# The Final Fling, 2016

Friday night certainly was Music Night as The Cricket Club hosted the annual Welly Hoyers' Variety Show during the New Year's weekend. Attentive readers of The News might remember that this event was previewed in October's edition of the paper. Anyone who took the opportunity to attend was treated to a distinctive assortment of comedy and musical entertainment. Occasionally accomplished, sometimes not quite so, this good humoured fun was enthusiastically embraced by a receptive audience of over a hundred. The event, which has run for almost twenty years, is all about raising money for charity whilst having a fun night out. In that time, a number of charities have been beneficiaries with the Air Ambulance Service receiving donations on a number of occasions. This year Cancer Research will benefit from the Welly Hoyer's efforts following recent deaths due to cancer of friends and colleagues who have been associated with the show over a number of years. The show kicked off with a stirring performance of the Black Eyed Peas' party anthem, 'Tonight's Gonna be a Good Night'. The performers, looking more "Dippy Hippy" than "Hip Hop Dance Pop", revealed themselves to be a collection of members and friends of the organising committee. The earnest, but not too serious, approach to the evening having been established Charlie, one of the band members, stepped forward to explain the history of the noble and honourable art of Welly Hoying.

Taking the audience back to the 1970s, he conjured a vision of bored Sedgefield farmers passing their time competing to see who could throw their Welly the furthest. The idea caught on and very soon crowds would gather down 'The Crimer' (the playing field between Ivy House and Hornby Avenue), wellies in hand,

# **Charity fundraiser continues to raise the bar**

A dedicated fundraiser has vowed to continue to raise money and awareness for cancer charity group Bloodwise, after seeing recent contributions under his #NotOneInch banner exceed £25k. Paul McGeary from Newton Aycliffe was 33 when he was struck with Acute Promyelocytic Leukaemia just over two years ago. Despite beating the disease in 2015, he suffered a heartbreaking relapse in July 2016. Throughout the ordeal, McGeary busied himself raising funds. Wth help and encouragement from family, friends and strangers alike, efforts in those 2 years accumulated £24,112.38, prior to Christmas. McGeary was buoyed just days into 2017 by a phone call from Sedgefield Community College, where he works as a Maths teacher, to say that staff and pupils had raised almost £1500, meaning the £25k mark was eclipsed, bringing the current total raised to a whopping £25,582.23. "I was made aware that school were raising monies, but had no idea contributions would

reach anywhere near £1500. I almost fell over when I was told of the total amount," he said.

"I couldn't have been much prouder of the efforts of the students and my work colleagues, and it gives me motivation to continue to raise awareness and funds, and also to beat this disease a second time and lead a normal life again, including a return to work." Previously, staff and students from the high-achieving school – which recently featured in The Sunday Times online list of the UK's top-50 11-16 schools - had raised £700, meaning almost 10% of the total amount has come via their efforts. The school supports many charities, but when student reps were asked who they wished to raise funds for via the annual non-uniform day and Christmas celebrations, they unanimously agreed on Mr McGeary's campaign.

A spokesman said "The students have followed his story from day one, and have really bought into the message of raising vital funds and awareness for Bloodwise ... They should be really proud, as we are of them."

Mr McGeary has now launched a campaign to get more people signed up to the bone marrow registry; he himself seeks a donor to further improve his chances of beating leukaemia for good. People in good health, aged 16-55, can find more at www.anthonynolan.org


# Steve's Nature Diary

### The natural world month by month: February

I am writing this just after a birding trip to Hartlepool fish quay — a strange place you might think to go to look for birds. In winter, it is possible to see a number of birds that come into shelter and feed in and around Hartlepool Headland. This includes common waders like Oystercatcher, Redshank, Curlew and Turnstone which especially at high tide can been seen in amongst the rocks. You may also see small groups of hyperactive Sanderling following the tide in and out looking for food. There may be some sea ducks as well, such as Common Scoter and Eider.

But in winter it's the Gulls and Divers that I go to see and it was my lucky day as I managed to see two of the white winged gulls both at the same time which helps with identification. Scanning gulls can get a little tedious but it's the only way to spot the visitors from the North – you need to check their wings. Both Iceland and Glaucous Gulls have white wing tips. The first bird I saw was the Iceland Gull, the smaller one of the two which is slightly smaller than a Herring Gull with a rounded head and smallish beak, giving it a somewhat dove-like expression.

This was then joined by a much larger bird; a **Glaucous Gull** (pictured), bigger than a Herring gull and bulkier, with a fiercer expression, larger beak and squarer head. Both feed on fish either alive or dead with the bigger Glaucous Gull quite often chasing smaller gulls and forcing them to drop their catch so they can eat it. It was a good start to the New Year list.





two. Three divers can generally be seen off the east coast and I was looking for the largest of the three, the Great Northern Diver. This bird, like the gulls, breeds further north in Greenland, Iceland and Svalbard and is a winter visitor to Hartlepool. It has a bigger, heavier head (with bumpy forehead) and bill than its commoner relatives the Red-throated and Black-throated Divers. All the divers in winter are black and white and to see them in their true glory you need to go to Scotland in the summer. That's another story, but it is still good to see them in winter plumage not far from home.

