OPINION Not just any old place

Sedgefield, looking glorious in one of Paul Heasman's lovely photographs: now imagine it held under a skysized net of tiny twinkling lights, like the best ever starry night. What would it say to you? A pretty place to live in and go to work from 5 days a week? Your home - your safe haven? Or a special place held together by people who help us to connect? If it's the first, I hope that if you stay long enough, you will begin to share that special sense of place felt by so many who live here. It can take a while to feel you belong and it can creep up slowly, but when it does, you should discover a place that's powered and enriched by all sorts of organisations which are able to operate solely on voluntary effort. Exploring ways of giving time to one of these groups can wrap you in that sense of togetherness, as I have

come to understand well during my almost 20-year involvement in this publication.

It was expressed beautifully early in 2020, when COVID19 forced us to appeal for extra volunteers to deliver the News. Our aim was to protect the network of older or vulnerable residents who had been the resolute backbone of our distribution system from day one. The response from the next generation was generous, stunning in fact. We smiled for days! Whole families got involved and when the grown-ups were at last able to return to normal working, some of their older children and teenagers took on the responsibility for delivering Sedgefield News perhaps as a pocket money job or as their good deed for the day. Whatever the reason, it gives us a warm glow to know that it happens.

We always try to get the News to your door by the beginning of the month and when the diary page is packed with events from first to last it's particularly important - but sometimes things can slip. When we hear that delivery is falling behind regularly on a particular route, we try to find out if there's some way we can help, and there usually is, but occasional late deliveries happen for any number of reasons. To send a young person home with harsh words ringing in his ears has little to do with our special place. Up on my imagined sky-net, a little twinkling light went out when I heard of that happening.

How much better to say thanks, ask if all is well and maybe offer just a gentle reminder? When all is said and done, good deeds by old and young have built this community. *SC*

Our Family and Autism

In July, Sedgefield Community College (SCC) had a visit from Paddy McGuinness, who was recording content for a documentary: 'Paddy and Christine McGuinness: Our Family and Autism.' Paddy and Christine's three children have all been diagnosed with autism, as has Christine. The documentary explored their experience of raising children with the disorder and the challenges they have faced. Paddy came to SCC after hearing that our staff had raised £9,500 for 'Walk for Autism' earlier in the academic year. The documentary finally aired on 1st December, and shone a light on the work we do at SCC with neurotypical and neurodiverse children.

The absolute stars of the show for us were our very own Jack, who was told he is autistic sometime before he was 6 years old, and Maggie who was diagnosed more recently. They both used their appearance to raise awareness of what autism actually is, with Jack describing it as 'thinking weirdly' and Maggie adding that there is a misconception that it is just about poor behaviour.



Paddy was reassured by how resilient Jack is and expressed his hope that 'every school starts to think like Sedgefield because they're opening kids' minds to the idea that we all think differently and the next generation will have an idea of autism that mine never did, and that's encouraging."

We are very proud of everyone who was involved in filming the programme and hope it helps to promote a greater understanding of ASD. It is available to watch on BBC iPlayer.

Stone Age children

Year 3 at Sedgefield Primary had a super day as they dressed up and tried to imagine life as a stone age child. They researched artefacts found by archaeologists that showed children were very much valued in their tribe and probably played games, similar to those of today. They made their own weapon (out of card of course!) to enable them to join in the family hunt for a woolly mammoth, aka an unfortunate teacher! You can see from the picture how well they took to this activity, looking extremely ferocious. As Tilli said,' I've had a good day but I still wouldn't want to be a stone age person'.





Partnership with Feeding Families Sedgefield Hardwick has



recently formed a partnership with a charity based in the North East of England known as Feeding Families. Feeding Families offer support, hope and security to those experiencing food poverty, ensuring that thousands of families across the North East who are in desperate need, including those 'close to home', have access to Emergency Food Boxes and support packages.

At the beginning of December, the pupils of Sedgefield Hardwick managed to collect a significant amount of food and toiletries, which will go some way to helping Feeding Families achieve their target of supplying over 7,000 hampers this Christmas. Sarah McPhie, from Feeding Families, thanked the pupils of Sedgefield Hardwick for their generosity and suggested that the collection of food and toiletries would be enough to make around 30 Christmas hampers.

In the New Year the pupils of Sedgefield Hardwick will continue their partnership with Feeding Families to raise awareness of food poverty. Through working in partnership, both parties aim to remove the stigma associated with food poverty and help the pupils to be empathetic and supportive of those in desperate need.

