

Your Park needs YOU!

This headline was used in the February 2020 edition of the Sedgefield News, inviting those in local communities to participate in an exercise planned to take place in Hardwick Park during the summer of that year... but we all know what happened the following month! The Covid-19 lockdown meant that the two dozen or so who responded positively to our invitation had to keep their enthusiasm in check until normal contact could resume. That time has come!



In the intervening 30 months, the Friends of Hardwick have sought to keep in touch with those who had volunteered to participate in archaeological investigations over the sites of two of the Park's principal 18th century buildings - the Bath and Banqueting Houses located towards the north-west and north-east corners of the main park but now reduced to mere footprints.

Inevitably, some recruited for the archaeological project in 2020 can no longer participate, but a healthy core remains. Nevertheless, the Friends are keen to recruit fresh faces to our ranks, especially so since the death last year of our Hon. Secretary, John Fitzpatrick, who had handled administrative matters so effectively since the Friends were formed in 1998.

The main focus of the group has changed over the years - from research on the Park's history to one of supporting the County Council in its continuing restoration, management and maintenance of the 210 acres within its quardianship.

As Hardwick lies virtually on the doorstep of most who read this monthly newsletter, we invite as many as are able to join us in our work there, to establish a healthier generational spread of members and, more immediately, in the archaeological investigations rescheduled to occur next month. Darryl Cox, the Council's Principal

Parks and Countryside Manager, has recently produced a paper highlighting the areas in which the Friends might become more involved. These include - marketing and promotion, interacting with visitors generally and a variety of roles at special events.

For all of this, we require people - as many as possible - to turn aspirations into reality and make Hardwick a 'must go to' park, providing both health and economic benefits for individuals and local communities.

Specialist knowledge is not required but those who join the Friends could soon learn far more about Hardwick than they may ever have imagined.

A whole range of opportunities awaits those prepared to offer time and enthusiasm to become a key link between the Park and its visitors. During lockdown, we have received most generous support from the Sir James Knott Trust and National Lottery Grants for Heritage, making the project financially

Dance at the Gala

On the 5th May 2022 our GCSE dancers took part in a festival celebrating Dance in Education at the Gala Theatre, Durham. This is typically an annual event where dancers from Sedgefield Community College regularly shine and it was excellent to see it return to our annual dance calendar after the disruption in recent years due to the pandemic.

Our school's dancers excelled themselves in showcasing such a variety of work from contemporary dance to an 80s jazz throwback piece. Pupils demonstrated the dedication and commitment it takes to perform and study for a GCSE in dance. As their dance teacher, Miss Arrowsmith was extremely proud of every dancer and it is moments like this which demonstrate the importance of creativity in education.



As a school, we place enormous value in creative subjects and dance is at the forefront of our efforts to give students opportunities to perform. We have close links with Dance City in Newcastle and many of our students go on to study dance after leaving SCC. One of the most important elements of our approach to dance is that this is an inclusive subject for all of our pupils and this is seen in our 'Boyz Project' which is another important part of our dance calendar!

Facing the challenge

After two years of cancelled visits, Year 6 have finally ventured to Hadrian's Wall again to take part in their residential. They had a spectacular time doing all the activities, including hiking, rock climbing, water games, camouflage and concealment and many more. They displayed resilient attitudes and outstanding teamwork, accomplishing every challenge that faced them. School staff were also united in their praise for the Year 6 pupils, commenting in particular on how their character skills were able to come to the fore throughout the trip. It was a trip of a lifetime where many happy memories were made.



Chris Hall (Head of Thrills and Skills for Life) stated, "The children matched their Ofsted grading - outstanding. They achieved everything set out for them. I'm very proud of them!"

Hannah Davey (a year 6 pupil) commented, "Residential was really fun especially the rock climbing as it had lots of learning opportunities." Another Year 6 pupil stated, "We've had an amazing time in Northumberland. Rock climbing, hiking along Hadrian's Wall, fire building, shelter making and water sports have been the most memorable activities of our adventure. We've made memories that will last a lifetime."

Down at the Farm!

The Early Years children from Sedgefield Primary had a wonderful day at Coulby Newham Leisure Farm, finding out about different animals. Pupils loved learning how these animals were cared for. They returned to the classroom to find out more facts. A favourite animal of many of the children was horses.



In the Mines!

Year 5 pupils had a fabulous time this week visiting Beamish Open Air Museum. They investigated what life was like as a child miner. Drama activities were used to interview staff from the museum who played the role of different characters from the mining community. They couldn't believe children the same age as themselves (aged 9/10 year in the 1860s) were sent to work in the mines!

