# Lower Energy Bills: progressing to the next step

Sedgefield, Bradbury, Mordon & Fishburn, via SDT (Sedgefield Development Trust) are now members of a National Collective Energy Switching Initiative.

#### What does this mean?

SDT has joined an initiative which could reduce domestic energy costs for residents throughout our area.

#### What are the benefits?

If large numbers of people collectively switch the supplier of their Gas and/or Electricity at one time the costs will be reduced.

#### How much can I save?

If you have not switched your energy supplier in the last 3 years, or are paying Standard Tariff charges, an average user of this initiative could save over £150 per year for a dual fuel deal.

#### Can anyone join?

Yes, as long as your energy bill is in your or your partner's name, and you are a domestic user.

#### Is it free?

Yes. It will cost you nothing to join.

#### What is my commitment?

Just asking for a quote doesn't commit you to accepting. After the offer is made, you decide.

#### Tell me more

The initiative starts on the 5th August, and details of how to get be part of the scheme will be published in the August edition of Sedgefield News and on posters in the village. If any earlier news crops up, it will appear on our website, sedgefieldweb.co.uk and via twitter @sedgefieldnews.

#### Who is involved?

Sedgefield Development Trust followed up a suggestion from the community that this idea should be explored. So we have joined a regional purchasing scheme, the North East Purchasing Organisation through which we will work with Ichoosr – a company that has developed this kind of bulk tendering of people's energy purchasing both in the UK and in Belgium and Holland. Ichoosr have worked with over 150

local authorities in the UK and still do so but, we understand, this will be the first time the national tender will include consumers in a direct community scheme. Ichoosr are pleased to be working directly with a community controlled group like SDT, seeing it as a possible example for the rest of the country. SDT are, of course, delighted to be pioneers, but we are determined to do it well. So far so good! Now we want to make a good job of getting our residents involved.

# Sedgefield Twinning Association celebrate 32nd year of friendship

During the first week of June a small group from Sedgefield spent an excellent week in Hamminkeln, our Twin Town in the Lower Rhine area of Germany. Although few in number we felt that it was one of the most successful visits we have had, due in part to the fact that our planned activities were well spaced out so nobody got too exhausted and we had plenty of time to simply visit our friends, some of whom we have known, if not the full 32 years, for a very long time! We were very conscious that our group is getting older but we were all still very able to enjoy ourselves. We were greeted with a Welcome Meal at the Bürgerhalle in Hamminkeln where we were entertained by an excellent male voice choir, which included several friends and hosts. A day in the delightful small town of Kalkar followed, guided by an exceptionally good bilingual guide. We had a tour of the old town and a delicious lunch in one of the oldest houses, then a tour of the church with its beautiful carved wooden altars. The day ended with Kaffee und Kuchen (coffee and cakes), a tradition without which no day trip in Germany is complete! I think it safe to say that most of us gained some weight in the course of the week!

After a free day spent with host families, on Wednesday morning we could chose to go for a "walk" with the Senior Citizens of Mehrhoog. Those of us who did, discovered that the Senior Citizens all had electric bicycles – some even seating a couple side by side – but those of us were on foot still managed to get back in time for breakfast (or brunch).

A rainy Thursday was another free day (otherwise the weather was warm and pleasant) but on Friday we had a full day visit to Cologne, travelling in a double-decker train! The morning was spent in the outstanding Roman Museum, featuring (among many other wonderful things) a mosaic from a Roman villa, still in its original site and almost completely undamaged by the intervening years. This was only discovered during World War 2 when they dug down deeply next to the cathedral in order to build a bunker. The mosaic had been the floor of the dining and entertaining area, featuring as it does a drunken Dionysus being helped home by his servant, surrounded by Roman citizens in various stages of undress, all enjoying themselves hugely! We were also enthralled by the collection of artefacts, 80% of which came from Cologne, which were in an amazingly good state of preservation. Lunch in a German brewery, a tour of the spectacular cathedral, then free time to enjoy the shops and the sunshine, completed a wonderful day. On Saturday, our last day, many of us visited Wesel market and attended an excellent organ recital in the Willibrordi Dom (cathedral). The grand finale was dinner at Hoffmann's restaurant in Dingden, where we were entertained by a remarkable group of bagpipers, the "McBricht Pipers"!

