Prestigious award for Hardwick Park

The magnificent restoration of Hardwick Park has been nationally recognised by coming first in the annual Georgian Awards in the 'Restored Georgian Landscape' category. Maria Murphy, Countryside Information Officer, and Sara Fortune, Hardwick Park Education Officer, accepted the award on behalf of Durham County Council. Sara said "We are overjoyed to have won this award. The Council has put a lot of effort and funding into restoring Hardwick to its former Glory and it is wonderful to have this recognition." Over £9m has been spent on the restoration of which £4,056,000 was provided by the Heritage Lottery Fund. Head of the Heritage Lottery Fund in the North East, Ivor Crowther, said: "The award means so much to everyone that has been involved with this project, proving all their hard work was worthwhile. It means that the park itself gets the recognition it deserves. It is a wonderful space that is right at the heart of the community.' A new Visitor Centre is open daily and now has the added facility of a café open from Tuesday to Sunday (closed Mondays). The Friends of Hardwick have recently released a DVD chronicling the restoration project which is available from the Visitor Centre or by phoning 01740 621431.

Sedgefield Hardwick Primary School celebrates!

We are delighted to have achieved the full International Schools Award this term. Our MFL co-ordinator, Mrs Jane Westerman, was invited to London on the 16th October to be given the award by BBC newsreader George Alagiah. It was a very prestigious occasion. The evidence file that Mrs. Westerman submitted was of such high quality that the British Council have retained it as an example to others. It is wonderful to know that all of the work that we have done to develop our children's knowledge and understanding of other cultures and peoples has been recognised.



On Tuesday 20th October, Head Teacher Linda Johnston, Teaching Assistant Wendy Nadin and school cook Susan Stapleton spent the day at the Riverside Cricket Ground, Chester-le-Street with



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eight children, to celebrate the free school meals pilot. Our school dinners are now so popular that the numbers have increased from an average of 40 a day to 150. Phil Barclay, Head of Finance services, greeted the 15 schools and set the tone for a fun, informative celebration. Some of our children interviewed him: Hardwick: Why do you like doing school dinners? Phil: I'm head of finance and there are only two areas in the country in this pilot. I like mums and dads saving money and I like talking to Head Teachers about the dinners. We also interviewed Mr. Taylor who is the Managing Director of Taylor Shaw,

the catering company. Hardwick: Do you like your job? Mr. Taylor: I love my job. We work with over 200 schools

and prepare over 40,000 meals in Durham alone. We enjoyed a super dramatic presentation by Shotton Hall Comprehensive School and a lively cookery and tasting session with Mark from Expochef. The most exciting part of the day was meeting former athlete and presenter Steve Cram. He talked to us all about the importance of a healthy balanced diet and led everyone in a fun run. At the end of the day, he presented everyone with a medal. He was kind enough to sign autographs and grant us an interview.

Hardwick: When did you first start running? Steve: I started running seriously when I was 12. Hardwick: What foods do you like? Steve: Well I don't like cheese! I think my favourite is steak in a pepper sauce. Because I've travelled so much I've tried foods from all over the world. I've had sheep brains, kangaroo sausages and frog's legs. I don't always like it but you have to try it to be polite. We enjoyed a truly memorable day!

We have been singing together for some time and our rehearsals take place around the rather unconventional and chaotic setting of a kitchen table. Chaotic because between us we have 7 children, aged 6 and under, who are everything that little children should be and - above all - noisy! It is not an uncommon sight to see whomever's turn it is to provide lunch for the ten of us standing with a spoon in one hand, music in the other and a toddler on each leq. We feel so blessed with our wonderful children that we decided to do something to help children who are suffering and in need.

The Little Way Association is a charity whose 'Fund for needy children' helps children all over the world, such as the street children in Latin America and the children in South East Asia who have been abandoned due to their being born with a disability.

Our initial idea was to get our friend, Anthony Robb, to record the CD for us, to run off 100 copies and sell them locally, but Anthony challenged us to think bigger. The result was 1000 copies made by a professional recording company. We enlisted the help of a very talented local photographer, Stephen Cooper, to create the artwork for the CD and 8 months after conception, the CD is now ready for sale.

Vacancies for 2 new councillors on Town Council

Two vacancies were declared on the town council in October. Following publication of the statutory notices on the Town Council Noticeboard, and also in the Sedgefield News, no-one has completed the statutory form to call an election. Consequently the town council will co-opt two new members at their January meeting. If you are interested in being co-opted then, a full information pack is available in the Council Offices.

JOTTINGS from November meeting of the Residents' Forum

A facility for viewing planning application plans at the Town Council Office was welcomed.

Concerns that money could be spent duplicating youth facilities already available instead of extending those currently operating are to be investigated.

