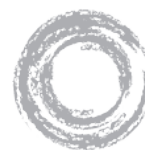

There has been much critical comment about the loss of local banking services since Barclays closed in May. Businesses and individuals are inconvenienced by it and for some people, dealing with everyday financial transactions is hard.

Sedgefield Development Trust is still prepared to contribute to an initiative to bring banking facilities back to Sedgefield, in co-operation with the North East First Credit Union and others.

To do this, we would need to bring volunteers on board, from this community, who have banking and other relevant experience. In at least one case, that experience would have to be at a senior level. Wheels to Work

Wheels to Work County Durham

A moped-loan scheme aims to help people access employment, training or education that would otherwise be inaccessible due to poor public transport connections or out-of-hour work patterns. The project has been set up in response to a growing need to help local people get to work or college. The idea is to provide a loan of a moped for 6 months to help people to establish themselves in work and/or training, making people more employable by helping them to be mobile and independent.

Mopeds of either 50cc or 125cc are available to people aged 16+, as long as they have a provisional or full driving licence. The cost is £25 per week for a 50cc and £30 per week for a 125cc moped. Riders are provided with brand new protective clothing (helmet, armoured jacket, gloves, waterproof over-trousers and high visibility vest) and a heavy duty lock, and are also covered for bike insurance, road tax, breakdown cover, as well as regular servicing of the moped. There may be a chance to buy the moped from the scheme at the end of the loan period. Motorcycle training is included as part of the scheme, provided by Ace Motorcycles in Pity Me, Durham. A full day's Compulsory Basic Training is followed by a 2 hour CBT plus session on a separate day, when clients are provided with additional road time and issued with their clothing and bike. 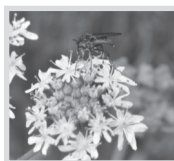


Elena Degnan is delighted to announce that Jayne Fashions Ltd has been shortlisted in the Local Champion in the Drapers Independents Awards 2018.

Steve's Nature Diary JULY

I was up this morning at 5.30am and out of the house, ready to start my British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) Breeding Bird Survey (BBS). This is the main scheme for monitoring the population changes of the UK's common breeding birds. It is a national volunteer project aimed at keeping track of changes in the breeding populations of widespread bird species in the UK. Volunteers all round the country are making two visits to their chosen 1 Km square to count the birds present and then enter their data online.

My square was on farmland near Sedgfield and I had to walk along a transect noting down the birds I heard and saw as I went along. It must be said that my first issue was, although I was on public footpaths and they were way-marked in places, some of them had crops planted right up to the edge or I had to fight my way through undergrowth to get through sections. Luckily I had a map or I would have lost my way in several sections. This means that visitors to Sedgfield and its environs would really struggle to use these paths as well. Other than this I had a very pleasant morning and saw and heard a few birds including Hedge Sparrow, Whitethroat, Blackcap and others that are typical to this habitat. I was really pleased to see and hear several skylarks doing their aerial flight display, yellowhammers with their distinctive "Little bit of bread and no cheeeese" song and the chirping of tree sparrows which must be nesting in some of the larger trees in amongst the hedges. Another highlight was a Buzzard which was being mobbed by crows. All in all, not a bad count. I think if I had done this walk fifty years ago things would have very been different, and I may have come across birds like Corn Bunting, Cuckoo, Grey Partridge and Turtle Dove. Some older residents may be able to tell me whether this is true or not. These birds, along with twenty-four others, according to the 2017 report, show a long-term statistically significant trend of greater than 50% population declines over periods of 31–48 years. Research has shown that often declines in farmland bird species are associated with more than one factor impacting on a species simultaneously. The main factors driving declines since 1970 are: loss of mixed farming; increased use and efficacy of pesticides; changes in crops grown; changes in grassland management; field drainage; predation; weather and migration issues. With over 70% of the UK's land farmed in some way, how this land is managed has a big impact on wildlife. The Wildlife Trusts produced a report "What next for farming" with recommendations for a future agriculture policy after the UK leaves the EU. It was published in January 2018 and you can download it at <https://www.wildlifetrusts.org/farming>.

Wild bird populations are an important indicator of the health of the countryside and knowing to what extent bird populations are increasing or decreasing is fundamental to bird conservation.