We have returned home full of enthusiasm for entertaining our friends next year here in Sedgefield, and we would be delighted if anyone out there might be interested in hosting someone, or just coming along to see what we do! On the Sunday of Sedgefield Weekend, July 13th, we will be serving tea and coffee in Ceddesfeld Hall from 10am-12 and we plan to hold a small exhibition to tell people a bit about our Association. German food and drink will also be available, so please do come and see us.

## 'Not in Sorrow, But in Pride'

Sedgefield Players' production proved an outstanding success. Using poetry, song and drama in commemoration of World War 1, the title is drawn from Sedgefield's war memorial; 'Pass not this stone in sorrow, but in pride, And may you live as nobly as they died.' SPYS joined the adults to create a huge ensemble team (in the programme as Sedgefield Players Pals Battalion.) The hall was decorated with banners, bunting and wartime posters. Even the raffle followed a wartime theme, the prizes being Red Cross parcels like those sent to troops. During the interval, a slide show of images donated by local people brought home the impact of the war on Sedgefield itself.

Well known poems such as 'In Flanders Field' and Rupert Brooke's 'The Soldier' featured alongside less familiar works dealing with the contribution of nurses at the front, the anguish of wives and sweethearts at home and the tragic loss of life and limb in the trenches. Two 1 act plays showed contrasting views of the effect of the Great War. 'After the Ball is Over' by Lynn Britney, set in a grand country house, with the upper classes trying to maintain their life style in the early stages of the war. Charitable work, letters from the front and a touching romance helped them to cope in the face of loss and injury to their menfolk. The men in the trenches in Steve Harper's 'Lions and Donkeys' had cheated death for four years, their heroism and ingenuity more than a match for the young officer sent to take over in the last days of the war.

Audiences were most attentive and appreciative, joining in with wartime songs and responses such as 'We will remember them'. People had come from as far afield as Gateshead and Whitley Bay to see this production, one which will live long in the memory of those involved, both on stage and in the audience. A privilege for all concerned. If you missed out on this opportunity to see a great local company in performance, look out for the Players next event, a week long drama festival in September, bringing talent from all over the region to your doorstep.



#### Sedgefield charity seeks support after downturn

Sedgefield Educational Foundation is one of two grant-awarding charities dedicated to supporting the residents of the Sedgefield district. Its funds grew out of a number of bequests made by noteworthy Sedgefield philanthropists, the earliest in 1782. Since that time the Foundation has provided financial support to families where help was needed to enable children to benefit from education and for some years provided the salary of the teacher at Sedgefield School before the days of publicly provided education. Over recent years grants have been made to encourage 'A' level students to go on to higher education. In the economic downturn of 2008 the Foundation lost a significant proportion of its capital, and in the following years the requests for help have increased, many families being affected by economic circumstances, increased costs in attending university and cuts in benefit support. Despite this, Trustees of the Foundation have continued to maintain the value of grants and have sought to help all families whose resources fall below a certain level. The Foundation's investments have now reached a level at which the income generated does not provide the annual expenditure, typically up to £4,000. Consequently, Trustees now seek to revive that tradition of endowments from individuals, businesses and philanthropic organisations and invite any persons or representatives of bodies which may be able to help to contact John Hannon, the Clerk to the Trustees. John will be happy to meet with anyone requiring more details of the charity's operation and explore ways of giving support.

Very few parts of the country have charities dedicated to the benefit of its residents. Sedgefield is remarkable in having charities with a long history of providing help with education, training, health, poverty and many other aspects of the quality of life. It is hoped that with the help of those who live and work in the Sedgefield area these benefits will continue into future centuries.

## Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel Notes from June 10th Panel meeting

Outgoing Mayor Mel Carr's kind donation to the group from his charitable fund was reported to members, this will help meet the ongoing costs of meetings and other activities undertaken during the year; members expressed their appreciation.

From the previous (April) meeting Julia Bowles reported that the Residents' Forum's efforts to get funds to purchase traffic Speed Matrix (measuring) equipment had been thwarted yet again, but they intend to try again in September when funding may be available.

Also from the last meeting, Phyllis Hillerby on behalf of residents at the Willows recorded her appreciation for the very rapid response by our local force especially that of attending officer Gavin Rutter to the anti-social behaviour activities residents were then experiencing from a few young persons. Police actions swiftly and effectively eradicated the problem and happily it has not re-occurred; PC Todd was asked to convey residents' appreciation to his colleagues.

PC Todd discussed in detail the low level of crime in the village and the effectiveness they have had regarding most ASB issues but pointed out that there is another – again from young persons – resurgence of this at the Coop premises. This will be dealt with we were assured, once again the question of parental awareness / control was discussed.

