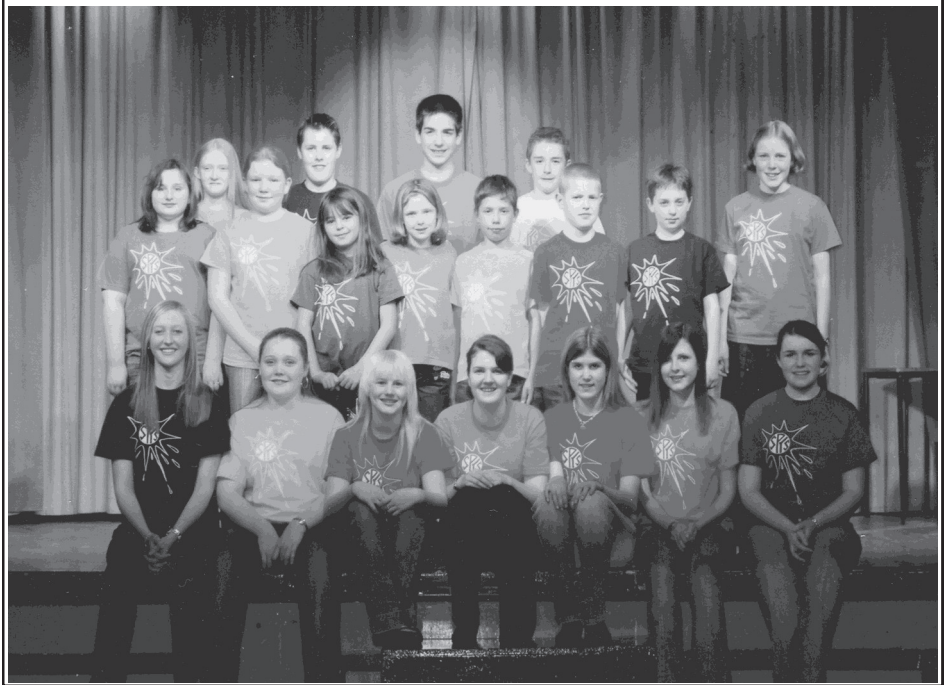

The SPYS - Sedgefield Players' Youth Section - aged from 7 to 17, recently presented their LAMDA award winning pieces to an appreciative audience of family and friends, and reported one of the best set of exam results ever.

Tutors Jean Hewling and Sarah Atkinson were full of praise for the standards achieved and said that the examiner from the London Academy of Music and Drama had been very impressed with the group, which gained honours & distinctions in all categories.

Society President Barry Jackson made the presentations and Mayor of Sedgefield, Linda Maddison was among the guests on one of her last official engagements before the end of her term of office. The young performers entertained a capacity audience with a selection of poetry, prose and drama ranging from comedy to tragedy, from Shakespeare to Shirley Valentine.



New trophy to Players' credit

Sedgefield Players returned from the Isle of Man Easter Drama Festival with the award for Ensemble Acting, won by Norma Neal, Jean Hewling and Viv Jacobs for their portrayal of three patients who shared their worries, secrets and hopes in "A Kiss on the Bottom", a comedy in the unlikely setting of a women's cancer ward. The award was given by Group Theatre London in memory of one of their young members who died suddenly last year. Chairman Norma Neal said, "The Players always pride themselves on their team work, so it was truly fitting that we should win this award as a tribute to the commitment and professionalism of the group." Four other nominations were received; Norma, for Best Actress as Marlene, the outspoken mother desperate to get out of hospital in time for her daughter's wedding; Sarah Atkinson for Best Supporting Actress for her portrayal of Bev, the long-suffering nurse constantly rushed off her feet; Walter Howell for Best Director and the production for Best Comedy.

Goodbye to Simon

Sedgefield Development Partnership was very sorry to see Simon Leadbeater leave at the end of April. He had been with the Partnership since 2002, first as an ITEC apprentice, then employed as the Office administrator.

During his time here he completed an NVQ Level 2 in Business Administration and was in the process of completing level 3.

He was responsible for the day to day running of the office and in particular supporting the newsletter, compiling the latest community Directory and co-ordinating the database for Lifelong Learning.

We wish Simon the best of luck with his career, knowing that any future employer will be lucky to have such an enthusiastic and mature employee.

So what of the future?

The fact that Sedgefield Development Partnership has been unable to continue employing an office administrator is mainly due to a shortfall in funding. This is because the large room within the Advice and Information Centre, which we had been using for training, was withdrawn from us by the Town Council. A lack of available alternative premises in the centre of Sedgefield from which to deliver Lifelong Learning - in particular ICT sessions, combined with the subsequent loss of income, resulted in Simon's redundancy.