Sedgefield Twinning Association visit to Hamminkeln

A month ago, members of Sedgefield Twinning Association returned from a lovely 4 day visit to Hamminkeln. Although we were a very small delegation this time, as usual we were made to feel very welcome and given a wonderful time, with a guided tour of a "water castle", Schloss Raesfeld, followed by a lovely lunch and a visit to the local museum which showed us what it was like for ordinary people of the area who were caught up in World War 2. A "beer seminar" involved tasting a selection of beers (not just German ones) and also whisky and Schnapps. Nobody reported a headache the next day, and even the teetotal among us had a great time, maybe because we were served roast pork and crackling as well!

Another day we visited an organic farm with 4,500 laying hens, which sold not only eggs but products made from them, direct to the public via their shop and markets. Of course we also sampled their products – which included strawberries, vegetables and "pick your own" flowers.

Welcoming us, the Mayor of Hamminkeln, Herr Bernd Romanski, emphasised the importance, particularly in the present world situation, of this continuing friendship between countries. Personal friendships and understanding each other's ideas is the only way to achieve peace. Nobody wants to fight their friends! This was true when Twinning links were set up after World War 2 and is equally true today.

We are enthusiastic to continue this 35 year old tradition, and think that there must be others in Sedgefield who would enjoy a visit to Germany. Next year friends from Hamminkeln visit us, and we will be looking for hosts for them. But even if you do not want to host, by all means come and join in while they are here (dates not yet been decided). WW1 commemorations

Sedgefield Local History Society and the Village Veterans were delighted to welcome family members to their latest World War I commemoration.

Auriel Anderson (nee Banks) and her granddaughter Melanie laid a floral tribute to their grandfather and great great grandfather Edwin Banks.

A Lance Sergeant with the 1st/6th Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers, Edwin Banks lost his life in France on May 27th 1918, aged 36. Born in Sedgefield in 1882 to Bernard and Jane Banks, Edwin Banks began his working life as a house painter, later working at Durham County Asylum. He lived in East End with his wife Annice (nee Hallimond), who he married in 1904. In 1926, Annice's younger sister Gertrude married Robert Cooper, marking the beginning of the Cooper dynasty at the Golden Lion. Edwin and Annice Banks had two sons – William Bernard, born in 1905 and Charles (Auriel's father), two years younger. The boys would have been 13 and 11 when their father died.

Edwin Banks is remembered on the Soissons Memorial in France, near the River Somme and on Winterton Memorial, now in St Edmund's church.

The next commemoration is on Friday July 27 at 10.45 am at the war memorial, when we will remember William Henry Bungay of the 13th Battalion Green Howards. Family members or other interested parties are welcome to contact Norma Neal on 01740 620091 or email

Male victims of domestic abuse are top priority for the Young Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner

A new campaign to support male victims of domestic abuse was launched at Police HQ in Durham on Tuesday 12th June.

Domestic abuse can be psychological, physical, sexual, financial or emotional. Victims may feel threatened, coerced, controlled or degraded. 2.5 million cases of domestic abuse against men are reported in the UK every year. One in six men have been victims of violent domestic abuse from an intimate partner. They are far less likely than female victims to tell someone else about their experience.

Libby Wright, the 17 year-old Young Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner, who is the driving force behind the new campaign, wants people to understand what male domestic abuse is and how to get support. Libby was elected to the role by Police Cadets in 2017, and has teamed up with Ron Hogg, Stephen Cronin and senior figures from Local Government, the NHS, the Harbour support service and the Police to champion the rights of male victims.

Grant Funding still available for Businesses & Farmers in the Sedgefield Area

The LEADER fund is still open to applications from farmers and businesses in the Sedgefield area. The £1.584 million fund has already helped dozens of farmers, businesses and community organisations across the Durham Coast and Lowlands area, but there is still money left in the pot for new projects to come through.

The fund covers rural areas between Dawdon in the north to Newton Aycliffe in the south. Sedgefield and surrounding areas, including Foxton, Mordon, Bradbury, Fishburn and Bishop Middleham are all eligible for funding between £2500 and £180,000 for capital projects.

The scope of the funding is wide; LEADER has already funded projects such as playgrounds, robotic mowers, factory production line machinery and building works for holiday accommodation.

Applications are welcomed from projects that will provide:

- Support for increased farm productivity
- Support for micro and small businesses or farm diversification (non agricultural)
- Support for rural tourism
- Support for rural services

LEADER is European funding, so farmers, businesses or those thinking about a start-up are encouraged to come forward before the funding disappears.

The Sedgefield area is new to this funding so it would be fantastic to continue to support the area.

