Competition is necessary, but no longer enough

Competition and Co-operation are not mutually exclusive. If either is used, results are ok. If both are used together, extraordinary things happen. In pure competition, agents try to succeed not by improving themselves but by undermining others. Think of Premier League football players who will dive or fake an injury to achieve an advantage. The emphasis is only on winning. The result is a race to the bottom.

If competition is combined with co-operation, agents try to succeed by improving themselves and that necessarily means helping their competitors who will mutually respond. Think of the Olympic Games this summer where there was striving not just to win but also to make the experience magnificent for all – even if you didn't win you were not left out. The emphasis is on both winning and achieving greatness together. The result is improvement for all.

Application to Economic Life

We have seen an example in sporting life: football vs Olympics. In business the former would be an investment bank while a historical example of the latter would be Henry Ford's motorcar business – reputedly the most successful business ever.

Privatise the gains, socialise the losses.

Efficiency is a perfectly good idea, but if applied too aggressively can be counter-productive. If each agent only looks after its own profit/loss account, the agents that make the most profit will be those that manage to collect money from the positive aspects of its business while forcing others to pay for the negative aspects of its business. The most extreme example of this is the financial industry's innovation of private-equity firms. A private -equity firm was widely implicated in the near financial collapse of the care home business.

Ideas from Biology

40 years ago, Darwin's theory of evolution was still being presented as 'Survival of the fittest'. The book that did the most to present that idea to a wide audience was Richard Dawkins 'The Selfish Gene', an extraordinary accomplishment mainly because he was such a gifted writer.

Biology has moved on however. While Darwin's theory is still fundamental to the study of life, the theory has been extended and built upon. There has been a lot of work on things like co-operation and symbiosis which arise from Darwin's theory. Both symbiosis and co-operation have been shown to be just as fundamental to life as competition using both experimental and theoretical methods.

Our own bodies are marvels of co-operation. Genes co-operate to build cells, cells co-operate to build organs and organs co-operate to give us life. Of course things occasionally come unstuck. Sometimes co-operation breaks down leaving competition the only route to success. When co-operation between cells breaks down, cells start reproducing uncontrollably. This is commonly known as cancer. Of course cancer is not a sustainable strategy as it eventually kills its host.

Summary – a Sustainable Future

Our athletes have given us a gift, a vision of what lies beyond our current ideas, ideas that came to the fore 30 years ago and have served us well until recently. We need new ideas to make sure we have a future and this doesn't mean dismantling the old ideas, it means improving and building upon them. Evolution not revolution.

Home Security - a Brief Reminder

It is all too easy to forget about the open window or the unlocked door; your chance forgetfulness is what the thief is waiting for. Make it a habit to keep doors and windows locked even when you are in the house.

Don't become complacent! Think security; just take the time to routinely practise some simple crime prevention measures, such as those which follow...

House unlit after Dark: use timing switches to turn on lights or radio while you are out, to make your home appear occupied.

Door Callers: Trading Standards, Police & N/H/Watch urge everyone **not** to buy at the door. Why not display a NHWatch **No Cold Calling Home** sticker and ignore uninvited callers, especially those who ignore your notice. Stickers are available **free** from the Town Council Offices (next to the Doctor's Surgery).

Bogus Callers & Walk in Theft: this happens to the least expecting & often to someone who is usually careful. Keep door chain or door bar on at all times especially when answering the door. If in doubt, keep them out. Do not allow entry without an appointment or notification Remember, a locked door prevents unwanted visitors

Garden Security: mark valuables with your post code using a simple UV pen; don't leave tools, toys, bikes etc. out unattended, lock them away, preferably out of sight.

Flask in the Fridge: please remember to update your data sheet inside the flask, following any change to either your medication or to your health. It is vital that if Emergency Services are called and refer to the information, it is accurate & up to date. This is for your benefit only. A simple method is to put your most recent medication script in the flask (as long as it has all current medication on it).

Jottings from Residents' Forum meeting January 2013

The first meeting of the New Year saw a good 'turnout' of residents. However, it was again disappointing that there was no representative from the Town or County Council; there has been no information or updates from Councillors since October 2012 meeting. The Forum has acknowledged how useful input from Councillors is, in fact residents miss a lot of information without such input.

The meeting again covered issues that seem to be taking an unacceptable time to resolve, in particular, the woodland at Neville Drive/ Cunningham Court and the funds involved in that. We understand residents in the Cunningham Court area have been sent information on Durham County Council (DCC) plans for the area and asked for comments or further suggestions – hardly proper community consultation! But we hope residents take the opportunity to give their individual views; the Forum agreed to send a response and ask for a breakdown of costs. It was also agreed it was time to involve the Press in the efforts to get to the bottom of why DCC retain interest from grant monies i.e. s106 for spending at their discretion, rather than attributing the interest to the relevant project as is seen as good practice by other Councils in the Country.

