Steve's Nature Diary The natural world month by month

My car went in for some work to be done recently, so I took the opportunity to have a walk round Coatham Marsh, Redcar and because it took longer for them to do the work than expected (doesn't it always) I had a very pleasant stroll around Tees Valley Wildlife Trust's Nature reserve and saw quite a few things. This is interesting because recently someone wrote a piece about how nothing lived there and what a poor state it was in. The site was looking at its best partly due to the hard work and commitment of Tees Valley Wildlife Trust staff but also because of the gallant effort of local community groups who have all been doing a sterling job of tidying up the local area. Not that it is really their job - we all have a responsibility to look after the environment whether it is taking litter home with us or picking up our dog poo. Back to the walk, the first thing I heard was a Sedge Warbler which was singing its heart out close to the Locke Park entrance to the reserve. These warblers, like a lot of the species that visit the marsh, are summer visitors, quite often from Africa, who come to places like Coatham to bring up their young. They have a noisy, rambling warble which goes on a bit and can be difficult to see, but quite often perch on a bush or the reeds. Over the water I could see four more migrant species who were hawking for insects - they were Swallows, Swifts, House and Sand Martins. The latter, it is hoped, will move into the custom built Sand Martin Nest Bank put on the reserve last year. No signs yet but it can take a while for them to discover new places to nest especially if they are manmade. As I continued my walk, I saw families of Blue and Great Tits, heard a Water Rail and Reed Warbler. I spent quite a while watching hundreds of tadpoles by one of the bridges feeding on something (not sure what) and also saw a small shoal of fish. So far I have not mentioned any of the water birds I saw but this included two Mute Swans with 4 cygnets, Mallard, Coot, Moorhen, Tufted Duck, Pochard and I watched a Heron fishing for 5 minutes. As the weather started to warm up the insects emerged. I saw a yet unidentified moth, Common Blue and Small Heath Butterflies and Blue Tailed and Common Blue Damselflies.

Plant wise, not being an expert, I took a few pictures which I will be posting to the www.clevelandcoast.org.uk/add/ to see if they can be identified. The reserve was bursting with patches of Bird's Foot Trefoil and Kidney Vetch all being used by the butterflies. The reserve has several public footpaths and will soon become part of the England Coastal Path. There is a small car park at Todd Point Road. In July is comes alive with damselflies and dragonflies along with butterflies such Meadow Brown and the rare Grayling butterfly so well worth a visit – you can find more information at www.teeswildlife.org/nature-reserve/coatham-marsh/.

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch

Update from the meeting held on 9th June

PC Keith Todd could not attend as he was called away at the last minute for operational needs, but the newly appointed Police Liaison Officer, PCSO Lauren Wray was able to attend.

Lauren introduced herself, outlined her role and her extensive geographic area, and gave an update on the messaging system (no longer available to us) and of the replacement plan in place by Durham Police.

Lauren spoke on the Safer Homes scheme and is to follow up the slow response (none so far) to a member who had requested assistance / advice under the scheme, several weeks ago.

She also spoke about the Police Junior N/H/Watch scheme that is run in Durham and of the intention to follow up the request from our Chairman Ken Saiger, to introduce this into our local Primary Schools if it can be arranged.

Lauren was asked to take back to the Police our members' continued dissatisfaction with the lack of contact and inadequate communications from Police. Several incidents were cited that they may have been able to assist with if they had been made aware.

The Secretary reported on progress to date regarding the N/H/Watch request (09/04/2015) made to DCC asking for improvements in pedestrian Safety, Traffic Congestion and Verge Damage in the areas of the Hospital Roundabout and the access road into the Trading Estate.

Two meetings on site have been held with DCC Officers and a group of 4 residents representing N/H/Watch. At the meeting of 17th April residents' safety issues for pedestrians crossing the road were listened to and recognised as valid concerns, but they did not give rise to meeting Government criteria that would require DCC to take remedial actions (as was requested) for controlled crossings or other measures; therefore no action is to be taken.

At the meeting of 15th May the DCC Officer agreed to make a proposal to restrict parking from the bus stop to the roundabout (entering the village) and on both sides of the road from the roundabout to the Sainsbury entrance and he was sympathetic to including no unloading or loading.

Since that (15th May) meeting, County Councillor John Robinson has held a meeting with the officer and now N/H/Watch are awaiting written details from Councillor Robinson & the DCC Officer of the actual proposed restrictions to be applied to the roadways.

Following the meeting, crime figures provided by local Police for the period 11th May to 8th June showed **9 recorded crimes**.

There were 3 burglaries, & residents are reminded that there is a rise across the country in shed and garden crime at this time of the year. Sedgefield is no exception; please lock valuable tools bikes etc. away and out of sight and don't leave unsecured items lying around. Iinsurance is unlikely to pay out. Fit a shed alarm if possible (consider using the Safer Homes initiative.)

There was 1 serious assault on a cyclist by the driver of a blue Ford estate vehicle on 2nd June; this took place in Rowan Oval.

We continue to urge members & residents to report (to the Police tel.101) all out of place or suspicious vehicles and also any persons or activities that cause you *any* concern.

Next meeting, on Tuesday 13th October, will be the AGM, followed by an ordinary meeting.

PC Todd's report

An unpleasant crime was committed recently when a male riding a bike along Salters Lane was stopped by a male driving a blue Ford Escort. The rider was then punched in the face and kicked when on the ground. This was an unprovoked assault and we are seeking any witnesses who may have seen the incident on Tuesday 2nd June at about 7pm.

Other crimes reported include a burglary at the Cricket Club and a burglary at the Hardwick Visitor Centre. A shed was forced in Chestnut Road where two high value bikes were taken and the Temple in Hardwick Country Park became the victim of graffiti criminals who have defaced this iconic monument by scribbling on a wall. Two youths have been interviewed so far, with others to come. *Keith Todd*

The Sedge field Plan

Shaping the future of our area

As you will have noticed in previous bulletins much has been happening and It is time to bring the community up to date with the current status of the plan and to let you know what we know in regard to DCC's progress with the judicial review that they seek to challenge the inspector's interim report. The inspectors rejection of key elements of DCC Local Plan has left this community exposed to unwanted development.

We have already had an application refused for the three cornered field on Stockton Road for 35 houses that may yet go to appeal and we have a new application for 315 houses on Eden Drive, submitted by Story Homes and the Diocese, that includes the partial closure of Stockton Road.

These sites are outside the 'Built up area boundary' that has been defined in The Sedgefield Plan and both are located on the 'Green Wedge' that is in the saved policies of Sedgefield District Council. None has taken account of the inspector's call for new housing here to be reduced and dispersed to neighbouring communities.

We have arranged two public meetings to take place at 7pm on 29th and 30th June in the Parish Hall.

Please do come along to participate in the discussion and to hear what you can do to help protect our village it is under a real threat which makes it imperative that the plan is submitted to DCC to commence its progress through independent inspection as soon as possible.

The tests and one day international matches against New Zealand were hugely entertaining, with some excellent cricket on display.
