Haven't heard of Kromek? Read on ...

Kromek, the first tenant on NETPark is commercialising some cutting edge technology that has applications in security, industry, defence and medicine. It has grown rapidly since 2005 and is poised to become a well-known name the world over.

For 20 years the department of physics at Durham University investigated how to produce defect-free crystals of an intriguing and useful semiconductor. Defect-free crystals of this semiconductor are very good at detecting X-rays and gamma-rays (X-rays in medical imaging and gamma-rays generated in nuclear reactors and from outer space). Durham Crystals Ltd, a spin-off company from the University proved the applicability and now Kromek is selling products based on the technology with more to come.

If you have been through Durham Tees Valley Airport recently you may have had some bottle contents scrutinised by a piece of equipment with the Kromek label displayed proudly on the front. Using their X-ray detectors, this equipment can tell what materials are contained in bottles from their X-ray 'signature'. The equipment is so accurate it can tell the difference between shampoo and liquid explosive. The trials at our local airport have proved so successful, that the CEO of Kromek predicts that all UK airports will be using their equipment in a few months time!

That is not the only application of Kromek's technology in current use. At Japan's tsunami-damaged Fukushima Nuclear Power Plant, Kromek's detectors are being put to use in detecting damaging gamma-rays coming from the core. For those budding astronauts amongst you who have been following the latest Mars mission that blasted off from Florida a few weeks ago, you will be interested to hear that Kromek's technology is being put to use in the latest Mars rover, called Curiosity. We shall probably be hearing a lot from and about Curiosity in about 8 months time when it lands on Mars.

An interesting application in development is medical imaging. Kromek are currently working on medical X-ray machines that provide 3-dimensional images. If you want to look out for it in future years, the technology's acronym is XRA.

The CEO of Kromek, Dr Arnab Bashu, was keen to point out that Kromek's success extends further still. To date, the company has 140 patents in semiconductors and has received international recognition from the US Dept of Defense in their Security SME of the Year award. There has been personal success for Indian-born, anglicised Arnab, who was awarded UK Entrepreneur of the Year by Ernst & Young. Watch out world, here comes north-east manufacturing pride born aloft by people like Arnab.

For those who eyes gloss over when the conversation turns to science here is a YouTube video link: http://youtu.be/kgE2Q_zjoZQ. For all you science nerds (and the intellectually curious) here comes the good stuff:

The technique for creating defect-free crystals of the semiconductor Cadmium Telluride (CdTe) is called vapour-deposition. The technique was nicely compared by Arnab to nature creating black ice on roads. Black ice is created when water vapour in the air hits a very cold surface (black tarmac) and deposits a layer of water ice. Over time this builds up into a substantial crystal of water ice that happens to be relatively defect-free and so absolutely clear. The alternative technique is called liquid-deposition and can be compared to making ice cubes in the freezer. It creates a crystal of water ice, but one with lots of defects in the crystal causing it to be opaque. Kromek's radiation detectors are CdTe crystals that need to be defect-free for high efficiency operation.

These detectors can also identify the material that the particles of radiation penetrate. They can measure the energy of an incoming particle of radiation accurately and from the detection of many radiation particles, build an energy 'profile' of the material which can be matched to many known substances, including explosives. We will know that the science has arrived when one of Kromek's machines appears on an episode of CSI!

My apologies go to the talented people who work at NETPark for a couple of mistakes in the last article. I wrote NETpark, an obvious error which a few eagle-eyed readers may have spotted. Secondly, NETPark is owned by Durham County Council and has developed strong partnerships with Durham University and the Centre for Process Innovation around NETPark.

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel Details from the Christmas Meeting held on 13th December 2011 Remembering Jeanette Garbutt

Meeting: Details from Durham Police Authority Group meeting, held on 28th Nov.

- In 2012 a Police & Crime Commissioner will be appointed, the Police Authority will disband and a new structure will be formed.
- Good solid reductions in crime have been achieved this year despite budget restraints.
- Alcohol is involved in more Police work than any other issue. It is responsible for costs of £55billion each year (nationally) in Police, NHS & Local Authority services.
- Durham Police are totally committed to Neighbourhood Policing.
- PCSO's provide more than 50% of "intelligence" to Durham Police. Their contribution to the public and Durham Police's achievements were highly praised by Deputy Chief Constable Barton.
- PACTS have proved successful. They are now able to be more flexible in how they are organised and managed in different localities (DCC Barton). They are still essential to get local public input to decision making on priorities for Policing in their local area.