Sock snowmen



Sock snowmen have been very much the theme for Year 5 in the lead up to Christmas. Pupils have been delighted making unique individual sock snowmen. They have looked at product design and attributed special features to their sock snowmen, considering who their target audience would be if they were to market their product. Each snowman has been individually named. Pupils are keen to use this product to inspire their creative writing. Stories set in remote arctic settings are currently underway!

Award for Kromek Chief Executive

Dr Arnab Basu, chief executive of Kromek Group plc, has been awarded an honorary fellowship by the Institute of Physics (IOP). As founding chief executive, Dr Basu has grown the company, exporting products to more than 40 countries, and employing in excess of 150 people, including at sites in Pennsylvania and California.

Dr Arnab Basu MBE DL, said: "It is tremendous honour to receive this prestigious recognition from the Institute of Physics and a testament to the exceptional dedication and ingenuity of my team at Kromek. We are all immensely proud of the work we do and the things we have achieved in delivering innovation to make the world safer and in helping people to live longer, healthier lives."

Five ladies from the Balance Right class in Sedgefield will be on our screens in January showing the people of County Durham how they can move more from home.

Anne Gray, June Beveridge, Josie Gatenby and Connie Spring taught by instructor Sue Boylan, have been taking part in some filming with Local TV Ltd to produce four short episodes which will be shown on Channel 7 in January. The episodes are part of a series filmed for Move Durham TV, an element of Durham County Council's Move campaign which will encourage everybody in County Durham to get moving. Deborah Breen, Wellness Coordinator for Durham County Council said "These episodes are aimed at housebound people, older people and those with long term health conditions or disabilities. Exercise is important at any age but particularly as we get older as it can help to maintain independent living, reduce your risk of falls and helps to manage the symptoms of some health conditions. Many people in our county can't get to a class like the one at Sedgefield Parish Hall. With Move Durham TV we can bring the exercises to people so they can join in from their own home."

SUSTAINSEDGEFIELD

Water water everywhere! At this time of year when we seem to have far too much water falling from the sky, it is difficult to



remind ourselves what a rare and precious resource it is. Water is essential for life. It takes energy to collect, clean, store and pump to where it is needed. So using water wisely will reduce carbon emissions and limit environmental impact.



Average water consumption per person in the UK is about 150 litres per day in the home for things like washing, cooking and flushing the toilet, so what can we do to reduce it?

Kitchen:

· Wash vegetables in a bowl rather than under a running tap. Then use the same water to water plants.

· Choose energy and water efficient appliances, and wait until they are full rather than doing half loads in the washing machine or dishwasher. Bathroom:

· Shower rather than bath. Restrict the flow on a power shower.

• Turn off the tap when brushing your teeth.

· Reduce the toilet flush capacity, and flush less often - 'If it's yellow let it mellow, if it's brown flush it down'

· Collect rainwater or use grey water for watering plants

· Use mulches or let the grass grow longer to conserve moisture

Avoid power washing

We also need to take into account 'embedded water' that is water used in the production of food, textiles and manufactured goods. Making these processes more water efficient is mostly down to the businesses that make them. There are lots of examples of embedded water in different products for example 700ml of beer uses 208 litres as opposed to 870 litres in the same volume of wine. Processed foods will use more than home prepared. Items which come from water stressed areas of the world such as flowers from Kenya should be avoided. Use water intensive products like cotton, paper and metal sparingly, and prolong the lifespan where possible.

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY JANUARY 2022

I was pottering in the front garden the other week and I noticed something strange on the bare soil beneath one of the shrubs. I wasn't sure what it was, initially I thought it was a pile of cat poo which is a perennial issue in my garden. But it wasn't - it was a strange looking fungus called an Earth Star.

