The Future's Green!

Out with the old ------ and in with the new



We use an awful lot of electricity and

gas to keep our homes warm and run our gadgets, but it comes at a cost - and not just from our quarterly fuel bill. Producing these fuels pollutes the air and changes the global and local climate by the release of harmful gases like carbon dioxide. The effects of it are already being experienced today. Recent flooding in the UK and elsewhere is probably evidence of this. The number of extreme weather events around the world seems to be increasing. Even if we stopped all pollution now, the damage already done could affect us well into the next century. Unless we do something now, the Nile Delta and one third of Bangladesh could disappear under the sea, resulting in tens of thousands of environmental refugees. There'll be no skiing in the Alps and the polar bear could be extinct!

So what can we do about it?

One way is to use renewable forms of energy. Buy electricity from suppliers who are investing in wind power and bio fuels, (Green charities like the RSPB do this) - or select the 'green' option offered by your power company, putting pressure on them to try harder.

Local authorities now have a duty to help curb emissions, so Sedgefield Borough Council has just signed a deal to buy all the electricity for 5 of its largest buildings from sources certified as totally renewable. The price is competitive with traditional forms of electricity and it will save 2,500 tonnes or so of CO2 from being released into the atmosphere.

Another option is to use solar power. Several local community and public buildings have been earmarked for the installation of "photovoltaic cells" on their roofs, to generate electricity. These can supply at least half of the average building's electricity demands, depending on roof-space and location. These attract financial support from the Dept. of Industry.

An experimental installation at Sedgefield Community College points up their wish to be involved. On a regional scale, if you want to see a fine example, look at the award-winning Barclays building in Sunderland, at Doxford Park.

Inspired to DIY?

There is plenty of advice available and the good news is that financial support is not just for big public projects. Householders can apply for a grant of up to 50% towards the capital and installation costs.

Lost a Playing Pitch?

The Borough Council's Playing Pitch Strategy Roadshow came to Ceddesfeld Hall on 15th January and the Borough's officers Tony Guest and Tim Watton explained, listened, debated and took notes. For Sedgefield, the draft strategy has great significance because of the loss of the Winterton playing fields and pavilion to the new development - the housing had been allowed to encroach upon the playing fields, though the NetPark was amended so that it did not.

The strategy sets out to show what effect this has had on local playing pitch capacity and suggests how the need can be best met. The Borough recognises that Sedgefield is short of one junior football pitch (junior football was played at Winterton) and that the cricket club lost capacity which needs replacing. Also there may be demand to reinstate the rugby club at the Community College and provide for a hockey pitch there. Those attending generally agreed that the main needs had been correctly identified but were less sure that the supply of football pitches is adequate. Having allowed the loss of these pitches, the authorities are obliged to make adequate reinstatement, if the need is justified. This is the last chance to have your say. Revised versions of the strategy can be seen on the Borough's web-site, www.sedgefield.gov.uk or earlier versions can be consulted at the Town Council office. There is still a little time to send comments to Sedgefield Borough Council or by e-mail to tguest@sedgefield.gov.uk. If you care, do something soon.

I knew very little of such things then so it could be daunting, but the pleasure of learning to sing madrigals and choral singing in general soon took over.

I heard David play professionally once, accompanying the soprano

Carole Andrew, and was entranced by his playing. I had begun to realise what I'd given up as a wayward teenager, when I'd stopped singing and studying piano.

Later on as I returned to musical education I came across David at Stockton & Billingham College. He was always supportive even though he taught only a small part of my course. When he heard I wanted to start a youth choir, he willingly gave up lunchtimes to teach me to conduct.

Since then I've had many occasions to be grateful for his advice and enormous stock of knowledge. When I needed a serious work for an Easter programme, sing-able by young voices, David came up with an obscure little Mass by Fauré, which proved to be a perfect gem. There were plans afoot to sing it again soon and David was to play the organ.

Many people will remember David - at home, in his churches, at the Cricket Club, playing golf and enjoying a pint!

But I'll remember him at the piano. When he was inspired, his playing could be brilliant, passionate, subtle and delicate in turn. It seemed to me that he was deeply contented then.

more to get the numbers up so we can hold one in Sedgefield. Do get in touch.



Questioning the cost of the Green future

Do You Believe in Fairies? Or little green men? Well, Sedgefield Borough Council obviously believes in GREEN electricity! So much so, that they have signed a contract with London Electricity, to supply their needs for two contractual years. The contract will cost an extra £8,408 per annum.

At an Area Three Forum held at Mordon & Bradbury Village Hall, Neil Barnes, the Borough Council's Energy Officer, gave a run down on how this will help the environment. The additional cost will enable the supplier to meet targets for the purchase & supply of green electricity, which have been set as far ahead as the year 2010. Purchasing their supplies from wind farms and Hydro Electricity schemes where possible, and issuing a certificate to guarantee that this is so, will help towards the building of new, environmentally friendly generators - or so the theory goes! Perhaps we should reserve judgement and wait to see what does happen!

Clarification from Sedgefield Borough Council:

SBC invited tenders & chose a supplier at a cost saving on the previous rate and within the budget allocated. A cheaper deal was available but would have been without the environmental benefits. The Borough's Auditors have agreed the deal and regard the environmental benefits as an investment.