Police Priorities for 2012 / 2013 are:

1. Tackling anti-social behaviour in partnership
2. Reducing the impact of alcohol abuse on people and communities
3. Protecting vulnerable people from harm

Community Liaison Officer: Neil Langthorne asked members to visit the National N/H/Watch website and to consider signing up to their e-petition relating to Scrap Metal thefts. Neil pointed out that DCC Barton values the work done by N/H/Watch members highly also. In support of this he would like members to be signed up to "voice connect" and that he wants the (street) N/H/Watch contact to be briefed by the Police officer who attends any crime in a street covered by N/H/Watch.

Crime Prevention Officer: Mark Pheasant gave details of the Winter Nights project and reminded everyone of the need to take basic prevention measures (lights, curtains, doors – locked etc.). Mark is available to visit any member of the public to give advice on home security if contacted.

Police – Local Crime Report: Keith circulated his report covering the two months up to the meeting. He discussed the crimes recorded and gave more details about arrests made and relevant information to our locality; which members found most valuable. The state of the Youth shelter, due to vandalism, was discussed; PC Todd acknowledged the damage caused.

Police Crime Report from 12th Oct-13th Dec 2011 stated that there were: 235 calls to the Police (81xTraffic; 15xCrime; 139 x other). 15 Crimes recorded (3 Burglaries, 9 Thefts and 3 of Damage).

Youth Provision: Laura Sloan who is now in Sedgefield to promote a Sedgefield Youth Work project was introduced to the meeting. C/man Ken Saiger invited Laura to explain her role and explain to members what she hopes to achieve. Laura is leading the project initially for 6 weeks starting in January and is focussing on getting a drop in centre working again. Below are the details of the drop in for the first 6 weeks of 2012.

Sedgefield Youth Work project is holding 6 young people's drop in sessions at Sedgefield Parish Hall running on a Friday night, starting on Friday 6th January 2012 6pm - 8:30pm until Friday 10th February. Activities will include issue based work such as alcohol, games, arts and crafts and cookery. The sessions are aimed at young people 12-19 year old. Jottings from Sedgefield Residents' Forum

There was no Forum meeting in December as it has been agreed that the Forum will now meet bi-monthly, alternating with the Neighbourhood Watch Group so that the police can still hold PACT (Police and Community Together) meetings on a monthly basis. So the next Forum meeting will be on January 9th 2012 at 7pm in the Fletcher Room, Parish Hall.

*On December 6th DCC (Durham County Council) held a planning meeting and whilst it is not the final decision DCC have recommended refusal of the proposed wind turbines for Spring/Foxton Lane. The final decision will, however, be made by a planning inspector as the developer has gone straight to appeal on the grounds of 'non determination' i.e. DCC did not consider the proposal in the statutory time period. So we will all have to be ready for another appeal hearing to try to protect our community from the impact of this proposal.

*The same meeting considered the application for a new supermarket on Salters Lane Industrial Estate and granted permission for the project. There is still considerable concern regarding traffic increase as a result of the plan; hopefully the developer can solve any traffic problems!

*Residents are remaining alert to noise disturbance in the village and an email address has been established with a request that anyone experiencing noise from any commercial establishment in or around the village should record information on the site i.e. date, time, type of noise and origin of noise if known. The email address is pttp.sedgefield@hotmail.co.uk so please use the facility and help to protect our environment from noise disturbance.

Housing provider to tackle unemployment

As youth unemployment breaks the 1 million mark and the UK's wider unemployment reaches a 15-year high, one of County Durham's largest registered housing providers is taking bold steps in an effort to tackle the problem across south Durham.

livin (formerly sbh) recently announced a new image and strategy for the company and has wasted no time in appointing an Employability Co-ordinator, Helen Johnson (pictured right).

The social housing company has set itself the ambitious target of supporting over 100 people into training and employment over the next three years. Tenants will be offered one-to-one support through a series of bespoke training packages as well as help to develop basic skills such as interview techniques and CV writing. Younger tenants will also be supported through new interventions, including the internationally recognised training programme The Duke of Edinburgh Award, in partnership with the DurhamGate development. Up to 60 young people a year will be supported through the programme which is part of the company's 'first steps' approach to get young people into training and employment.

New local Police number (see poster on left)

An easy to remember non-emergency police number was launched in our region in December. You can now call 101 for non-emergency issues such as minor traffic collisions, criminal damage or if they want to speak to a local neighbourhood officer about an issue affecting their community.

Calls to 101 will cost 15p per call, no matter what time of day it is, or how long the call lasts. This means everyone calling the police will know exactly how much a call will cost them, whether they're calling from a landline or a mobile phone. Calls are free from public phone boxes.

