# Allan Smart, 1928 - 2021. A tribute from family, friends and the community he supported

It is with great sadness that we report Allan's passing on 27th June, at the age of 92. He had been ill for some time and died peacefully at home with his family around him. He and his beloved wife, Nancy (pictured here at a birthday party in Ceddesfeld Hall) had just celebrated 70 years of marriage. A colourful character, much-loved in Sedgefield, where he had lived for over 50 years, Allan enjoyed nothing so much as a chat, so a ten-minute trip to the local shop often took at least an hour!

Born in August 1928 in Kelloe, the only child of George, an overman at Kelloe Pit, and Nellie. Allan had 39 cousins, George being one of eleven children! Allan followed his father down the mine, where he worked as a fitter until 1971. He met Nancy (a Yorkshire lass) whilst doing his National Service and they married in 1951. During Allan's time at Kelloe Pit he had two serious accidents which he recovered from, but after a trip down the pit herself, Nancy, appalled by the conditions, persuaded Allan to leave the mine. He initially became an Education Welfare Officer but then trained as a Social Worker at Newcastle Polytechnic. These two very different careers provided him with a fund of great anecdotes. Nancy reckons that his job as a Social Worker was at times just as dangerous as working down the pit!

Prior to 'life underground' Allan served four years post war National Service in the Royal Engineers stationed in Hamelin, Germany where he made sure to learn the 'local lingo'. Fluent in German, he made lifelong friends with several brave individuals who had been dissidents during the war years, some of whom were imprisoned for their beliefs. Allan maintained these relationships over many years, often travelling back and forth to Germany accompanied by his family. Both his daughter Helen and granddaughter Ruth went on to study German at University, so the chain has not been broken.

His time in the Royal Engineers had fostered a concern for the welfare of Service families, which led to him taking on voluntary casework for SSAFA after he had retired. He completed over 1,000 cases for them and in 2008 Allan was given the SSAFA-Forces Help 15-year Award. He also undertook voluntary work for the Anglican Diocesan Adoption Agency, his social work having given



him a particular concern for the welfare of children from disadvantaged backgrounds. Even after many years he was invited to the weddings of several adoptees. Allan and Nancy have lived in Sedgefield for over 60 years and both took an active part in village life. Allan was a founder member of the Sedgefield Community Association, serving on its committee for many vears and eventually becoming its Honorary President. Of course, his 80th and 90th birthdays were celebrated in Ceddesfeld Hall and well into his eighties he could still be found pulling a pint and chatting to locals in the bar at Ceddesfeld. Nancy often said that their friend Judith did all the working whilst Allan did all the talking!

He was an important part of the Mediaeval Fayre and of the annual drama festival, being very involved with Sedgefield Players. He could boast of taking part in an open-air production of A Midsummer Night's Dream at Ceddesfeld Hall. A stalwart supporter, the Players were always glad to see him in the audience, especially for a comedy or panto, where his welcome chuckles provided a brilliant soundtrack to the show. His support for the Lyrics choirs would manifest itself in postcards from the self-styled "Arts correspondent of the Exchange & Mart", pushed through the youth choir leader's letterbox the day after a concert and by his own special request, Lirica sang at his funeral. Allan had a passion for history and regularly consumed huge tomes, often biographies of politicians to the left of the political agenda! He also had a phenomenal memory for dates and events.

In fact, Allan was interested in people from all walks of life and took note of their stories. He was one of the 'old school' who valued courtesy and politeness (though he did know some rude jokes!). He was amusing but compassionate and very kind when people were in distress. There are many in Sedgefield who can attest to that, and he was very proud to be given one of the first Sedgefield Citizen of the Year Awards in 2001.

Allan summed up his philosophy as 'try to put more into life than you take out'. As his life admirably demonstrated, he practised what he preached. A devoted family man and a kind friend, it is no exaggeration to say this place has lost a true friend. Sedgefield will miss him.

# **Diversity at Sedgefield Community College**

# Reading scheme for long Covid patients

Patients being treated for long-term effects of coronavirus in County Durham and Darlington are benefitting from a new mental health and wellbeing initiative.

The Reading Well initiative, by The Reading Agency, is providing book collections to support patients in the region being treated for post covid syndrome, also known as long Covid. The books are being provided to the County Durham Care Partnership for the long COVID clinic at Sedgefield Community Hospital. Curated by health experts, the book collections have been carefully selected to provide helpful information for managing common mental health conditions and dealing with difficult feelings and experiences with this new physical condition.

# **Protecting our planet**

Year 2 have worked incredibly hard during their final learning enquiry which was all about saving our beautiful planet.

They began their enquiry with science "instil" lessons where they focused on living things and animal habitats.

The children then moved onto geography lessons, where they researched the seven continents and five oceans. During these lessons, the children realised the importance of helping our amazing planet, oceans and animal habitats.

The children discussed a variety of different ways on how they could raise awareness of the issues relating to climate change, deforestation, pollution, and the damage to animal habitats.

