David Hillerby is Sedgefield's Citizen of the Year 2014

David Hillerby first came to Sedgefield in 1956 and has lived here since marrying Enid in 1962 (seen together here in David's favourite photograph.) When their son started school ten years later, David's long history of volunteering began as Secretary of the PTA at Rectory Row School. His commitment to youngsters continued as Sedgefield Scout Group Leader from 1975 - 85 and still, when he makes the annual Young Citizen of the Year award at Sedgefield Community College, having helped to establish the Alan Sowerby Annual Award for the pupil considered most deserving by the staff.

David's volunteering efforts seemed to flower at the turn of the century, when he organised the Boynston Grove Millennium Party. In the same year joining the Neighbourhood Watch group and in 2002 he was elected Vice Chair of NHW, a position he has held to the present day, championing the "flask in the fridge" scheme, the Alan Sowerby Awards and much more. He had become committed to this community and has always been very generous with his time and energy.



At Sedgefield News we have reason to be grateful for his efforts. In 2002, as an active member of Sedgefield Development Trust, he helped to launch the newsletter by organising the house to house distribution, with help from others in NHW, and soon he had arranged to produce an audio version for partially sighted residents. He still personally delivers many copies of Sedgefield News every month and continues to create and distribute the audio version. For this reason, David is among the first to see the News every month and has been known to spot a mistake in the nick of time!

Road safety has long been one of David's concerns and as Vice-chair of the Road Safety Committee was instrumental in getting Stockton Road junction re-aligned, reducing accidents and injuries. He was active in the group which persuaded Durham County Council to close Beacon Lane to vehicular traffic. An interest in transport also showed in 2003 when he co-authored "Wilkinson's of Sedgefield", a history of the local bus company - and transport of a very different kind - he was in at the beginning of the very popular "Spitfire on the Green" project, which highlights the next part of the story, because in 2005, David was one of three founders of Sedgefield Village Veterans.

For 10 years he has raised the organisation's profile and our awareness of the role of our armed forces, and this year he was elected the Veterans' first president. Sedgefield Veterans have organised repatriation services, commemorations for VE day & VJ day at the war memorial at St. Edmund's as well as the 11th November armistice services at the war memorial at St. Luke's, Winterton. David's outstanding achievement in relation to repatriation services was recognised in 2012 by the award of the DCC chairman's Gold Medal.

In 2014 he arranged the visit of the Lord Lieutenant to launch the departure of the Boundary 500 Motorcyclist's visit to the Western Front, carrying a Poppy wreath and 100 Poppy crosses from Sedgefield, to be planted at various battlefield memorials in France and Belgium; at about the same time he rescued 2 war memorial plaques from a skip at Durham County Hospital, one of which was from Winterton. It is being renovated, to be hung in St Edmund's Church in perpetuity.

David has done such a lot for Sedgefield, and his achievements are great, but for many of those who proposed him as our Citizen of the Year for 2014, it is also for David the man; a gentleman, a friend with a big heart, a compassionate and kind man who can always be relied upon; the ultimate volunteer, who takes his responsibilities seriously.

Steve's Nature Diary The natural world month by month

If you visit Durham Wildlife Trust's Bishop Middleham Nature reserve in winter you begin to wonder why it is a nature reserve. It looks rather bleak, lifeless and dull. But revisit it in June or July and see just why this former magnesian limestone quarry is so important. The magnesian limestone is a special group of rocks laid down in the Permian period, 270 million years ago. At that time Bishop Middleham was part of a barrier reef, on the western edge of the warm, shallow, Caribbean-like Zechstein Sea.

The reserve is 1km north of Bishop Middleham on the minor road off the A177 with parking in the roadside lay-by opposite the reserve entrance. Enter through the kissing gate and before you is a hidden oasis of flowers and if you are lucky butterflies. The terrain can be difficult with steep cliff faces but keep to the paths and your effort is rewarded. The quarry was abandoned to nature in the 1930s and with careful management by the Wildlife Trust became a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) for its plant life.

