Legal Musings

Sadly, over the past few years I have seen an increase in financial abuse of the elderly. The most memorable case was of a lady in her 70's who was suffering from dementia and her neighbours, in their 60's, were driving her around to various cash points where she was withdrawing a few hundred pounds at a time and giving it to them. It took some months for her son to realise what was happening. When his mother was interviewed by the police not only did the mother fail to remember the withdrawals she also claimed that she had known her neighbours for many years, she had chosen to give them money and, that they were her best friends. The sad truth was that the neighbours had only lived next door to her for about a year and, would not fall within the definition of friendship, taking the elderly lady's savings from her.

The son came to see me desperate for the financial abuse to stop. Unfortunately his mother did not have a Lasting Power of Attorney, and because she did not have mental capacity (the ability to make decisions), it involved a long and arduous application to the Court of Protection seeking an interim order to investigate her financial affairs before a final order could be granted by the Court to enable him to manage her financial affairs.

There are two types of Lasting Power of Attorneys that a person can have: health and welfare or property and affairs. For the purposes of this article I am focussing upon the property and affairs Lasting Power of Attorney. A Lasting Power of Attorney allows you to appoint someone, known as an attorney, to make decisions on your behalf about your finances and property when you can no longer do so. I would always recommend that you have at least two attorneys whom you trust implicitly.

The Lasting Power of Attorney is prepared in advance, when you are able to make decisions, and in it you can restrict the attorneys' powers or place conditions on what they can or cannot do. For example, you can say that your attorneys cannot sell your house until a doctor has certified that you can no longer live there or that the attorneys cannot register the Lasting Power of Attorney until a doctor has certified that you can no longer manage your affairs. You can direct that the decisions the attorneys take are 'joint and several'. In other words, if you have more than one attorney, you can direct that they can make some decisions on their own but other, more important decisions, must be taken collectively. It would be sensible to allow an individual attorneys to make some decisions on their own. It would be too complicated and time consuming for all attorneys to have to agree on day to day purchases for you such as milk, bread etc. It is advisable to direct that all attorneys must take a collective decision on purchases over a particular sum of money. This would be up to the individual but some people are quite happy for their attorneys to take individual decisions on sums up to £100, £500 and even £1000.

The benefits of making a Lasting Power of Attorney are numerous:

It is reassuring for you to know that someone you know and trust will be making decisions on your behalf in the future.

If one has not been made it can be expensive and stressful for the family to apply to the Court of Protection for a similar power.

It will give you time to discuss your future planning with friends and family and give you an opportunity to put your wishes in writing.

I personally would recommend that everyone over the age of 18 should have a Lasting Power of Attorney and that it is not exclusively for the elderly. No one knows the future, but I realise that it is not a priority for younger people! You can get the Lasting Power of Attorney forms from www.justice.gov.uk/ forms/opg (Office of the Public Guardian).

Sedgefield Lyric Singers 40 years of singing together

Sedgefield Lyric Singers was formed in October 1974, on the initiative of Derrick Lofthouse, with the aim that its members should gain pleasure and companionship from singing together, further their knowledge of music, of singing in particular, and give enjoyment to others through performances. The choir also set out to support charitable and worthwhile causes whenever possible. The first concert was in December 1974 under the musical direction of the late David Garood, and from the outset the choir clearly knew where it was going. The opening song was 'See the Conquering Hero Comes' from Handel's Judas Maccabaeus. They have been conquering ever since!

By the 1980s the choir numbered about forty, a level it maintains today. What's more, almost half of its members have sung with the choir for most of its forty years. Ten years after its inception, a junior section for young people aged 8 to 18 was created and when that had run for over twenty years, a small group of young men and women reunited to form Lirica, a group specialising in close harmony and a cappella singing. The children of Lyric Singers have sung in Sedgefield Lyrics Youth Choir, graduated to become members (and even Musical Director) of the adult choir, and in due course, seen their own children join the youth choir.