This resulted in them contacting the WWF to research the issues further. To end their learning enquiry, the children created a clay sculpture representing the planet and what we can do to protect it.

Year 2 were delighted when WWF acknowledged and praised their hard work with a message just for them!

# **BUSINESS UPDATE**

#### **Durham University goes into Orbit**



Durham University has opened its £1.4m Orbit area at NETPark to support small and medium sized technology and science businesses in the region. Businesses will get targeted guidance and support from Durham University's researchers and their partners, CPI and Business Durham. Companies will have access to flexible, private or collaborative office spaces and will be able to be join networking events and skills workshops.

Businesses who are interested are encouraged to get in touch with the University to see how they can be supported. They can sign up for a private office, hot desk or virtual membership on flexible terms. The development at NETPark was delivered by several North East companies including Vest Construction, Space Architects, Identity Consult and Cundall.



# **NETPark powers smart labels**



The National Printable Electronics Centre, part of the Centre for Process Innovation (CPI), based at NETPark has provided crucial support to help develop a new battery technology to enable goods to be tracked using smart labels. The labels, developed by London-based company Reelables, can be attached to objects like a sticker and can be tracked using a phone app. This makes them ideal for tracking goods and it is hoped the project will lower production costs and drive growth within the printed electronics industry.

This development is an example of the Internet of Things. The Internet of Things is a network of physical objects, from labels to fridges, with embedded software allowing them to connect, and exchange data, with other devices and systems over the Internet.



CPI led the 12-month feasibility study to develop the low-cost battery that would be printed onto each smart label's circuit. The battery is much smaller, and more affordable, than existing solutions.

# **Casa expands with Café**

Once again, our intrepid journalists, were dispatched to check out the latest café opening in Sedgefield.

Casa Café has been set up by Christina, who many of you will know from her other business, Casa Yoga, which now operates from the same building, which is centrally located on The Square.



The café has been designed to coordinate with the yoga practice, with soothing colours and beautiful photographs (by Tina Veeranna) of Hardwick Park covering the walls.

There are lots of healthy choices on the menu with plenty of vegan, vegetarian and gluten free options and some treats for that special occasion.

Where possible, the food and drink items are locally sourced, and we spotted Parlour Made cheese on the menu. We enjoyed a light lunch of red pepper and goat's cheese paninis washed down with Shmoo milkshakes.

There are tables inside and outside, and take-out is available. The dessert menu has just launched – so we'll have to go back to check this out.





# Fishburn Memorial Garden opens

In December 2020, we reported that Fishburn Parish Council were raising money to create a place of remembrance and respect for those we have lost.

We are delighted to report that the garden was officially opened by Paul Howell MP on 10 July with Fishburn Band playing and attended by many supporters from the village.

Organiser Sandra Dowson explained, "It all came from having nowhere to go to remember my gran and so as a parish councillor, I approached the parish with a drawing and after a lot of hard work and sheer determination, the end result is there to be seen.

Lots of other cemeteries have this sort of thing so why not Fishburn. I love where I live and wanted the village to have somewhere they could sit and reflect in peaceful surroundings."

# STEVE'S NATURE DIARY AUGUST 2021

#### By the time you read this we will be half way through "The Wildlife Trusts" Marine Week which officially finishes on 8 August so you still just have enough time to do something fishy!

Staycations mean more of us are set to discover the delights of our shores and coastal waters, as we visit the seaside for a summer break. The Wildlife Trusts' National Marine Week is celebrating the intriguing, weird and wonderful lives of shore dwellers and coastal citizens: solar powered anemones; fish which dupe their rivals; rockpool residents battling the elements, and sometimes each other.

Situated where we are, not far from the coast, whether it is sand dunes and little terns at Seaton Carew, rock pools at Redcar or Saltburn or a number of other seaside locations, it's good to spend some time by the sea with big skies and wide open spaces. If you look closely in rock pools and encourage the children (and adults) not just to concentrate on crabs, you can find beautiful creatures such as sea anemones and occasionally small fish.

Battered by waves then exposed as the tide retreats, rock pools are tough places to live in. The extraordinary snakelocks anemone harnesses solar power through symbiotic algae, which live in its bright green stinging tentacles. The algae turn sunlight into energy for the anemone, which is why snakelocks live in the sunniest spots in the pool. In return, the algae get benefits in the form of protection and nutrients.

With rockpool space at a premium, the seemingly serene beadlet anemone defends its place by deploying a ring of bright blue beads full of stinging cells and battling against opponents. Clamped tight until the tides cover them, cone shelled limpets zigzag around, feeding on algae scraped off rocks with their tongue, one of the world's strongest biological structures! Returning to their home patch,

limpets sometimes clash shells; trying to tip each other over or prise their opponent from a rock. No one's quite sure why, it could be territory or feeding disputes, but one thing's for sure they're not the motionless shells they appear to be.

