Daniel Mold 1948 - 2006

Dan was brought up in Thornley vicarage, and from this background he developed strength of character and a quiet dignity as well as a faith which sustained him right through his illness.

His interests were very many: in addition to his close-knit home with Susan and the two girls, he loved nature and was hugely knowledgeable about the weather, rocks and fossils, insects and animals. He enjoyed birdwatching and provided carefully chronicled information to BOT surveys.

Dan was a most regular churchgoer; for several years he was treasurer at St. Edmund's and was an enormous help to me when I arrived in this parish. He loved teaching - his subject was geography, especially outdoor activities, which included camping with students in snow holes, and latterly at East Durham College he prepared students for all the armed services, civil and military, though he was flexible enough to turn his hand to maths and other subjects if necessary. His knowledge of World War I was encyclopaedic.

All this might make him sound a sobersides, but Dan greatly enjoyed comedy - the Goons, Monty Python, Blackadder, the Two Ronnies, Have I got News for You? and so on. He loved real ales and brewed his own, made sloe gin, loved gardening alongside Susan and travelling with her to many parts of the world: throughout Britain, Europe, USA, the Canadian Rockies, Russia, Mexico, Peru (they celebrated their silver wedding at Machu Pichu). Only ten weeks before his death there was an uncomfortably close encounter with a lion in South Africa.

He met Susan as a student, and first showed an interest in her by lending her a book on badgers. This unusual chat-up was to be followed after their marriage by her discovery of a carefully stored harvest mouse in her fridge, and later, a guillemot in the freezer! His idea of a good weekend involved a long walk with Susan and a pub lunch, enjoying the scenery, the birds and flowers, the moors, castles, cathedrals and country houses.

These things strike me most: his tireless energy and willingness to help; his keeping in touch with students and family; his meticulous care, his firmness and fairness. And his faith: his last night on earth, apparently semi-comatose, he expressed his thanks for his life and his hope for heaven.

No more NHS dentistry in Sedgefield

Some of our readers have informed us that they have received notice from our local dental surgery (Chris Edmonds and Associates of Front Street, Sedgefield) that there are important changes ahead which will affect people of all ages living in the Sedgefield area.

For many years this privately owned practice has provided the local population with both NHS and private dental treatment.

Recent discussions between the practice and Sedgefield Primary Care Trust unfortunately resulted in "irreconcilable differences" and from 31st January 2007 the practice has decided to stop offering NHS dental treatment. Patients will instead be offered a "Practice Plan" membership scheme private dental treatment only.

Winter Nights – Security Concerns

With the dark nights comes the Burglar & Sneak Thief's greatest opportunity, so take the time and trouble to help yourself minimise the risk of their Xmas Bonus!

Don't leave your house unlit after dark. Use light timers and draw curtains.

Don't leave valuable items or Xmas presents on show. Lock your doors even when you are at home.

Don't leave your keys where a thief can see them or where they can be hooked and retrieved via the letterbox.

Tell a "trusted" neighbour of any extended periods of absence and ask for their help to push all letters and papers **fully** through the letterbox (& why not complain to the culprits who leave stuff sticking out in the first place?). Report any suspicious persons or out of place vehicles to the Police on 0845 60 60 365

Door Bars are a simple and effective deterrent to the sneak thief or unwelcome visitor; these are available from our local Community Warden **Tim Spearey** who will also fit same if required (Tim's phone details below or contact N/Hood Watch C/man **Ken** Saiger on **621896**).

Visible burglar alarms make burglars think twice and usually they go elsewhere, similarly good exterior lighting usually deters thieves; for advice on these items and other security aspects contact **Neil Langthorne** our local Crime Prevention Officer (see below).

N/Hood Watch are able to provide door/window stickers stating "No Cold Calling" and also a small label to attach to your phone, with the Police & Warden telephone numbers detailed on it; please contact Ken Saiger or your Neighbourhood Watch Street Contact for supply.

Not the Royal Mail - beware of postal scam

The Trading Standards Office are making people aware of the following scam: a card is posted through your door from a company called **PDS** (Parcel Delivery Service) suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them on 0906 6611911 (a premium rate number).

DO NOT call this number: it is a mail scam originating from Belize. If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed $\pounds 15$ for the phone call.

If you do receive a card with these details, then please contact Royal Mail Fraud on 02072396655 or ICSTIS (the premium rate service regulator) at www.icstis.org.uk

Young Persons' Health Event Report published

In January 2004, there was an opportunity for the Patient & Public Involvement Forum Sedgefield to apply for funding to support specific pieces of work. At the time, the government had recently produced its Choosing Health white paper that put forward proposals for how services should encourage the population to live healthier lifestyles.

