

#### Sedgefield Players 'Dead Guilty' in the Isle of Man

Sedgefield Players met with success again at the Isle of Man Drama Festival this Easter, when they took their chilling production of Dead Guilty by Richard Harris to the stage of the beautiful Gaiety Theatre. An intriguing thriller, full of twists and turns which kept the audience guessing right to the end, the play had already been very well received by Sedgefield audiences in March. ## Community Safety Neighbourhood Watch, Police & Community Warden reports

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crimewatch Panel - Minutes of Meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> April 2005

1. Minutes of Previous Meeting: The minutes of 08/02/2004 were approved.

2. Matters Arising: There were none.

**3a)** Treasurer's Report: Details of Bank accounts were read out. **3b)** Secretary's Report: Correspondence: Received from - Town Council, CAVOS, Durham Police, Sarah Norman, Neil Langthorne, Community Force, Carelink, and Durham Social Information Centre. Issued to - Town Council, Trading Standards, Chief Constable, Inspector Andy Neal, Sarah Norman, and Neil Langthorne.

4. Representative Reports: 4a) Village Constable: PC Keith Todd tendered apologies from Sgt. O'Connor due to his attendance at a Trimdon meeting. Keith provided copies of the Crime Report for period  $8^{th}$  Feb  $-11^{th}$  April. There were 18 crimes recorded, consisting of 1 Burglary, 4Thefts, and 13 Damage (to Property & Cars). Keith expressed his concern over the repeat damage being caused by local youths, particularly to the school. He informed members that Police are to install covert cameras and will bring the persons responsible to book! Keith confirmed he would investigate why letters were stored over night in the "temporary holding" post box that was vandalised and report findings at next meeting. 4b) Crime Prevention Officer: Neil tendered apologies due to work commitments. He will present his video covering a 24hr period of a Sedgefield Borough Police Officer, at the next meeting. 4c) Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator: Sarah Norman reminded us that "when summer comes out, sneak thieves come in!" and discussed measures the public should adopt as second nature to prevent the sneak thief. Sarah also reiterated that crime prevention equipment and advice is available from her on 01325 742755

4d) Community Force: Tim Spearey was not able to distribute copies of Task log for our Village as previously due to internal constraints. He gave details of 9 events that had been responded to by the Force. Tim has issued 3 people with written warning regarding littering offences; next time it will be a fixed penalty. Tim informed us that the age which a person can be individually charged for Littering &/or Dog Fouling is now 10 yrs. Parents please take note. Tim is obliged to warn once and fine on the second occasion. The ongoing litter problem from school children during lunch break was raised, & specific details given to Tim, who confirmed he is aware and actively involved with College and children to improve the situation (there are measures in place to achieve this). **5 Schools – Citizenship Schemes: 5.1** C/man proposed to extend this activity by involving the groups of Scout based & Guide based children that are very active in the village and who have indicated their desire and willingness to participate. C/man gave details of potential costs and advised he would seek initial funding from SPARC – approved unanimously.

Norman will present the initial award later in the year. **6 Ring Round:** Secretary gave members an update of contact to and from the Police, following his letter to the Chief Constable in January. Matters of significance are; Inspector Andy Neal is the Responsible Officer for progressing our concerns/needs; he has already had all (local) beat officers trained to use Ringmaster; he is keen to make it work and concurs with our views / needs; use by Keith has already taken place

5.2 Vice C/man reported that accompanied by Tim Spearey he

will hand over the replacement Shield and establish scheme

implementation at the Community College next week; Sarah

and would have been effective but for Police problems at Central Comms; secretary is to act as the point of contact between Police & Members on this, so he **needs members** to give views on **both** good & bad experience of Ringmaster & Telephone Contact with the Police; members and public have had serious problems in trying to contact the Police by telephone, now acknowledged (by the Police); secretary has provided initial feedback to Insp. Neal. Keith Todd confirmed the above and spoke of recent positive experience at a one-day "workshop" involving a broad cross section of Durham Police Officers confirming our problem is common in other areas too. Keith believes communications/initial contact will be improved.

**7 Bus Trips:** David Hillerby reported that there are to be two trips this year, the first one will be to Keswick on Weds 6<sup>th</sup> July; the second to York (details yet to be arranged). There is a charge of £2.00 per seat to cover bus costs. Please contact David on 01740 621343 to book a place.

