### **Honouring Crimean War heroes**

Sedgefield Village Veterans propose to have a plaque made, engraved with the names and Regimental details of the 4 Crimean War soldiers (1854-57) with Sedgefield connections. They are: Bugler John Nichol (survivor), 4th Dragoon Guards and Sgt Frederick Hardwick Bolton (died of wounds 25th October 1854) of the 6th Inniskilling Dragoon Guards who both fought at Balaclava in the Charge of the HEAVY Brigade: also, Sgt Thomas Denton 21st North British Fusiliers (now the Royal Highland Fusiliers) who distinguished himself at the siege of Sebastopol and Lt Col. Clement Wm Strong, Coldstream Guards, son of the incumbent Rector of Sedgefield, Rev. Strong, who fought at the battles of The Alma, Sebastopol, Balaclava and Inkerman. He later lost his toes from frost bite, due to living in the trenches (this was the beginning of trench warfare) and was then sent home to recuperate.

We feel that these men should be remembered as part of Sedgefield's heritage, so would ask fellow citizens for their thoughts. We propose to have the plaque sited on the village green, close to the War Memorial. Your thoughts please, to Tim Spearey, Chair, on 623654 or David Hillerby, Secretary, 621343.

#### Red House School to move to Wynyard

The Governors of Red House School, Norton, have announced their planned re-location of the existing award-winning co-educational independent school to a purpose built 22-acre site at Wynyard in 2013.

Since its foundation in 1929, Red House School has become synonymous with teaching and sporting excellence with a formidable academic record, backed up by its present No.1 in Great Britain position in the Sunday Times Parent Power league tables. In order to facilitate demand for places by parents and accommodate an increasing school roll, the School expects to move to its new site at Wynyard Estate by September 2013.

Following an agreement to purchase the new site with land owners Cameron Hall Developments Ltd., Red House plans to move forward with the development of a brand new school with state of the art teaching and sports facilities. However, its relocation and increase in size will not change its overall ethos of providing a caring, safe and warm teaching environment with an emphasis on small class sizes, discipline and academic excellence.

Having outgrown its existing site at Norton Green, the relocation of the school at the heart of the growing Wynyard residential development will provide an academic facility that is beyond parallel in the Teesside region. Expansion will also result in new teaching and non-teaching positions, generating new employment opportunities locally.

This new £18m school on this highly accessible site will create a flagship academic establishment with purpose built facilities, including the addition of a sixth form college, allowing pupils the opportunity to take advantage of a first class education from the age of 2 to 19.

Alex Taylor, Headmaster, said "It has been my long held belief that Red House School should provide a complete and rounded education for our pupils from nursery through to, and including, sixth form. These facilities will enable us to do that and I am particularly excited that we will now be able to offer a top class sixth form in order to continue the School's already excellent academic record."

#### **Notes from Sedgefield in Bloom**

Young visitors to Ceddesfeld gardens have enjoyed **Woodland Bingo**, searching the grounds for leaves from 12 tree species. Proceeds from this and Cream Teas go to fund additional planting in the village. **Volunteers** continue working alongside Town Council gardeners and, on Wednesday morning sessions, have increased planting along the church wall, improved flower beds around Crispin Court and helped restore the large shrubbery at Beacon Lane. Jubilee Gardens on The Lane have been landscaped by Sedgefield Borough Homes, who kindly offered a donation to buy additional plants and the Rotary Wheel has been renovated, ready to be planted up and placed at the entrance to Winterton Park. Students at the Community College are restoring a vintage plough to join the seed drill which made such an impression last year. Other farming equipment, generously donated by local people, will also be planted up.

**Sedgefield in Bloom's cookery book** will soon be ready and children who wish to take part in the sunflower competition to be judged in August can get seeds from the council offices.

Northumbria in Bloom judging is on Fri. 15th July. On Sunday 17th, Sedgefield takes part again in the National Garden Scheme open day, when you can enjoy a wide variety of gardens, in aid of national charities (see page 11 for details).

The photo could have been taken in 1953, the tree planted to commemorate the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.

## Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel Request to Residents as well as Members

At every N/H/Watch meeting for several years now the problem of dog fouling is reported and complained about. Since Durham Unitary Authority was inaugurated the problems have worsened; it would seem that the time Tim Spearey spends in this village has diminished dramatically to the point recently where he is becoming ineffective. Despite written requests from Sedgefield N/H/Watch and from our Town Council there is no intention by Durham County Council to put more resources into the Village to improve the situation on dog fouling or other issues needing assistance from the Community Warden.