There was discussion on the progress of The Isle Wind Turbines, the proposed additional house building in the village, the new Sainsbury store, a new bus service using The Lane area of the village. Questions were asked about the Caravan Park at Hardwick Country Park and an update was given by the Area Action Partnership community representative. PC Todd gave a crime report and it is very pleasing to hear of the low levels of crime in our village. He also outlined a request for volunteers to help when he is monitoring speeding in the village. It is simply to help keep an eye on the readouts on the machines whilst the attending Police Officer is watching the vehicles, and is for quite short periods. Anyone interested please contact PC Todd.

The Forum also discussed the elections which will take place in May. In the past there have never been a great many residents standing for election; it would be really good to get some new and younger people who have made Sedgefield their home, to shape the future for their families. No particular qualifications are required - only a desire to do what is right for all our community. There is no need to be a member of any particular group or party. Forum members would be happy to help anyone interested so please get in touch.

The next Forum meeting is on March 4th at 7pm in the Fletcher Room, Parish Hall. Everyone is welcome.

Recently released figures for 2012 reveal that recorded crime in Sedgefield Village is down by 26% and Anti Social Behaviour is down 60%. This downward trend continues in Fishburn and the Trimdons. This is good news, but we must not be complacent. Thieves and low life in our society are still out on the streets. The police and, in particular, your local Neighbourhood Police Team will continue to work with the community to reduce these figures further during 2013. I would encourage residents to attend their Neighbourhood Watch meetings and Residents' Forum meetings which include the P.A.C.T. (Police and Community Together) meetings. These are YOUR meetings, so please come along. Details can be found in your Sedgefield News.

At the time of writing this report we have suffered four crimes in the village this year which include two plant pots containing ornamental trees taken from Turnpike Walk and two wheels taken from a Ford Escort in Eden Drive. The wheel arch was removed from a vehicle in Winterton and damage caused to a shop window in the High Street.

A meeting was held recently at the end of a Residents' Forum meeting. It was agreed that the Neighbourhood Police Team should continue to focus their attentions in Durham Road, especially motorists driving through the chicanes. Many people have noticed bad manners and poor driving skills in some drivers manoeuvring through the road safety area. You have been warned! Some drivers have already received warning letters through the post.

A meeting was held recently in the Golden Lion. Licensees report having had a busy and friendly Christmas and New Year. The one incident which spoilt the party which took place in the Black Lion has resulted in a male receiving a 12 month ban and a pending court case. Sports UPDATE with sports Editor, Chris LINES

Winter has finally got its grip on the UK, playing havoc with weekly sporting fixtures up and down the country. It's at this time of year that football fans travelling to away fixtures at the other end of the country set off on a bit of a wing and a prayer, especially in the lower leagues. Not only can the journey itself be difficult, but at any moment the game itself might get postponed. In this age of social media, news of a postponement might travel faster and to more people than in the past, but you still need to be sure that you can rely on the source of that news of course! It can be a really frustrating experience for fans, especially given the mounting cost of following a team.

It will stay the same until the clubs and authorities decide to work together to change the situation. It could happen, but the will needs to be there and at the moment, there appear to be too many vested interests (and too much greed) involved for much of significance to change. I hope the campaign has some effect, but I'm not optimistic. Back in Sedgefield, there has still been plenty of sport, and all great value for money, where there's any involved! Safe to say that 2013 looks set to be just as busy here as last year, which will be guite something.

Rugby

Sedgefield District Rugby Club managed to get in an early January game before the cold weather took hold, and they will be pleased that they did. Determined to start the second half of their season in style, they tackled a home fixture against Seghill, the team directly above Sedgefield in the league. Sedgefield started in great style and opened up a good lead in the first half. Early in the second half, the home team was temporarily reduced to 12 men with two in the sin bin and one being treated for an injury. This allowed Seghill to get a foothold in the match, but once Sedgefield had a full team again, they took control and completed a good 30 – 19 victory. We were down to 12 men for 10 minutes of the second half. During that time Seahill started to get a move on and ran in a few tries. Once we were back up to full strength the home side took back control of the game with some great defence and winning all of the scrums Sedgefield were always going to be the triumphant team. Worth a mention is that Owen seems to have re-set his right boot and is back on target and it was also nice to see Ollie playing well and winning the man of the match accolade despite G B's attempts to sabotage the decision. Training is on Tuesday and Thursday then we are away to STC on Saturday. Well done to all.

