Report from the Neighbourhood Watch Meeting held on December 9th 2008

Under Matters Arising No Cold Calling it was recorded that the Executive have decided this task is now complete. By request details from an article in the N. Echo 4/12/08 "No Cold Calling Zones Reach 200 Milestone" were read out. This demonstrates North Yorkshire's Trading Standards' latest achievement and their total commitment to creating No Cold Calling Zones to combat unwanted callers and hence doorstep crime. In 3 years they have created 200 zones and in the last 2 years no-one in a zone fell victim to the conmen even though there were 600 doorstep crime complaints. A North Yorks. Trading Standards Councillor said "We believe that No Cold Calling Zones send a clear message to those people who target vulnerable householders that they are not welcome". They are keen to create more zones where all residents are in full agreement.

This report further demonstrates the real value and benefits of "No Cold Calling" to members of the public.

Under Representative Reports:

Community Force: Tim circulated copies of his report & provided details to members. The report was in two parts a) Environmental Matters, b) Anti Social Behaviour and Tim gave further details about log entries.

Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator: Mel described the Crime Prevention "seasonal" leaflets she had brought for members to collect and use accordingly. Mel gave strong advice regarding unwanted callers "stand your ground and ask them to leave". Mel thanked members for making her so welcome to the group and praised them for doing an excellent job.

Crime Prevention Officer: Neil endorsed Mel's comments and thanked members for their contribution and for turning out in such good numbers on a very dark & cold winter's evening. He gave additional details of some significant successes in the fight against crime achieved on our patch and of some ongoing issues; members were very appreciative.

Neil alerted members to the harder line Insurance companies appear to be taking to claims and suggested they ensure they comply with what their policy states / covers. Some people have, sadly not had a pay out for vehicles stolen because of non compliance with conditions (even though it was not a deliberate disregard).

Neil gave an update on Operation DARC and the new "Red Cards" that local Bobbies would be dispensing to unlit householders in the coming weeks.

Village Constable: Keith's report for period 1/11 - 9/12/08 showed that there were 13 reported crimes consisting of 3 Burglaries, 6 Thefts, 4 of Damage within the village, giving details in respect of individual crimes, and advice as appropriate. He reiterated his previous (Ringmaster & S.News) messages about car thefts from drives in the village due to owners leaving them warming up and unlocked. His advice - don't do it, it is too costly for everyone. C/man David Hillerby thanked Keith especially for his turning out for us on his day off, members endorsed this.

Police Priorities: Secretary asked members to allocate their 1-3 priorities against Durham Police's list A-G so he could collate and submit to Durham as a consensus view from the Panel.

A.O.B. 1 Red Cross Nuisance Cold Callers w/e 6th Dec: Several members reported details of wilful disregard of our No Cold Calling Home notices, late night (dark hours) calling, pressurising elderly persons, disregard of residents request not to call at specific homes and pressurised entry to homes.

Mel asked the Secretary to provide details after the meeting so she could follow up with the Red Cross in the same vein as she had done with respect to problems experienced with energy company Go Warm.

Neil also suggested that if members experienced similar events again that they take full details of the caller (name etc.) and their company and pass them on directly to a member of the N/H/Watch Committee.

2 C/Man Ken Saiger: Everyone present expressed their concern that Ken was still in hospital. Wishes for a speedy recovery were sent via a get well card. C/man David Hillerby and everyone present thanked Bell Saiger for her and Ken's generosity once again, in providing food and wine to the members so that they would enjoy a "festive" meeting amongst friends.

3 Sarah & Abigail: Everyone present were absolutely delighted with the surprise visit paid by our ex N/H/Watch Coordinator Sarah Norman accompanied by her delightful and impeccably behaved 3 month old daughter Abigail.

