All the while, Gary Hetherington and Diane Baines were completing the 10k road race around the edge of the park.

Next on the cross country course for a 4km run were Jonathan Baines, Ben Hetherington and Lee Armes finishing in 11th, 19th and 42nd. After watching the international men and women race in a heavy snow shower we headed back to the hotel for some well deserved pizza! Travelling home on Monday was an adventure to say the least. After an early morning wake up call, and the obvious game of pool, we left the Sleepwell for the very last time. On arriving at the airport, after much confusion we established our plane was cancelled and flying was not an option. So a 15 hour ferry was booked and we were getting home in time for Christmas! The Pride of Bruges was more luxurious than the hostel with power showers, comfortable beds and good food. Unfortunately, sea sickness got the better of two of our runners, but nurse Diane was on hand to help and everybody was okay in the morning. Entertainment on the ship was so



good that Rory fell asleep in the cinema, probably helped by the 'gentle' rocking of the boat. After a good night's sleep we were finally in England, although it seemed like passport control didn't want us in the country! When we were finally free, Dave from Trimdon picked us up in his mini-bus and we set off for Sedgefield. But the story doesn't end there - Diane, Scott and Gary still had to go to Edinburgh to pick up their cars and only when they returned was the Sedgefield Harriers' trip to Brussels officially over.

#### No ordinary 'Back to School' for College students this year







Whilst youngsters across the country reluctantly returned to their desks after the Christmas break, students of Sedgefield Community College did so with much excitement and enthusiasm as they walked through the doors of their brand new £18m building for the first time. The college, which was fortunate to be one of the few schools in the country to benefit from the 'Building Schools for the Future' initiative before the programme was scrapped by the new coalition government, opened for the first time at the beginning of term.

Whilst not unappealing to the eye from the outside, it is not until you enter the building that the true visual

Built around a large, striking central 'heartspace' which incorporates performance and teaching areas, the building branches off into a number of specialist areas, of which the sport area is particularly impressive with a large purpose built Dance Studio, a vast sports hall (photo p.6) and a fitness room equipped with modern machines. However, it is clear to see that significant emphasis has also been placed upon ensuring general teaching areas are equipped and furnished to the highest of standards. Every area provides teachers with the latest technology at their fingertips, whilst students have brand new laptops available to them should they wish to use them.

Headteacher Dave Davies is understandably pleased with the outcome of what he explained has been a long process to reach this point.

This fantastic new building provides us with the perfect environment through which to achieve this goal and continue the huge improvements that have taken

# Community SAFETY

### Police Liaison Officer's report for 2010

Neighbourhood Watch members who opt to receive Crime related messages from our local Police (by telephone or internet) will already be aware of the good report from our Police Liaison Officer Neil Langthorne. Crime continues to reduce and in particular, house burglaries were significantly reduced during 2010 on the previous year. Neil makes the point in his message and it is particularly relevant to all householders: "Don't become complacent. Think security - just take the time routinely to practise some simple crime prevention measures." The one area of increase in crime is the theft of scrap metal. Police continue to ask the public to be especially vigilant and report any suspicious persons or vehicles to them. Even houses have been targeted for

metals/lead flashings, so watch out! There are thieves about. In fact the value of the link between Police & NHW members is illustrated here: "This is a Police message for Sedgefield Neighbourhood Watch. About 2.45am on Saturday 15th, two incidents were reported in Station Road, involving the attempted theft of lead from the bay windows of properties in the street. This continues to be a problem in the village and your continued vigilance can only assist us to track down the persons responsible."

#### Home Security - a Brief Reminder

Remember it is all too easy to forget about the open window the unlocked door, your forgetfulness is the chance the thief or burglar is waiting for. Make a habit of keeping doors & windows locked even when in the house.

#### House unlit after Dark

Use timing switches to turn on lights or a radio around the house while you are out, to make your home appear occupied. Door Callers: Trading Standards, the Police & N/H/Watch urge everyone to not buy at the door. Display a No Cold Calling Home sticker and ignore any uninvited callers - especially those who ignore your notice. Stickers are still available free from the Town Council Offices (next to the Doctor's Surgery).

#### **Bogus Callers & Walk in Theft**

This happens to the least expecting & often to someone who is usually careful. Keep the door chain or door bar on at all times especially, when answering the door. If in doubt, keep them out. Do not allow entry without an appointment or notification. A locked door prevents unwanted visitors. Door bars are available, from Tim Spearey (see number below).