A resident's confirmation of noise intrusion from wind turbines raised further concerns about the current proposals for more sites in the region and the lack of a regional strategy.

The Town Council is seeking clarity on how the £47000 from 106 monies following the Cunningham Court development is to be spent.

Questions raised by the community following the granting of permission for the Caravan Park have not been fully answered; a further meeting will be arranged to determine future action. A ruling regarding the Low Hardwick Off Road Motorcycle Course appeal is expected soon.

Those wanting to attend the AAP whole Forum meeting at Trimdon Station Community Centre on 12th Dec need to register their intention with DCC AAP Coordinator. There was strong feeling that these meetings should address local issues.

Residents urged clarification from the Town Council about the timing and display of information about 2 Town Councillor vacancies which had become available

Date of next meeting: 7th December at 7pm in the Fletcher Room. There will be no meeting in January (unless a need arises) but there will be one on 1st February 2010.

How's the club doing these days?

This question can often be heard in the village whenever a member who hasn't attended for a while meets another whom he recognises as a regular. At the beginning of this year members became so concerned at the possible closure of the club through financial difficulties that they called a special general meeting. This was very well attended and members learned that their concerns were well justified - the main problem being overdue VAT. There were other creditors too. Criticism of the committee came from all quarters of the room and was not gentle. The committee was left in no doubt that priority must be given to the VAT debt.

Four months later at the AGM members heard that a payment plan agreed with the VAT people was on schedule but should it fail then in all probability the closure of the club would soon follow. Members decided, without any dissenting voices, to increase the annual subscription from $\pounds 5$ to $\pounds 10$ and for the first time to charge pensioners. Their subscription was set at $\pounds 5$. These increases will be payable in January. Any member who doesn't agree with this only has himself to blame - either because he didn't speak up or because he didn't attend.

As is normal following the AGM the committee stood down and this year a new committee under the leadership of new Chairman Kevin Jones took over. It is still early days but already the new broom is sweeping clean and this is despite severe financial constraints. Because the previous committee couldn't afford to pay the VAT when it became due this committee must not only do that - it must also pay a set amount per month off the arrears.

Thus with no money in the kitty when the committee identified that the upstairs lounge (often used for christening and other parties) was in need of redecorating one new committee man used his trade contacts to source, at no cost to the club, the necessary materials and other new committee men applied them without charge. In addition members who are due to honoraria payments for their efforts have agreed to forego them.

The club newsletter which hadn't appeared since a previous chairman stood down in 1995 has been reborn and brought into the modern computer age - you can keep up to date with club life in your own home simply by reading your e mails. All you have to do is email <u>sjarcher@btinternet.com</u> and request it. New committee man Steve Archer will be pleased to add you to his address list. The last issue even included an appropriate cartoon to illustrate a point. It is well worth the effort.

Once again the club has a committee which recognises that the club belongs to the membership as a whole and that committee men are there to manage it as best they can on behalf of that membership. The intention is that all debts, except for the interest free 'brewery' or suppliers' loans will be cleared before the start of the new financial year and the next AGM. These suppliers' loans are reduced every time a pint is sold.

The answer to the question is that although not yet out of the wood the club, through the efforts of its new committee, is doing much better than it was and some light is beginning to show through the trees. If you are one of those members who have asked the question then both the club and its new committee are worthy of your support so why not arrange to meet your mates in the club and save money on pub prices. It is surprising how quickly this differential will pay for the increase in subscriptions.

On the day 23 Harriers made the journey to Stanley and competed against strong teams from Derwentside Athletic Club, Durham City Harriers and Chester-le-Street Athletic Club. Our Postcode

I am an off comer, having only experienced 3 years at Durham University in the late sixties and the last 20 years in County Durham at Lanchester, Durham City and for the last two years in Sedgefield. I believe myself extremely fortunate to have lived in such lovely places within County Durham. However, I now find myself living in Stockton, Teeside, when I know I live within the County Durham boundary. If I had wished to live in Stockton I would have moved there, but I very much prefer Sedgefield. Other places such as Houghton le Spring and Hetton Le Hole whilst having DH postcodes are at least addressed as Tyne and Wear, which is where they are. Similarly Seaham, whilst having an SS postcode is addressed as Easington Co. Durham.

We are not only wrongly postcoded we are also wrongly addressed. This should be taken up by all who are County Durhamites, including councillors and MPs and corrected as a matter of principal. The fact that the TS postcode results in extra expenditure as far as insurances are concerned and critical confusion as far as the Health Service is concerned, is of equal consideration, but are just two examples of the important consequences that this postcode anomaly causes for everybody in Sedgefield and its County Durham environs.
