Twenty is plenty!

"Watch out and slow down" is the key message from Ron Hogg, Durham's Police and Crime Commissioner, who is in favour of introducing 20mph speed limits near schools. Road traffic accidents are the single largest cause of death for children and young people aged 5-25 and evidence is growing that 20mph pilots are showing marked reductions in deaths and casualties.

Improving road safety is one of the policing priorities Mr Hogg, pictured right, has tasked the Chief Constable to deliver. He is also working with partners to tackle other road issues, including speeding, dangerous driving and illegal and inconsiderate parking.

County Durham Plan Examination in Public

Update from Sedgefield Town Council

As many readers will be aware, the draft "County Durham Plan" sets out Durham County Council's proposals for new development across the county between now and 2030; this includes significant development within Sedgefield. Those of you who have followed the progress of The Sedgefield Plan (p4 this month) will know that it was initiated by the town council and, once approved, will sit alongside the County Durham Plan to set out a strategic framework for land use (and therefore planning) in Sedgefield.

Throughout the development of the County Durham Plan, the town council has sought the views of residents and presented them to the county council. The latest draft of the plan is currently being subjected to its Examination In Public (EIP) to determine if it has been prepared in accordance with the legal and procedural requirements set out in legislation, and if it is sound in terms of guidance in the National Planning Policy Framework. The examination is led by Harold Stephens, an inspector appointed by central government. The EIP has three stages and the first is drawing to a close. Alongside other groups and individuals from Sedgefield, the town council has played an active role in the process.

One of the key subjects covered during the first stage of the EIP has been allocations of housing on sites across the county. Representatives from Sedgefield Town Council have attended four EIP hearings and made contributions on behalf of the community. During the hearings, other representatives spoke on behalf of communities in many parts of the county, as did numerous representatives of developers and landowners. Some of the hearings were long, detailed and at times, heated.

Throughout all of this, representatives from Sedgefield delivered strong, rational and consistent messages. The town council's stance has always been very clear that, based on community consultation, Sedgefield will accept no more than 300 new dwellings and that these should not all be located on one site.

The combination of written and verbal statements from the town council and Sedgefield Residents' Forum, written submissions from the steering group of The Sedgefield Plan, who also supplied the town council representatives with valuable information ahead of hearings, and contributions from individuals in the community, persuaded Harold Stephens to make a special, previously unplanned visit to Sedgefield to see potential housing development sites for himself. The town council liaised with Mr Stephens' team to organise the visit.

It is the view of the town council that Sedgefield has been very effectively represented during the first stage of the Examination In Public, and that the combined efforts of several groups and individuals have served the community very well. An interim EIP report is expected from Harold Stephens towards the end of January and, assuming that the process continues as scheduled, stage two will focus on specific areas and sites identified for development and stage three will examine the Community Infrastructure Levy charging schedule. The town council will participate in both of these stages, continuing to work with other community groups and individuals, and will keep residents updated on progress in future editions of Sedgefield News and the Sedgefield Extra.

New Year's Eve fireworks

Last year, Sedgefield Town Council took the decision to cancel the New Year's Eve fireworks. This was done in the context of the increasing pressure on the council budget and was one of a series of measures that also saw the council cancel the Mayor's wine & cheese event. Early this year, a petition was handed in to the council asking for the display to be reinstated and the potential for that has been investigated. The council set up a working group to review the management of all events involving fireworks and it became clear that some changes needed to be made from a health and safety and insurance perspective. These are mandatory, not optional. Consequently, the cost of putting on even a very short display on New Year's Eve would be many times greater than in previous years, and other health and safety requirements would make the event extremely problematic. In these circumstances, the council will not be reinstating the event this year. The feasibility of holding a display next year will be discussed during the Community Development and Engagement Committee meeting on 19th January 2015, which will start in the council offices at 7pm.

The Sedgefield Plan

Shaping the future of our area

It is now 14 months since we commenced this important project with the community and it has not been without its frustrations and problems along the way; however we are now within sight of submitting the final document to Durham County Council (DCC) for approval and inspection and hopefully 'The Plan' will be 'made' and become a statutory element in all planning applications in and around Sedgefield.