**8 AOB: 8.1 Community Hospital:** C/man requested (retrospective) support for funding for a printer (£39.95) to present to the Hospital to help them in a current activity with patients, outlining his proposal to raise publicity in the N. Echo for our Panel from this – the proposal was approved unanimously. **8.2 Postage:** C/man sought approval to purchase a sheet of stamps; this was approved. **8.3 Police Community Safety Officer:** PC Todd suggested we invite the officer, Helen Holme to a Panel meeting to allow her to explain her role as well as meet members; this was agreed – C/man to arrange.

**8.4 Crime Reduction:** C/man circulated two sets of crime figures 11<sup>th</sup> Jan. 2002 v 11<sup>th</sup> Jan. 2005 and gave his sincere thanks to the members of Sedgefield Village N/Hood Watch for their most significant role in achieving this reduction in our village and went on to say that he also acknowledged that the Police, Community Wardens, Sarah & Neil have all been part of our success.

C/man stated it was extremely important our members do not underestimate the importance of their role in this beneficial trend and that it is acknowledged in other circles, even though it is seldom seen in any published material. Thanking members again, he emphasised continued need for participation in N/Hood Watch and in activities to reduce crime and anti social behaviour in our village (as seen above 18 crimes in 2 months is 18 too many).

# Hair today, GONE tomorrow!

"Sedgefield Winkers" normally meet to play football on Thursday nights, but on Monday 13th June, courtesy of "Evolution", several of them will meet for a different purpose - to sacrifice their flowing locks to raise money for Leukaemia Research! Volunteers include Jonah Jones, Chris Stephenson, Steve Chaytor, Steve Nadim, Philip Jackson, Kevin Foakes, Duncan Woods, Colin Lowe, Roy Chowns-Smith, and David Etheridge (who is also having his beard shaved off.) If you would like to sponsor these brave lads or, indeed, join them you do not have to be a Winker phone Chris Stephenson on 622396. The venture was inspired by 14-year old Bethan Jones, who was recently diagnosed with leukaemia and is receiving treatment at the RVI in Newcastle. One in 700 children get cancer and the most common form is leukaemia, but thanks to expert specialist centres like the one at the RVI, the recovery rate is very good and improving all the time.

One of the less pleasant effects of the treatment is hair loss, so Bethan is looking forward to going along to watch the lads lose their hair too – especially as her Dad is one of the volunteers!

#### 'Have I got it?'

Young people across the area are being encouraged to ask themselves 'Have I got it?' - Chlamydia, that is. A campaign launched by County Durham & Darlington Chlamydia Screening Programme tells young people about the risks of Chlamydia & directs them to new screening services. The programme is targeted at people aged under 25 years, who are at greatest risk of infection. Screening services, treatment and advice on sexual health are being offered in clinics where young people access sexual health services. A simple, self taken test is offered in sexual health clinics or by requesting a postal testing kit (telephone Central Screening office on 0191 587 6016). Or you can log on to www.haveigotit.org. The Central Chlamydia Screening Office will then offer free treatments and partner notification to any person testing positive. The new campaign has been launched in partnership with Galaxy 105-106 radio.

Chlamydia is now the most common, curable sexually transmitted infection in people under 25 in England and Wales. The infection is most common in younger sexually active adults, especially women aged under 19 years and men under 25 years. Chlamydia is easily treated with antibiotics but a large number of cases of Chlamydia infection remain undiagnosed and untreated as most people do not have symptoms. It is important that young people find out as soon as possible if they have Chlamydia as it may have serious long term consequences, including pelvic inflammatory disease, ectopic pregnancy and infertility in men and women.

#### Sports Update with Chris Lines

#### We round-up the football...

The Black Lion finished runners up in Division 4 in their debut season in the Durham District Sunday League. with 22 wins, one draw and three defeats. If the team hadn't lost the first two games, they would have won the league! There were some good cup results against higher division opponents and the season ended with a 14 match winning run, including a hard fought away victory against eventual champions Burnside WMC. Consistently good form, won the team much deserved promotion; congratulations to all involved. The club would like to thank Ian Parsons of Parsons Containers Ltd and Eddie and Wendy from the Black Lion for their sponsorship and support.

The **St. Edmund's** team has been a fixture in the upper divisions of the Durham District Sunday League for many years now and continues to perform well up in the Premier Division. The team has had another solid season, ending up fifth in the league and enjoying some good cup runs, ending with a final against Hetton Lions in the League Cup. It was a close game and St. Edmund's had their chances, hitting the woodwork twice. In the end Hetton edged it 1-0 and silverware eluded the grasp of the Sedgefield team.

