

A message from Martin King

Rector of Sedgefield

"Go, join the human race" - a word for Christmas.

Clergy need to be more mischievous. Much less pious. Not exactly "un-holier than thou", but certainly feet-on-the-ground.

One of the great experiences of my student days was to go on a residential conference with several hundred other students. We struggled with mind blowing new ideas about theology, about the church in society, about missionary work in

Britain and overseas - all sorts of intoxicating things for eager young minds.

One speaker, a huge Canadian, had transformed a Leeds housing estate parish. Part of his strategy was to take Communion services in people's houses before the early shift - so it might be 5 a.m., but the kitchen table would be ablaze with candles (and the curtains open so passers by could see something odd was going on).

It was a way of signalling that the Lord can and does come into your house - he's not confined to the church building. I have often found this myself in praying with sick or elderly people in their homes or in hospital.

He was concerned that when he spoke in the pulpit it often seemed as though a magic surplice had come over his words, smothering them with fog, and they failed to be heard by the people in the pews. His message didn't connect inside the church building, let alone outside it. And one urgent piece of advice has stayed with me ever since:

"Go, join the human race!"

I recall this advice frequently. One reason I need to is that generally I am one of the last people in Sedgefield to hear of people's troubles with their health, with their bodies, with their prayers or their spiritual battles, their addictions and anxieties at home or at work. And yet what else am I here for? Do people think I'm not really human, so I won't understand?

As though there were three sexes, male, female and clergy?
"Go, join the human race".

At Christmas we recall that the Creator joined the human race. No foggy surplice on him. In doing so he forged a strong connection with all aspects of our nature - what our fingers are doing, what goes on between our ears and between our legs. What goes on in our rages and our fears, as we spend our cash and when we can't find how to meet our children's expectations.

The birth of Jesus shows us that God is loving, not aloof. Committed to us, not complacent. Magnificent, but not wilful. And if clergy, like him, should in some way be "set apart", it must be in the quality and depth of love, not in the alien style of our life.

May you have a splendid
Christmas, connected with those
around you, with your deepest
self, and with the God of
all your nature.

May you notice him in your home and relish his presence.


Community Force has been encouraged to bring their speed indicator into the village on a regular basis to discourage speeding.

Sedgefield Development Partnership Ltd.



This report on Sedgefield Development Partnership's progress is long, I know, but it is part of our effort to be accountable to the people who matter. As that's everyone living in the Sedgefield News area, this seems the ideal place to give some idea of what it's all about.

How we got started

At an Organisations Fair in autumn 2000, Maxine Robinson, as Mayor of Sedgefield, Julia Bowles from CAVOS and I set out reasons why a there should be a 'partnership' for Sedgefield. Within a month we had enough volunteers to get the show on the road. First there was a public open 'forum' where speakers from Trimdon 2000 and Cornforth Partnership told us what they were managing to achieve. People were inspired by what they heard, and agreed on a few basic principles:

- The whole town should have the chance to speak its mind in an 'appraisal'.
- There should be better communications; maybe a web-site and/or a newsletter.
- Learning opportunities should be open to everyone.
- We needed an office and some resources.
- We should try to employ a development worker.
- We would respond to ideas suggested by other village organisations, and in particular, help with the Parish Hall, if asked by the Town Council.

So what have we been doing about all this?

Appraisal: We raised £7,500 through grants from various bodies, plus help in kind, and appointed a respected consultant, Chris Cox & Associates, to carry out the bulk of the work. A questionnaire was sent to every house, followed-up by numerous interviews. Walkabouts were held and volunteers were trained so that they could run focus groups which went ahead this autumn. The final report of the Sedgefield Community Appraisal is about to be published.

Newsletter & Web-site: We have launched Sedgefield News, delivered free to every household in Sedgefield, Bradbury, Mordon and Foxton (regrettably we can't yet reliably deliver to every farm). The newsletter is helped by grant aid of £2,700 and already generates useful income which helps keep it going. We are now working with the Town Council to develop the community web-site, www.sedgefield.net.

