Making our *real* address legitimate could be part of Tony's legacy

Ask three different people if Sedgefield is in County Durham or Stockton or Cleveland and you may get three different answers.

The facts of the matter are these:

1. The county of Cleveland ceased to exist at midnight on March 31st 1996.
2. At the same time Stockton became a unitary authority, so is in neither Co. Durham nor Cleveland.
3. The Local Government Act 1972 left Sedgefield in Co. Durham.

Thus the answer to the question is that Sedgefield is and always has been in Co. Durham.

The confusion arose when the Post Office, for its own administrative convenience, decided to ignore the law and treat Sedgefield as a part of Stockton. This infuriated local residents and the Parish/Town Council, backed by unanimous votes at annual meetings attended by the villagers, fought for years to have the address changed back to Co. Durham. The Post Office refused to budge and the Town Council decided to comply with the law and the wishes of the electorate and left its letterhead reading 'Sedgefield, Co. Durham'. Residents continued the fight however and the recently formed Sedgefield Village Residents Forum asked Ian Hunter to see what he could do. As a seasoned campaigner in this battle Ian decided to call for artillery support and wrote to our MP and PM Tony Blair. Mr. Blair passed the correspondence to the Secretary of State for Trade & Industry who, in turn, passed it to the Royal Mail, asking them to reply to the PM direct.

In his response to the PM, the CEO of the Royal Mail, Mr. Adam Crozier robustly defended the Postcode Address File (PAF) system and pointed out "...the fact that public and private agencies use them for other purposes (than delivering mail) is an indication of how accurate and useful they can be". He continued "The county does not form part of any postal address on PAF as Royal Mail's sortation process does not rely on counties.

However, this does not prevent people from including a county on items of mail which should also include the correct Postcode".

Ian too has responded to the PM thanking him for the copy of Mr. Crozier's letter and stating "His point that the PAF is an accurate and useful tool to both public and private agencies for purposes other than the delivery of mail is valid - BUT ONLY FOR THE 92% OF CASES WHERE THE PAF COMPLIES WITH THE LAW AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOUNDARIES. For the remaining 8% it is inaccurate and inconvenient to say the least. Local businesses can cite cases of delayed deliveries and missed appointments due to people driving around Stockton looking for Sedgefield - according to the PAF, within its borough boundaries. Please convey to Mr Crozier that we Sedgefield residents also pay toward the postal service and we too would like to share in the benefits that an accurate PAF can bring.

In closing his letter Mr. Crozier states that we can include the county provided that we also use the correct Postcode. This we already do. Please advise him that if he will take one more small step and amend the PAF by deleting the legally improper reference to Stockton and substituting 'Co. Durham' everyone will be happy and the annoyance and confusion caused by the present PAF entry will cease.

The Bookworm

A reader recommends...

The Hungry Tide by Amitav Gosh

If you want a good story that's difficult to put down yet different from the run of the mill novel, try this one by Amitav Gosh.

You may have read his very successful "The Glass Palace" and there are some similarities between the two novels although this one is not nearly as long!

Both take modern characters and look at events in their lives from the past as the stories gradually evolve.

Set in the Bay of Bengal in the area where emerging rivers create a giant archipelago of islands called the Sunderbans, The Hungry Tide relates events that are closely tied in with the tendency of that area to suffer from cyclones, floods and other extremes of nature. In fact the climax of the book takes place during one such horrific cyclone.

A young woman of Indian ancestry, but American by upbringing, arrives to do some research into the Irawaddy dolphins and meets a Delhi businessman who is making a supposed brief return visit to his native area in the Sunderbans. Piya, the young woman, finds that as she investigates the Dolphins, (that in itself being fascinating reading) she finds out more and more about the people of the area and events of previous years that involved her new friend, the businessman.

The story is all based on actual events that happened when the people living in the many islands of the archipelago were ordered by the government to quit their homes to make way for a nature reserve; when some refuse to co-operate, tragedy ensues.

As one reviewer has put it, it is a tale of "history, folklore, ecology, migration, love and grief". It is beautifully written, has plenty of suspense and is certainly a book I read with real pleasure.

COMMUNITY SAFETY

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood Watch



At the June Neighbourhood Watch Panel meeting, Village Constable Keith Todd circulated copies of the reported crime in Sedgefield Village for the period between 12th April & 13th June. This showed that there were 13 recorded crimes consisting of: 4 thefts; 2 burglary; 6 damage (to property and vehicles); 1 animal (injured by shooting). Keith provided details relating to these crimes and discussed various issues arising. Keith also updated members regarding a reported (at April meeting) assault on a 17 year old. Follow-up by the Police had exposed this to be a fictitious report and whilst this has wasted Police time, it is good news for our village. Under the topic "Tapes for the Blind", acting C/man David Hillerby informed members that, following the grant awarded by our Town Council, we have replaced our tape recorder and microphone. This has exposed the need to replace tapes, however, following a most generous award from ex Mayor Maxine Robinson's local good causes fund, we have the money to do this.

