### Queen's Jubilee Baton Relay

On Wednesday, 10th July, the Queens Jubilee Baton Relay is in our area en-route to the Commonwealth Games in Manchester. The Baton is being carried by 5000 runners and will visit 500 towns and villages in 50 days before arriving at Manchester for the opening of the Games on the 25th July.

At approximately 4:19 pm on Wednesday July 10th, Audrey

Flanagan will carry the Baton from the BP garage on the A688 near Coundon for 440 yards. The Baton is made of machined aluminium and weighs 1.69kg. The message from the Queen to the Commonwealth Games is held in an aluminium capsule inserted into the top of the Baton.

Inside the Baton, sensors detect the runners pulse rate, these are conveyed to series of Light Emitting

Diodes, thence into a blade of pulsating light. The Baton Relay began it's journey from Buckingham Palace on Commonwealth Day, 11 Mach 2002 and has travelled to 22 Commonwealth Countries before returning to the UK on the 6th June. The Baton carriers are made up of athletes, celebrities, sponsors and a wide cross section of people from all walks of life.

# The Golden Lion Golf Society

It was reported that Community Force had been in the Village with their speed indicator board and that they had noted that after a few minutes of them being there, a marked reduction of vehicles registering speeds of over 30m.p.h.was apparent.

They soon got the message!

Community Force will continue to do these checks on a regular basis.

The Police will also be asked to bring their speed gun, so as to show that speeding must be eradicated.

Institute of Advanced Motorists will be coming to Sedgefield, providing there is sufficient interest shown, and carry out checks on driving standards. So, if you would like to take part, there are forms available in the Library to arrange a booking.



# Sedgefield Crime Watch Panel Neighbourhood Watch

(ALL for ONE & ONE for ALL)



Sedgefield Crime Watch & Neighbourhood Watch bi-monthly meeting was held on Tuesday 11th June, in the Parish Hall.

The format for the evening was, Welcome to new members (7) and the new Area Co-ordinator, Sarah Norman This was followed by the formal part of the proceedings, the Agenda.

Chief among the items discussed were, (1) The planned presentation of the Alan Sowerby Shields to the two Junior Schools, for the "Junior Citizen of the Year", date to be fixed.

(2)Highlighted was the subject of Distraction Burglaries, where a householder is confronted by bogus representatives of (usually) The Water Board, one of whom distracts the householder while the other helps himself to their valuables. There have

been two cases, recently, in Sedgefield, but a lot more in the surrounding areas. So householders should not open their door to anyone they do not know!

(3)A presentation was also given on the subject of DATALINK, a system by which a householder's medical condition, prescribed medication,

next of kin, etc., can be passed to the Emergency Services, in the event of them not being in a condition to do so themselves.

Called the "Flask in the Fridge", Sedgefield NHW intends to ensure that all vulnerable people in the Village are offered the chance to participate! So far the system has been approved by the Sedgefield Medical Practitioners. Interest has also been shown by the Parish & Borough Councils, Community Force, The Police and local Aged Concern.

(4) The usual site has been booked for Sedgefield Show on Saturday 10th August and anyone who is able to, can provide Tom bola prizes through their Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator and will be gratefully received.

There was a wine & cheese party afterwards, where the new members were introduced. Finally a raffle was held, Mrs Mary Hodgson won a bottle of wine donated by Crime Prevention Team (Police).

(5) The next meeting was arranged for Tuesday 6th August, although we are in the process of arranging a talk on "Drug Abuse" by a member of the Crime Prevention Team, in Sedgefield Parish Hall, date Wednesday 17th commencing 7p.m.

# P.C. Todd's Column.

As I said in my column last month, I would highlight various crimes and trends the criminal fraternity in our community, are up to!

On this occasion I would like to focus on the despicable crime of Bogus Officials (or Distraction Burglary as it is also known). These people prey on the old, weak and vulnerable members of our society, who deserve better!

There have been two of these crimes in Sedgefield recently and I would like to take the opportunity to remind ALL the residents to ask for identification BEFORE allowing anybody you don't know, even me, into your home! I will not be offended and nor should any other Official, who has legitimate reason to call on you.

If in doubt, don't let them in and inform their Company via your telephone, what business they have with you. Contact your family, friends and/or neighbours, to assist you. Finally, call the POLICE, if you feel they are not genuine!

If this is the case, you can assist the Police identify and arrest these people by remembering as much as you can about them- facial features,

clothing, accent, vehicles used and anything else you can think of!

The latest incident involved two males, one of whom convinced a 92-year-old lady, that he was from the Water Board and carrying out work nearby. He then asked the lady to turn her taps on. While she was distracted, a second male entered unnoticed and made a search of her house. Eventually they were confronted by the lady and asked to leave. They took with them £50 of the ladies money! So, please BEWARE!

Lastly, I would like to remind people that garden furniture and plants, still remain popular with the thief, as these are easily stolen, and sold at car boot sales! So, please look after them!

#### Sedgefield Pub & Club Watch Scheme

Pub & Club Watch Schemes were set

up Nationally nearly 3 years ago, in response to problems with-in the Licensed premises. It was recognised that such schemes would help to prevent and also reduce crime. It would also make the atmosphere for people visiting Pubs & Clubs more pleasant and friendly. It would be more acceptable to take along the family, as well! A more convivial place to socialise in!

