Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch Panel Shed & Garden Equipment - Security Alert!

Many people take a great deal of time and effort to secure their house and the property within whilst at the same time neglecting the valuable property in the shed or around the garden. Often the shed is unlocked or so "insecure" and run down that it would pose no problem for even the amateur thief. During the summer months our area regularly experiences an increase in thefts from garden sheds and also the garden itself.

What can you do?

1. Ensure your shed is in good condition.

2. Fit a good substantial lock to the shed door. The fitting for the lock should be bolted through the door of the shed and reinforced at the back with a steel plate. The hasp should have concealed screws or coach bolts fitted. Don't forget the hinges should be secured also with non-removable screws or coach bolts. The lock should be 2.5" in width and made of hard-ened steel. It should be a closed-shackle type which will reduce the risk of the lock being forced or bolt-cropped.

3. Fit any shed windows with a grill and a cover (internally to thwart prying eyes).

4. Security mark property such as lawnmowers, garden furniture, even tools.

5. Never leave items unattended, even to pop into the house. You may only be gone a few minutes, but they might be gone forever.

6. If you leave items such as cycles in your shed make sure they are security marked and secure them to the shed's structure, just as you would if you were leaving your cycle in a public place.

7. Install either a "Dusk to Dawn" or a "PIR" Security Light to illuminate your garden.

8. Install one of the many low-cost security alarms available and readily useable in a shed location.

Alarms

Sedgefield's Crime Prevention Officer has previously demonstrated (at the Neighbourhood Watch meeting) very useful alarms including a wireless PIR/ alarm unit and a unique "alarmed" pad-lock both can be purchased at reasonable cost; and of course there are numerous similar devices readily available from normal retail sources.

Just having a clearly visible deterrent in place really does help to deter the casual thief, who will try elsewhere.

Flask in the Fridge

Please remember to update your data sheet inside the flask, following any change to either your medication or to your health. It is vital that if the Emergency Services are called and refer to the information that it is accurate & up to date, it is for your benefit only.

Contact from the ambulance service suggests that they are still finding the information in the Flask is not always up to date when they are called out in an emergency.

Jottings from Sedgefield Residents' Forum

There was no meeting in May as the scheduled date fell on bank holiday. The proposed planning application for possibly up to 45 wind turbines in the Bradbury and The Isle area has hit the headlines and we are still awaiting a date for the planning meeting regarding the proposed turbines for Spring Lane/Foxton Lane. There is to be a public meeting on May 27th so we will discuss the outcome of that at the next Forum meeting in June.

The issue of the section 106 monies 'owed' to the village (now circa £53K) is being dealt with by the Local Government Ombudsman following our complaint about the Local Authority's handling of the situation. We will report as soon as we have an update from the Ombudsman.

The next Forum meeting is on June 6th in the Fletcher Room of the Parish Hall at 7pm. The Sedgefield Together Partnership has again arranged their 'Open Event' for the same time. We will endeavour to get through Forum business as quickly as possible so that anyone who wishes can then attend the 'Open Event'

Agenda for the June meeting and minutes of the April meeting will be available in the Library one week before the meeting, everyone is welcome, come along and hear what is happening in our village and give your views.



Sedgefield in bloom



Shortly after our wonderful success last year - Best Small Town, gold in Northumbria in Bloom, silver in Britain in Bloom - we heard the sad news of the sudden death of assistant gardener Norman Willis. At the same time, Head Gardener Stephen Young had a hip operation, returning from sick leave only recently. Volunteers stepped into the breach and have been busy planting, weeding and tidying. This year we have entered Northumbria in Bloom only and judges Valerie Giles, Wendie Robertson and trainee Roy Foster made their spring visit in April. When they return on July 15th for the final summer judging, they will find plenty to admire. As well as providing colourful flowerbeds, tubs and baskets in the village centre, Sedgefield in Bloom plans to

improve existing permanent beds and create new ones, continue improvements to the roundabouts and refurbish Jubilee Gardens in The Lane. Developments continue at Winterton allotments and Ceddesfeld Gardens. Pupils from Sedgefield Community College will again be involved in restoring kindly donated vintage farming equipment. On Durham Road, an original wrought iron gate from Hardwick Park will be restored, set into a framework of 17th century bricks and planted with climbers. At the entrance to Winterton Park, the Rotary Wheel will be beautifully planted up.