Ring Master Messaging System: Members present confirmed their satisfaction with information presently being received from local Beat Bobby Keith Todd and thanked him for this. Keith advised he would continue as at present.

'Stay Safe' booklet for Sedgefield

Sedgefield residents can now take advantage of a useful free guide on how to stay safe in their community. The Stay Safe booklets have been produced by Sedgefield Community Safety Partnership and gives information on how to report crimes such as graffiti, vandalism and vehicle crime and how to take advantage of free fire safety checks and crime prevention advice.



Sedgefield Community Safety Partnership Chair, Glyn Hall, said: "Sedgefield Borough is already a safe place to live and work and our crime rate is 26 per cent lower than the average for England and Wales. However we want our residents to feel secure in the community and have a number of ongoing projects to help make further improvements".

Topics covered in the guide include: neighbourhood wardens, anti-social behaviour, domestic abuse, hate crime, drugs and alcohol and crime prevention.

The booklet also includes a list of useful contact numbers and it will be available from council offices, police stations, libraries and GP surgeries around the borough.

Brian's final sponsorship appeal

Brian Hunter has been an energetic Charity Fundraiser for 25 years, organizing and leading some imposing events like the Made in Sedgefield Charity Run for the North Tees Women's Cancer Appeal; the Sugarlump Shuffle; 5 traverses of 270 miles of Pennine Way, one of which was a double traverse of 540 miles in 23 days (Brian is the only insulin dependent diabetic to complete this traverse); 5 Coast to Coast relay runs, for which he organised & led teams on continuous relay, three of these teams being insulin dependent diabetics and the first diabetic swimming championships at Gateshead. He climbed 3 Italian volcanoes in 5 days (Vulcano, Stromboli and Mt. Etna) and celebrated his 65th birthday on the summit crater of Etna.

Brian has decided that his last fund-raising effort will be this year's Great North Walk, raising funds for the Durham Society for the Blind and Partially-sighted.

Despite suffering partial sight through age related Macular Degeneration, he is confident of completing the event.

Jottings from Sedgefield Village Residents' Forum

Another full and interesting meeting was held on 22nd May. Correspondence had been received from the Minister responsible for the Post Office regarding resident's issue with Sedgefield's official address and postcode. The letter stated that the Post Office will accept the use of the geographical County and current post code - Sedgefield, Co Durham TS21 etc. So it's official; you don't need to include Stockton-on-Tees and the non-existent Cleveland, but don't hold your breath on all those computers recognising that we are not part of Stockton and Cleveland no longer exists. Discussion again took place on drinking in the village and the associated anti-social behaviour and broken glass. There is an opportunity for Sedgefield village to be a trial area in the Borough for an order controlling drinking in some public areas (some areas would be recognised as acceptable for drinking outside). The Forum has written to the Town Council urging them, as a matter of urgency to take the appropriate action for the village to be a 'pilot' area.

Many ongoing issues were discussed – information can be found in the minutes available from Town Council Offices, village web sites or directly to you by email if you leave your contact email with the Town Council. We've also put a notice with info on meetings on the new notice board outside the library. Have you noticed the notice board has two additional legs now, to keep it upright. Who designed it we wonder?

At each meeting there is an update on the illegal encampment issue in Old Beacon Lane. Whilst the following information was not available for the May meeting and will be discussed at the June meeting this seems an opportune time to briefly update everyone.

The residents complaint to the Local Government Ombudsman was "that Durham County Councils (DCC) practice of tolerating unauthorised encampments on Old Beacon Lane, discriminates against the local residents who feel, at times, effectively excluded from the area and subject to unacceptable nuisance"

The Ombudsman has now given her findings within her powers (too lengthy to explain here) but basically **she found the residents concerns to be justified and that the expectations of residents are fair and reasonable**. She did not however go as far as immediate gating of the area but must offer DCC the chance to manage any illegal encampment in line with strict criteria, which she has laid down. She emphasised that it is essential that ANY INCIDENTS OF CONCERN in Beacon Lane should be reported- please do so. This can be done directly to the Police (get an incident number) to the Town Council to David Hillerby on 01740 621343 or Julia Bowles on 01740 620409.

The Ombudsman recognised that residents will still be asking for immediate gating and to this end we are arranging a meeting with DCC to progress this and clarify their position and interpretation of the Ombudsman's report.

Still no response on this issue from our MP despite his promise to get back to us in September 2005 and the Constituency Office chooses to ignore all contact and reminders – wonder if this will change as elections approach?

As always everyone is welcome to Forum meetings – it's often better than the tele! Don't forget meetings are the 4th Monday in the month in the Fletcher Room, Parish Hall at 7pm. Everyone is welcome – do come along.

