DNAs are a serious problem for the NHS

Within Skerne Medical Group, between 1st November and mid-December, DNAs (Did Not Attends) equated to 80 hours of wasted appointments.

Patients not arriving for Face to Face Appointments or being unavailable for a Booked Telephone Consultation are hugely costly in both time and money. We understand that things can change very quickly, but if you are unable to make your scheduled appointment, PLEASE let us know as soon as possible. Call the main surgery number and select Option 1. Remember, every DNA reduces the number of appointments available for other patients.

Verbal abuse

Most patients appreciate those who treat them, but a minority of people are abusive or violent towards staff and the NHS has taken a zero tolerance approach to this problem since 1999. Sadly, at this practice we have seen a noted increase in verbal aggression by patients during visits or telephone consultations. We recognise that there can be contributory reasons for difficult or challenging behaviour, but where this tips over into aggression or violence, we will adopt a zero tolerance approach.

We wish to reassure our patients that all staff try their very best to meet requests appropriately and hope you understand that while the pandemic situation continues, there may sometimes be unforeseen and unavoidable delays in meeting your requests.

COVID-19 has caused more families to struggle with everyday living.

Blue Plaques: can you help?

Durham County County's blue plaques appraisal panel is carrying out an audit of plaques, blue or otherwise, which commemorate places or people of interest in County Durham.

The scheme in its current form has been operating for a couple of years and DCC is now establishing a website to include interesting local history marked by plaques, and in some cases, stories of people or places which are of interest and significance but do not fit the criteria for the current scheme.

They also want to include plaques awarded under other schemes, for instance, the old district councils, heritage associations, etc.

To identify plaques in your area, they need the following details: what the plaque commemorates, its precise location, the scheme it was awarded under, the story behind the award and if possible, a photograph. But if you don't have all of the information, they say anything is better than nothing, so don't hold back! Vaccine fraud

Criminals are using the COVID-19 vaccine as a way to target the public by tricking them to hand over cash or financial details. They are sending convincing looking text messages letting people know they are eligible for the vaccine or phoning people directly pretending to be from the NHS, or local pharmacy.

The NHS will

NEVER ask for payment - the vaccine is free.

NEVER ask for your bank details

NEVER arrive at your house unannounced to administer the vaccine NEVER ask you to prove your identify by sending personal documents such as your passport

If you think you've been a victim of fraud or identity theft, report it to Action Fraud online at actionfraud.police.uk or call them on 0300 123 2040.

Police recently attended and issued orders to disperse, when more than 100 youths gathered in the centre of Sedgefield. This appears to have been organised on social media and it amounts, basically, to encouraging people to break the law, as well as putting lives at risk through COVID infection. Please note that the Government has asked Police to get tough on those that actively flout the current restrictions, so be prepared to receive a fine and, potentially, a criminal record which can affect you for the rest of your life.

GREENER SEDGEFIELD

During the first lockdown many people discovered their green fingers and turned to gardening as never before. For some it might have become a new hobby, but admittedly not everyone might be able or willing to keep up the work. Lack of time, knowledge or ability can dampen the budding gardener in us and turn us to low maintenance gardening. But can we have a garden which is both low maintenance and "green"? Paving is one preferred option for low maintenance garden. No mowing or grass maintenance, rarely any weeding and it can be livened up with potted plants and flowers. But the downside is not only depriving the wildlife of their natural habitat and further threatening the already declining bee population, but on a paved area there's nowhere for excess rainwater to drain. You may not notice it normally, but during heavy downpours, rainwater will accumulate, being unable to soak into the ground. The ageing sewage system was not designed to accommodate the increasing levels of surface water it is now expected to carry, and can quickly become overwhelmed. Flooding is inevitable in some areas.

Artificial grass may offer better drainage solutions, as long as the soil below does not get badly compacted, but it still steals habitat from wildlife - no critters can dwell in the polyethylene that artificial grass is made of. Over time the quality of manmade grass has become safer for humans and pets, and is longer lasting, but the environmental impact has changed little. The rubber filling, made from tyres and often used as infill on plastic lawns and football pitches, is the main culprit when it comes to health concerns. Also, rubber granules and polyethylene grass are big contributors to micro plastic pollution.