The Forum, in partnership with Sedgefield Primary Care Trust held Young Persons' Health Events in three schools in the area, with an emphasis on healthy eating and providing information to help children and young people to make decisions about their lifestyle and control their own health. The Forum and the PCT went about doing this through various methods including preparing and providing healthy snacks, fruit smoothiemaking displays, discussion groups, questionnaires and other various exercises which highlighted how to live a healthy lifestyle. Jottings: Sedgefield Village Residents' Forum

From the October meeting:

Ongoing issues were raised and discussed, in particular the relationship between the Forum and the Town Council. Both organisations wish to promote a more efficient way of dealing with issues, which affect our community. The recently published Government white paper will influence this - it would seem that more powers will be given to local authorities, it is therefore increasingly important that the voice of the community is heard and listened to, it also appears that local areas/authorities have three months to address their status e.g. unitary, elected Mayor, directly elected Chief Executive - presumably we are going to be consulted on this! So watch out for information and don't forget we have local elections next May. There are real concerns about the planning application for the wind farm at Butterwick. As always it is not just the people closest to it that will be affected, there are issues that can impact on the whole area. A group is forming to address the proposal - the first priority is to ascertain the time scale i.e. when is the planning meeting etc. to take place. The proposal for 17 windmills is the largest that EON, the applying company, have anywhere - we really need to be aware of the consequences of such a large wind farm in our area - watch out for information or if you would like to get involved with the group now contact the Residents Forum.

Another very concerning piece of information has been highlighted. Whilst not confirmed in writing, rumour has it that bus companies are proposing to stop all buses after 6pm in the village. We can imagine the impact this would have – again, the Forum will try to find out more.

The Forum will have a stand at the Organisations Fayre in the Parish Hall on Saturday 25th November. We may not be able to have someone attending the stand all day but there will be information and an opportunity to leave your contact address if you wish. All Forum info can be found in the usual places, Notice Board, Library, Town Council and the village web sites.

Winterton Hospital War Memorial Service Resurrected

At 10-45am on Saturday 11th November 2006, Sedgefield Veterans held the first service at the above Memorial since Winterton Hospital closed; however, we understand that wreaths have been laid, regularly, without benefit of a service during the interim period.

Father John Caden and Rev. Michael Gobbett officiated and the Mayor of Sedgefield village, Councillor Dudley Waters and the Mayor of Sedgefield Borough, Councillor Lucy Hovvels each laid a wreath. Mr Jackie Brown, President laid a wreath on behalf of Trimdon Branch of the Royal British Legion and Tim Spearey laid one on behalf of Sedgefield veterans. Mr Eric Richards played "Last Post" & "Reveille" on his bugle, interspersed by "The Silence", at 11 o'clock, to correspond with the silencing of the guns on the same date in 1918.

There was a goodly turnout, including Mrs Christine Moore, who owns the site and gave her permission for the service to be held, with the proviso that it is repeated next year, when we hope for a much bigger service and turnout. It will probably be held at 2pm on Sunday 11th November so as not to clash with the service at St Edmunds church. We would also like to thank Durham County Council, Etherley Lane Depot for coming to our rescue, by sending their Simon Snorkel Land Rover across to Sedgefield and putting the cord onto the 25ft. high flag pole, thus enabling us to fly the flag of St George, over the weekend. Sedgefield's leading Sunday league team is St. Edmund's, playing in the Premier Division of the Durham District League. The team had a poor start to the season, but form has really picked up. It was a hard fought game, but St. Edmund's ran out 3-0 winners. The Black Lion missed a few good chances during the match, but St. Edmund's deserved the victory and are looking forward to the next round of the cup and continued success in the league. Crosshills FC are having a mixed season, their first in the Durham District League. Cup success has eluded them, but they are starting to make modest progress in the league. Three wins in a row in October boosted confidence and though the team have since suffered a defeat at the hands of the league leaders, prospects for a good league position remain high.

Junior Football

It's not strictly on our 'patch', but there are plenty of children from Sedgefield who are members of Trimdon Juniors FC, so it's good to know what the club offers. 

Unitarv U-turn? It may be dry reading, but bear with it, because it will affect our lives

You may recall in 2004 we had a Referendum. The issue was Regional Government, but on the back of this, County Durham was asked to vote on proposals for the re-organisation of Local Government, and given two options; either one unitary authority, County Durham Council, or two unitary authorities covering the North and South of the County. The outcome was in favour of one unitary authority, but this could not be implemented because the outcome was tied into the vote for Regional Government being agreed. This was consequently rejected by the voters. Nevertheless it is clear that the status quo is not an option, and now some two years on the Department for Communities and Local Government has issued an invitation to Councils in England to make proposals for the future unitary structures and to pioneer pathfinding new two-tier models. The indicative timetable is as follows:-

Christmas **Cooks' Corner**

Christmas Nut Roast 3 oz butter or margarine 1 medium onion, finely chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed 5 celery sticks, finely chopped 6 oz Brazil nuts, ground 6 oz roasted, ground cashew nuts 2 oz wholemeal breadcrumbs 4 oz mashed potato or parsnip 2 tablespoons chopped parsley 1 teaspoon dried sage 1/2 tspn oregano ¹/₄ tspn ground ginger 1/4 tspn cayenne pepper 1/2 tspn curry powder Juice and rind of $\frac{1}{2}$ a lemon 1 eag, lightly beaten Stock or wine to taste Salt and pepper 8 oz chestnut puree Heat the butter, add the onion and cook until transparent. Add garlic and celery and cook for 1 minute.