C/man closed the meeting at 7.45 pm and invited everyone to partake of Bell & Ken's generosity. Everyone was extremely happy to do so. A record of thanks must go to those dedicated members who so kindly leapt into action to not only serve up the food but ensured it was all cleared away dishes washed and everything in the room & kitchen left spick & span before the lights went out - thank you ladies!

from Sedgefield Village Residents' Forum meeting, January 2009

Only a brief report this month as there was no Forum meeting in January. The meeting would have fallen on January 5th and we thought it a little too soon after the festive season. We have however still been giving attention to ongoing issues, attending the Town Council meeting and of course keeping up to date on the planning application for the caravan park.

The planning application is the information we particularly wanted to give everyone notice of. **The application will go to the Planning Committee for consideration at 10am on February 6th 2009** we are presuming it will be at the Borough Council Offices in Spennymoor again. Final information from the Borough will come out later, nearer the date, too late for this newsletter, so we wanted to let you know now. In the mean time put that date in your diaries and watch the village notice board for any updates. Also, the next Forum meeting will be 7pm Monday February 2nd in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall – as always, everyone is welcome.

Our community can again demonstrate its objection to the caravan park by turning up at the planning meeting - please try to be there it really does make a difference – **February 6th**, **10am**, **Borough Council Offices**.

Work in progress will improve river quality

River water quality in the Tees, the Skerne and other waterways in the area will be improved as a result of work going on in Sedgefield during the next few weeks, to upgrade and screen four combined sewer overflows. These overflows are designed by the Environment Agency to discharge wastewater into watercourses in times of very heavy rainfall to protect properties and land from flooding.

The upgrades are at the junction of Stockton Road and Beacon Lane, in East End and in land east of the Leas and east of The Orchard.

Traffic management is needed in East End, but Northumbrian Water says that it is doing its best to keep disruption to a minimum.

PC Todd reports

The New Year started on a positive note as crimes reported to Police remain very low. Over the Festive period burglaries were reported on Winterton Estate, Neville Drive and on The Lane. On White House Drive, a male was assaulted and his take-away food stolen. Vehicles were damaged on Thurlow Road, Neville Drive, West End and Queen's Drive. A car was stolen from Winterton and number plates in The Orchard. A house window was smashed in Cherry Tree Drive. Crimes reported so far in 2009 include a garden gate broken, and fence damage on Front Street.

I am disappointed to note that at least 6 assaults have taken place, mostly as a result of excessive alcohol consumption. My hope for the rest of the year is that we all remain vigilant and not give the criminal a chance to prosper.

Pub Watch

At a meeting held recently at the Dun Cow licensees were informed that in general the majority of people who enjoyed a social night out in the pubs and clubs were well behaved. Unfortunately a few embarrassed themselves by drinking too much and a small number of incidents were reported to the police. Enquiries are still ongoing.

We're a month into 2009 and I still haven't finished rounding up last year's sports news from Sedgefield. I'm not going to linger on the past too much, but have just realised that I haven't yet provided an update of how our various Sunday league football teams are getting on this season.

This month, I'm going to concentrate on St. Edmund's FC and Crosshills FC, and I will hunt out some news from the Black Lion for the next issue. Elsewhere, we have news from the Harriers and the sports development officer at Sedgefield Community College.

Further afield, England's cricketers are in the West Indies. Hopefully, they are settling some differences off the field and getting things right on it. It's a big year ahead with the Ashes on the horizon. With a North East hat on, I'm hoping that Steve Harmison can re-discover the form he showed on a previous tour to the West Indies that made him the world's number one fast bowler. That would be very timely.

As I type this, Andy 'slightly-lessgrumpy-these-days' Murray has breezed into the fourth round of the Australian Open. He now looks like a genuine contender for a major title, rather than a dark horse. The rugby union Six Nations tournament kicks off in early February, with England hoping to forget recent history and become contenders again. So, as ever, there is plenty to look forward to for sports fans near and far. Oh, and of the course the biggest day of the sporting year is just around the corner - Sedgefield Ball Game takes place on Tuesday 24th February.

Football

As I have stated before, St. Edmund's FC is the leading club in the village, consistently competing with the best Sunday league teams in County Durham. Playing in the top division of the Durham District League, St. Edmund's have had a good first half to their season, both in the league and in cups.