Lifelong Learning: A year ago we were awarded a grant of £6,000 to investigate local demand for lifelong learning, and employed Sandy Denney to carry that out. Her thorough, well researched report has led to further support from the Learning and Skills Council (this time of over £23,000) and Bob Harris has been recruited put the recommendations into practice. Sedgefield Community College is very much a partner in this.

Development Worker: So far we have not been able to raise funds to employ a development worker so everything achieved so far has been through voluntary effort. The work load is now very large though, so we must still work towards this.

Office & Resources: We have an office within the Advice & Information Centre, initially through a grant from the Town Council, and we have begun to build up the basic facilities of a Community Resource Centre. A number of organisations are already putting the equipment we have assembled to good use. The overhead projector has proved particularly welcome.

Other ideas and opportunities:

The first really big idea was that there should be a local First Responders Group. Within a very short time the first volunteers were training and we were negotiating for money to buy equipment A year ago Sedgefield First Responders went 'live', well equipped and training regularly so they are ready to cope when the Ambulance Service rings.

The **Community Action Project** was one of the few facilities available to young people in Sedgefield and a wide area around it, but during the last year it became impossible to continue with the project. After much discussion the CAP merged with the Partnership, and in taking over their funds, assets and liabilities we have accepted a moral responsibility that they should be used to benefit young people. We hope to let you know what is proposed very soon.

We also agreed to carry on with 2 projects started by Sedgefield 2000. Working with Sedgefield Rotary Club we now run the annual **Citizen's Award**, and have agreed to keep the very useful **Organisations Directory** updated.

Sedgefield Parish Hall

This was identified as a priority at our first meeting, and the Partnership has re-stated its willingness to help if asked.

Development of the Organisation

We started by drawing up a simple constitution but with grant aid from the Scarman Trust, we have succeeded in becoming a company limited by guarantee, which gives the partnership much more scope to be really useful. The law requires that a company must have a Board of Directors supported by co-opted executive members, and 'memorandums and articles' instead of a constitution. These have all been fulfilled and we have moved on to apply for charitable status. We hope soon to have fully satisfied the requirements of the Charity Commission.

Dealing with public finance

We have taken care to build up a track record as a reliable partner organisation which can be trusted with public, charitable and other monies. We have reported on how grant money is used and projects are undertaken. Also we have joined the Development Trusts Association, the national organisation for partnerships like ours. From the outset we knew that we must have this kind of official 'structure' if we were going to be able to access significant funding and be useful to the community. We have been told by independent observers that what we have done so far has typically taken similar organisations 3 years or more to accomplish.

Volunteers & Members

This progress is all due to the time and effort contributed by individual members and supporters and those who have taken on the responsibilities of the Board and Executive. Above all it is a team achievement and I would like to thank all of them for their work and support.

The Future

Although we have come a long way since the first meeting there is still a lot to do. An independent, not-for-profit organisation like this can add significantly to the community's resources, but if we are to continue being of value we must focus on what is most wanted and needed by the community. Membership of SDP is open to any individual or organisation with willing to commit themselves to our aims. If Sedgefield Development Partnership can continue to be of value, I know it has a bright future. Roger Clubley, Chairman.

Market Charter Found...

Like most of us, the Town Council believed we had a Market Charter granted long before anyone could remember, but where was it, what did it say, was it just myth? Well, the Council asked Helen Clifford-Brown to do some historical research and this is what she found. Sedgefield was granted a market charter in November 1312 by Bishop Kellaw, the Prince Bishop of Durham. The Market was held every Friday and once a year a five day fair was held in November, around the feast of St. Edmund. The charter was confirmed by Bishop Bury in 1330 and Helen found references to the market throughout the 15th and 16th centuries. By the end of the 18th century it was held in the "large square" at the centre of the town, presumably the green. The market obviously had its ups and downs but in 1827 it was "well supplied with corn, poultry, butter etc." However it failed in 1873. In 1918 the market was revived by the WI as part of the 'waste not want not scheme' and is still held on Fridays, now in the Parish Hall.

Helen found the original document from the year 1312 in the Public Records Office in London. You can read her full report. Copies are in the Library and the Advice and Information Centre.