Meanwhile, the **Golden Lion** had a season of ups and downs but on balance, it was a big step forward from the year before. In 2003/4, the club finished bottom of Trimdon and District Division 2, losing all but their final game, which they drew. The 2004/5 season saw the two divisions merge, meaning that the Golden Lion faced generally tougher opposition than the year before. Although suffering some big defeats and poor runs, the team showed great bouncebackability at times and managed four victories, including a crucial "six pointer" on the last day of the season against Trimdon Dovecot. The Golden deservedly won that away game 2-1, securing a third from bottom final league position – a massive improvement on the previous season. There are changes afoot for 2005/6 – watch this space.

#### ...and bring on the cricket

**Sedgefield Cricket Club** moved to the North Yorkshire South Durham league during the close season and both 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> XI teams have quickly got into the swing of the new season.

23<sup>rd</sup> April Sedgefield 1st XI started well in their first ever NYSD game. After winning the toss, home team Preston 1sts were asked to bat on a very soft and unpredictable wicket. Some excellent fielding and bowling saw the innings end with Preston 42 all out. The pick of the bowlers was Martin Lower with five wickets: the others were shared between Jon Clark (2) Ryan Boardman (2) and Steve Brodrick (1). After a nervy start by the visitors chasing such a low score - at one point they were 2 for 2, skipper Malcolm Dickenson steered the team to a comfortable 7 wicket win with a confident 22 not out. Sedgefield 2nds had an even more decisive 10 wicket victory at home to Preston 2nds. Ivor Revnard and Peter Brown shared the wickets bowling the visitors out for just 13. 30<sup>th</sup> April Sedgefield 1st XI v Northallerton. Sedgefield won the toss and put Northallerton into bat on a damp wicket at the Station Rd ground. The home team had the visitors at 75-7 at one point, but Northallerton chanced their arm and finished on 168 all out. Martin Lower was the star man with the ball, taking 4-44. In reply, an undisciplined Sedgefield batting performance soon saw them at 35-5. Captain Malcolm Dickenson came to the rescue with a drawn out 46 in 36 overs to see his side cling onto the draw with 91-9. The seconds made it two out of two against Seaton Carew 2nds. Batting first, Sedgefield scored 186 (Simon Hughes 52) then bowled the opposition out for 175, Peter Brown taking 4 wickets. Mon 2nd May Sedgefield 1st XI v Wolviston. Batting first, Sedgefield took advantage of the glorious bank holiday weather and set a total of 206-5, with Marc Jemmeson scoring an unbeaten 62. Sedgefield bowlers, Jon Clark, Martin Lower and James Forster worked tirelessly for 50 overs but were let down by fielders

who managed to spill eight chances and in a thrilling finish Wolviston managed to scrape a draw.

10<sup>th</sup> May Sedgefield 1st XI travelled to Richmond in their second division game. Winning the toss Sedgefield decided to bat, on a low slow wicket. Early casualties followed as Richmond took advantage. Peter Elwell battled hard for 35 in 30 overs, but captain Malcolm Dickenson once again shone with the bat. scoring an unbeaten 66 to see his side through to 174 for 9 at the end of the 50 overs. A tight opening spell from Jon Clark and Martin Lower put Sedgefield in charge as Richmond looked to chase down the total. Half way. Richmond were three wickets down and well short of the required run rate. Sedgefield crowded the bat but Richmond hung on to reach 123 for 7. Wickets were shared between Jon Clark. #### Who was St Kilda? Judith Edgoose reports on a journey through another 'local' history

I have to admit, when my cousin suggested I accompany him on a trip to St Kilda, I really didn't know who or what St Kilda was. Well, it turns out there never was a St Kilda. The name is thought to come from the old Norse "skildir" meaning shields, and is the name for an archipelago in the North Atlantic approximately 50 miles west of the Outer Hebrides in other words very remote! Formed by volcanic activity millions of years ago, the islands were inhabited as far back as 600 BC (however did they find their way out there in those days?) and more recently, a thriving community lived there until well into the 20<sup>th</sup> Century - but it dwindled and the few remaining inhabitants were evacuated in August 1930, leaving behind a ghost village with a moving history. We left Oban on a 75 foot ex-Norwegian rescue vessel, the Elizabeth G – an intrepid band of 10 holiday-makers and 3 crew. As the weather was a little inclement we moored the first night at Tobermory on Mull, setting off the next day in a force 7 gale! The idea was to go straight to St Kilda, but in view of the weather we decided to spend the first night on Canna, which was an absolute delight. We climbed to the top of the nearest hill to view the two beautiful islands of Canna and Sanday (also two sea eagles). Canna boasts a coffee shop/pub run by two of its 6 inhabitants; the islands together have 14 inhabitants, and share a school, with one teacher and 6 pupils.