They were shocked that the Mine Manager interviewed was more interested in profit than caring for his workers. The children were horrified by the lack of safety and general working conditions of the mine. They even went down the mine themselves to experience these further. By the end of the day they were pleased to return to the comfort of their own classroom and relieved they didn't live in this era.



One pupil, Adison (aged 10) commented "It was a really good day with interactive learning, which kept history alive".

When Roger took the market on for Sedgefield Development Trust, it consisted of just a few stalls but over the years it has grown into the kind of event that allows farmers and producers to thrive and to which shoppers, both local from around the region, like to return.








Blooming update

STEVE'S NATURE DIARY JULY 2022

Last month The Wildlife Trusts launched a new project with funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund – as part of The National Lottery's £22million investment to mark the Jubilee. Nextdoor Nature will support around 200 new groups with 50 community organisers across the UK to re-introduce nature into local areas deprived of natural places to enjoy. Our local Trusts Durham and Tees Valley will be involved in delivering the project.

What I found interesting was that for the launch they commissioned George the Poet to write a new poem. The poem – The Natural World – highlights how people can feel brighter and more at ease when they can tune into nature. It is performed and filmed on location across Manchester's wilder quarters, and it urges people to "celebrate nature in our everyday lives."

Evidence shows that people are increasingly disconnected from nature, with profound consequences for health and it also means they are less likely to protect their natural heritage.

The poem explores George the Poet's sense of being part of nature:



"...like the birds and bees.
Like the ferns, the seeds, the dirt, the trees."
It ends:

"Let's celebrate nature in our day to day, At home, at work, in how we talk, how we think. It starts with recognising we're part of it all. Nature's reaching out. Let's answer the call."

You can hear and see the full poem here <u>wildlifetrusts.org/nextdoor-nature</u>. We often use poetry during our outdoor activities as a way of reflecting on what we can see, hear and feel. It may be a piece by a famous poet of the past or one of the new generation of nature writers. Well worth a read is the "The Lost Words" a 'book of spells' that seeks to conjure back the near-lost magic and strangeness of the nature that surrounds us. The book began as a response to the removal of everyday nature words - among them "acorn", "bluebell", "kingfisher" and "wren" - from a widely used children's dictionary, because those words were not being used enough by children to merit inclusion. But "The Lost Words" then grew to become a much broader protest at the loss of the natural world around us, as well as a celebration of the creatures and plants with which we share our lives, in all their wonderful, characterful glory.

As I write this piece, it's Day 15 of #30DaysWild and I decided to be a poet and to do a Haiku poem, for those who don't know them, a Haiku poem is a three-line form of Japanese poetry. The first and last lines of the poem have five syllables, and the second or middle line has seven. It is often written about natural themes and is a good way to connect to nature in a unique way and I have used it with adults and children to good effect. Why not have a go? And my Haiku? You will have to wait!

Safeguarding

A quick-thinking waitress saved a child abuse victim by secretly showing him a sign reading "do you need help?" and calling the police.

She was working at a restaurant when the family-of-four came in for a meal. The server noticed that the 11-year-old boy was covered in bruises and said he appeared "secluded" from the rest of the group.

She also realised that he was the only one not eating - with the adults telling her that the child would have something later at home when she questioned why no food had been ordered for him.

Refusing to ignore the signs of abuse, she quickly flashed him a handwritten sign reading: "Do you need help?" before the boy gently nodded and she immediately called emergency services.

"We need to pay attention for the ones that are in need, and step forward to do something to change the situation", she said.

Police later learned that the boy's stepfather had tortured the child, punishing him with military-style exercises, hanging him upside down, isolating and starving him for days.

Officers recovered multiple items used as weapons to punish the minor - including a bent metal pole, a wooden broom, a dolly cart, handcuffs, and ratchet straps.

This is a real life example of safeguarding and may have saved a life.

'Safeguarding Children Week' took place in June. This is an annual event and an opportunity for agencies to work together to raise awareness of the importance of safeguarding issues. However, safeguarding is everyone's responsibility, not just for those who work in key services.

Please note, safeguarding also includes the welfare of adults, such as the victims of domestic abuse, therefore concerns for the safety of adults can also be shared via this number. You can share concerns anonymously.

Your information may be the missing piece that is needed to help a victim who, like the little boy above, may feel helpless and trapped in a dark situation.

Female Hormone Deficiency Support Group

This is the first support group in the North East to offer face to face support to women; pre-menopause, perimenopause, menopause and post-menopause. 51% of the population are women and 100% of women will experience this phase, either naturally or surgically. Each woman will experience this phase differently, 25% of women will not experience any symptoms, however up to 75% will experience many symptoms, including changes to their mental and physical health.

The aim of the group is to be safe and supportive, enabling and empowering women to improve their knowledge and skills when considering the impact of female hormone deficiency.