In June several types of orchid are in flower; Pyramidal, Common Spotted and Fragrant with their showy blooms, survive on thin limestone soils amongst a wealth of other flora including Bird's-foot Trefoil, Rock Rose and Blue Moor Grass. Look very closely to find small colonies of Bee Orchids: these are not as vibrant as others, but are fascinating and beautiful plants that certainly live up to their name, each flower seems to have a female bee resting on it. These modified petals also smell like female bees, emitting enticing chemical signals. These remarkable adaptations are an effective deception to lure a real bee to come and mate, the excited male insect becomes covered in pollen, in turn pollinating the next orchid he visits.

The site attracts large numbers of butterflies like Dingy Skipper, Common Blue, Small Heath, Ringlet, Small Copper and one of the county's largest colonies of the rare Durham Brown Argus butterfly, best seen in June and July; also many species of moth, such as Six-spot Burnet, Wood Tiger and Humming bird hawk moth. There is a small colony of Sand Martins which you see and hear as they reel over the quarry feeding on insects. Quite often you can hear the distinctive song of a Yellowhammer, "a little bit of bread and no cheese" as it perches and sings from the top of a bush.

A visit in June just whets the appetite and you must go back in July to see the Dark Red Helleborine, a nationally scarce orchid. With several thousands of spikes in a good year, Bishop Middleham quarry has a substantial number of the national population of this orchid and all on your doorstep.

Sedgefield Village Neighbourhood & Crime Watch

The meeting with the Durham County Traffic Manager referred to in last month's notes took place in April. Unfortunately, despite the Manager's recognition of the residents' genuine safety related issues (for pedestrians crossing the roads at the hospital roundabout and Salters Lane) no action will be taken by DCC to alleviate or improve matters; for the simple reason that the problems identified do not meet Government criteria where action must be taken, coupled with budgetary constraints which prevent an ability to make non-essential improvements an option for our Authority.

There is to be a further meeting in May with residents from N/H/Watch and an officer from DCC responsible for parking matters, to hear their concerns relating to the access road into the trading estate from the roundabout. This will be reported on **Tuesday 9th of June** at the next N/H/Watch meeting, at 7pm in the Fletcher room of the Parish Hall.

N/H/Watch wish to thank Mayor Mel Carr for his kind donation from his fund raising activities; this will go towards our costs incurred holding our 5 meetings each year, the balance coming from our existing but dwindling funds. We still urge members & residents to report to the Police on tel. 101, all out of place or suspicious vehicles and also any persons or activities that cause you some concern – it will help to make our village & our homes even safer.

PC Todd's report

Crime remains low in and around Sedgefield Village. The two crimes reported include the theft of a lawn mower from a shed in Rowan Oval and a vehicle having been broken into on the A689 where a large quantity of paintball equipment was taken. Remember, if anything in your garden can be seen from the road it is vulnerable and prey to nocturnal thieves. Make sure you protect your property. Mark with your post code and take photographs.

Last month I reported on the theft of a mobility scooter. The six youths responsible for taking the vehicle to Hardwick Park and depositing it in the lake have been interviewed and are being dealt with through the criminal justice system. I would remind young people visiting the village not to engage in this type of mindless behaviour.



SPORTS UPDATE with Sports Editor, Chris Lines

Despite appearances to the contrary, summer is well and truly underway, so Sedgefield Cricket Club's many teams are getting stuck into a packed programme of fixtures, while athletes from Sedgefield Harriers can be found here, there and everywhere, on track, field, road, trail and fell. Look out for full updates from both clubs over the next couple of months, but meanwhile, it's time to wrap up a couple of seasons that have just finished.

Squash

Following two years that saw considerable team success for Sedgefield Squash Club in the Durham and Cleveland leagues, it was inevitable that this season would be focussed on consolidation rather than promotion. All of the teams put in strong and spirited performances over what proved to be a tough year.