They started 2009 with a convincing 7-2 victory against Hetton social club to move into the quarter finals of the league cup. St. Edmund's have only played seven league games so far, winning six and drawing one. While that represents a fantastic return, it means that the team will have to cram in loads of fixtures between now and the end of the season. Also, amazingly, of the 17 league and cup games that St. Edmund's have played, 16 of them have been at home (good for home advantage, but a huge drain on resources when referees have to be paid!). So, the latter part of the season is going to represent a huge challenge for the club – here's hoping they can maintain their form, avoid too many injuries and perhaps grab some silverware.

Talking of injuries, they have been a constant problem for Crosshills FC. Several squad members have been out for much of the season with long term problems, which has put extra pressure on those players who have been fighting fit. Despite that, the club has enjoyed a lot of success in the league and have been a regular presence in the promotion places. However, the table is quite misleading – some teams have played 13 or 14 games, while others have completed as few as six.

Crosshills FC hit a rough patch in January, with two disappointing league defeats in a row. Nevertheless, the team is still confident that a good run of results is just around the corner and promotion is still a realistic ambition this season. Some of the longer term walking wounded are starting to return to fitness, which will boost a fairly small squad. So, the club's management is looking forward to a really positive second half of the season.

Junior Harriers review of the year

2008 saw continued growth of Sedgefield Harriers' junior section and now 60 children between the ages of 8 and 16 regular attend the main training night on Wednesdays at Sedgefield Community College.

However, Harriers have only been able to accommodate such numbers due to the commitment and growth of their voluntary coaching capacity. Three coaches are qualified as UK Athletics Level 2 coaches and one is qualified at level 1. Two additional coaches are in the process of attaining their Level 1 and 2 qualifications with a view to completing these qualifications in March. This level of commitment and expertise has enabled a pathway for the Junior Harriers' development of fundamental skills and competencies through to competition at a national level. Also, three junior sports leaders living in Sedgefield and studying at local colleges and universities have assisted the juniors. This has enabled lead coaches to provide a better quality of provision and in so doing enhance the experience of children attending the Club whilst retaining their involvement

The commitment of all the volunteers that assist the Junior Harriers is essential to the Club's continued growth and sustainability and provided the foundation upon which the following successes of 2008 were built. Notable amongst these has been the Club's continued development at a competitive level, with the Club winning its first North East medal in the U 13 boys' long jump at the North East Track and Field Championships at Gateshead in May. The Club also competed with distinction in the North Yorkshire and South Durham Track and Field and Cross-country Leagues. In the track and field league the Harriers were represented by more children than any other club, with up to 15 children attending each fixture. Meanwhile in the crosscountry league the U15 and U13 boys' teams have real chances of winning the overall team titles for the 2008/9 season. These performances werefurther supplemented recently with a strong showing in the North East Cross-Country Championships. Here, the U13 boys' team finished 6^{th} and the U15 boys' team, 5^{th} - a significant achievement, with many long established clubs in the North East languishing behind the Harriers. There were significant individual performances too, from Jonathan Baines, 14th in the U15 boys' race and Gemma Varley, 11th in the U17 women's race.

Other developments through 2008 have seen the Junior Harriers involved in the consultation for the redevelopment of the Community College as part of the Building Schools for the Future programme. We also recently purchased over £1000 worth of equipment for the junior section. Meanwhile, a Monday night training session at Durham University's Maiden Castle track has been established for children in school year 7 and above.

Finally, the Harriers have joined forces with 3 other clubs, Durham City Harriers, Chester Le Street and Houghton, as well as Durham University, to form an Athletics Network. As a Network we will be able to apply for up to £50,000 funding from England Athletics for each of the next 3 to 4 years, to support club development with a particular emphasis on school to club links. An initial application for the first year's funding has been made and if it is approved, Sedgefield Harriers' juniors will receive £8,000 funding in the first year to develop the club further through 2009/10.