The tompot blenny (below), a colourful fish with a punk hair do, and a big character, is rusty brown with an impressive pair of red head tentacles. It can occasionally be spotted in rockpools, more often in rocky crevices in shallow water.

Our seas are home to over half of all our wildlife, they provide oxygen for every other breath you take, and visiting the coast can improve mental and physical health. This is why it's so important that more and better protection is given to the waters around our shores. National Marine Week is a chance to celebrate our amazing seas, and I'd urge people to make the most of the coast and enjoy events hosted by organisations either locally or throughout the UK.

Sedgefield Playgroup Closure

# It is with great regret that on the 25th May, we had to announce the permanent closure of Sedgefield Playgroup.

Sedgefield Playgroup was founded on the 21st October 1966 by parents who wanted to create a social, learning and caring environment for pre-school children. It was based, as it always has been, in Sedgefield Methodist Hall. At the time of its launch there was no nursery provision in the village and children did not start school until the year that they were 5. Children could be left by their parents for a half-day session, where they were encouraged to learn socialisation skills in a play environment. Education was also an important element, with a strong emphasis on arts and crafts.

Sedgefield Playgroup proved very successful and popular with parents and children alike. Demand was so high that it ran morning and afternoon sessions. Other playgroups in the village soon followed, all parent led. Over the years increasing

government regulation has made the

running of playgroups more complex and difficult. There were benefits to increased regulation, such as police record checks, education frameworks and health and safety but there were also problems caused by them. The amount of paperwork and record keeping demanded by Ofsted were not appropriate for volunteer groups.

Early Years provision has also improved within Sedgefield, with both primary schools offering excellent nursery services. Over the years free nursery education has been lowered in age, meaning most children now have a place at the age of 3.

All of these factors have contributed to the slow demise of all of the playgroups until only ours was left in Sedgefield. We operated three sessions a week and had good attendance for 2-3 year olds in the village; unfortunately we could not survive the COVID pandemic.

We closed our doors on the 18 March 2020 for the last time at the start of the COVID outbreak. With no income and only a small bank balance (as we have always run as a non-profit group) the cost of reopening would now be prohibitive.

#### Your LETTERS 2 Planning application: Community athletics track

We have recently been informed of a planning application for the formation of a community athletics track facility with associated floodlighting, access, car parking, drainage and landscaping. Reference DM/21/01984/FPA, which can be accessed online <u>https://publicaccess.durham.gov.uk</u>

Whilst the Harriers vision for their own track should be applauded, we feel that this site is unsuitable and will only benefit a minority of people whose interests are athletics. Local residents are greatly concerned by the proximity of this site to our homes and its location next to Sedgefield Development Trust's Woodland and Wildlife Group. Most residents that live here do so because it is a quiet, peaceful countryside location.

I am concerned that people are unaware of where the proposed track is to be located and may not be aware that the application has been submitted? Local people have been told that the site for the track is earmarked for development. This is incorrect. The site proposed for the track is included in the County Durham Plan as a Safeguarded Employment Site for the future expansion of NETPark beyond the current plan period. The council state they have no requirement for this site for NETPark until 2045.

The development of the athletics track facility is against the land allocation in the recently adopted County Durham Plan and would not be a sustainable development with most people travelling by car. We do not believe the benefits of this proposed facility outweigh the negative impact upon the landscape, ecology or the noise and disturbance to nearby residents and wildlife. If you do not want to see Sedgefield unnecessarily lose another wildlife rich greenfield site when there are other, better located and more sustainable sites in the area, then you have a right to have your views heard. The final date for comments is 29 July, however I believe all comments and objections will be included even if received after this date.

#### **Kynren Returns**

August 2021 sees the return of the hugely popular Kynren performances at Bishop Auckland.

The premise is an ambitious one; to

present 2000 years of the history and mythology of Great Britain in 90 minutes, utilising a cast of over 1,000 performers in a beautiful setting on a warm summer evening; the show always delivers, even when the weather does not. This unusual format, a fusion of art, drama, fireworks display and historical reenactment has been so popular that it has drawn rave reviews & over 250,000 visitors from all over the world.

# Architecture & Arts at Ushaw College

Ushaw College has been expanding its range of artistic events in recent



years and over the last year of lockdowns its buildings, parks & grounds, enhanced with the work of outdoor contemporary artist Steve Messam, became a real highlight during fine weather.



The buildings alone are well worth a visit, being among the finest examples of Victorian Gothic architecture anywhere in the country, and designed by three generations of the Pugin family. The buildings are best appreciated on one of the architectural tours that Ushaw operates, accompanied by a knowledgeable and likeable guide. Free to annual pass holders, the cost otherwise is just £5.

The college also houses an exceptional collection of art, including the finest collection of Karl Hoffman sculptures anywhere in the world, as well as five significant Franz von Rohden paintings.

There is currently a temporary exhibition of 36 paintings from the artist Mark Fairnington alongside objects from Ushaw's collection, and on 3 August Fairnington will give a talk at Ushaw about the exhibition, which is titled *Relics*.
