Police warn of action on parking

At the PACT (Police and Communities Together) meeting held on Monday 2nd June, a number of local residents expressed concerns about indiscriminate parking in Sedgefield Village. The following hotspot areas were identified: **Parking at Sainsbury's Store, North End Sedgefield**

Parking within the confines of the Zebra Crossing on High Street Parking at junction of East End / Front Street Sedgefield

During recent months Police have issued warning notices to motorists in those areas with a view to advising and educating motorists, however Police continue to receive complaints. Therefore, in the interest of the safety of pedestrians and other road users, and in order to address the concerns of the local residents, directed patrols will again be carried out by officers from the Neighbourhood Policing Teams in those areas.

Police are warning that drivers found to be parked in contravention of any traffic regulation may be issued with a fixed penalty notice incurring a fine of £30.

'New' Hardwick Park opens this summer

The 18th century historical landscape of Hardwick Park has been restored to its former glory by Durham County Council, with funding primarily from the Heritage Lottery Fund. Historical features have been recreated, including the elegant Lake, the Statue of Neptune, the Temple of Minerva and the Gothic Tower. Many areas of the Park are rich in wildlife and the restoration has enabled many of these areas to be enlarged and improved. *continued on page 3*

Coast to coast ballad

Since May, thousands of young people have been singing in a series of events stretching between the west and east coast of England. Songlines: Singing Coast to Coast is the first project of its kind in the UK and there have been performances in towns from Barrow to Seaham, finishing at Hartlepool's 'Dock Fest' on Sunday July 5th at about 1pm. Songlines draws on the traditional West-East migration line across the North of England and celebrates the heritage of these towns and the people that live there. The Songlines ballad, composed along the line, reaches Sedgefield on July 1st (see Diary page), when SLYC will welcome the puppet balladeer and perform a set of local songs, including their contribution to the new ballad. Then at Hartlepool Marina all the communities come together for one final performance, in which the entire ballad will be performed for the first time.

The Annual Sedgefield and District Agricultural and Horticultural Show will take place on Saturday 8th August. The Show, situated in the Robert Brown Showfield, West Park, Sedgefield, is in its 156th year and promises a full range of competitions, displays and exhibitions.

This year's show will host many of the traditions that we have seen over the last 100 years and in 2009 we welcome the return of the Goat Show, the only goat competition at an agricultural event in County Durham.

A full range of competitions and displays include agricultural classes for cattle, sheep, horses, ponies, vintage tractors, small livestock and a dog show. For the second year, the heavy horse category will also feature. The popular 'Build a Scarecrow' competition returns; entrants can compete for the Mr N and Mrs A Oliver Cup by dressing a scarecrow as a farmer, pop star, gardener, window cleaner, pub landlord or anything else ...and providing it with a name!

There will be several marquees with craft stalls, horticultural displays, home produce and handicrafts. Once again, by popular demand the Food Hall returns with a range of local and regional delicacies on offer. In the craft marquee there will also be a rug making demonstration to show the unique skill of 'proggy' mat making! A large number of trade stands are expected too, selling products ranging from replica farm toys, ride-on lawn mowers, to jewellery and bespoke wood carvings. We also hope to see the return of the Classic Vehicles and the Keith Turner & Sons Funfair.

Support from other organizations is always welcome and new ideas will always be considered. Without the continuing support of the many local businesses and individuals who take part each year, it would not be possible to hold a growing event of this size.

A new programme of self care workshops for young people with Diabetes has been hailed a success by NHS County Durham. It provides education and support to young people between the ages of 12 and 17 years, to help them cope with the day to day problems that living with Type 1 diabetes can bring. Five further workshops have been commissioned, to run between 10am and 3.30pm on Sundays from 6 September by the 'Getting Sorted' team. They are looking for young volunteers in the 18 to 25 year group who have Type 1 diabetes to help this next programme. The workshops are held in various sports centres across County Durham, rather than in a clinical atmosphere giving young people the freedom to talk about any issues surrounding their diabetes. There are activities and games as well as advice on different ways of coping with the condition. 'Getting Sorted' co-ordinator Mary Maplesden said "the response has been very positive and enthusiastic! Festival success for Sedgefield