Autumn is the best time to see fungi, but during wet milder winters you can still see a selection. I am quite interested in fungi and spend time looking for them, so finding this in my own garden is a bonus. I think the one I found was one of the commoner ones called Collared earthstar, (Geastrum Triplex), they have a diameter between seven and ten centimetres. They have between five and seven rays, which crack as they arch and result in the spore sac seeming to sit on

a saucer. It is often found in a number of habitats especially if there is a lot of leaf litter. Initially resembling a small brown bulb, after it splits these open into pointed rays, the collared earthstar is star-shaped. As the rays continue to turn back on themselves they create the 'saucer', which the round fruiting body sits on. This fascinating fungus would look at home at the bottom of the sea. It may be small but its transformation from bulb-shape to star, to saucer, to support its delicate spore sac is truly remarkable. The spore sack measures up to 5cm in diameter and up to 10cm when fully outstretched. The spore mass is dark brown and the spores are round and covered in small, spiny warts. They disperse when raindrops fall on the delicate skin of the spore bag. The Native American Blackfoot call the earthstars ka-ka-toos, which means 'fallen stars.' They believe them to indicate supernatural events. The earthstar is also used in traditional medicines of the Chinese and Native American cultures. The fruit bodies of Geastrum Triplex have been chemically analysed and shown to contain a number of bioactive chemicals. Various chemical derivatives of the fungal sterol ergosterol have been identified along with several fatty acids. The earthstar is used in traditional Chinese medicine to reduce inflammation in the respiratory tract and to stop bleeding and reduce swelling. The Cherokee put fruit bodies on the navels of babies after childbirth until the withered umbilical cord falls off: as a prophylactic and therapeutic measure.

Do you remember any of your early experiences with nature? I have always been interested in natural history and my enthusiasm was fuelled by a science teacher who used to run a nature club. Whether actively engaging with wildlife, or just spending time in wild places, developing a connection to nature from a young age is so important for health, wellbeing and for attitudes towards nature. But did you know many students spend less time outdoors than maximum security prisoners? That's why The Wildlife Trusts are calling for learning in and about nature to be embedded across the curriculum, for all ages and throughout all subjects. The information is on a blank sheet of paper with no heading, address or contact details and suggests that their app can be used:

"to find out what is going on in Sedgefield, recover lost pets, find free stuff or sell an old bike, borrow a ladder, share safety tips and much, much more."

If a sheet with this wording (or similar) comes through your letterbox, ignore it and throw it away!

think... but don't be a victim. Please lock up, stay safe, sleep well.





Athletics

Hundreds of runners from around the North East descended on Sedgefield on Saturday 11 December for the 115th North Eastern Counties Athletic Association (NECAA) Cross Country Championships. Hosted by Sedgefield Harriers in East Park, the event is an iconic fixture on the region's grass roots sports calendar, with races for junior and senior athletes from under 11s to senior men and women. The event returned to Sedgefield for the second time in six years.

The action began at 10:35am with races for under 11 boys and girls, started by Cllr Ann Carr, Mayor of Sedgefield, and Cllr Mel Carr, Chair of Sedgefield Town Council. The NECAA championship races kicked off at 11:00am, with a series of events for U13s, U15s, U17s and U20s, and culminating in the races with the biggest fields, for senior men and senior women. Despite rain and snow in recent weeks, the course was in good condition and proved popular with athletes, presenting them with a good balance of climbs and flatter sections through the three fields that constitute East Park.

The men's race was won by reigning English National Cross Country Champion Calum Johnson of Gateshead Harriers, with a dominant performance. In the women's race, Catriona MacDonald of Morpeth Harriers was the winner. The men's team event was won by Morpeth Harriers, with Jarrow & Hebburn AC claiming the women's title. The home club was well represented in many of the races during the day and Sedgefield Harriers fielded the biggest team in the senior women's race.



Ahead of the championships, Sedgefield Harriers recruited a large team of volunteers to deliver the event, with over 50 club members contributing in many different ways. Staging the event was a big community effort. Sedgefield Cricket Club hosted the race headquarters, St. Edmund's Explorer Scouts put up marguees, Number Four tea room supplied sandwiches for the officials' packed lunches and fruit came from The Juicy Pear. Event catering for runners was provided by Ramside Estates. Hardwick East Park is owned by Durham County Council, which gave permission to hold the event on its land, and rangers from Hardwick Park provided great support throughout. Unlike in 2015, the weather didn't misbehave too much and feedback from runners was that it was a really good cross country course - fair, but challenging, and in a lovely setting. The club was delighted to welcome runners of all ages to compete in Sedgefield, representing clubs from every part of the North East. Sedgefield Harriers is grateful to all of the volunteers who made the event possible, and ensured that it ran smoothly throughout.

As if hosting a major event wasn't enough for one day, Sedgefield Harriers handed out its annual awards the same night, at a social event in the Parish Hall. The winners are:
