
Jubilee Celebrations



SPORTS UPDATE

In less than a month's time, the London 2012 Olympic Games will begin, a moment that sports fans in this country have been anticipating for seven years. As I type this, the GB athletics trials are underway in Birmingham. Athletes who have been dedicating themselves to qualify for the biggest sporting event on the planet will be straining at the sinews to secure their places in the team. Inevitably, trials like this result in a lot of joy and a lot of distress, and unsurprisingly, the tension is particularly high this year. That makes it compelling viewing!

Within the full GB Olympics team there should be a few men and women from the North East, including table tennis star Paul Drinkhall, 1,500m runners Laura Weightman and Ross Murray, and long jumper Chris Tomlinson. Here in Sedgefield, we have been using London 2012 as the inspiration for our own Village Games (see the supplement in the centre of the newsletter). As well as being great fun, the hope is that the Village Games will encourage a lot of young people to participate more regularly in a range of sports. So, when we start to look forward to future Olympic Games and Paralympic Games, perhaps the North East representation on the GB team will include a few more stars from Sedgefield.

Olympic Torch Relay

Although not a sporting event in itself, it was a major part of the build up to the biggest one on the planet, and Sedgefield can be proud of the role that it played in it. A crowd of around 10,000 welcomed the Olympic Torch relay to the village, which Durham Police reckoned was the biggest turnout in the region in terms of people per square metre. That's what they said anyway and given the density of the crowds in the centre of Sedgefield on 17th June, it rings true.

Of course, as Sedgefield News has already reported, village resident Ryan Davey was one of the torchbearers here, but he wasn't the only one from Sedgefield. The day before, Sedgefield Harriers' own Scott Hydon carried the torch in Sunderland, in recognition of the work he has done to establish the club over the last seven years. That same afternoon, he invited junior (and senior) Harriers to join him in a mini-relay around Hardwick Park that gave scores of youngsters (and the not quite so young!) the opportunity to run with an Olympic Torch. It was a really generous gesture, and everyone who took part had a fantastic time – the perfect warm up for the official relay. There a photo of the children on page 4

Sedgefield Junior Harriers' Magnificent May

April 2012 was a landmark month in Sedgefield Junior Harriers history. The month saw the Harriers compete in the Cyril Elliott and Anne-Marie Readshaw Open Medal meetings at Middlesbrough and Shildon, and the first Minor Athletics Meeting (MAL) of the season at Gateshead. In total, 28 medals were won across the three meetings, with record hauls for Sedgefield on each date. If anything, May proved to be even better. In the second 2012 MAL fixture at Gateshead, Sedgefield claimed 11 medals across the Year 3, 4, 5 and 6 categories (see Junior Results on the website). This was four more medals than were won in the same competition in April. A trio of athletes also competed in the first North Yorkshire/South Durham (NYSD) fixture of the month at Darlington, with George Pilkington, Abie Hearmon and younger brother Tom all achieving top three places in their respective track events. The throws group made Harriers history by being the first Sedgefield field eventers to take part in the North East Athletics League (NEAL) on May 23rd. Seven of the group competed in the shot at Monkton with three athletes - Kate Carmichael, Joe Bellis and Megan Devine - all achieving top three places. The other throwers making history were Zoe Dobson, Joseph Devine, Ryan Fleetham and Lucy Robertshaw. Zoe also competed the following week, in the second May NYSD league fixture, this time in the U15 girls discus. Zoe took the first ever 1st place for Sedgefield in a discus event.

The highlight of the month saw Sedgefield retain the County Durham Athletics Network Quadkids Shield with 54 athletes from Year 3 through to Year 8 turning out for Sedgefield at Maiden Castle. The Harriers dominated the competition taking 36 of the available 72 top three places across the different age groups and winning 12 medals each at U11, U13 and U15 levels (see the Sedgefield Secure Shield Success report on the website).

Such was the turnout of young athletes at Maiden Castle that it means the Junior Harriers have now had 67 juniors compete in one or more track and field meetings in 2012, with 31 of them achieving at least one top three placing so far this season. By the end of May, an incredible total of 83 top three places had been achieved in sprints, middle-distance, jumps and throws in this track and field season. With the Sedgefield Junior Harriers competing at more MAL, NYSD and NEAL meetings over the summer it's possible that the club's young athletes may break the 100 barrier!

A list of all the competing athletes and their achievements will appear on the Harriers website (www.sedgefieldharriers.com) in early September as part of a track and field season review.