Sedgefield Players production of Sue Wilding's "Some People Talking" won second place at the recent Wakefield Drama Festival. Adjudicator Russell Whiteley commended the sensitive playing of all four cast members and the smooth choreography of the scene changes which kept the audience riveted throughout. Group chairman Norma Neal won the Best Actress award for her stunning performance, showing depths of emotion as well as hilarious moments of comedy. Viv Jacobs was also nominated in the best actress category, Terry West for Best Actor and Walter Howell Best Director. Originally set in a bar, the play moved to various locations, simply evoked by the cast, all of whom played multiple roles.

This was the Players' second visit to Wakefield Festival, which takes place in the Theatre Royal and Opera House, built in 1894 by Frank Matcham, who also designed Newcastle Theatre Royal. The winning production at Wakefield was John Godber's "Bouncers" by Tickety-Boo Theatre Company from Pontefract and third place was taken by the Halifax Thespians with "Home" by David Storey. Sedgefield Players' next project is their own drama festival of one act plays in September, when groups from the region bring a variety of productions to the parish hall for a week of friendly rivalry and high class entertainment.

the opening of the restored Hardwick Park

Access: There are new easy access routes for pedestrians and specific routes for cyclists and horse riders; we would ask all cyclists and horse riders to respect other park users whilst in the park. Entry to the Park will be via the new Visitor Centre and car parks. There is the opportunity to sponsor a memorial seat in the Park, so contact the office for details.

Dogs: There are now areas of the Park where dogs must be kept on a lead at all times. This is to ensure the safety and comfort of all users, whilst also protecting the wildlife in the Park. Please clean up after your dog. A "poop and scoop" area can be found next to the main car park and we would encourage people to take their dogs there before entering the main park.

Visitor Centre: A brand new Visitor Centre has been built. This will open this summer, offering an exhibition to interpret the history, past and present of Hardwick Park. An education room for use by school groups will be available, as will public toilets with baby change facilities. It is hoped the café will be open later this year.

Helping Out: We are looking for volunteers (of all ages), who can help us to manage the Park. At the moment we will run task days on the first and third Wednesday and the second Saturday of every month. The tasks will be wide ranging and generally vary from week to week. Full training will be offered in use of hand tools and safety equipment will be provided. We are also looking for assistance with the running of the Visitor Centre and helping out with education activities.

Holiday Fun at Hardwick Park

Every Wednesday throughout the summer holidays there will an activity available in the visitor centre for families to enjoy. These activities will be art & craft based and will vary from week to week. The sessions are just drop in throughout the day and everyone is welcome. Community SAFETY

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel Items from the Meeting held on 9th June 2009 1) Town Councillor Allan Blakemore provided guidance and help to the Panel regarding financial support in meeting the room hire costs incurred in holding Panel meetings. Allan was warmly thanked by C/man Ken Saiger and members. 2) Community Force Officer Tim Spearey provided a comprehensive report and made a very strong request to members to report dog fouling and to encourage other residents to do so. This ongoing problem is much complained about by residents and members of NHWatch but not much reported by them; his report showed only 2 such reports in the last 10 weeks! A formal request was made to Tim for a dog bin at junction of Old Durham Rd/Salter's Lane opposite Turner's garage to resolve one of the problems in his report. Tim agreed to progress it.