People should continue to call 999 in an emergency - when a crime is in progress, there is danger to life or violence is being used or threatened. Local councils should still be contacted on their existing phone numbers for issues such as dog fouling or litter.

Sedgefield in Bloom

Plans are already well under way for exciting blooming projects for 2012, but more volunteers, in whatever capacity, would be welcomed with open arms. This year, as well as entering Northumbria in Bloom, Sedgefield has been invited to take part in Britain in Bloom. In 2009, the last time we participated in the national competition, Sedgefield won silver. It would be great to turn that silver into gold.

The economic cuts we are all suffering at the moment have thrown greater responsibility on to the voluntary sector so fund-raising is more crucial than ever. Members of the Sedgefield in Bloom team run successful coffee mornings, as well as planting, weeding, litter picking and undertaking major projects like Winterton Community Garden and refurbishment of planted areas all around the village. We have also had fantastic support from the local primary schools, Community College and our generous band of sponsors and supporters. The group meets on the first Wednesday of the month at 10am in the council offices and a dedicated band of Bloomers meet every Wednesday morning to complete gardening tasks around the village. Regular updates appear on the Sedgefield in Bloom Sponsor Board outside the parish hall.

And so 2011 draws to an end. As ever, the year has been packed with great sporting moments, internationally, nationally and of course here in Sedgefield. Outside of our part of the world, highlights for me have included: England's inexorable rise to the top of the world test cricket rankings; the performances of Mo Farah and Dai Greene in the world athletics championships (and my money is still on Jessica Ennis grabbing a gold in London 2012); the domination of the world of golf by European players, led by Luke Donald, Rory McIlroy and Lee Westwood (not to mention Darren Clarke and his fairytale win in the Open); the open water and pool successes of Keri-Anne Payne and Rebecca Adlington (appallingly overlooked by the 'experts' who shortlisted candidates for the BBC Sports Personality of the Year Award); and last, but the opposite of least, the achievements of cyclist Mark Cavendish in the Tour de France and world road cycling championships. Oh, and a quick word for Jonny Wilkinson. He may have retired from international rugby union following a very disappointing world cup, but nothing will ever tarnish that moment in 2003 when he secured the Webb Ellis Cup for England with his right boot. He was an outstanding player and a great role model for any aspiring sportsperson.

Meanwhile, here in Sedgefield, there has been success at many levels on and off the field of play. Sedgefield Cricket Club has had an outstanding year. The club facilities have been significantly improved, while all of the teams have performed brilliantly. Sedgefield Squash Club continues to field competitive men's and women's teams, while at the same time introducing more and more young people to the sport. Sedgefield District Rugby Union Club now has a new pitch adjacent to the cricket ground, the result of a huge amount of hard work. So far, the team has been performing admirably on that new pitch. The village's three Sunday league football teams are now all in the top two divisions of the Durham Sunday League, a great effort for a relatively small community. If you have read the front page of this issue of the Sedgefield News, you will already know that the awards keep piling up for Sedgefield Harriers – Northern Echo Local Heroes Team of the Year, North East Development Club of the Year, England Athletics Development Club of the Year and now UK Athletics Club of the Year. Blimey! It's a miracle that the Harriers have found time to do any running, given all the awards ceremonies they have had to attend. Happily, there are quite a lot of them now and the juniors in particular (now numbering over 150) are starting to achieve some great results at events both in the region and further afield.

So, sport in Sedgefield is in rude good health and I think we've got a lot to look forward to next year, not least plenty of sporting elements to the Sedgefield 700 celebrations and a visit from the Olympic Torch. Oh, and then of course there's the Olympic and Paralympic Games themselves (not actually in Sedgefield unfortunately, but no less exciting for being based in London village).

Football

While noisy neighbours Sedgefield Social Club FC and Sedgefield NetPark FC continue the battle for bragging rights in the first division of the Durham Sunday League, as ever St. Edmund's FC set the standard. After a great start to the season, the team is currently at the top of the premier division, having won eight and only lost one league game so far. Out of 21 games in all competitions, St. Edmund's have won 19 and lost only two, scoring 82 goals and conceding just 27. Here's hoping the team can maintain that form and secure some silverware this season.