The Lyric Singers have sung at many venues throughout County Durham, including hospitals, care homes, churches and church halls, in parish and village halls, and at one time they sang regularly with the Billingham Silver Band. SLYC and adult groups have travelled to Hamminkeln, our German twin town, and in combination, have hosted visiting choirs from Germany and Sweden. The Lyrics' repertoire of over three hundred songs includes classical and sacred music, songs from musical theatre, traditional North Eastern ballads, folk songs from around the world, and of course, Christmas songs and carols. There are annual Christmas, summer and Mediaeval Fayre concerts here in Sedgefield, as well as invitation concerts across the county and beyond.

The Lyric Singers have nurtured considerable musical talent, and often perform pieces composed or arranged by members. Concerts, some 'spectaculars' (remember An Edwardian Evening', 'Lyricsitania' and 'Down Memory Lane'?) have raised money for numerous charities and good causes. In fact, over the last 40 years, in excess of £18,000 has been donated to local and national good causes. Charities as diverse as the Great North Air Ambulance, Butterwick Hospice, MIND and the Anthony Nolan Trust, and global charities such as WWF and Practical Action have all benefited. Some individuals have also been given a helping hand with grants to help further their musical ambitions.

Shed & Garden Equipment - Security Reminder!

Many people take a great deal of time and effort to secure their house and the property inside yet they forget their valuable property in the shed or around the garden. Often the shed is unlocked or so "insecure" and run down that it would pose no problem for even the amateur thief. During the summer months our area regularly experiences an increase in thefts from garden sheds and also the garden itself. So what can you do? First, Ensure your shed is in good condition.

Fit a good substantial lock to the shed door. The fitting should be bolted through the shed door and reinforced at the back with a steel plate. The hasp should have concealed screws or coach bolts fitted. Don't forget, hinges should also be secured with non-removable screws or coach bolts. The lock should preferably be 2.5" in width and made of hardened steel. It should be a closed-shackle type which will reduce the risk of it being forced or bolt-cropped.

Fit shed windows with a grill and cover (internally) to prevent prying eyes. Security mark property like lawnmowers, garden furniture, even tools.

Never leave items unattended, even to pop into the house. You may only be gone a few minutes, but they might be gone forever.

If you leave items such as cycles in your shed make sure they are security marked and secure them to the shed's structure - just as you would if you were leaving your cycle in a public place.

Install a "Dusk to Dawn" or a "PIR" Security Light to illuminate your garden. Install one of the many low-cost security alarms available and readily useable in a shed location, all readily available from local retail sources.

A clearly visible deterrent in place really does help to deter the casual thief, who will usually move on and try elsewhere.

Flask in the Fridge - Reminder

Please remember to update your data sheet inside the flask, following any change to either your medication or to your health. It is vital that if the Emergency Services are called and refer to the information that it is accurate & up to date, it is for your benefit only. A simple method is to put your most recent medication script in the flask (as long as it has all your current medication on it). Flasks are still available free from Library and Town Council Offices.

Finally, please report to Police on 101, out of place or suspicious vehicles and persons who cause concern. This will help make our village & homes even safer.

Sedgefield Residents' Forum notes from May meeting

The May meeting was still held despite it being a Bank Holiday; it proved too difficult to change the date. Once again there was no update or information from County Council representatives but Sedgefield Mayor attended with Town Council and Area Action Partnership information.

A report was given on the recent licensing hearing for the Hardwick Live license application. Whilst everyone wants local businesses to be successful those present once again agreed this should not be at the expense of residents having peaceful life. Concern was expressed that there seemed to be a reluctance on the part of the Local Authority to accept that sound levels caused a considerable nuisance to some residents and also that the Authority seemed to have a much lower number of complaints than had actually been made by residents. The Licensing authority recommended that there be meetings between Hardwick Hall, local residents, Town council and County officer in an effort to address issues.

There was, of course, discussion on the ongoing threat of extensive housing development in the village and residents await further information from the Neighbourhood Plan group.

Cllr Carr reported on funding available from the Area Action Partnership for improving health initiatives and welfare reform implications; he emphasised that it is important that Sedgefield tries to access the funding.

There was a comprehensive update from the GP Patient Panel representative including information on interesting initiatives in the surgery reception area i.e. appointment self check in and a self service blood pressure monitor.