On Sunday July 17, Sedgefield takes part in the National Gardens Open Scheme, a wonderful opportunity to enjoy a whole range of beautiful gardens around the village. If you would like to open your garden to the public, please contact Sedgefield in Bloom at the Council offices. All gardens, large or small, are eligible, so long as they can be accessed without going through the house. Proceeds from entry fees go to national charities, and money raised from the sale of refreshments, plants, tombola tickets and Cookery Book & DVD, will be devoted to village planting.

Time constraints mean judges can't see all our beautiful gardens, so this year, we plan to create a photographic display to show Sedgefield's breadth of gardening expertise and pride. If you would like to be involved, photos of your garden, with name & contact details, should be taken or emailed to the council offices. But you don't have to get your hands dirty to show support. The Sedgefield in Bloom Cookbook will be available to buy very soon. Visitors to our popular coffee mornings have helped us raise £1200. This is the kind of community involvement which so impressed the judges last year; plus the dedication the volunteers who turn out in all weathers. Stephen Young is back in harness, joined by new assistant gardener Roy Cairns. Volunteers have a regular date at 10am on Wednesdays to plant, weed and tidy the village. If you'd like to help, just turn up, bringing your own tools and gloves.

Damage to Harbinson House GP Surgery

Overnight on 10th May, vandalism caused serious, significant damage to the wall and steps outside the doctors' surgery (see right). Damage was so severe that the wall alongside the disabled access ramp was in danger of collapse and had to be removed immediately to prevent accident or injury to innocent people attending the surgery. Further hazardous damage was caused to a section of steps, resulting in loose, broken and missing bricks. When a hearing aid is just not enough

It can be a terrible struggle to cope with hearing loss - on the edge of conversation is one of the loneliest

places on earth but Durham Deafened Support can show how there really is a "Life after deaf".

Established 14 years ago, DDS try to complement other excellent services provided by Social Services, hearing therapists etc., and have valuable experience in bringing together people who are isolated or excluded, enabling

them to cope with their disability. Sudden or gradual, slight or profound, hearing loss can have a traumatic affect on the deafened person and their

families. It may be the poor relation of disabilities but it really changes lives. A slight to moderate loss can make a person feel inadequate or excluded, even within the family circle.

"Dealing with Deafness" non-residential rehabilitation weeks help a deafened or

hard of hearing person and their 'relevant other' to cope with changes that hearing loss has brought to their lives. Learning about Tinnitus, balance problems or clear speech from hearing therapists audiologists and people who have cochlear implants, is all part of the

programme. The next Dealing with Deafness week will be at Bowburn Hall in October.

DDS also provides lip-reading training, Tinnitus counselling and information about cochlear implants and one to one

and family support /training in communication and coping skills. We also have a large range of equipment such as hearing aid compatible phones, personal listeners etc:

SPORTS UPDATE

Space is at a premium this month (like tickets for the men's 100m sprint final at the London 2012 Olympics), so my planned cycling tale and round up of the Sunday league football season will have to wait until next time. However, I must at least mention news that has just come in, that Sedgefield NetPark FC has achieved promotion for the third season in succession. Congratulations to everyone at the club – more on that and the fortunes of Sedgefield's other clubs next time.

Cricket

Last month's optimism about Sedgefield Cricket Club's prospects for the new season appear to have been well founded. The senior teams have now been kitted out in sponsored shirts thanks to Hambleton Ales, while the ongoing refurbishment of the clubhouse continues and a new electronic scoreboard is being fitted. Meanwhile, as I type this, performances on the pitch are matching up to expectations. Following a win against Guisborough, the first team extended its lead at the top of Division 1, while a 10 wicket victory at Hartlepool saw the second team move up to third in Division 2.

Squash

An already successful season for Sedgefield Squash Club got even better recently at the Durham and Cleveland Squash Association presentation night. Sedgefield swept the board, picking up a fine collection of awards. Once again, the club was named Small Club of the Year in recognition not just of individual achievements, but also of the work that has gone into developing and promoting the club, through completion of the £60,000 refurbishment programme, the junior coaching sessions, expansion of racketball, and taking squash to local schools along with the inter schools competition.

Isle of Man Squash Blitz

A delegation from Sedgefield Squash Club has attended the annual Isle of Man Squash Blitz. The tone of the weekend was very much a mix of social and squash (leaving it up to individual clubs to decide on the proportions!) with 24 teams of six players competing. Each match lasted eight minutes in which both players had to score as many points as possible, as all points scored contributed towards the team's overall score. This resulted in fast moving intense games. County players were ineligible, which again helped contribute to the social nature of the event.