The Sedgefield Plan's inspection process needs explanation, we will submit our final submission draft to DCC in late November early December, DCC then have to submit it to a statutory 6 week consultation with this community and all interested parties. Whilst this is going on we will appoint an inspector jointly with DCC who will, hopefully, commence the inspection process early in the new year. The inspector will choose one of three options; 1) It is fit for purpose. 2) it is fit for purpose but needs modification or 3) It is not fit for purpose. Our objective is to achieve option 1 or 2 after which the Plan will go forward to a community referendum when you will be invited to vote for or against and a simple majority of 51% of those voting will win the day with a positive vote for the plan to be 'made'.

So much for our plan, but as you know DCC's Local Plan is currently going through its inspection process at which some of my colleagues, the residents forum, some individuals and the town council have had an opportunity to voice their concerns and seek clarification of some of the assertions that DCC have made. It has become clear that the Eden Drive and Beacon Lane sites will be considered by the inspector and it seems that he will determine which of these alternative sites goes forward to planning to meet DCC's allocation of 450 houses. It has also emerged that DCC highways have decided that they will leave Stockton Road open but only with access to the A689 by left turn, to access the A177. We will have to go through the new estate on Eden Drive if that alternative is chosen. At the DCC plan inspection we questioned the figures stated in the Arc 4 SHMAA Appendix A1, showing Sedgefield as having 7133 houses. DCC's response indicated that this figure represented Sedgefield plus the surrounding settlements. However we would question whether this figure has been used to justify an allocation of 470 houses to Sedgefield village. This represents an increase of almost 20% on the actual number of houses in Sedgefield, currently recorded as 2438. We note that elsewhere 10% appears to be the norm. To increase a community by 20% cannot be sustainable especially as this development is proposed in the short term. The Sedgefield Plan has been developed with the community and has built an impressive evidence base of views and opinion from all of the surveys, public meetings and direct discussions and conversations. Therefore the plan calls for no more than 300 houses to be built to 2030, that Brownfield sites should be used first and that our green spaces must be preserved. The Forum had submitted Freedom of Information requests to establish the cost to the tax payer of the event and a very conservative estimate of cost of policing and County Council provision is around £24K. Report was given on the Forum's attendance and presentations at the Examination in Public of the Co Durham Plan. It was emphasised how important it is that our community has its Neighbourhood Plan in place as we will need to be fighting off the totally unacceptable development proposals for our village. 

SPORTS UPDATE with CHRIS LINES

This time last year, I got into 'grumpy old man' mode and wrote about my gripes with the BBC Sports Personality of the Year show, chuntering on about how it was better in the past, when it included a proper, in depth review of sport during the previous 12 months, rather than pandering to the culture of celebrity obsession. Of course, I still watched the programme and enjoyed much of it. The clear winner in 2013 was Andy Murray, but as I outlined last month, I think it's going to be a much tighter contest this time around. That said, now that Lewis Hamilton has secured the Formula One champion-ship, the odds will be shortening on a win for him.

Here in Sedgefield, we have enjoyed another great year of sporting achievements, by teams and individuals of all ages. We live in a very active community and it is a privilege to report on just some of the local sports news here. I am lucky to have some regular contributors and am very grateful for their input, but equally, I am always keen to hear from anyone else with good sporting story that they would like to share. So, if you have a tale to tell, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Squash

Sedgefield Squash Club celebrated the tenth year of the Sedgefield primary schools mini-squash competition on 23rd October by welcoming five competing teams for the first time, as Bishop Middleham joined old-stagers St.William's (Trimdon), Trimdon Juniors, Sedgefield Hardwick Primary and Sedgefield Primary. The club also had a new approach to pre-competition training: Diane Harker, supported by a partnership between Sedgefield Squash Club and a grass roots funding programme through the county association and England Squash, delivered taster sessions to the whole of Years 5 and 6 at all five schools in early October. Stephen Rowsby and Oliver Larcombe provided follow-up training for school teams, while James and Oliver Larcombe organised the round-robin competition.