Referendum consultation process - Trust issues disclaimer

On the information sheet enclosed with the referendum papers it is explicitly stated that the Town Council worked with various groups including the Sedgefield Development Trust, to bring forward the options and the summary of their implications in the information sheet.

Whilst representatives of SDT did work with the group, we wish to make it absolutely clear that the options were chosen by the Council and no debate was allowed. The Trust believes that they do not reflect the real choices, which should revolve around the cost of the schemes when carried out in different ways.

Discussion of the implications of each scheme is not properly reflected in the information sheet. Despite the recommendations of the consultation group, the Town Council met on 22nd May and significantly re-wrote the information in 46% of the boxes. The Trust disclaims responsibility for the information given to the electorate.

Tiramisu

Easy to make and goes very well with fresh fruit salad

Ingredients

2x250g pots mascarpone cheese

¼ pint/150ml double cream

1 packet sponge fingers

Cocoa powder

¼ pint hot strong coffee or heaped tablespoon coffee granules with water
400g tin condensed milk

3 tablespoons brandy

2 Cadbury's flake bars (crushed) or grated chocolate

This pudding consists of repeated layers of sponge fingers soaked in coffee, followed by the sprinkling of chocolate with cream cheese above

Method

Make the coffee and add the brandy.

Soak a few sponge fingers at a time with the coffee.

Place a layer of these in the base of a trifle bowl.

Sprinkle over with some chocolate.

Whisk together the cheese, condensed milk and cream until even, and add a layer on top of the sponge and chocolate.

Continue with the layers, ending up with the cream mixture on the top.

You may find that you run out of coffee, so you may need to make more, especially if you want a strong flavour.

Decorate with grated chocolate and a sprinkling of cocoa powder.

Undue influence concerns readers *More Letters*

Given that the format of the referendum on the Parish Hall is more complex than the usual voting system, I was pleased to see that the Town Council had provided a sample for information.

I was amazed, however, when I examined the example, to see that it include the real options and showed a voting pattern that appeared to match the Town Council's preferences!

Several residents have indicated to me that they are confused by the process so will "just fill it in like the example". Surely the overview by Electoral Reform Services should have prevented the real options being matched against the Town Council preferences in the guise of a sample sheet.

Don't miss the chance to vote

In its wish to be impartial in the matter of the referendum on the Parish Hall and Ceddesfeld Hall, the Town Council appears to have fallen foul of the regulations for the use of the electoral roll.

Last year when we filled in our electoral roll returns some of us ticked the box which indicated that we do not wish to have our names released on the 'edited' version of the electoral roll (which the district council sells to commercial and other organisations) - so that we would not be pestered with junk mail. However, as a result we appear to have been deprived of automatic inclusion in the mailing list for the referendum; unless we have taken note of recent notices in the village and requested a form (at the cost of having to phone ERS at our own expense) we cannot take part.

The Electoral Commission website states:

"The full register has the names and addresses of everyone registered to vote and is updated every month. Anyone can look at it, but copies can only be supplied for certain purposes, such as elections and law enforcement. Credit reference agencies are also allowed to use the full register, but only to check your name and address if you are applying for credit, and to help stop 'money laundering'. Anyone who has a copy of the register will be committing a criminal offence if they unlawfully pass on information from it. You do not have a choice about your name and address being on this register."

Having read that, one might ask, did the Town Council take advice on their decision to hold a referendum and from whom did they get any such advice, as it may well be that the referendum in question is just such a 'certain purpose'.

Electoral Reform services being the accredited national experts check whether this referendum could be classified as a 'certain purpose' as described by the electoral commission and if not why not? And did they advise the Town Council of the problems? Councillors who have access to the full electoral roll would well be able to establish the scale of this problem.

Electoral Reform Services is the leading administrator of ballots and elections in the UK, are part of the Electoral Reform Society and as such are recognised as a professional organisation. It is extremely difficult to understand that they allow such a referendum as we are having, where such a potentially high proportion of the electorate may be disenfranchised due to no fault of their own.

We may well hope that this issue will be referred to both the Electoral Commission and the ERS and their responses published.

In fact Sedgefield News has learned that a total of 722 electors could be excluded from the referendum unless they apply to the ERS. However there is still time to act if you wish to take part.

Referendum confusion

Complete rebuild, would be the cheapest and best option. The Referendum papers indicate that it will be the most expensive for the Council Tax payer. I am confused!

When the letter was written, it was assumed that the information sheet would indicate that Option 2 was for the transfer to and financing through Sedgefield Development Trust at **little or no cost** to the Council Tax payer.

The Town Council, however, at the last minute changed the wording on the information sheet to effectively cut out the SDT from this option entirely.

As the Town Council does not have the same access to funding as a development trust, a large part of the cost would devolve onto the Council Tax payer.

Sedgefield Development Trust is still willing to take on the task of raising the funding to rebuild the Parish Hall.