Remove from heat and put in a large bowl with the nuts, breadcrumbs, potato, parsley, herbs & spices, lemon rind and juice, egg and stock. Season generously and mix well to give a firm consistency. Press half the mixture into a greaseproof paper lined 2 lb loaf tin. Spread chestnut puree over the mixture. Top with the remaining nut mixture. Bake at 190 C, 375 F, Gas mark 5 for 45-60 minutes until golden brown.

Winterton Lighting

Jan Welsh is a lady with a problem. She has been trying for over 6 months to get 2 street lamps repaired in front of her property at Winterton Park, where the lamps are actually still under the ownership of Miller Homes, not having been adopted by the Council as yet. Miller's technical department tells her the responsibility for repairs lies with contractors EDL... Jan would obviously just like someone to do the repair. As she says, knowing who SHOULD be doing it doesn't make her feel any safer at home. She writes:

"It is very dark in the area and I am very concerned about break-ins, car theft, or tripping and falling, especially now that the dark nights are upon us. Durham County Council are not interested, as the estate has not been adopted, even though I pointed out that if adoption is near they will be inheriting a long outstanding issue which would then cost the local tax payer. I've spoken with neighbours who have been informed the repair is not straightforward; it would involve digging up land as the repair is underground. I spoke to a footpath workman contracted by Miller Homes. He said he would inform his foreman, but other than that he could not help. I had a better response from Sedgefield Borough Council's Community Safety Warden, Colin Mason. He was very helpful, and has contacted Miller Homes expressing concerns for public safety, theft, and injury due to the area being so dark. They told him they are looking at the problem and it will soon be repaired. I'm not holding my breath, but I greatly appreciated the effort made by the Officer".

With luck, by the time we get this month's edition printed and distributed, Jan's problem will be resolved, but this does seem to be a case of the proverbial buck being passed without anyone bothering to stop it! We welcome responses from the other parties involved. Editor

Age Concern offer help to stressed men

Age Concern is trying to dispel the myth that men don't suffer from mental health problems by offering them a chance to read up in the rather unexpected form of a Haynes "Brain Manual" Any man who has used a Haynes manual in their life will instantly recognise the layout more customarily used to describing the internal workings of a mini metro than their brain. This time however, Haynes have teamed up with Dr Ian Banks, who has written the manuals in an entertaining and informative way, cutting through jargon and explaining that men do regularly suffer from mental health problems

There are many reasons for people become vulnerable to developing mental health problems; indeed one in four of us will experience a problem at some stage in our lives. Although these problems affect both men and women, men are much less likely to seek help, finding it hard to admit to the fact that they are feeling fragile and vulnerable to a doctor, ending up talking more about physical than emotional and psychological symptoms.

Mike Bridge, development worker for Age Concern in Sedgefield said "Both the Manual and Mini Manual are well written and are easy reads. It's true that historically men find it harder to talk about their feelings, one thing that the books both do is make us realise that if we're suffering then we're not alone and that there are things that we can do as "blokes" to help ourselves. It offers simple advice that we can take or leave, but by getting one of these manuals anyone is taking a great first step. We've been fortunate to secure 3 of the manuals that normally sell for £17.00 and 20 of the mini manuals, so that we can give them away to the residents of Sedgefield Borough."

All the men of the borough have to do is phone in on 01388 720064 and leave their name and address stating that they would like the manual. The first three to leave a message will receive the manual; the next twenty will receive the mini manuals. All the manuals will be delivered in the post.

I am very well aware that there are a number of trouble-makers who hang about in the church grounds and on street comers. I do not condone this anti-social activity, and I also believe that these folk would not be happy even if there was somewhere for them to go in the evenings.

Nowadays teenagers don't want organised fun - they want to be independent. (By independence I don't mean hanging around street corners, being disrespectful and making nuisances of themselves.) They have had their lives organised for them from a very young age: childminders; playgroup; Tumble-Tots and other gymnastic activities; ballet lessons; swimming lessons; football and other sporting activities, and school. However, they need to feel that there is somewhere safe for them to go to in the evenings.