Artificial grass doesn't cool the environment as natural turf does - in fact, in hot weather it makes the surrounding area even hotter. Neither does it filter air and water pollutants, as does natural turf. So, how to have a low maintenance garden which does not cripple the environment? Happily, the traditional "perfect" lawn now has a very worthy competitor - the wildflower meadow. It ticks many boxes. It's pretty to look at and it carries huge benefits for wildlife. You feel closer to nature, the children can learn about mini beasts and plants, and it doesn't need constant work! STEVE'S NATURE DIARY FEBRUARY 2021

I know this is a little late for New Year's resolutions, but people often ask me what can they do to help the environment. I always say "join your local wildlife trust" followed by suggestions about the usual green activities: refuse, repair, reduce, reuse, recycle and rethink your waste; reduce your carbon footprint; cut down your travel; and environmentally friendly gardening - something we can all do.

One issue that "The Wildlife Trusts" advocate strongly for is the reduction in the use of peat based compost. At present we use around 2 million cubic metres of peat every year. There has been a reduction, but only 1 in 20 bags of peat on sale is peat free and an average bag of peat based compost contains 40% peat. Why does it matter? Peat has been a major ingredient of compost sold for gardening for many years.

Peat is dug out of wild places, damaging some of our last remaining peatlands here in the UK and overseas in places like eastern Europe. It destroys habitats which have taken thousands of years to form. Peatlands are amazingly wild places, home to birds, insects and unusual plants that aren't found anywhere else. This process also releases carbon into the atmosphere, accelerating climate change. They are the world's best carbon sinks, they lock away more carbon than the rest of the planets vegetation combined. Digging up the peat to use in gardens releases the carbon into the air again. The stored carbon combines with oxygen in the air and releases as carbon dioxide with harmful effects on the climate. Peat degradation in the lowland bogs of England alone releases 11 million tonnes of greenhouse gases per year - that is equivalent to around three coal fired power stations.

The Wildlife Trust and other environmental charities are calling for a ban on using peat by 2025. Garden celebrities are supporting it as well. Monty Don said "There is no garden, however beautiful, that justifies the scale of environmental damage or contribution to climate change that peat use causes. The extraction of peat for horticultural use is an act of environmental vandalism. It causes irreparable environmental damage. The fact that it also significantly contributes to the release of CO2 and aggravates the effects of climate change adds salt to a grievous wound". Peat free compost is available – if everyone used it our peatlands would be safe from this type of damaging practice. It's often not the first compost you see, or necessarily the cheapest, but if you ask most stores do stock it. By buying peat free you're helping our precious peatlands and sending a message to manufacturers that people want peat free products. Both are really important. So why not make it a New Year's resolution to only buy peat free compost and if your supplier doesn't have it ask why!

Sedgefield in Bloom

We are very grateful to those who supported our Christmas tree recycling project. Collected in early January, your trees were loaded up and taken to the new woodland beside NETPark, to be put to good use by Woodland & Wildlife project volunteers. Chopped and chipped, the trees will provide valuable wildlife habitats and mulch.

Stalwart Bloomers Doug Etherington, Ian Milne, Gary Hetherington, Alice Hobson and her husband, Neil were joined by new volunteer Phil Stewart. Phil is a Jet 2 pilot who is part time furloughed. He has helped out a lot this winter with leaf collection and heavier tasks - and has also reduced the average age of the Bloom team considerably!

As well as bringing in valuable funds, this project has highlighted recycling and

community, two very important aspects of the Bloom ethos. We were delighted to be able to work in collaboration with W & W volunteers and hope to repeat this very successful project next Christmas. Funds raised will be devoted to the purchase of spring planting. Alongside the work council gardeners, we'll keep Sedgefield blooming beautifully throughout the year.