### **Temporary speed restrictions**

are in place on the A689 until the end of February to enable works to be undertaken on the 'rail over road' bridge adjacent to the Vet Hospital/ petrol station near junction 60 of the A1(M). Delays can be expected.

A planning application has been submitted to Durham County Council, including a full application for a new road from the existing roundabout within NetPark, running parallel to the A177, and for a new junction giving the new road access to the A177. 12-year-old Jessica has been offered the chance to go to Atlanta, Georgia to ride trained barrel horses and to represent England in the Youth World Barrel Competition at the end of July. Barrel racing is a sport which originated in America. Horse and rider attempt to complete a course around pre-set barrels in the fastest time.

Jessica is currently trying to raise enough funds to make her dream come true and enable her to take this fantastic opportunity in the birthplace of the sport, the USA. Last summer, Jessica and her family sadly lost her beloved pony, Abbi, who she had been training and competing on for the past two years. Jessica told me that becoming Northern Lights Junior Champion twice on Abbi has been her biggest accomplishment in barrel racing so far.

The National Barrel Horse Association England, offered her this chance and Jessica and her family are currently trying to raise enough funds to go to the USA, which could open many doors for the 12-year-old to travel and compete in her sport all around the world.


One Step Forward (formerly Sedgefield Bereavement Support Group) have been meeting every Thursday (from 3 to 5 pm) in St. Edmund's Church since the beginning of November 2014. Although we are closed between Christmas and New Year, people can still contact me or other members of the group by phone, text or email during the festive season. Over the next few editions, I hope to be able to provide some insight into bereavement and how it affects us and those around us.

As I write this, we have just finished celebrating Christmas and the New Year, a time when we are expected to be supremely happy. For many of us, Christmas is a painful reminder of those we have lost, but we are expected to put our grief to one side, and concentrate on having FUN.

What is grief? Grief is the love that we

What is grief? Grief is the love that we feel for someone when that someone is no longer with us. We grieve when someone we love dies, but we can also grieve when a child leaves home, or moves abroad; when we leave/lose our job; when a relationship ends; when we relocate. I refer to it as a steam train, as the effect is so total, so overwhelming, and we have no control over it. Some of these losses also act as a trigger, and a previous bereavement can resurface when we least expect it.

How do we manage grief? When the steam train comes, we have no option



but to go with it. There are as many ways to cope with the effect of grief as there are people. There is no right or wrong way, so long as no one is adversely affected, but one of the best ways is to acknowledge it. Painful as it is, it is far worse NOT to talk about the person who has died and the effect their death has had on us.

Grief has a very physical effect on us: we feel physical pain; we hear those we have lost; smell their perfume; see them even. And when we come across someone newly bereaved, we don't know what to say, so we avoid talking about the bereavement. We avoid eye contact, even cross the road to avoid talking to them, because we don't know what to say, for fear of upsetting the newly-bereaved.

Terry Kettering's poem 'The Elephant in the Room' describes beautifully the effect of not talking about a bereavement. Copyright prevents me from reproducing the poem, but it ends: 'For if we talk about her death, perhaps we can talk about her life. Can I say her name to you and not have you look away?' If you have been bereaved recently, or not-so-recently, talk to someone about the one you have lost, and please feel free to join us in St Edmund's on a Thursday afternoon. ### **Letter from PC Todd**

Happy New Year to you all. I'd like to stay positive and look forward to a crime free 12 months but sadly, the New Year has not started well for some residents with a number of burglaries and cases of criminal damage occurring in and around the village. Burglaries took place at Sedgefield Cricket Club, Hardwick Park Visitor Centre and at a property at Howe Hill Plantation as well as at dwellings in White House Drive and Kerr Crescent. Residents should make sure they consistently take all routine precautions to minimise the risk of such danger to themselves. (See Neighbourhood Watch advice.)

In Chestnut Road a window was broken by a brick and in Naylor Road a window was smashed by unknown persons throwing an unidentified object at it. It is also a good time to remind residents to be ever alert to Fraud scams. Fraudsters will use telephone, post or email to target people (very often the elderly) to relieve you of your money.

Be wary of any stories given to you by unsolicited communications of this type – stories that will always end in a request for you to send some of your money or financial details. In a recent fraud of this type victims are informed that they owe HMRC tax and that, to prevent them being arrested, they should pay the debt in a manner which is then described to them. This is, of course all nonsense. Official bodies would never make such threats in such a casual way. The police take all crime seriously and invite all residents to report any suspicious activity they see, including vehicle registration numbers, which might assist in apprehending offenders.

### **Pub Watch**

A meeting was held recently at the Hardwick Arms. Licensees reported a busy Christmas period but a quiet New Year. No incidents were reported that required further action by members.

Despite the regrettable closure of The Crosshills, the village still retains many drinking and food outlets, and I would encourage residents new and old to visit these premises – drinking responsibly at all times, of course!