Since last month's report, they have managed to snatch defeat from the jaws of victory at Guisborough and last year's champions, Marton. However, Sedgefield also showed amazing character to tie with Normanby Hall. Professionals Steve Naylor and Mohamed Zahid continue to star with the ball and Chris Gillespie has excelled with the bat. The weather has denied the 2nd team of any play in seven games so far this season; in the four games where there has been some play, Sedgefield have recorded crushing victories over Blackhall, Preston, Yarm and Bishop Auckland. The team sit second in the league. Mal Dickenson leads the way in the batting and Ben Young continues to take wickets with the new ball. Only three games have seen any action in the Sunday division 2, where Sedgefield's young 3rd team have won two, drawn one, leaving them in a handy position to fight for promotion when the rain stops! Luke Henderson and James Kemp have both scored heavily with the bat and James Bell leads in the wicket taking.

So, it's been quite a sporting month (loads happening in and around Sedgefield, plus Euro 2012, the US Open in golf and French Open in tennis) and the next couple are going to be amazing.



Notes from the Meeting held on 12th June 2012

Prior to the meeting proper, Chair, David Hillerby informed members of past Treasurer & real "gentleman" John Fawcett's sad change of circumstance. He is now living in Willowdene; hopefully someone may find time to visit him soon. The continued absence of Ken Saiger was felt by David, who along with all present wish Ken well and a steady recovery.

The cheque from outgoing Mayor Allan Blakemore for £150 was appreciatively received by members who commented on how good Allan has been not only for NHW but for the whole village during his period of Mayor. Allan's regular attendance as a Town Council representative at NHWatch meetings was also positively appreciated.

Neil Langthorne confirmed that our group is still covered with Insurance & that the policy is now from Towergate insurance. Neil informed members that Towergate are discounting domestic policies to **NHW Members** by 10%, but stressed he was not making any recommendations, merely informing members. Neil gave details of a stand-alone security device; Passive type Detector. It can auto dial up to 3 separate tel. nos. when activated; it is relatively low cost (poss. as low as £15). Anyone interested, contact Neil or come to next meeting. PC Keith Todd circulated his Crime report for 13/04/2012 - 30/05/2012. There were **8 Recorded Crimes**. 253 calls were made to the Police during this period, 92 related to Traffic, 8 to the Recorded Crimes and 13 for Anti-Social Behaviour.

During **PACT** Keith discussed the previous month's activities, informing that the Speed Matrix sign had been used on 7 separate occasions resulting in 15 warning letters sent out, 11 to village residents! It was acknowledged that the St Edmund's Terrace parking problems had been much improved. New Issues raised: Front St/Cross St. Parking (obscuration danger); Rectory Row Parking; Counterfeit Pound Coins and Traffic Calming Motoring Issues with Speeding on Durham Road. Foodstore windfall

As readers will be aware, planning permission has recently been granted for a new foodstore in Sedgefield. After taking a pragmatic view that the foodstore would be likely to get the go-ahead, Sedgefield Harriers campaigned and lobbied hard throughout the planning process to ensure that the community would receive some wider benefit from the planned foodstore through investment in local projects, and in particular the installation of an athletics track (and associated sports club house) at Sedgefield Community College for the benefit of the local community and the college.

The club feel that an athletics track with additional features added in the future (sports club-house to benefit all sports clubs, and changing facilities) would have a positive impact on youth in Sedgefield. The club already has as many as 200 young people involved in sport as well as a senior group of 70. The foodstore developer was unable to commit to funding the facility in its entirety, though they have agreed to allocate significant funds to the Town Council to invest on projects they decide on.

Despite lobbying, despite the positive impact on youth of a sports facility at a time when local leisure centres have closed and despite the fact that the Harriers have led the way in ensuring that there is community investment as a result of the foodstore, it appears that the athletics track project is being ignored. Despite a lot of hard work and financial support for a feasibility study, it is not even mentioned in the Annual Report of the Town Council for the past year. Sedgefield Harriers is currently UK Athletics Club of the Year and England Athletics Development Club of the Year; national awards made in recognition of the work done with young people.

We will not rest until we have achieved our goal of having a first class athletics facility in Sedgefield. If the Town Council are not predisposed to support the track project then perhaps we can expect a reply here to explain what the foodstore windfall will be spent on and the comparative merits of the projects involved.