Keith gave a very interesting description of our local team's involvement and that of the wider force in tracking down a miscreant, who had carried out a distraction type crime on an elderly local person, predominantly by using (Durham Police Force's) social media.

Concerns for the number of "Scrappies" with overloaded looking pick-up trucks were reported to the Police.

The issues with vehicle parking and traffic congestion along the road leading to Sainsbury's, with the attendant safety issues so caused, were brought to Keith's attention; as was the speeding along the Fishburn road and down Durham road.

Chairman Ken Saiger was able to close the meeting before 8pm, thanking those who had attended and reminded everyone that the next meeting will be the AGM plus a normal meeting on Tuesday 14th October.

Finally, please try and report (to the Police on tel.101) all out of place or suspicious vehicles and also any persons that cause you or neighbours concern. Such reports will help to make our village and homes even safer. There are no Panel meetings during July, August or September.

# Sports UPDATE with sports Editor CHRIS LINES

"Expectations for England seem to be refreshingly realistic at the moment", I wrote last month. Ho hum. Anyway, wasn't that a great strike by Tim Cahill?

English sport has had a tough time of late in general. The rugby union team returned from New Zealand after three defeats to the All Blacks, while the cricket team lost the one day series against Sri Lanka and, at the time of writing, is going to have to work hard to secure a positive result in the final test match. A longer series against India is next on the agenda.

On a much more positive note, one English sportsman has just set an amazing record. Steve Birkinshaw, an athlete who lives in Cumbria and works at Newcastle University, set out on a week long continuous circuit that included the summit of each of the 214 hills or mountains that feature in Alfred Wainwright's famous seven volume Pictorial Guide to the Lakeland Fells. His route was 512km in length and included 36,000m of ascent. Steve completed his run in six days and 13 hours, knocking almost 12 hours off the record set by fell running legend Joss Naylor MBE in 1987. Starting from Keswick on Saturday 14 June, each day he ran about 78km and reached the top of over 30 peaks. Throughout his run, Steve was carrying a GPS tracker, which allowed the public to follow his progress and to hike or run up to meet him at locations along the way. As the week progressed, word of his progress spread via social media and there was someone waiting to cheer him on at the summit of almost every Wainwright top. On the final day, scores of runners appeared to join Steve for the final leg of his challenge and accompanied him as he arrived in Keswick, where hundreds more people were waiting to welcome him, including his wife Emma and their three children. I was fortunate enough to be able to join him for a few miles on the sixth day of his run. I covered about 18.5 miles on a warm day and my legs were aching afterwards. It's hard to comprehend covering another 300 miles as part of the same run, but Steve managed that. I was also there to see him finish in Keswick, where there was a really special atmosphere as people saw the conclusion of a genuinely astonishing adventure. Anyway, back to Sedgefield...

#### Boxing

Sedgefield boxer Bradley Saunders is making very impressive progress in his professional career. He is now unbeaten in 10 fights, including eight knock outs, and recently secured his first major belt. Bradley beat seasoned pro Ville Piispanen in just 81 seconds and claimed the WBO Intercontinental light-welterweight title. Promoter Frank Warren was ringside for the fight in Newcastle and has stated that a world title challenge beckons if Bradley continues to perform to the same standard. His next fight will be against a yet unnamed opponent on the undercard of the heavyweight rematch between Dereck Chisora and Tyson Fury in Manchester during July. This will put Bradley in the media spotlight once again and provide him with another opportunity to demonstrate his ability to a big audience.

#### Sedgefield Village Games

Two years ago, the London 2012 Olympic Torch visited Sedgefield and was greeted by thousands of people. The same day saw the launch of the Sedgefield Village Games (SVG), an initiative that was inspired by the Olympics and set up to provide pathways into sport and healthy living for residents in and around Sedgefield. SVG put a lot of focus on young people and over three weeks in 2012 laid on a series of taster events with the help of many clubs and societies in Sedgefield. Hundreds of youngsters participated and the games were widely acclaimed as a great success. Although London 2012 is now just a memory, the Sedgefield Village Games project has endured. Last year, the committee behind SVG revised the set up and agreed some new objectives. SVG continues to organise its own events or support others, but now also seeks to support young people achieve their personal sporting ambitions by providing bursaries. In addition, the SVG committee is exploring other ideas that will benefit the community in Sedgefield.