SDP is working on securing accommodation from which to deliver lifelong learning, which will hopefully generate income to enable the Partnership to re-employ an Office Administrator. Despite losing Simon, the office is still operational and is being covered by volunteers (if no one is in the SDP office, please slide any letters or notes under the SDP office door!).

Unfortunately for this community the situation has impacted on the Partnership's successful Lifelong Learning Project. SDP had to return £9,500 of a £10,000 grant from Neighbourhood Learning in Deprived Communities and lost out on the offer of 10 free computers with printers, software, scanners, networking etc (valued at another £10,000) and until we have alternative premises, we are unable to secure income to deliver learning opportunities.

But SDP has proved with its previous work and current database of over 350 people who have registered an interest in courses, that there is a demand within the

community so in the mean time we continue to work closely with Bob Harris, now working for County Durham Education in the Community, to ensure that those registered on our database are contacted directly about the courses he arranges. (see below)

Lifelong Learning

Firstly, congratulations! Since November, nearly 200 learners have attended 31 different courses. Sedgefield is recognised as a centre for learning, but other communities are following in our footsteps so we must be on our toes.

Following requests for a digital camera course, one starts this month (phone for details). I also have had requests for a guitar course. If anyone knows of any prospective pupils or tutors, please contact me.

Courses running currently include Basic Spanish, Holiday Spanish, Dance, Basic Computing, Flower Arranging, Desktop Publishing and Plumbing.

I aim to use local people to conduct the courses and I can tell you that of the above courses 5 are run by locals. Thanks to Andrea, Lenny, Adam and Nigel; keep up the good work - it is appreciated.

I'm now working on the programme for September so please to contact me with suggestions.

I would like to hear from anyone interested in a 4 week Saturday morning (10am-1pm) computer course.

Sewage system work in the pipeline

First constructed back in the 1950s, Sedgefield's Sewage Treatment Works need a considerable rebuild to bring them up 21st century standards. Requirements for river water purity and urban wastewater quality are, quite rightly, very demanding these days and despite the improvements made during the 1970s and 80s, Northumbrian Water is now preparing plans for a very thorough upgrade.

The works currently serve a domestic population of 5000. Although the new proposals allow for an additional 100 houses (based on estimated housing figures in the Local Plan) within the catchment to be served, much of the extra capacity will be taken up by Hardwick Park Heritage Resource Centre and Hardwick Hall Hotel.

In any case, the Local Plan is due for consultation and revision and the capacity envisaged certainly does not appear to allow for huge numbers of new houses. The extension proposed, over the by-pass south of Sedgefield, isn't large and is well screened by planting. Nearby houses should not be affected, apart from some increase in traffic during construction, which will be eased by the upgraded access junction. There will be no change to any existing right of way.

The proposals themselves verge on the poetic!

Picture a storm weir chamber; a storm pumping station; a *splitter* box and perhaps most evocative... a fine new wastewater *kiosk*! Wonderful language for a seemingly prosaic business; but such things make our lives comfortable and we can afford the luxury of giving them not a moment's thought, unless something nasty in the air has us pondering our drains.

We now think of the Victorian sewage system under the streets of London as a wonder of civilization. Lucky for us the engineers can still think so deeply! **SC**

Tribute paid to Joan Smith

Joan was quite a character, there is no doubt about that! She died on April 23rd and the fact that it was St George's Day seems apt for a proud Londoner and a very *English* lady.

With husband Sam and daughter Roberta (Bobbie), Joan moved in the sixties from Hornchurch, where she had been a Councillor, to Durham. Joan was soon involved in the Labour Party in Newton Hall and after moving here she was instrumental in developing the Sedgefield Branch. Indeed she was soon active in many aspects of village life; SCA, church choir, Sedgefield Players, Friends of Hardwick and the Local History Society (of which she was Chairperson). A career in the legal profession had given her a vast knowledge of constitutional procedures; she was an excellent Chair - a real 'stickler' for the rules.

Joan was outspoken at times, if not downright rude, but her real friends recognised this was often out of frustration about her high expectations of standards in public and private life. She was often disappointed and hurt by people's attitudes, and by the general lack of respect and consideration for one another nowadays. She often spoke of her upbringing through difficult times in London, when her Mother had instilled a sense of self-pride, family values and good manners.

Loyalty was particularly important to Joan, in both friendship and politics, as born out by her dedication to the Labour Party for 66 years. But she never got over the insensitivity shown to her when she felt she could not support the war in Iraq, even though she was one of many Labour Party stalwarts who felt the same way.