3) Village Constable Keith Todd circulated copies of his report for the period 14/03 - 9/06/09 showing only 10 recorded crimes: 1 Burglary, 4 Thefts (2 car related) & 5 of Damage (3 car related) in the village. Many guestions from members including events that did not appear on the crime list, some of which Keith was not personally aware of, including serious intimidating verbal abuse to a young lady (due to alcohol) at a local pub. Keith explained again the difference between recorded crime and recorded incidents/calls, to remind members that he does not present recorded incidents to the meeting as it is impracticable to list all those relating to our village. This was understood and appreciated by members. However there was a strong request to be informed of the number of incidents/calls made in the village to the Police in the two month period between Panel meetings. Members feel they are in the dark regarding numbers of calls to the Police and yet they are continually told by the Police "there is not the evidence recorded - people must ring in". Further discussion about data analysis took place but members re-iterated they don't want that sort of detail; just a simple number - how many calls to the Police last period from our village to get a clearer picture. CCTV was discussed. Strong view from the C/ man and many others that overall it is a major factor in making people feel more secure in the village and is much valued. 4) Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator & Crime Prevention Officer - Neil Langthorne is presently fulfilling both roles prior to becoming our Community Liaison Officer. Crime Prevention: Neil reviewed current crime trends in our area and village. welcomed our continued low "Crimes" but warned of his concern for one particular crime issue in our area which could come here - Sneak in Crime. The consequences of this are extremely damaging to the individual victim; sadly, usually the most vulnerable of people. Neil urged people to be on their guard and to make it difficult for people to get in through open windows, unlocked doors etc. especially whilst at home and feeling fairly secure. Lock up, secure it, make it difficult for the thief - keep them out. Neil brought along various crime prevention devices which were made available / sold to members as appropriate after the meeting and members thanked him for his efforts.

5) PACT meetings. Chair of Residents Forum Julia Bowles raised the difficulties of holding all PACT meetings within the Residents' Forum & suggested it would be better to hold 6 at the Residents' Forum and 6 on alternative months at the bimonthly N/Hood Watch meetings, as it was felt the N/H/Watch was actually a more relevant meeting for setting Policing Priorities. Vote resulted in unanimous Yes from members present. Neil agreed to take proposal back to local Sergeant. 6) Your Police - Have Your Say meeting 6/6/09 held at Sedgefield (Community College). Unfortunately on 6th June N/H/ Watch were away at Keswick on the first of their 2 Carelink Bus trips of the year, so attendance was minimal. Julia Bowles attended as a resident and Chair of Residents' Forum and had been mandated to speak about issues of nuisance and in particular drink related problems spoiling the village and the quality of life for many residents. Julia reported on the meeting and her request (from the Forum supported by N/H/Watch) for controls to be put in place to restrict drinking in public places in Sedgefield - these would not stop the café culture/beer gardens but would control the streets, the green and other such areas. Supportive response from Chief Constable who said they were trying to support what people wanted for their community - this one sounded as though it was "pushing on an open door". Allan Blakemore advised there was not enough evidence to support this approach confirming that the Town Council do not support this and expressed concern for local pub business. Julia pointed out that it would help the pubs by getting people to drink on licensed premises and in their designated areas and should prevent supermarket fuelled cheap booze consumption (especially underage) in public areas, leading to public nuisance, damage & littering. Allan pointed out that such an arrangement could not be resourced by the Police. Julia informed meeting that Willington had already implemented such an arrangement with support from their local authorities using only two PCSO's; from start to implementation it took 3 months. Anti Social Behaviour problems there had improved dramatically. Members gave total support to Julia as Chair of Residents' Forum to write to Chief Constable to identify the way forward now.

Meeting closed very late at 8.30pm. C/man Ken Saiger thanked everyone for good turnout and a lively meeting. He thanked Keith who once more had turned out for the members & residents on his day off; much appreciated. Finally Ken thanked Neil for turning out on his Wedding Anniversary, & providing members with relevant "freebies".

Jottings from Sedgefield Village Residents' Forum, June 1st `09

Another meeting with lots of issues and information and this month we welcomed a couple of residents from Mordon who are addressing the issue of wind turbines in the area. The Mordon residents, like most others, are not totally against wind turbines but want a sensible and rational distribution of developments. The Forum agreed that it is essential that there is a well thought out and agreed strategy for the siting of any turbines and the Forum will support residents in our neighbouring communities.

Another issue brought to this month's meeting is the Racecourse licensing application which is to not only to renew their existing licence for various events but to also extend it to a further 5 acre area. There is also concern regarding the helicopter rides operating from the Racecourse and the rumour that they may be applying for permission to hold a third car boot fair each week

A priority which is always highlighted in any consultations or discussions is the need for youth provision in the village. We understand there is a Youth Forum trying to address the issue but there is never anyone able to give information at the residents' meeting and there doesn't seem to be reports easily accessible anywhere else. The Residents' Forum will try to get some update for our July meeting.