WHY? Because DCC only allocate resources (like Tim) when complaints / issues reported to the DCC Helpdesk raise the priority to a high enough level (compared to other locations)!

If you want to see our Warden Tim Spearey in our Village then you must ring Durham County Council and report each and every incident of dog fouling, as well as anti-social behaviour, fly tipping etc. - and not just where you live but wherever you come across it. Please insist that each "deposit" is recorded as a single complaint and not listed as only one fouling incident.

Please ring DCC and **not** our chairman, Ken Saiger; for all his efforts he has been unsuccessful, as he is classed as a single resident complaining. It is up to each and every one who encounters dog dirt or stands in it, to report it and inundate the Helpdesk with calls; then and only then will we get any benefit from *their* "resources".

During May Tim advised that there were no reports of dog fouling to DCC from Sedgefield – therefore **no problem** for DCC to tackle! Clearly the first part of the solution lies in each and everyone's own hands so please pick up the phone and report to the DCC Helpdesk! The number specified in the Durham County News is **0300 123 70 70** 

#### Now for a more positive report -

The following message was issued on May 17th to all NHW members who have elected to receive Police information/requests for observations/ feedback on incidents via their phone (this is also available via the internet).

This is a Police message for members of Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood Watch. We have had nine calls relating to suspicious activity in the village since the beginning of May and thanks to one Neighbourhood Watch member whose prompt action allowed us to respond and check a suspicious waste carrier, which resulted in an offender being prosecuted for a number of offences.

Thanks again and keep up your good work.

This demonstrates the benefit to our village of ordinary residents reporting concerns and responding to Police requests for specific observations. It all contributes to keeping crime down and improves the place we live in.

#### Parking on public footpaths

At the last Town Council meeting, Cllr. David Brown raised this matter. An e mail was sent to Durham County Council and their response was as follows:

Durham County Council shares your concerns regarding motorists parking vehicles on pavements and obstructing their use by pedestrians. Unfortunately there are no powers which we or the Police can use to enforce pavement parking where motorists do not contravene yellow line restrictions. However if vehicles are parked such that they obstruct the footway and cause pedestrians whether disabled, pushing a pushchair, accompanying children etc, or not to use the road to get past, then an offence may have been committed and the police may take action. It is often the case that to take action the Police must view the obstruction taking place (i.e. both vehicle and pedestrian in situ)

With the current level of car ownership, sadly a compromise has to be accepted in respect of parking on the footway. However, this is not to be to the detriment of the pedestrian. If you wish to contact the Police to report this matter the local office can be reached by telephoning 0345 6060365.

#### **PC Todd reports**

This month I would like to draw your attention to the car parks of Castle Eden walkway on the A689. This area is popular for cyclists and dog walkers alike. However, we have received more complaints that vehicles have been broken into, and handbags, Sat Navs and mobile phones taken. Even if secure your car is still not safe. Two other vehicles had Catalytic converters removed from under the car. These crimes have occurred between 7:30am & 10am, mainly at the weekend. Please try to avoid these times to reduce your risk, and don't leave valuables in the vehicle at any

Yet more damage is being caused around the area of the Doctors surgery and Council offices.
The young people who visit the youth shelter mayor may not be responsible but if this mindless vandalism does not cease this facility may be removed. Whoever you are, don't spoil it for other youngsters in the village.

**Jottings** from the June meeting of Sedgefield Residents' Forum

As usual this was an interesting, informative meeting, with residents giving views on issues which affect our community.

There appear to be differing views on the effectiveness of the youth bus in the village on Saturday nights, also there was information given that an alcohol free facility is currently operating in Sedgefield but no-one seems to know anything about it, so any information would be helpful please.

It seems unlikely that the Planning application for wind turbines in Spring/
Foxton lane will go to planning committee in June. Residents expressed concern if the application was to be considered in July or August when many are away on holiday. A request has been made to the Planning Department to avoid these two months. Still on the issue of wind turbines, the Public Meeting on the possibility of a further 45 turbines at Bradbury and the Isle gave some interesting information not least that Co Durham has already met its target re wind renewables for 2020 – so why do we need to continue industrialising our landscape? Watch out for further information and meetings, remember the proposed Spring/Foxton lane turbine installation will have a tremendous affect on our whole village.