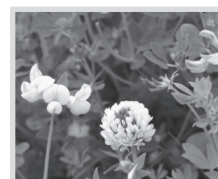
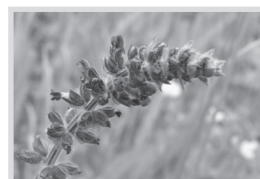
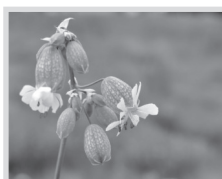
Sunday July 1st

Woodland and Wildlife: My Happy Place!

On a crisp sunny February morning I turned up at NetPark to discuss a project to plant a woodland and wildlife area on the outskirts of Sedgefield. Since that initial meeting an enthusiastic group of volunteers have planted 840 trees in blizzards, cleaned up the site on a mass litter pick and over the past 6 weeks have been clearing a considerable amount of undergrowth. This has been very hard but rewarding work, definitely better than going to the gym! I was interested in the environmental aspect of the project and as a Mum of two young girls it was an excellent opportunity to introduce them to nature and plant trees which will grow with them. They would be able to visit the site as adults and know that they were part of its beginnings. They have really enjoyed the visits to the trees; the freedom the open space allows them is rare in an increasingly urbanised world.

The Woodland and Wildlife site has become my happy place; it is so peaceful, and I feel proud knowing we have made a small difference to the environment. The changing seasons make every visit different and I'm quickly gathering knowledge of the flora and fauna. 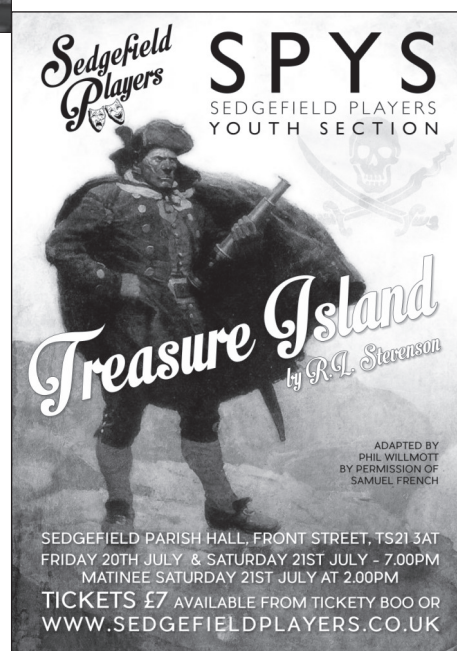
Players succeed with new venture

Planning issues: Sedgefield Village Action Group notes

There isn't much to report from SVAG at the moment as we are waiting to hear when the Wimpey application for 60 houses on the 'horse field' at the bottom of Stockton Road will go to a planning meeting. Maybe by the time you read this we will know, as we were told it would probably be June. SVAG will again represent the majority of residents' views at the planning meeting but we do still need residents to help us.

Signs. Some people think that the Wimpey signs in the two fields either side of the Stockton Road entrance mean that Wimpey will be building there, but that is not the case – the signs are there illegally. Wimpey do not have planning permission to put them there, but are now applying for that permission and indeed saying they want them there until 2024. Does that indicate that they don't intend to have Eden Drive building site finished until 2024? To date they do not have any further permission to build on new areas. This is another example of developers showing total disregard for rules and residents' opinions.

The Sedgefield Neighbourhood Plan (NHP) has completed a re-consultation stage resulting in a need for some minor word changes and updating of maps; the Town Council (TC) will progress this and we have requested they treat it as a priority. It is even more important that we have our NHP making progress as the County Durham Plan (remember the first Plan was withdrawn a couple of years ago and has been started again) will be out for consultation on June 22nd with any comments required to be in by August 3rd. The Town and County Councils will publicise where the Plan can be viewed (libraries, Council offices, online and some 'drop in sessions' with County officers present to answer questions). We need to keep a close eye on what the County Plan indicates should happen with future housing development in Sedgefield – so please have your say at any consultations.

In other news, the land between Old Beacon Lane and Butterwick Lane where a company called ESRG was looking to develop housing is now 'in the hands of' a company called Hellens Group Ltd. They have requested the opportunity to meet the Town Council about their plans. We understand STC will probably do this at a meeting in July and the public will be able to attend so watch out for information.

SVAG will carefully look at what impact the County Plan will have on our community, but we need everyone to have their say. You can contact SVAG by email on SedgefieldVAG@gmail.com or on 0752 3457584.

Athletics

July will see Sedgefield Harriers host the club's next event, the annual Summer Handicap for the Gerry Kearsley Memorial Trophy. Because of the handicap system, most runners finish within a few minutes of each other, making for an exciting conclusion to the event.
