, as do several Aunts, Uncles, and Cousins. I am a regular visitor to both Sedgefield and Fishburn, and will be visiting over the coming Summer.

I have written to you for two reasons. One is to congratulate you on your newsletter. These are a real asset in bringing a community together, for highlighting up and coming events and for recognising local peoples achievements. If I didn't live so far away, (Suffolk!) I would gladly offer to help out with delivering this very worthwhile medium.

My second reason for writing is to express my absolute amazement at the content of one of the contributions featured on your 'Your Letters' page, headed 'Car Boot.'

Now I myself have not attended

Sedgefield Car Boot Sale for a long time, probably approaching twenty years in fact. However I regularly attend car boot sales within both Norfolk and Suffolk, living on the border of the two as I do. These Car Boot Sales are for the most part EXTREMELY well attended, both buy sellers and buyers. My point is this: Not one SINGLE car boot that I have attended charges buyers for entering. I find it incredible that the organisers of Sedgefield Car Boot Sale not only charge, but that they have even had the bare faced audacity to implement a two tier payment system, which they then fail to operate properly as highlighted in Mr & Mrs Mays letter! As was also stated in the letter, there were approximately 300 stalls, which at an average fee of £6.00 per stall will have generated an income of £1800.00 – for one mornings work!!! To then charge an entry fee is an example of pure, unadulterated greed on the part of the organisers, particularly as not all stallholders had had an opportunity to get in and set up their stalls, thus denying paying 'buyers' from perusing their wares! I strongly advise the people of Sedgefield and the surrounding villages to boycott this Car Boot Sale, until they come into line with the vast majority of Car Boot Sales and allow free admission. Further to this, I might suggest that The Trading Standards Agency might be interested in the organisers failure to adhere to a minimum standard. This country is in the grip of the worst economic crisis for decades, and I would urge the organisers to examine their collective consciences and abolish their admission fees, and get their act together and ensure all stallholders are in and set up before they 'open up.'