The Local Government Ombudsman is currently finalising the decision, report and recommendations on our complaint about DCC (Durham County Council) and the s106 monies attributed to the Cunningham Court development, an amount of circa £53K is outstanding to our community.

Important issues affect our community; the Boundary Commission is finalising consultations on the DCC Counsellor areas and it will result in Sedgefield being partnered with Fishburn in future instead of Bishop Middleham as has been the case for many years. Also recent news shows proposals to change the Constituency areas; the proposal is that Sedgefield will disappear and will join with Billingham to form Stockton North. Information on this is expected to be out for consultation in September. Do you want to see the Sedgefield constituency disappear?

Many other issues were discussed. Come to a meeting to find out more or minutes can be emailed to you if you request ask <code>jane@sedgefield.net</code> or find them in the library one week before the next meeting. The next meeting is on July 4th at 7pm in the Fletcher Room, Parish Hall.

One final issue which was raised – not dog fouling this time but horse fouling. Some residents experience problems on narrow pavements fouled by horses. Those with push chairs, wheel chairs etc. are having to go on the road to avoid 'piles'- so an appeal to horse riders - please use the roads wherever possible and avoid fouling public footpaths.

#### SPORTS UPDATE

Did anyone else out there apply for tickets for the London 2012 Olympics? If so, based on media reports and what I've heard from family and friends, you may have been really disappointed with what you did (or more likely didn't) get. I applaud organisers LOCOG for trying to administer as fair a system as possible. The lottery was clearly designed to give everyone who applied for tickets an equal chance of being allocated some. However, what actually happened is that most people (like me) applied for the lower priced category tickets, which were hugely over-subscribed. It seems that those who felt able to request the most expensive tickets (e.g. £400+ per ticket for some sessions of athletics) were more fortunate. There is 'round two' of course, which will be underway by the time you read this, but the vast majority of the most popular tickets have long since been allocated. I'll still be trying to get hold of at least some tickets that will get me and my family onto Olympic Park; otherwise, it's going to be difficult to justify spending money on transport, and possibly accommodation, to witness four hours of archery at Lord's Cricket Ground on a Monday afternoon! One last thought - once the corporate and sponsors' tickets had been removed from the process, I wonder how many of the lower price category tickets were actually left to be allocated to the general public?

#### Sedgefield Harriers

There was a strong turn-out at the Redcar Half Marathon on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> June for a race which is a fixture in the North East calendar and which is run over a 'fast, flat course' which usually promises good personal times and maybe even an elusive personal best (PB). What this really means to those taking part is that it is going to be a hard race.

'The Redcar' is run over an out-&back course and the wind was kind on the way out but in the face on the return, making a mockery of splits. Nevertheless, there were some solid performances and some PBs. Though short of his best due to injury, Gary Hetherington still managed to finish first in the vet-50s and a very good 16<sup>th</sup> overall in a field of nearly 1,200 in a time of 1:18:58. Ian Blakemore was second Harrier, 33rd overall in 1:21:46. Gail Bell was first for the Harriers Ladies in 1:35:14 and Christine Hearmon put in an excellent run for a PB of 1:48:14 which was thoroughly deserved, following excellent effort in training in recent months. All Harriers had a good run, including Ean Parsons (1:35:05),

#### **Football**

Here's a final round up of the 2010/2011 Sunday league season. **St. Edmund's** finished in 6th place in the Durham District premier league, which is a decent outcome. However, after a fine 3-1 win at Ferryhill on the last game of the season, the news emerged that Ferryhill had dropped out of the league and would not complete their remaining fixtures. This meant that St. Edmund's lost the six points they had earned by beating Ferryhill twice, and were not mathematically safe from relegation. In the end, the club stayed in the top flight. Despite a difficult and inconsistent season, team spirit was excellent and everything bodes well for the future. At the end of season awards presentation, Steve Flockett was crowned player of the season, Steve Bagshaw was players' player and young player of the season. Andrew Beamson was leading goal scorer.