Sedgefield Harriers

Over the usual mudbath of a course that is the North East cross-country championships, this year held at East Cramlington and hosted for the first time by Blyth RC, Sedgefield Harriers' U13 girls team won the club's first medal at the event. The team of Hannah Featherstone, Rebecca Mott and Ellie Gaines finished sixth, seventh and 22nd to finish third team behind Jarrow & Hebburn and Darlington AC. The result was the highlight of some quality performances by individual Harriers. Abie Hearmon finished eighth in the U17 girls, Jonna Baines finished 10th in the U20 men's race, Jamie Addison 42nd in the U13 boys, and Ben Hetherington 18th and Sam Hearmon 27th in the U17 boys. In the men's senior race Ean Parsons finished 186th and Jason Catterall 207th in a field of 292.

Sedgefield Harriers held their annual dinner and awards presentation night at the Hardwick Arms in Sedgefield on 18th November. Guest for the evening was Olympics bronze medallist and English marathon record holder Charlie Spedding who grew up in nearby Ferryhill. Charlie gave an enthralling account of his career and his 1984 Olympics race. The dinner culminated in the presentation of awards with Runner of the Year going to the Harriers' own Ferryhill flyer Jason Catterall who competes in everything from 100m to half marathon, with plans for a full marathon in Sunderland next May. Diane Baines won Club Member of the Year for all of the background work she does at the club. A new award of Volunteer of the Year also deservedly went to Diane Baines who is the type of individual that an active club just can't do without.

The Supporter of the Year award - for someone who gives most time to supporting a runner - was shared between Gareth James and Vivienne Parsons. Time trial winners were Jonathan Baines and Gail Bell, with best improvement from Jason Catterall. Grand prix winners were Graeme Addison and Gail Bell. Jonathan Wallace received a special award in recognition of six years service to the club committee.

Parkrun is an international non-profit organisation that boasts over 100 runs in Denmark, Australia, Afghanistan, Poland, South Africa, Iceland and the UK. The closest Parkruns are currently in Albert Park, Middlesbrough and Maiden Castle outside Durham, but the hope is that Sedgfield will soon have one of its own. It will be a 5km run/jog/walk held every Saturday at 9.00am in Hardwick Park - the hope is that this free to enter, weekly event will encourage more people to exercise and improve health and fitness. To make this exciting event possible, Parkrun relies on volunteers from the local community. During 2011, South Durham Boxing Club was able to build on previous success, as several boxers gained recognition for themselves and the club at the upper levels of amateur boxing.

- Jeff Saunders Jnr remained unbeaten during the year and won the North East Senior Championship belt at both 60kg and 63kg.
- When Jeff gave up his North East 60kg belt, James Archer took on that mantle, demonstrating the strength in depth within the club. He then went on to qualify as the North East representative at the national senior ABAs.
- Daryl Clemett, at 74kg, won the North East Senior Novice Championship. He was only beaten in the final at national level and is now ranked number two in England.
- At 54kg, Matthew Tenby became the national champion at senior novice level and became North East Boys Club Champion.
- Lee Milburn's development continues, the highlight of his year being his defeat of the European silver medallist at his weight.
- Jay Hughes reached the final of the schoolboys national ABAs and is now ranked number two in the country.
- Declan Fosco has become the two time junior national champion at 81kg.
- Bradley Saunders, winner of 12 national titles during his amateur career, has reluctantly decided to turn professional and is awaiting his first fight early next year. Injuries during 2011 gave him no chance of proving himself ahead of the London Olympic Games and he is looking forward to progressing at the next level throughout 2012.

Hardwick Park Gate Opening

At a recent small ceremony Mrs Elsie Roper unveiled a plaque on the gate pillar at Hardwick Park. Michael Rudd, the Chairman of The Friends of Hardwick, in welcoming people to the event said that the gates were replicas of those once sited at the original entrance to Hardwick Park in Durham Road, Sedgefield. The replicas would not be at the Park but for a number of people who he thanked. In particular Park Manager Sara Fortune; The Friends of Hardwick - Treasurer John Hannon, Secretary John Fitzpatrick, but especially Vice-Chairman Tom Stubbs, who realised the importance of the finding of the original gates and who has seen this project through from the beginning; Tony Smith who painstakingly drew the design for the gates from the originals, adjusting the size to accommodate modern vehicles, and who as Manager of Hardwick Park Restoration Project, organised this particular project; Peter Coverdale, the stonemason from Bowes Moor who built the pillars - based upon Neptune's plinth; James Godbold who painstakingly constructed the gates at his forge in Egton on the North York Moors; and The Pilgrim Trust, especially the Director Georgina Nayler and Trustee Tim Knox. The Pilgrim Trust funded the £40,000 cost of making and installing the magnificent replica gates. However, the ceremony would not have taken place were it not for Mrs Elsie Roper of Sedgefield, who very kindly donated the original gates to the Park. The originals had been saved from destruction by her late husband, Mr Ben Roper.