Even at the age of 81 Joan was quick-witted, astute and a great conversationalist. She will be long remembered and sadly missed by her many friends. **Gloria Wills**

Roundabout Hardwick

Work proceeds apace on the new roundabout, with high hopes it will be finished by the beginning of July. The new sewerage system serving the hotel and Heritage Resource Centre is some months from completion, being held up by the discovery of running sand in the excavations.

It's really good to see visible evidence of Park restoration. The new cascade and footbridge at the end of the Serpentine River is well advanced, its facing stonework about to be fitted; and soil is being removed from the face of the Lake Dam ready for the concrete facing - a modern requirement which be hidden by the lake-water.

In the next major operation silt will be scooped out of the lake-bed, the spoil being used to landscape the new Car Park and other areas.

Work on the main buildings goes out to tender soon and should start during the summer. This will include consolidation work on the Bono Retiro.

Finally, thought is being given to how to separate public from animals in the East Park, but there will be a corridor round the edge so that the view from nearby houses is unimpeded.

A Ghostly Story (or a Ghastly Tale)

My name is Albert Bateman and I was born in Sedgefield on August 6th 1897. My family lived in East parade, just Mam & Dad, my elder brother John and me, then along came brother Tom, followed by sisters, Alice and Edna. We were a happy family, very close. After school I got a job as an apprentice groom for the Ramsdens at Sands Hall.

Then came the Great War, the war to end all wars! "Your country needs you" ran the posters. Lord Kitchener seemed to be pointing at me. Shortly after my 19th birthday the recruiting Sergeant from the 5th Yorkshire Regiment (later The Green Howards) visited Sedgefield and made a fine speech. "Everyone is joining up" he shouted "are you going to be left out – a "white feather". He looked right at me when he said it. "Well now", I thought, "I don't really want to go". Then I saw my mates were filling in their forms. "Here's the King's Shilling" the sergeant shouted "what do you think of that". That decided me. That and the fact that Chris Ruddock shouted "Come on, Bert, let's do it". So I signed.

We marched down to Stockton, more a rabble than a troop of soldiers. But the Sergeant kept us in time and we boarded the train at Stockton Station bound for Catterick. "I haven't said goodbye to the family" I said. "Don't worry, lad. My men are calling at your homes to tell the folks you're men now" said the Sergeant.

So we arrived at Catterick Garrison and marched straight out to the barracks. We received a meal and a palliase and were taken to our barrack room. We were met by a Corporal who started shouting and calling us a lot of foul names (we soon got used to that). We were there for the next 6 weeks, square bashing; arms drill. Not that they gave us rifles - we used sticks, but we got the hang of it. We were allowed to write home once a week, but couldn't say where we were nor give any other information, just that we were alright and enjoying ourselves (I must say). At the end of

6 weeks we were issued with FSMO (Full Service Marching Order) and fitted with uniforms, issued with rifles and 10 rounds of ammunition. We were marched to the rifle range where we were shown how to load and fire our guns. We fired off the 10 rounds, cleared our weapons and with all empty cartridge cases accounted for, were marched back to barracks. Our platoon Officer came to see us to tell us we would be marching out next day to the railway station, where we would board a train for the south. We headed for Dover and shipped out to Calais. It took us 3 days. We then boarded a train and steamed east. We pulled into a station I don't know its name. The area was full of what we took for shell holes. We were right. Just then there were a number of bangs and the earth erupted. Then I heard a whistle and then...

That was 88 years ago. My name lives on, on Sedgefield War Memorial. But the lettering is very faded (I'm fifth down the list but you can't read it). The memorial is well kept, but the names are unreadable. Was this why I gave my tomorrow - for oblivion?

Albert Bateman was my wife Enid's Uncle, who she never knew. He's buried in Thiepval Cemetery, The Somme. He never even reached the battlefield!

NetPark link benefits youngsters

As a result of the growing links between our community, the NetPark and Durham University, a group of students from Sedgefield Community College have had a unique opportunity to check out state-of-the-art instrumentation for astronomy at the University of Durham Centre for Advanced Instrumentation. Patricia Higgins, Teacher of Science at Sedgefield Community College was delighted that her students were able to gain such a practical insight into the work which will be carried out at NetPark and the immense capabilities of adaptive optics

Durham University is one of the UK's top 12 research universities with two campuses in the city of Durham and in Queen's Campus, Stockton-on-Tees.

Each year the University generates over 3000 high quality graduates in a broad range of disciplines and some 85% of the University's academic staff were recognised in the latest national research assessment exercise for conducting

The Transit of Venus

There's bound to be a lot of publicity about the transit of Venus on 8th June, when the 2nd planet from the Sun (Earth is the 3rd) passes between us and the Sun.