Sedgefield NetPark FC finished in 4th place in the 2nd division of the Durham District league. The league has since confirmed the club's third promotion in a row, continuing the great progress that NetPark FC have made in recent years. Key to the club's success has been the outstanding team spirit, with everyone in the squad and among the backroom staff making important contributions. At the end of season presentation in Salvo's restaurant in the Crosshills, the following awards were handed out: club player of the year, Martin Broom; players' player of the season, Dan Pilling; goal of the season, Dan Pilling; most appearances, Nicky Walker; supporters of the season – Harvey Ryder, Robbie Dickerson & Ciaran Lines; best looking player (!) Phillip Bland.

**Sedgefield Youth FC** held their presentation evening on 11<sup>th</sup> June in the Parish Hall and had a great night. Every player was presented with a trophy for their contribution to the season. In addition, the following awards were made: most man of the match awards, Jamie Herd; manager's award, John Walton; most improved player, Michael Thompson; sportsman of the season (the Alfred Stelling Trophy), Sam MacCormack; most goals scored (at 36, also, most scored in the league), Jamie Herd.

Other prizes went to home referee James as a big thank you (I presume for excellent service, rather than any 'helpful' decisions!) to coach Sean Parkin for continued dedication and to Joe Worley & Ryan Towler for being the fittest players. The John Robinson Trophy went to William Davies (Taff), the club's most dedicated supporter. He attends every home game and most away games, even though his grandson no longer plays for the team.

Unfortunately, some Sedgefield Youth FC players will leave before next season. The club wishes them all of the best for the future. They hope the dedication shown this season carries on to their final year together as a youth team.

Junior Harriers were in action at County Durham Athletics Network inter-club match at Maiden castle on Wednesday 15th June against Durham City Harriers, Chester-Le-Street A.C. and Derwentside A.C. This annual fixture has taken place for three years and has been won by Durham City Harriers on both previous occasions. The event is aimed at younger athletes and has categories for U11, U13 and U15. All athletes take part in a sprint, an endurance run on the track, a longjump and a throw, scoring points for the club, so it is a good test of athletics skills and abilities. There were some marvellous individual performances for the Harriers in all events and Sedgefield Harriers came out on top - a fantastic result, given the level of competition from other top clubs. The U13s won their category outright and Ellie Gaines was top U13 girl of the whole event.

Would you like to win an athletics medal at Gateshead Stadium?
Leanne Fleetham and James Raw did

just that recently with second place in the howler throw (the howler is used to teach generic throws skills relevant to javelin, shot, discus and hammer) and a third in the standing long jump respectively in the Young Athletes League. A lot of credit for all these results must go to the large team of coaches who work with the Junior Harriers, developing their skills over a long period and preparing the athletes for competition, namely; Tim Dredge, Diane Baines, Kate Devine, Sharon Carr, Anne-Marie Robertshaw, Hannah Davison, Christine Hearmon, Sue Dobson, David Walker and Frances Barlow who work with the lead junior coaches at the club (Marie Walker, Scott Hydon and Ean Parsons). In recognition of the great athletic development work going on at the Harriers, the club has been included as one of a very small number of clubs in the North East to benefit from direct support from England

#### Squash

The Junior Sedgefield Squash Club was delighted to be awarded runner-up in the best team category at the recent Sedgefield youth awards. The club continues to attract new players aged 7-16. Many simply enjoy going along to Saturday morning coaching sessions while others will eventually join the adult leagues. This season, Robert Pearce and George Peden are playing for the county at U15 and U13 levels respectively, while others have attended county squad training sessions or regional events. There's a break at the end of the school term, with coaching resuming at the start of September

Senior squash

Although the season has officially ended, events continue at the club, with the Summer Squash Blitz which was held on 25<sup>th</sup> June, and the summer barbeque. Over the summer break, the club will be getting the front wall on court two refurbished. The new season starts at the beginning of September with the annual team handicap competition, open to players of all abilities, as a means of a warm up for the challenges ahead. The club plans to overhaul its website, www.sedgefieldsquashclub.co.uk over the next few months.

Athletics as a part of their Athletics 5 -5-5 strategy, aimed at bringing through top talent. This support comes in recognition of the very strong development pathway that the club now has, which gives every junior athlete the opportunity to take part and fulfil their potential. Coaches Scott Hydon, Marie Walker and Ean Parsons have also been selected to be a part of England Athletics Local Coach Development Programme, giving them access to first class resources and support and which will also ensure the young athletes at the Harriers have every opportunity to progress strongly. The junior club is now attracting athletes from a wide area across Durham and Teesside to train and compete in the Sedgefield vest.