The next day we travelled as far as Harris, again in a gale; it was like a four hour fairground ride! By the following morning the wind had died down and the tides were in our favour so we set off early and arrived at St Kilda for a late lunch at about 2.30. (Our cook, Mark, produced wonderful 3-course meals from a tiny galley and we ate extremely well all week). The circular top of the ancient volcano hides a sheltered bay apparently surrounded by rounded hills, but they are only "half-hills". On the far side the cliffs drop away sheer, home only to millions of seabirds.

The St Kildans had sheep and a few crops on their island but were dependent on the birds for their survival – their staple diet was fulmar and puffin, and they used puffin oil and feathers for a variety of purposes. They built storehouses out of the very plentiful stone - the entire island is peppered with "cleits" or stone huts roofed with turf. These were used for anything from storing dried puffins to hanging their Sunday suits away from their smoke-filled "black houses".

In 1727 the population was devastated by an outbreak of smallpox. One of the inhabitants had visited Harris, caught the disease and died, and one of his friends carried his clothes back to St Kilda. 94 people died, leaving a population of 4 adults and 26 children. St Kilda was repopulated with families from Harris and in the mid 1800s 16 new cottages were built, the remains of which can be seen today alongside the old "black houses". However, in 1852, 36 of the inhabitants accepted an invitation to emigrate to Australia, and this was the beginning of the end for the little community. Its demise was not helped by the traditional custom of treating the umbilical cord of new-born infants with a mixture of puffin oil and cow dung! Many healthy babies succumbed to infantile tetanus.

When in 1930 the 36 remaining inhabitants were evacuated to the mainland, many were found jobs in forestry – ironic as until then they had never seen a tree! Some returned the following year to bring sheep back to the island to keep the grass under control, staying from May until August from 1931 until war broke out in 1939.

The islands were sold to the Marquis of Bute who ran them as a bird sanctuary and on his death in 1956 they were bequeathed to the National Trust for Scotland. Around the same time an RAF tracking station and Royal Artillery naval station were built there. These very ugly buildings are still there adding nothing to the beauty of the place. but they are part of its history. The National Trust for Scotland has restored some of the old houses and a warden and several volunteers are there throughout the year, monitoring the seabirds and the rare Soay sheep. There's a museum, a shop and a very cheap pub, the "Puff Inn". St Kilda has been declared a National Heritage Site and, despite its remoteness, is visited by birdwatchers, divers, fishermen and sailors. An elderly couple we had seen on Harris in a small yacht caught up with us on St Kilda, to our amazement! I for one can't wait to go back to the Outer Hebrides for more island-hopping!

#### Generous June - seasonal food & drink with Meg Clubley

June is one of the most bountiful months in the British food calendar, all the more so in the north east where we must wait a few weeks longer than southerners. The sun may be letting us down (it certainly was, at the time of writing) but nonetheless, it's time to think positively and banish heavy red wines to the under-stair cupboard! Stock up on pinks, whites and light chill-able reds and keep some in the fridge in readiness for a spontaneous Saturday lunch in the garden should a fleeting moment of warmth occur at the right moment!

I always think it one of life's nice serendipities that, just as my thoughts are turning to Sauvignon Blanc (as they do at the first glimpse of spring sun) its twin soul mates, British asparagus and peas in the pod, arrive in the shops. Now is also the time to make the most of young and tender broad beans (try them in a risotto), rainbow-trout and early baby courgettes, with their flowers, if you grow your own. Strawberries and early cherries are also on their way, crowning this as the ultimate season of good health and pure luxury. And to think that people still query why June should be my favourite month!

Wild Garlic Gathering and using wild food has a smug-

ness factor that is second to none, but many free foods (mushrooms, berries etc.) come with inherent dangers. One that is safe, plentiful and easily spotted is wild garlic, also known as ransoms. People do notice it but stroll by, pausing only to inhale a whiff of its distinctive fragrance, perhaps unaware that it is one of the most easily used of wild foods. Our woods are swathed in it at the moment and if its garlic-and-chive smell isn't identification enough, you can spot it by the broad, long leaves and dainty white flowers. Gathering wild food should be done responsibly; pick just enough leaves, from a wide area, rather than decimating individual plants. So now, what to do with it? After washing, roughly tear it and throw (at the last minute) into creamy pasta sauces or risottos; shred into cheesy sandwich fillings - try goats cheese and parmesan for a truly posh alternative to the "cheese savoury"; slip it into the flesh of a joint of lamb before roasting, or use with your usual herbs if roasting a chicken. In short, use it anywhere you would garlic or chives, and enjoy the thought of your ancestors pride in your hunter-gathering credentials!