We understand the Durham County Council (DCC) Cabinet meeting will be discussing the issue of car park charging at Hardwick Country Park at their next meeting in June we are hoping that there will be action taken so that local residents are able to park at the Country Park without being charged.

We are still seeking to get answers to the many questions residents have put regarding the granting of planning permission for 330 caravans near Hardwick Country Park. We sent a list of questions to our MP Phil Wilson in the hope that he could get some answers for us. He forwarded our letter to Government Office for the North East (GONE) they have replied stating that they can only comment on planning issues and are not able to answer the majority of our questions so we will wait for a reply from our MP, hopefully with some answers. We will put all correspondence in a file in the Library and Town Council Offices so that anyone can keep up to date with information.

As we highlighted in last month's jottings there is wide concern about the 'atmosphere' in the centre of the village on some occasions. Many residents find the large groups of drinkers around the village very intimidating. The village green seems to be becoming a focal point for such groups on warm days and evenings and residents can feel intimidated or at least very uncomfortable with many 'locals' avoiding the village centre. The Forum, with other partners, will continue to push for action.

Despite much publicity by DCC there is still considerable confusion about the new unitary structure and how things will now operate. The new Area Actions Partnership Boards were scheduled to be in place and the first meeting to be held by the end of June; this has now been delayed until July. If, as a community we wish to have a say it really is important that we 'engage' with the new structure.

As always all issues discussed are in the minutes of the meeting which can be accessed in the Library or Town Council office at least one week before the next meeting. And remember any residents can be on the Forum email list to receive all information by contacting jane@sedgefield.net and leaving your email address. Next meeting 6th July 7 pm in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall – everyone welcome.

Free high quality wigs for people living with cancer

North East patients who are living with cancer in the North of England can now access free high quality wigs from local salons thanks to a new initiative. People who may have lost their hair through treatment for cancer can now choose their own wig from a number of participating salons across the region which will be paid for by the local NHS.

This pioneering service, which ensures patients across the North East and Cumbria have access to the same quality and service when receiving a wig, is being used as an example nationally for other regions across the country to develop the service.

Hairdresser Trevor Sorbie was able to len a hand to the project with his wealth of experience, advising on the quality of the wigs which will be provided. The patients also carried out their own research on potential salons. Ann Fox, nurse director of the North of England Cancer Network said: "We are delighted to be involved in this work. Many people feel their hair is their identity and losing it through cancer is incredibly traumatic. We hope this initiative will mean they are able to find a beautiful wig which they can have fitted and styled by specially trained hairdressers to make their experience the best we possibly can."

Much as I will enjoy all of the events just mentioned, for me the contest I look forward to most is cricket's Ashes, which start in Cardiff on 8th July (the venue is a sore point -Durham CCC's Riverside should be hosting a Test in my humble opinion). After the drama of 2005 and disappointment of the following series, the current form of both teams makes it hard to predict the outcome, but if it's anywhere near as exciting as the previous Ashes series in England, then we're in for a treat. We could even see three Durham players in the England squad, as Steve Harmison and Graeme Onions are both showing outstanding form in County Championship matches and must have hopes of joining regular Paul Collingwood. Closer to home, there are exciting developments underway at Sedgefield Cricket Club. We have the full story here, plus plenty of other village sport.

Cricket

As you may have noticed, walking past the clubhouse, extensive work is being carried out on the first phase of a project to update and improve the



facilities at Sedgefield Cricket Club. The initial plan is to build new changing rooms for all players and officials. When breaking through into the club from the extension, a new kitchen will be provided, allowing the existing tea hut to be removed from the site. The second phase will include upgrading facilities within the clubhouse, where full refurbishment is needed. Meanwhile, phase one frees up a lot of extra space which will be put to good use. An extended patio area at the front of the building will be completed by the time this newsletter is out, and an open invitation (as always) is extended to everyone to see for themselves the standards the club hopes to achieve. A fundraising exercise is now in operation to support the building of the phase two development. On the cricketing side, the senior teams have had a mixed start, but first, second and third teams are all competing well. They are supported by several excellent juniors who continue to thrive, making the most of a great group of youngsters whose development is there for all to see. The club's future looks to be in very good hands.