Each team has five players but this year the format was simplified with a minimum of two girls per team and no other restrictions. Two teams, including the winners, included three girls. To maintain a round-robin format, which with an extra school now featured 10 rather than six matches, each game was shortened to first to seven points-a rally scoring. The competition was a resounding success, with excellent performances from children new to the game as well as more experienced players. Last year, it felt impossible to have a closer competition, yet amazingly, it nearly was. Three teams entered the final round with only 13 points separating them (35 per match available) and again the title wasn't decided until the final game. Final results: 1st Sedgefield Primary 123 points (four wins); 2nd Sedgefield Hardwick 118 (2 wins) 3rd St. William's 117 (three wins); 4th Bishop Middleham 82 (one win); 5th Trimdon Juniors 54 (no wins). Top individual scorers (for each place in the team) were: 1st Jessica Weatherspoon, Sedgefield Primary 28 points; 2nd Cameron Mutcaster, Sedgefield Hardwick 25;

3rd Jack Murray, St William's 28; 4th Ryan Easton, Sedgefield Hardwick 28; 5th Anya Murphy, St William's and Danny Welsh, Sedgefield Primary 25.

Sedgefield Primary will now represent the area in the Durham and Cleveland inter-primary schools competition early in 2015.

Three Sedgefield juniors competed in the North East regional championships, held at Pontefract. In the boys U17s, Oliver Walls and Dan Toas gave good performances, finishing 5th and 11th respectively. Jessica Weatherspoon competed in the girls U11s, finishing 4th.

In the first stage of the inter-county championships, the Durham & Cleveland teams included Sedgefield's Rob Pearce (Boys U19s), Oliver Walls, George Peden and Daniel Toas (Boys U17s) and Jessica Weatherspoon (Girls U13s). Rob posted a great win over senior county player Cai Younger with a 3-2 result, with Oliver, George and Dan all winning their matches against Lincolnshire.

Although I will report more fully on senior team progress next month, a notable result for the club was achieved in November when the 1st team, competing in the County Premier League, won its match against a strong Guisborough side, fielding three club juniors; Rob Pearce, Oliver Walls, and debutant George Peden. This was a great result for the club, with its top junior players competing at the highest level within the county.

Football

Sedgefield Youth FC under 10s team started the season well and are improving with every game. They have already managed three wins, equalling their total for the whole of last season! There has been great enthusiasm from the kids, who turn up in numbers to both training and the games.

Sedgefield Youth FC U14s are currently sitting top of their league. They were conceding too many goals at the start of the season, but have improved a great deal in defence, while scoring for fun at the other end. The club would like to thank Lee Mason from LM Windows for sponsorship of the new U14s strip. Both teams play on Sunday mornings in the TJFA league, with home games at Sedgefield Community College. *The U14 2014-2015 team is pictured below.*

Sedgefield NETPark F.C are enjoying their first season in the Durham Alliance League and currently sit joint top. The team has also made it to the quarter finals stage of the Durham County Trophy. NETPark FC now has over 40 local players registered and the switch from Sunday to Saturday football is proving to be a really positive one for grass roots football in Sedgefield. With the added expense of paying for linesmen as well as referees, the club is working very hard on raising funds.

He disqualified Usain Bolt from the final of the 100m during the World Championships in 2011 – apparently Bolt doesn't hold a grudge! The big winner was David Sawyer, who picked up Runner of the Year and Individual Performance of the Year. David only took up running a year ago, attending sessions with Sedgefield Harriers and immediately discovering how much he enjoyed it. Having lost some close friends and relatives to breast cancer David decided to take on a challenge to raise money for Breast Cancer Care and planned a gruelling challenge for 2014 of five marathons, five half marathons, five 10ks and five 5ks, Sedgefield parkrun being the last 5k and the Northumberland Castles Half Marathon being the final race. Not content with that, David linked the last two events, running non stop from the end of parkrun, throughout the day and night to get to the start of the half marathon around 25 hours and 75 miles later. He completed his epic run in the shadow of Bamburgh Castle on Sunday 26 October. David was accompanied by fellow members of Sedgefield Harriers at every stage of the way and when he won two awards (as voted by fellow Harriers), it came as no surprise to anyone.