#### **Garden Security**

Mark valuables with post code using a simple UV pen; don't leave tools, toys, bikes etc. out unattended. Lock them away, preferably out of sight.

#### Flask in the Fridge

Please remember to update your data sheet inside the flask, following any change to either your medication or to your health. It is vital that if the Emergency Services are called and refer to the information that it is accurate & up to date, it is for your benefit only. A simple method is to put your most recent prescription in the flask (as long as it shows all your current medication).

#### **PC Todd reports**

First, the good news! Every year I run a Christmas card competition in the local Primary schools: the children do a picture of me in a Christmas setting, I choose the 5 best in their age range to win a prize and I print cards with the winning pictures and names of the children. These are sent to the Royal family, MPs and other VIPs. This year we had a reply from the Queen, which I read out at the prize-giving at Hardwick School. But also, our chief constable, John Stoddard judged that my overall winner was good enough to win his county-wide competition, and the prize for that is a bike (see left).

Back to business now and yet again lead thefts dominated the crime figures in January, bay windows being the target. Lead was stolen from 2 properties in Lile Gardens and another in Station Rd. Another crime emerging as a problem is the theft of old cars showing signs of damage or appearing unroadworthy. Two such vehicles have been taken recently, one from Winterton, after a breakdown, and one from West Park Lane. Nearby villages have suffered similar crimes. It is not known how these vehicles are taken but if you see a car being lifted onto a recovery vehicle or being towed, please record the recovery vehicle details and inform the police. So far these stolen vehicles have not been recovered but are believed to have been broken down into spares or scrap. Other reported crimes include theft from the Co-op where 3 youths were arrested and theft of a trailer from Hardwick Hall Hotel.

#### **PACT** meeting

No January meeting took place so the next meeting will be directly after the Neighbourhood Watch meeting on Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> February 2011. The priorities remain until this meeting, which are parking issues outside Theakston's and Sainsbury's.

If you have any local concerns affecting you or your neighbours come along to the meeting – we may be able to resolve it.

#### **PUB Watch**

A meeting was held recently in the Social Club. Christmas and New Year passed with no major issues with only a couple of people warned by police regarding their behaviour on the streets due to excessive alcohol. No incidents were reported which required further action from members.

### Jottings from Sedgefield Residents' Forum

There was no meeting of the Forum in January, the first Monday being a bit too close to the New Year. As reported, the December meeting didn't take place as only a few people attended, we could probably blame the weather; so that leaves our next meeting at 7pm on February 7<sup>th</sup> as a catch up from November. We do need residents to come along and give their views on issues affecting the village and also the future of the Residents' Forum – do people want it to continue, should we change the meeting date? Come along and let us know.

New Year sees the opening of the New Community College, and don't the pupils look great in the new uniform? Reports on results are brilliant, congratulations to all concerned.

The residents of St Edmund's Green area of the village as well as those on access routes to the college have been extremely tolerant over the time of the college rebuild; there are still some months to go before the old school is demolished and everything gets back to normal. The Forum has been made aware of parking problems in the St Edmund's Green area as a result of the rebuild. We have contacted the college and believe the college are very sensitive to the issue and seem to be doing all they can to minimise problems, but we will keep informed of residents' problems. We are still seeking answers to the £46K section 106 monies which should be spent in the village, and await an update on our response to the proposed land allocation for future house building in the village. Those of you who gave feedback to Durham County Council (DCC) on the Co Durham Plan and in particular, housing land allocation, should have received a letter from DCC giving information on accessing the reports online, but for those who are interested, www.durhamccconsult.limehouse.co.uk/portal/planning gives some interesting info on the settlement study and there is further access on www.durham.gov.uk/ldf. DCC also state: - From January 2011 onwards we are also intending to consult on a number of other reports including reports which consider the overall Spatial Strategy for the County Durham Plan, Overall Housing Requirement, Housing Distribution, Executive Housing, Strategic Employment Sites and Waste Delivery Strategy. Further details will be posted here (on their web site) when they become available. So as a community we need to be very clear on what **WE** want and make sure that happens. The Forum is here to help with that, so come along and give your support.