...a Farmer's Market for Sedgefield?

Recently many market towns, in the North East, have successfully established Farmers' Markets, and people have been wondering whether Sedgefield could run one. They are useful in helping local farmers and food producers sell direct to the public, giving them an alternative outlet to the supermarkets. They give their customers access to good, local and distinctively regional foods. The Town Council now wants to discuss the possibility seriously and will explore the idea at a conference in January. The Golden Lion Tuesday Night Darts and Dominoes team

Last year saw the Golden Lion re join the blue star darts and dominoes league after an absence of 10 years. Some of the original members of the team are still present and are relishing the challenge of pitting their skills against other teams from Ferryhill, Trimdon, Spennymoor, Coundon and West Cornforth. Along with the existing members, new members were recruited to join the team to compete on a level with the other 13 teams in the league.

The format is quite simple, a combination of darts and dominoes with the darts having a team game, 5 individuals, 2 pair's games, a captains and a trio game. The dominoes are played as 5 individuals [the first to 5 wins], a captains and a pair's game. Each game has a value of 1 point and is also classed as a league of its own; these points are totalled at the end of the season and a monetary value added to each point.

During the season many battles were hotly fought, with pressure on the players to play well and do the best for the team The standard was high as the league contained many county dart players and wizened domino players, who could tell what you had in your hand, even before you picked them up [beat that Uri Gellar]. Along with 2 Knock-out competitions, the league went on for 9 months so players needed the stamina of a marathon runner. Over the months players followed a strict fitness programme to keep them in top shape for the battles to come, with many a decision on the comparative value of John Smiths bitter against Boddingtons to ensure peak fitness! Dart players were even noticed going for a run over 7'9" to get the darts out of the board before they fell out.

The 'Golden' took the league by storm surprising many teams on the high standard of player's performance and dress. We all had a grey team shirt emblazoned with the pubs name. At the end of the season the team was Runner-up in the champion of champions and the knockout, winning the trio, 2nd pairs and runner up in the individual darts; but most of all, winning many friends.

This year so far the team has got off to a good start and is already through to the Semi final of the champion of champions.

So if you are not doing anything on a Tuesday night and you want to see a range of 'top athletes' competing at a high level come on down to the Golden Lion where you can marvel at the skill and dexterity of the darts and dominoes team. Who knows perhaps you can join in the discussion of which bitter will keep our players in peak condition!

Methodist Medic

Let me share the story of one of the young men of the village... George Simpson. Brought up here, attending the local schools, and also a member of our Methodist Sunday School and Youth Fellowship, he has just begun his 5th year as a medical student at Dundee University. This summer as part of his training, he opted to work for 8 weeks at the Maya Methodist Mission Hospital in Kenya. Thanks to the magnificent sum of £850 raised at our church coffee morning in May, along with gifts from family and friends, he was able to take a supply of much needed medical equipment. He also presented a wonderful donation of £1,320 to the hospital, via the Methodist Mission House. George is now working in Stranraer with local GPs in the hospital there.

Sedgefield Primary Care Trust

This is the organisation which has responsibility for local heath services such as Nurses and GPs. It is literally your local NHS. Managed by a Chief Executive and advised by a committee of clinicians, the Primary Care Trust (PCT) Board currently has 10 members, most of whom are non-executive. This means the Board is mainly drawn from our local communities.

A reasonable question at this point might be 'What difference will this make, if any?' Well, here a just one or two examples:

Many outdated local health centres will be replaced - planning is already underway.

New approaches to delivery of health care will mean even more services being locally provided, reducing long waits for many hospital appointments.

In addition, your PCT is committed to improving its services to you year on year.

One important issue I have not mentioned is your responsibility to help us. Although staffed by dedicated people, health delivery is a kind of business; it has to be paid for!

Take the use of emergency services. Out of hours services are relatively expensive and take a disproportionate amount of time and resources to deliver. Remember your doctor is not the only expert out there. All clinical staff, nurses, pharmacists, etc. are highly trained and can offer basic health advice, especially important over the winter period.