The men's 1st team competed in the Division 1 for the first time in many years. Led from the front by county standard players Chris Gillespie and Matt Marshall, the team put in a very creditable performance, and while they could not match the top three clubs, they competed strongly against the rest of the division, finishing sixth. It should be noted that Sedgefield fielded the youngest team in the division, with four juniors turning out for the team over the season. It is also noteworthy that Sedgefield do not pay for anyone outside of the club to play for its teams, which many other clubs do. First team matches always drew a large crowd to the club and the hope is that the 1st team now becomes a regular fixture in the county's top league.

Elsewhere, the 2nd team finished sixth in Division 3, despite losing some key players to injury over the season. The 3rd team shrugged off a slow start to the season to finish third in a closely fought Division 4. In Division 5, the 4th team finished fifth, despite posting only one win over the season, but their final placing reflects that fact that the other games were only narrowly lost.

The ladies had a tougher year, losing some key players during the season, and the ladies teams finished bottom of Division 1 and 2 respectively. However, it is a credit to them that Sedgefield remains the only club to field more than one ladies team, and were able to turn out full teams for each match. Hopefully, some strengthening next season will lead to a better outcome.

Junior Football

Sedgefield Youth FC held its annual trophy presentation on Saturday 9th May. All of the children and parents had a great night and the club management would like to pass on congratulations to everyone involved (there were too many highlights to list here). Sedgefield Youth FC is also very grateful to sponsor LM Windows and to all of the coaches and committee members for their hard work. Excitement is already building ahead of next season.

A new sports trophy was recently presented for the first time, in memory of local man Wayne Hedley, who died of kidney cancer last year. Wayne was born in Fishburn in 1979 and attended Sedgefield Comprehensive. He worked for a while at UPS and was a part-time fireman, but also had a real passion for sport. Wayne gained a degree in sports science and worked at Queen Elizabeth Sixth Form College in Darlington for five years before moving to Sunderland Bede's College, where he was a sports science teacher until his untimely death. Early in May, the two colleges held an event, competing with each other in football (girls and boys), rugby sevens, basketball and netball. Sunderland won the football matches, while Darlington teams were victorious in the basketball and netball. The rugby match was drawn, so, fittingly, the first Hedley Cup was shared. The event will be held on an annual basis and the colleges will take turns to host it (it was held in Darlington this year). The hope is that the Hedley Cup

will unearth some sports stars of the future.

William Affleck Anderson, RMS Lusitania and Sedgefield

Friday 8th May was quite special. With Alison Hodgson from Sedgefield Local History Society, my middle son Charlie and his friend Joe Whitehill, I visited the grave of William Affleck Anderson, the second man from Sedgefield who died during World War I, when RMS Lusitania sank on 7th May 1915. Although at the time of his death he lived in Liverpool, he was born in Sedgefield and still had relatives in our area. He is buried in Kirkdale Cemetery in the city, where we met local vicar, John Williams (whom you may remember as a former curate in Sedgefield), held a short service, and laid a wreath and flowers in memory and gratitude, on behalf of the people of Sedgefield.



We found the house on Trevor Road where Mr. Anderson lived at the time, with his wife Lilian Ethel and their two children. Then it was on to the Lusitania exhibition at Liverpool Maritime Museum, where Charlie and Joe learned about the ship and the circumstances of its sinking. The following week they shared that with their class mates at Sedgefield Primary School, as part of work that they have all been doing about the Lusitania and its link to Sedgefield. Thanks to the work of Sedgefield Local History Society and the Sedgefield Village Veterans, we are honouring each man from our community who fell in World War I, and I thought it appropriate to make the effort and visit his final resting place. It is important that we also use these commemorations to help younger generations appreciate the significance of what happened 100 years ago and I am delighted that Sedgefield Primary School is playing such a proactive role in that.

Although I have no personal connection with William Affleck Anderson, I found the visit to be a very moving experience. While at Kirkdale Cemetery, I was struck by how many other headstones marked the graves of men and women who fell in both World Wars, many of whom were service personnel. We owe a huge debt of gratitude to every single one of them. Whichever way we used our votes in the recent General Election and whatever our opinion of the results, it is thanks to the sacrifices of the likes of William Affleck Anderson that we have been able to exercise our democratic right at all. Thank you Mr. Anderson.