Notwithstanding all of this, in one pub the landlord had enquired as to why the Sedgefield players were there. On being told that they were competing in a squash competition he looked around the table and said, "Well you must be here to make up the numbers!" This proved somewhat prophetic with Sedgefield not making the knockout stages of the competition, which was eventually won by the Vale of Lune Squash Club. Junior Harriers

At the recent North East Track and Field Championships staged at Gateshead International Stadium, Sedgefield Harriers once again underlined their growing status as an athletics force with which to be reckoned.

Undoubtedly the highlight of the two day meeting for the Harriers was the U13 Girls' 800m. In one of the most competitive events of the whole meeting, Sedgefield's three girls, Rebecca Mott, Hannah Featherstone and Ellie Gaines, had to run in qualifying heats just to make the final. This they duly did to find themselves facing three Gateshead Harriers and an athlete each from Jarrow and Birtley. The final was fast and furious with all three Sedgefield Harriers being in contention off the final bend of the two laps of the track. In a tight finish that included six of the eight girls, Sedgefield's Rebecca Mott finished 4th in 2:43.7, while Ellie Gaines and Hannah Featherstone needed a photo finish to separate them as they finished 5th and 6th respectively with the same time of 2:44.7.

Rebecca Mott and Hannah Featherstone, fierce competitors on the track but best of friends off it, renewed their rivalry on the second day of the championships over the longer distance of 1500m. In scenes reminiscent of Coe and Ovett's rivalry during the 1980 Moscow Olympics, Hannah turned the tables on her conqueror over 800m by finishing one place ahead of Rebecca in 4th place in a time of 5:27.3, less than half a second off a silver medal. Meanwhile, Rebecca's 5th place and a time of 5:30.27 was enough to see her improve her personal best for 1500m by over 20 seconds.

Medal winning performances were also forthcoming for the Harriers with Scott Kippin battling windy conditions to win silver in the U17 Men's 400m in a time of 55.3 seconds. Meanwhile, Abi Hearmon rubberstamped her continuing improvement with a strong run in the U17 women's 3000m to win a bronze medal. In a highly tactical affair, Jonathan Baines was 7th in the U20 Men's 1500m in a time of 4:32.79 while Sam Hearmon took a step up in class and performance to finish 11th in the U17 Men's 1500m in a time of 5:16.69. George Pilkington demonstrated that he will almost certainly soon be among the medals when finishing 4th in the U15 Boys 80m Hurdles in a time of 15.31.

Senior Harriers

Sedgefield Harriers' own men's senior 'A' team pulled out all the stops to win the Neptune Relays on their own patch in Hardwick Park on Wednesday 20th April. Two promising runners, Ben Hetherington and Jonathan Baines, were plucked from the junior ranks to run the first and third legs of the four stage event, with Richard Bayles and Ian Blakemore completing the line up who won in a time of 36:22 overall, 1:12 behind the course record set by Brian Rushworth's Sunderland Harriers team in 2009. Jonathan Baines' time of 8:39 was just 17 seconds behind Brian Rushworth's best of 8:22 set in 2010 when Sunderland were second to Aycliffe. This year, Hartlepool Burn Road Harriers 'A' were second in 37:54 and Aycliffe 'A' third in 38:12.

In the women's race the Durham City Harriers quartet of Chloe Price, Aiveen Fox, Olivia Tindale and Kim Simpson defended their title, winning in 40:15 compared with 45:52 in 2010. Chloe Price ran a women's best of 9:54 on the first leg, 18 seconds better than her run in 2010. Elvet Striders women were second in 47:17 and Aycliffe women clocked 48:10 in third. Sedgefield Black Lion FC (Stephen Collins, Philip Tonks, Matthew Jacobs and Richard Bland) were first non -club team in 38:23 which gave them an excellent 4th position overall. A record forty-two teams took park. A special mention to 'Team Wednesday' - four women - Joanne Birbeck from Sedgefield, Sharon Stapleton from Darlington, Sharon Roberts from Darlington and Tracey Brown from Yarm. Team Wednesday only took up running in the past year, encouraged by Sedgefield Harriers' beginners running group, and who ran a time of 61:58 and completed their own victory by not coming last! Next year's event is on Wednesday 26th April.