#### Looking out for the neighbours

Durham County Council is asking us to be neighbourly during any future cold snaps. It's a simple idea - just to give help, when it's needed, to anyone living near us who we know to be elderly or infirm, to see if they are warm enough, have enough to eat, have all their medicines etc.

#### Headwear service for people with cancer

Jessica's Headwear service has been set up at the Cancer Information and Support Office, Pioneering Care Centre, Carers Way, Newton Aycliffe. The service is Call Freephone 0800 783 4056 for an appointment with a trained volunteer, in a private room. Bring a friend or relative along if you wish. You won't feel rushed, in fact the room is usually filled with laughter - it can be quite good fun trying on the headwear! It is hoped that clients leave not only feeling they look better but also feeling emotionally better and more able to cope with the challenges of living with cancer.

#### Sedgefield in Bloom 2011

Although this year's efforts for Northumbria in Bloom are not launched until the Valentine's Coffee Morning on February 4th, Bloomers have already been out planting and tidying. Very soon, thanks to grant aid from Durham County Council, new trees will be planted in various locations around the village and Chris Young, in charge of the farm at the Community College, has offered an old plough to be renovated by students, who did such a great job on the seed drill last year. An alpine bed based on the Rotary Club Wheel is to be created at the entrance to Winterton, where further work is to be done on community garden and allotments. At the North East Cross Country Championships on 8<sup>th</sup> January, the Sedgefield Harriers girls U13 team put in a very strong performance to finish in 4<sup>th</sup> team place and show the measure of the club's junior development. Very promising athlete Hannah Featherstone was first Harrier in 10<sup>th</sup> place, followed by Rebecca Mott in 15<sup>th</sup>, Ellie Gaines in 26<sup>th</sup>, Emily Robertshaw in 34<sup>th</sup> and Jade Vallelly in 37<sup>th</sup>. All of the girls were at the bottom of the age group, which bodes well for next year's championships.

There was strong representation at the championships from the clubs' juniors across nearly all age groups. Not having run since Boxing Day due to a heavy cold, promising U17 Jonathan Baines had to settle for 10<sup>th</sup> place but is sure to bounce back with an improved performance at the Northerns in Sunderland. The club's senior teams finished in 15<sup>th</sup> in the men's championships and 13<sup>th</sup> in the women's.

The club had a strong turn out at the Old Monks Race in Hart the day after the cross country event, with a number of runners taking part in both to ensure they scored in the club's first Grand Prix race of the season. On a cold but clear morning with conditions icy underfoot, Ian Blakemore was the first Harrier home in 15<sup>th</sup> place and Rosie Warnett picked up 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the ladies race. Next race in the club's Grand Prix series is the Castleton Beacon race, part of the North York Moors Winter Series.

Sedgefield Harriers' Gerry Kearsley Winter Handicap was run on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> January in wet but warm conditions with lots of mud, over the usual course north of Sedgefield. The race started near Fishburn and followed tracks and trails around Bishop Middleham over a 6.5 mile course. The overall winner was Andy Lowes (unattached) from South Shields, who ran off a handicap of 17 minutes. First Sedgefield man and woman were Jason Caterrall and Susan Wallace. Fastest man over the course was Will Horsley of Elvet Striders in a run time of 37:52 and fastest woman was Rosie Warnett of Sedgefield Harriers in a time of 48:30. The handicapping again proved pretty accurate as all but two of the 61 runners returned in a spread of ten minutes.

Some Harriers juniors have been competing for their schools in cross country with notable success. Hannah Featherstone finished 2<sup>nd</sup>, Abie Hearmon 3<sup>rd</sup> & Sam Hearmon 14<sup>th</sup> in their own age groups in the Teesside district events, while Ben Hetherington was 5<sup>th</sup>, Jonathan Baines 7<sup>th</sup>, Scott Kippin 16<sup>th</sup>, Joe Worley 27<sup>th</sup> & Megan Hetherington 42<sup>nd</sup> in their county races in the Co. Durham event. It is hoped that some will go on to represent their counties at the national schools cross country races.

That's all for this month, except to mention that, in case you missed the two recent darts world championships, Adrian 'Jackpot' Lewis won the PDC version in a final against Gary Anderson that may have signalled the start of a sea change at the top of the PDC game. Meanwhile, over at the Lakeside, Martin 'Wolfie' Adams bagged his third world title in the longer established BDO tournament, which was sadly a little short of high quality action and drama this year.