Football

Last month's update included news from two of Sedgefield's Sunday league teams; this time around I have a mid season report from St. Edmund's FC. St. Edmund's is Sedgefield's leading club and plays in the premier division of the Durham District Sunday League. It was always going to be difficult to match the success of last season and this term has not been straightforward. In the league, the team has recorded three wins, four draws and four

defeats. Meanwhile, St. Edmund's bowed out of the League Cup after a 2-0 defeat at Houghton Comrades, while a 3-2 County Cup win against Herington C.W. was followed by a 1-0 defeat at home to Billingham Cons the latter result was hard to take after so many chances were missed. There has been better news in the Heart Foundation Cup and the team has reached the guarter final stage by beating Washington J.F.C. on penalties. Team performances have been better than results suggest and St. Edmund's are confident of a strong finish to the season.

Squash

The final of Sedgefield Squash Club's individual handicap, was played on 8th January. The competition aims to level the field to give all players a chance of winning, albeit that advanced numeracy skills are required to understand the system! Daniel began strongly, surprising Peter by taking the game to him and playing some winners worthy of any player at the club. This resulted in him winning the first game 15 to -4. In the second

game Peter recovered, particularly in pulling together a run of almost 20 winning rallies, to bring the scores level at 14 each, after Daniel had been on match point. However, Daniel retained his composure, winning the next thrilling rally to take the game and therefore the match. For the second year in succession, this competition has been won by one of the club's up-and-coming juniors, demonstrating a healthy throughput of youngsters who are now able to compete with the adults.

Athletics

Winter is always a busy time for the Sedgefield Harriers. Along with numerous cross country races and ongoing training sessions, there are other events that prove to be popular every year. First in 2013 was the Old Monks Race hosted by Hartlepool Burn Road Harriers on 6th January. No less than 19 Harriers (10% of the entire field) turned out to run the five and a half mile multi-terrain route, starting and finishing in Hart Village. It was cool and dry, perfect for running, but recent wet weather made for tricky muddy sections, especially on the two major climbs. David Greatorex was first Harrier home in 35:52, coming 13th overall and claiming the first Male Vet 40 category prize. Justin Cox was next in 36:35, followed by Chris Lines in 38:45. Another 11 male Sedgefield Harriers finished the race, led by the ever-improving Dave Walker. First lady Harrier home was Gail Bell, finishing in a time of 42:24, closely followed by Abie Hearmon in 43:16 (just pipped to the post by brother Sam in an impressive sprint finish). Chris Hearmon was third Sedgefield lady in 47:47, coming second in her age category. Marie Walker and Suzanne Tait followed, with only a second separating them on the finish line.

The Old Monks proved to be a great warm up (metaphorically speaking) for the Harriers' own first big event of the year, the winter handicap race for the Gerry Kearsley Memorial Trophy, on 13th January. The race attracted a record field of 91 runners from all over the North East. Temperatures were kinder than forecast but the clear early morning had given way to foggy conditions by the time the race started. There was plenty of mud in several places on the route, but by and large the course was much better going than could have been expected. You would have got long odds at a bookmaker for predicting the winners of the trophies, once again presented by patron and sponsor Peggy Kearsley. First home overall was talented junior Sedgefield Harrier Sean Haycock having covered the 6.5 mile trail course in 45:09 off a 9 minute handicap. Coach Scott Hydon had provided the handicaps for a bunch of Sedgefield juniors running in the senior race for the first time and the senior competition was just what Sean needed to spur him on to a great performance. It is expected that his handicap will have come down in time for the summer event! Angela Proctor of Elvet Striders was second overall with a run time of 53:46 (3 mins handicap) and Jan Naisbett of Hartlepool Burn Road Harriers was third with a run time of 57:11 (zero mins handicap).

The fastest man over the course was Will Horsley of Elvet Striders with a time of 38:02 (23 mins handicap) and the fastest lady was Gail Bell of Sedgefield Harriers in 45:33 (15 mins handicap). Having taken the overall trophy, Sean also stepped up to take the award for first Sedgefield Harrier home and fellow junior Erin Peters took the trophy for first Sedgefield Harriers lady with a time of 53:33 (5 minutes handicap).

The senior event was preceded by a junior handicap race that attracted 37 youngsters, along with BBC Look North, filming a feature on multi event specialist Aimee Barlow. In the boys' handicap, the winner was Daniel Buckle, followed by Tom Hearmon and Ciaran Lines (all Sedgefield Harriers). In the girls' race, Harrier Carla Abel won, with Harriet Rogers second and Megan Noble in third. Well done to everyone who took part in the handicaps and to all the marshals and other volunteers who made the events possible.

Racing

Sedgefield Racecourse is now offering free entry to all under 18s throughout 2013. At a time when family leisure activities are increasing in price and many venues are lowering the age limit for free entry, the racecourse is bucking the trend and helping to make a family day out at the races a more affordable option. Under the new arrangements, a family of four (two adults and two children under 18) can attend one of the meetings for as little as £26.