# **Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel**

**Basic home security** In view of PC Todd's latest crime report it is a good time to remind people of the measures we can all take to make the criminal's task more difficult. Make it a habit to keep doors and windows locked *even* when you are at home and check that all windows and doors are locked when you leave home. Don't leave the opportunity the thief or burglar is waiting for.

**After dark use timing switches** to turn on lights or a radio while you are out; make your home appear occupied.

**Don't buy from cold callers at the door.** Why not display a 'No Cold Calling' home sticker and ignore any uninvited callers - *especially* those who ignore *your* notice?

**Bogus Callers & Walk in Theft**. Do not allow anyone into your house. A door chain or a door bar are very useful in helping you to control who enters your house.

**Garden Security** Mark your valuables with your post code using a simple UV pen. Don't leave tools, toys, bikes etc. out unattended; lock them away - preferably out of sight!

### **New Year, New Beginning**


Sedgefield Out of School Fun Club is now "officially" in possession of its new home, having moved into the building in the last days of November, only a week or two behind the original schedule. Manager Sue Bell, explained, "Small groups of children had visited the new building in the days leading up to the completion of the centre, so that they would have some experience of their new space when moving day arrived. When the day came, we finished club on Friday evening and worked through the weekend so the children could start the next week in their new building."

The Out of School Club celebrated the completion of their new facility with an official opening ceremony and reception on January 12th, when the building was opened by nine year old Grace Rowe, assisted by the Mayor of Sedgefield, Cllr. Chris Lines. Grace, an Out of School Club member and pupil of the Rectory Row school, won the chance to cut the ceremonial ribbon when her name was pulled of the hat in a draw for the honour. Councillor Lines addressed the crowd of parents, children, supporters and friends of the Club, congratulating staff and management on the completion of the project. He highlighted the club's growth and development in recent years and looked forward to a continuation of that success. A reception in the new building gave everyone the chance to experience the spaces for smaller children downstairs and junior school children in the mezzanine area. The dedicated craft area and the large, well equipped kitchen also attracted positive comment. Visitors socialised together and to speak to staff and managers about this exciting, new stage in the development of the Out of School Club.

Ms Bell was gratified by the strong turnout for the opening was very gratifying and received "very positive feedback from parents". "Obviously," she continued, "the children are delighted with their bright new surroundings, comfortable furnishings and improved equipment."

More importantly, the new situation presents some exciting possibilities for the future. Managing the new facility will result in fewer overheads, allowing Fun Club to expand its provision during holiday times and the newly vacated room in the school building can now be used by Sedgefield Primary as a nursery facility. Sue feels that these developments can "lead to greater flexibility to respond to the needs of children and parents and to improve the provision of wrap-around care on the site.

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## SPORTS UPDATE

### **Rugby Union**

Sedgefield District RUFC has been made to battle hard often this season but they have never been overwhelmed by some very tough opponents. Hosting high-flying Redcar they secured a very hard won 16-10 victory. The following game they lost narrowly, 39-34, to a very accomplished Darlington team. Trailing 21-8 at half-time they battled back to leave their hosts relieved to hear the final whistle It was a sign of the club's recent progress that they ran a strong Darlington side so close.

Meanwhile, the 'social' Saxons team also continues to make good progress and have more fixtures lined up for 2017, offering plenty of opportunities for players of all abilities. The club continues to recruit new blood (aged 17 and above) and has three coaches to help develop talent. And as with all community organisations, new volunteers will be welcome. Training is held every Tuesday and Thursday evening on the pitch, starting at 7:00pm. ### **Athletics**

For the senior men at Sedgefield Harriers, a big focus of the 2016/17 cross country season is the North East Harrier League. This team event sees clubs across the region compete over six fixtures at locations across the North East. Sedgefield Harriers (men, women and juniors) have been participating in the events for years, but have rarely managed to field full teams on a consistent basis, until this season.

In the senior men's event, each club's first six runners count in the scoring. Clearly, to be successful in the competition, it is crucial to for each club's runners to finish in as high a position as possible. These finishing positions are converted into points which decide the clubs overall position in the fixture. League table points are then awarded according to that position and this determines the club's standing in the North East Harrier League after each fixture.

To succeed in the Harrier League, a club needs to have a committed squad, with strength in depth. It's not just the first six over the line in each race that matter. Of course, it's crucial to record low scores among the six counters but it's equally important for other runners in the squad to perform well and push the competitors from other clubs down the rankings. Are you still with me?

Because Sedgefield Harriers did not field full teams consistently last season, the senior men started the year in the third of the three divisions in The Harrier League . After the first fixture, they sat in seventh place. However, the subsequent three races have seen Sedgefield fly up the table and with two races to go, the club is in second place. In the most recent fixture, at Herrington in Sunderland, the aggregate score recorded by the first six Harriers was the lowest recorded by the 55 clubs in all three divisions. The top two teams will be promoted, so the Harriers will be pulling out all of the stops to continue this great run of performances in the final two races, on 11<sup>th</sup> February (Thornley) and 4<sup>th</sup> March (Alnwick).