The Winterton estate has been the target for overnight thieves recently. On two separate occasions a number of garages were forced open and searched. It would appear that very little had been taken other than a road push bike and set of golf clubs. Could it be that they were looking for more profitable items such as Quad bikes/motor bikes? Please review the security on your garage doors and help prevent any further crime. Other crimes reported to police include the theft of electric gates from Sands Hall and wooden gates from the Winterton area. A vehicle windscreen was smashed by two males in Cragside and paint stripper damaged a vehicle in Beaumont Court. Also a 12"stone 'Buddha' was stolen from a garden in The Garth.

Comment was made that dog fouling seemed to be on the increase again in several areas of the village, residents are reminded to report all incidents as that is the only way to get the attention of the Authority to address the issue. A question was asked about the change in colour of some street lights. It was confirmed that eventually all street lighting will be changed from the orange lights to the white lights as they are more environmentally friendly and can be dimmed. However, in some communities there have been complaints that the white lights do not light an area as effectively as the orange lights therefore leaving some vulnerable dark areas.

There was no police report at this meeting. PACT (Police & Community Together) meetings will take place at the bimonthly Neighbourhood Watch meetings. Next Forum meeting, July 7th; 7pm, Fletcher Room, Parish Hall. But over the next weeks there will be Town Council meetings where everyone is welcome to attend and don't forget we have a new Town Clerk. Welcome to Jane Ayre. The Sedgefield Plan

We continue to make good progress with the development of The Sedgefield Plan, Writing it is a task that requires research and technical input but we hope to be able to discuss it with the community towards the end of June to mid-July and to submit it to Durham County Council by the end of July. Thanks to all the residents who have responded to the 'Site Preference Survey' as I write we have received over 250 competed responses and I anticipate more by the end of the month. The results are very interesting and will be available for all to see on the front page of the wehsite

www.thesedgefieldplan.co.uk . We will use the outcome of the survey to guide policy decisions in the draft plan.

Late April saw the submission of the ESRG planning application to build 210 houses and a care home off Beacon Lane adjacent to Beacon Avenue. The developer will also submit an outline planning application for a further 200 plus houses on land off Salters Lane, which will also include business premises. It is clear that Sedgefield is a community under siege - clearly demonstrated by the map on the Site Survey. It is therefore important that the community is represented at the 'Inspection in Public' of Durham County Councils Draft Local Plan to express our concerns and to broadly support the plan for the development and growth of Sedgefield in a controlled manner that does not diminish the character or the 'village' environment that makes it such a great place in which to live.

Father Caden Memorial Garden

At the end of April, the League of Friends dedicated a memorial garden at Sedgefield Community Hospital to the late Father John Caden MBE. Longest serving chaplain in the NHS, Father Caden founded the League, serving as Roman Catholic Chaplain from 1967-2013 at Winterton and Sedgefield Hospitals. Father Shaun Swales presided at the ceremony, attended by hospital staff, matron Sue Day, STC Chairman Chris Lines and members of the League.



With its own constitution and banking account, the League held charitable status from 1988-2008, giving invaluable service visiting patients, providing gifts and organising events. All had to undergo police checks and were insured for carrying out charitable work. When Winterton's closure was announced, the League bought the chapel's stained glass window. They were delighted when Rev Martin King obtained permission for it to be mounted in the North Transept of St Edmund's church.

Three members have been awarded MBEs for their work with the League – Ruth Lee, Margaret Horn and Father Caden himself. Other stalwarts include Iris Forsyth, Jean Ogden, treasurer Vera Iceton and Judith Tulip, Supervisor of the Voluntary Services Department. Secretary Betty Amlin is very grateful to all who helped the League over the years and to two gentlemen who funded the buffet served at the garden's dedication ceremony.

Plans to rename the hospital in Father Caden's memory were shelved, partly as the hospital building is a rented property. A petition to retain the existing name organised on behalf of the hospital's catchment area had no bearing upon the decision. The garden, as its plaque declares, will be a lasting tribute to 'A Loyal Servant and Friend'.