This collective effort by all Licensees within Sedgefield has resulted in a very successful scheme. The majority of the drinking fraternity has also accepted it!

A constitution has been agreed upon, and procedures adopted to ensure that any trouble that starts does not develop nor escalate to other premises!

Meetings are held monthly, where any issues are discussed and relevant action taken. Feel assured that every effort is being made to ensure your night out is an enjoyable one. SKOL!!

# Community Force and NeedleStick

In 1991 the Scott report commissioned by the Home Office, concluded that the general public's greatest concerns on crime were those on: Anti-social Behaviour, Nuisance, Vandalism and Graffiti. A large proportion being drugs related.

It was proposed that all affected and interested parties, namely the Police, Local Authorities, Community Groups and members of the Public, should tackle the problems themselves.

Sedgefield Borough Council, after consultation with local residents (who had identified a preference for a uniformed presence), took the initiative and formed what is now the Community Force. This is made up of ten Patrol Officers. So for the first time anywhere in the country, highly trained and uniformed civilians, <u>funded solely by a local authority</u>, now patrolled the Borough of Sedgefield, on the basis of 24hours per day, 365 days per year! NeedleStick

During the course of our patrols, Officers found themselves being first at the scene of potentially hazardous situations! Road Traffic Accidents, small fires, and like other Council employees and members of the public, finding discarded, and often, used Hypodermic needles and syringes!

It was apparent from these incidents that to maintain <u>Public Safety</u>, specialist training, as well as new protocols, were required. To this end all Patrol Officers are now trained First Aiders and are fully trained in "NeedleStick" management!

<u>NeedleStick</u> is the general term used, that deals with the dangers of coming into contact with drug paraphernalia, such as hypodermic needles etc.. Dangers from scratches, which could then lead to the contraction of such diseases as Aids and Hepatitis 'B'. Also the safe handling, removal and disposal of any such items, once discovered!

The Community Safety Department's Policy and Procedure, on this subject is quite clear and precise and is this:Needles can be discarded and found anywhere; thrown into gardens, hidden in bushes, lay-bys, and disused properties or even in the street! So members of the Public, who come across any of these items are Urged not to touch them or attempt to remove them themselves!

If a member of the public does come across needles of any description, we ask that they contact the Community Force, as soon as possible. For example, if they have a mobile phone, call them straight away, giving your name and phone number; if possible remain at the location to safeguard the area until Patrol Officers arrive. This will normally be in minutes!

Members of the public, who have found items but can not remain at the location, so as to make the phone call, etc., we ask that they loosely cover the items where possible, prior to leaving the area. When telephoning, we again ask that they give name and telephone number, also how many items and an EXACT location, where the items can be located!

All Community Force Patrol Vehicles carry the necessary safety clothing and a number of Sharps Disposal System MK11packs. These packs contain all the equipment needed for the safe and effective removal of hypodermic needles and syringes!

I have been asked by the Campaign for Community Banking Services, for any local feedback. Do you know about the scheme? How is Sedgefield's Barclays Pilot going? Let me know.

Lesley Swinbank Sedgefield Town Council. Thought community spirit was dead!!! Residents from all corners of Sedgefield Town proved that community spirit is alive and active in our community.

In February 200 people attended a public meeting and again in April 300 people had the Parish Hall 'bursting at its seams', to show their support in keeping our community safe and accessible for its residents.

The issue that roused such a huge of feeling is the problems being experienced on Old Beacon Lane. Speeding motorists, fly-tipping, drug use, anti-social behaviour and the use of the area as a stopover by gypsy/travellers has impact on the rest of the village and the public meetings showed a unanimous wish that access to the area should be restricted by lockable barriers.

The area is County Council land so the County must agree to the restriction but despite everyone else concerned i.e. residents, farmers, Town and Borough Councils wanting the barriers to be installed the County Council will not co-operate. Over the years Cllr Manton (Sedgefield's elected County Council Representative) has given dozens of excuses as to why the road can not be closed, every one of these excuses can be refuted but still there is no co-operation from the Cllr Manton and the County Council.

So, at the last public meeting, at the suggestion of the Town Council a group of residents came forward to form a group (Sedgefield Village Residents Liaison Group) who will lease with the Councils and seek the early closure of Old Beacon Lane.

This group has now met on three occasions firstly to organise a group/committee procedure and identify the best way forward. It has tried to meet with the Town Council, but to date has not had any success and so has decided to call a meeting of all interested parties. The Town Council has tried to do this on several occasions over recent years but the County was always unable or refused to come to the meetings.

Other parts of the County and the Region that have experienced similar problems have had the problem resolved in the same way as is suggested for Old Beacon Lane, so the new group will seek to get a fair and equitable solution for our community.

Sedgefield Village Residents Liaison Group will keep everyone informed via this news letter and if necessary will call further public meetings. The group is determined to have the wishes of our community addressed and not ignored or dismissed by those who are elected by us and therefore should have the community's interest at heart.