Who - each week we will have a specialist guest speaker, who will discuss topics relating to health and well being



New Exhibitions in Bishop Auckland

During July two new exhibitions arrive in Bishop Auckland under the umbrella of the Auckland Project. The Spanish Gallery, which reopened in February, will present two masterpieces by Spanish masters who approached the same subject some 350 years apart.



Dali's *Christ of St John of the Cross* will hang in the North East for the first time, alongside El Greco's *Christ on the Cross*.

This is Dali's most enduring religious work, and has over time become one of the nation's favourite paintings, notwithstanding the controversy that it has often attracted, which saw petitions circulated opposing it's acquisition in 1952 and it was also physically attacked and damaged in 1961.

El Greco addressed the passion of Jesus many times in his work and his composition *Christ on the Cross*, was also radically lurid and fantastical by 16th century standards. Both pieces will be displayed from July 9 until December, visit www.aucklandproject.org/venues/spanish-gallery for tickets and details.

A short stroll from the Spanish Gallery gets you to Auckland Castle where a celebration of British landscape painting will be showcased in the Bishop Trevor gallery from 2 July. Featuring works from Gainsborough, Stubbs, Richard Wilson, and Sir Joshua Reynolds, the exhibition, entitled Nature and the Ideal: Pioneers of British Landscape, chronicles the developments in landscape painting in the UK during the second half of the 17th century and features loan works alongside pieces from the collection. 

SPORTS UPDATE

Once again, the young sports stars of Sedgefield are showing us all how it's done. This month's update includes news of some excellent achievements, which as ever are only possible thanks to the support of the organisations and people who surround the youngsters – family, friends, grass roots coaches and more from every generation all play vital roles in the successes that keep coming the way of Sedgefield.

These folk are all volunteers and that commitment to giving back to the community manifests itself in so many ways. When Sedgefield parkrun was founded in 2012, Val Newton offered to volunteer at the weekly Saturday morning event in Hardwick Park, and then again and again and...you get the story. Then Sedgefield junior parkrun started on Sunday mornings a few years later and Val started volunteering at that too. Fast forward to 11 June 2022 and Val reached the amazing milestone of having volunteered 600 times across the two parkrun events in Sedgefield – wow! A huge thank you goes to 'Invaluable Val' from the 13,000+ different people who have taken part in the two events since 2012.

Open water swimming

One of the fastest growing sports/outdoor activities in the UK is open water swimming. In recent years, more and more people have been tempted by the lakes, tarns and big enough ponds, including a fair few who I know of from Sedgefield. You don't need a lot of equipment, though a decent wetsuit is important in a climate such as ours! People find their way to outdoor swimming from all sorts of directions and with many different motivations. Sedgefield's Adam Dovaston had a very personal reason for taking the dive. When his girlfriend Nell Wright faced a cancer diagnosis and the subsequent treatment, Adam decided to raise money for Teenage Cancer Trust, which has really helped Nell with support in the hospital and back at home. Adam secured a place at the Great North Swim in Lake Windermere and set up a fundraising page for the one mile open water challenge.

Unfortunately, bad weather meant that the swim was cancelled on the day that Adam was due to participate. Undeterred, a week later, Adam visited the lake at Ellerton Park in Yorkshire and completed his mile in a solo swim. I popped along to be a witness and make sure that he didn't cut any corners! I can verify that Adam swam his full mile on a three lap course around the lake, with a very strong and steady breast stroke, finishing the distance in an impressive time of about 49 minutes. Adam takes up the story: "I just wanted to do something to give back to Teenage Cancer Trust for supporting Nell and others. I was really disappointed that the Great North Swim was cancelled but I felt like that I should do the swim anyway, to show to everyone who has supported my fundraising that I was committed to the task and able to complete it. And I will be taking part in the Great North Swim next year too.

So far, Adam has raised over £3,320 for Teenage Cancer Trust and his JustGiving page is still open for donations at www.justgiving.com/fundraising/adam-dovaston.

Bernard Musgrave Memorial Trophy

Ellie's attention will now turn to the European Championships in Bilboa in September, with hopes to improve further and secure a podium position. Congratulations to Ellie!

This year sees the Sedgefield based Bulls Wheelchair Rugby Club celebrate its 20th anniversary. To celebrate, the club will hold a competition over the weekend of 30-31 July at the Community College. Five teams from around the UK will compete over the two days and at least three Team GB squad members, including two Paralympic gold medal winners (Jack Smith and Kylie Grimes), will be playing. Admission for spectators will be free and everyone will be welcome. The Bulls are keen to recruit new players and the event is set to be a great showcase for this exciting sport.