Three of the club's most improved juniors are playing at county level for Durham and are highly thought of by their coaches. All four junior teams are performing very well at under 11, 13, 15 and 17 levels. The club considers itself to be a community resource and although there is no annual membership system, nonmembers are encouraged to go along and enjoy the cricket or social aspects of the club.

Junior Harriers

Last month, I reported that Scott Kippen became Sedgefield Harriers' first North East athletics champion when he claimed victory in the U15 boys 400m at Gateshead Stadium. Scott went on to take silver medal in the 200m in a time of 25.21 secs, behind Ian Shevlin of Tynedale Harriers. Also picking up medals for Sedgefield were Joe Potts in the U13 Boys 200m who took silver in 31.71 secs and Gemma Varley in the U20 women's 5000m, who also won silver in a time of 21 mins 49.84 secs despite being only 16. There were superb performances all round from the junior Harriers who showed strength in depth throughout the weekend of athletics. This performance of one gold and three silver builds on the one bronze won by the club at the North East Championships in 2008 and bodes well for the future.

Senior Harriers

Four Sedgefield Harriers took part in this year's London Marathon in April. Regular marathon runner Rosie Sims produced the performance of the day to record a superb personal best of 3hrs 32mins and 42secs. Ian Blakemore, who broke a leg just before last year's marathon and has spent a year coming back, finished in a good time of 3:16:44. Ean Parsons produced a personal best to finish in 3:33:43 and Graeme Cherry ran 4:22:19 despite not having much time to train due to work commitments.

Just over a month later, 11 Harriers tackled the Edinburgh Marathon on a day blessed with blue skies and soaring temperatures. The Firth of Forth seemed like the Mediterranean - great for the spectators but not so good for the 8,000+ competitors. Like everyone else, the Harriers took to the scenic course, out from Prince's Street, around Holyrood Park to Leith and on via the sea front to Preston Pans and beyond before turning about, finishing on Musselburgh Racecourse after 26.2 miles.

Also running for Sedgefield were Anthony Long (3:38:50), Gail Bell (3:40:18), Matthew Jones (3:41:38), John Haycock (4:04:01) and Graeme Cherry (5:04:02).

Don't forget, Harriers stage their popular Summer Handicap for the Gerry Kearsley Memorial Trophy on the evening of Thursday 9th July, over 6.5 miles on tracks from Fishburn and around Bishop Middleham. Help to keep up the work of Scouting

1st Sedgefield Scout Group has been in existence for many years providing a significant number of young men, initially, now young women also, with access to high quality, challenging, fulfilling activities, as well as providing a place to go once a week where friendships have been created and talent developed. There must be hundreds of young people who grew up in the village for whom Scouting has played an important part in their lives. Today we have 4 groups belonging to the Scouts. The Beavers, catering for children aged 6 – 8, the Cubs which works with children aged 8 - 10.5, Scouts, providing activities for young people aged 10.5 – 14, and Explorers which work with young people aged 14 and 18. In total 75 children and young people are part of the Sedgefield Scout Group, drawn from the village and surrounding areas. There are also 15 volunteers who, on a weekly basis, run the groups and take part in local and district activities. Sedgefield Scouts plays an active part in the life of the community. They regularly support the Mediaeval fair, the annual service of Remembrance and deliver Christmas cards for the community. Since 1967 the Scout group has owned their own building, the former Methodist Chapel in Station Road. The group now faces some large costs to refurbish the building and to ensure that Scouting can continue to support the young people of this community in the future. Two of the major items needed are a new heating system and new windows. The heating system will cost in the region of £20k and windows about £10k. Whilst it is hoped that some funding can be raised from grant making bodies, we need to raise quite a large sum ourselves. Various fund raising activities are planned and applications are being made to external bodies for support, but we need your support. This is a call to all former Scouts and their families. Would you be willing to make a one off donation to the Scouts to help with the costs of renewing the heating system? If we cannot raise the money and get the work done before this winter, then it is unlikely that we will be able to operate over the winter months.