Venus will be seen as a small black dot passing across the face of the Sun.

However, many astronomical events are given a big build-up but end up disappointing those who try to watch. Will this be the same?

For astronomers it is a very special event - the last transit was in 1882; but it is unlikely to look really 'spectacular' unless you have a special interest in astronomy.

If you do want to see it though, there's just one thing I need to say, or rather, shout out loud!

Please don't look directly at the sun or with binoculars, telescope or camera.

You risk blindness, caused in a split-second before you have time to blink. Transit filters may be on sale (they look like aluminium foil) or you may have old eclipse filters left over from 1999. So long as they are not creased or scratched, they should be safe.

But the only totally safe way to view the sun is to use a pin-hole projector or eyepiece projection from a telescope or a pair of binoculars.

Instructions can be found at

www.exploratorium.edu/eclipse/how2.html (there's an Internet connection in the library).

Also, most astronomy books should be helpful.

The transit begins at 06:20 BST and ends at 11:24, (exact time varies with location). If you miss it this time there's another in 2012 but after that, no more until 2117! Good and safe viewing! **Tim Randall**

The 'greening' of the A689

When Durham County Council undertook to build over two miles of dual carriageway between Sedgefield and Wynyard Station, it faced the challenge of integrating the new road into open countryside. Construction work meant removing much existing hedging and several mature trees. After early completion last autumn, Service Direct (contractors wholly owned by DCC), undertook the planting during the winter months.

The County Council has a pioneering policy of transplanting existing hedges where possible, though the task is more difficult with older hedges. A large tracked excavator took broad bites of hedge that were carefully placed into deep trenches on the line of the new highway boundary. Any failures will be cut out and replanted new during the next planting season.

Nearly 3½ miles of hawthorn and hazel hedging transplants went in, including 400 beech, ash, oak and

sycamore hedgerow trees, plus 2000 additional native species transplants to enrich the verges. Common oak, sessile oak, wild cherry, lime, alder, birch, holly, hazel, blackthorn, elder, dog rose and guelder rose will flourish under an extended establishment period of four growing seasons, as weeds and rabbits are kept at bay. Owners and tenants of the farms and other properties affected by the road were asked for their preferences, and 66 larger trees have been planted at farm entrances and in gardens to complement access accommodation works.

17 giant sequoias have been planted near the Wynyard to Station Town Cycle Way Bridge and on the Sedgefield Roundabout, which in time will create an impressive feature at each end of the scheme - although perhaps not many of us will be around in the 22nd century to see them in their magnificent mature glory!

Bush visit question revisited

I have waited patiently for a response to Mr Wragg's letter 'Where was the Mayor' (Jan 04). I should perhaps remind readers that it concerned the conspicuous absence of Sedgefield's mayor, Cllr. Linda Maddison, at the luncheon and surrounding activities, when Mr George Bush visited Sedgefield. As I have yet to see a response from the local Labour party, town council or other interested party, I feel compelled to resurrect the subject as it risks being overlooked, or more accurately brushed under the carpet.

The first issue is one of principle. I hope this letter will prompt a response from someone in a position to clarify these issues. However I do not feel confident.

Action for Bradbury safety

To address the concerns of residents (Letters, November '03) Durham County Council will shortly be undertaking works to enhance the Bradbury Village Gateway features.

Although hedges and verges have previously been attended to, residents are still concerned that the features are not prominent enough and tend to blend in with the surroundings.

So it has been decided to bring painting of the fencing forward in the maintenance programme. In line with residents' requests, a brighter paint colour than the standard treatment will be used - possibly yellow, which will make it both stand out and co-ordinate with the edge of the village nameplate. At the same time existing stakes in the verge will be painted and additional carriageway markings applied, adjacent to the feature. The works themselves will be carried out within the next 2 months.

How do you rate your driving?

Good, bad or indifferent? Or are you the type who doesn't care? Most accidents are caused by bad drivers with bad habits! Whether you are driving a car, bus, HGV, white van or motor cycle, if you drive hard, fast and forceful, take short cuts, cut corners, cut across lanes on roundabouts then, in my opinion, you are a bad driver. A good driver progresses quickly but safely, by staying within their lane; by driving at a safe distance behind the guy in front; by assessing the situation long before you reach it. He has worked out the distance, speed and line of oncoming vehicles and taken the necessary action to combat any given situation, well in advance of any hazard. This equals "Defensive Driving". Do you know what is round the next corner? Do you use your powers of observation to pick out any clues? Shadows, hedgerows, tops of vehicles. These can all give you a clue.