Clearly 2008 was a significant year for the junior section of the Sedgefield Harriers and more significantly, it has provided a solid foundation for further development this year. As one U13 boy put it at the recent North East Crosscountry Championships, 'It's great to feel part of a big Club'.

Harriers

The Christmas and New Year holiday period is always busy, with many races offering runners the chance to escape or recover from excess! There were four races on Sedgefield Harriers' Winter Grand Prix, meaning points up for grabs, and an even greater opportunity for those fortunate enough to escape the rampant colds and flu as some runners fell victim to the winter curse.

The Grand Prix series set by club treasurer Rosie Sims awards points for where the Harriers finish in races in relation to each other, the first Harrier taking 10 points, the second 8, down to 2 points for simply finishing a race. There are mens' and womens' competitions. This encourages Harriers to enter races on behalf of the club and encourages healthy competition between members. Whilst the bottle of wine in April for the winner of the winter series is welcome it can't match the warm glow for the winner from knowing they have represented the club on numerous occasions and competed well against their club mates. The points available over the holiday period can make a big difference come April.

The first of the four races was the Loftus Poultry Run, an 8 mile pre Christmas trail race with 600 entries. Eight Harriers competed on a cold day with a biting wind straight off the North Sea. Scott Hydon was first Harriers man in 53.33 (53rd overall) and Amanda Hetherington first woman in 65.51. Next up was the Durham Fell Runners Ayhope Skyline on 28th December. A 10 mile challenge in the forest and on the fells around Hamsterley. With Gary Hetherington still a victim of the winter curse Scott Hydon again took full opportunity for 10 Grand Prix points by finishing an excellent 10th overall in a time of 71.46. Scott is being rewarded for a high degree of application to his running in recent months and his times are his best for a number of years. Gail Bell was first Harriers woman in 88.03.

Five Harriers competed over a very scenic course on a nice winter's day. On New Year's day when the 5 took part in North York Moors AC Captain Cook's Fell Race, centred on Great Ayton. Gary Hetherington returned to action to be first Harrier finished in 34.59 while Scott Hydon was a victim of a cold on this occasion. Gail Bell was once again first Harriers lady in a time of 44.45. On 4th January 6 Harriers competed in the Hartlepool Burn Road Harriers Old Monks 6 form Hart Village. Scott Hydon was first man back in 32.44 and Gail Bell was first woman in 41.50. Others to pick up points over the four races were Graeme Addison and Ean Parsons who, although missing out on the 10 points capitalized from consistency by performing well in all of the events. Also scoring were Matthew Jones, Jo James, Marie Walker, Paul Templeton, Jonathan Wallace and Helen Parsons. As if competing in the Grand Prix races wasn't enough Graeme Addison also competed in the Guisborough Woods race on 27th December.

PC Todd's 'PACT' with the village

In January I held the first of my 'surgeries' - meetings with the view to finding out what problems or concerns are important to yourselves, as residents of Sedgefield, and which you would like the local Beat Team to deal with.

The surgeries are not designed to replace the police non-emergency number, 0345 6060 365, where you wish to see or speak with an officer at the time; or the emergency number 999, which may be more appropriate. I see the surgery as a useful tool in support of the existing Crime Watch panel and Residents' Forum – both meetings that I attend.

The intention is to use the surgery to identify persistent or long-term concerns and other problems that arise from time to time; and to focus our attention on these issues. The theme behind this initiative of community engagement is collectively known as Police and Communities Together, or P.A.C.T.

The venue for my PACT meeting will be the Sedgefield Town Council offices, on one Tuesday evening a month starting at 7pm, until 8pm. The next meetings have been arranged for Tuesdays 10th February and 10th March. The first meeting (12th January) identified problems still being experienced in St Edmund's churchyard and church circle, and parking issues outside Sainsbury's store. Both these issues will be robustly policed over a period of time to identify any offences and deal with offenders.

I will give feedback in person at various meetings and in the next Sedgefield News. I hope that you, as part of this community, will endorse this initiative and help support our attempts to improve the quality of life for every resident. I look forward to meeting you. *Keith (PC Todd)*
